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



GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

Treatment Centres and Clinics.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

Maternal Mortality:

There were no deaths from Puerperal Pyrexia.

There were two deaths from other Puerperal causes. The certified causes given were :—

Toxaemia of Pregnancy 2.

Ante-Natal Clinics:

Dr. J. A. Nagle conducts these clinics which are held every Friday and every other Thursday.

All the salaried midwives attend with their own cases. A Health Visitor and clerk assist at each session.

The attendances for 1945 were :-

Health Visiting:

All notified births are visited. Close co-operation between the local Registrar and this Department is kept up. Advice as to proper care of the home, mother, baby and toddler is given on every available opportunity. Special attention is paid to nutrition of the individual and to the preparation and storage of food in the home.

Boarded Out Children:

A register is kept of all known cases in the area. The cases are visited monthly and reported on by the Health Visitors who act as Infant Life Protection Visitors.

Welfare Centres:

Welfare Centres are held on three afternoons a week. The Centres are under the Control of the Medical Officer of Health who is assisted on each occasion by two Health Visitors, a clerk and two or three members of the Ladies' Voluntary Committee.

Infantile Mortality:

Scabies.

Five Clinics are held weekly at the Cleansing Station rear of 23, Wellington Road. The total number of cases treated was 566.

Promotion of Cleanliness and Good Habits and the Elimination of Verminous Conditions:

The Health Visitors and School Nurses co-operate very closely with each other and in the general scheme of this work.

Lethane Hair Oil is used in the Clinic and also is given to mothers for use in the homes when found necessary. Instructions are given at the same time as to its use and for the care and toilet of the hair. Advice on Hygiene and good habits generally is tendered to mothers when routine and special visits are paid to homes, particular attention being paid to those homes most in need of it and all cases are followed up regularly.

Families have been sent to Institutions for cleansing when the need has arisen.

Legal action has been taken when necessary in cases of tenants who have persistently failed to keep themselves and their houses clean in spite of the advice and attention given by the Nurses and repeated visits and disinfestation of the homes by the Sanitary Inspectors.

Day Nursery.

The Day Nursery, situated in Prouds Lane, Bilston, will accommodate 40 children, ages ranging from 0 to 5 years. It is open daily from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. and the average attendance was 31 daily.

The Care of Premature Infants:

The three Health Visitors took a final course (of a fortnight each) at the Sorrento Maternity Home, Birmingham, through the kindness and co-operation of the Medical Officers concerned in the Public Health Department, Birmingham.

The weight of the baby is entered on the Birth Notification Cards.

Special Cots and equipment are provided for use in the home.

Supply of Sheets for Expectant Mothers:

386 priority dockets were issued to 193 applicants.

Care of Illegitimate Children:

The Council approved a scheme submitted by the Welfare Authority whereby the responsibility for the detailed administration of the scheme shall be in the hands of the Woman Probation Officer of the Staffordshire County Council, the Health Visitors of the Welfare Authority and the Ladies Voluntary Committee as constituted by the Welfare Authority, all acting under the general supervision of the Medical Officer of Health of the Welfare Authority.

The duties to be undertaken by the persons mentioned shall 'comprise all those suggested in the Circular.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Full details of the sanitary circumstances of the area have been given in previous reports.

Water.

The water supply in the area is satisfactory in quality and quantity.

During the year 13 bacteriological samples were taken: 3 from the Rising Main at the Bratch, 4 from the Covered Reservoirs at Coton Road, 3 from Tomhill Waterworks and 3 from private supplies in the town.

In each case the samples were satisfactory.

The water supply has 13.60 degrees of hardness before boiling, and the waters are not liable to have plumbo-solvent action.

Housing.

The applications for houses are increasing in numbers.

Clearance Areas.

A representation was made in 1945 in respect of nine areas affecting 1,504 houses and 5,640 persons.

This is a preliminary to further representations.

Overcrowding.

Owing to war conditions it has been impossible to build houses to abate overcrowding.

Inspection and Supervision of Food.

The work of food inspection is carried out by the Sanitary Inspectors, and details are given in the Sanitary Inspector's Annual Report.

Milk Supply and Food Adulteration.

The work under this heading is controlled by the County Council whose officers carry out the necessary work of sampling.

Prevalence of and Control over Infectious Diseases.

Table 10 shows the number of cases of infectious diseases notified during the year, cases admitted to Hospital and the known deaths.

Complaints.

The number of complaints received during the year was 683; 136 in respect of alleged nuisances or sanitary defects and 547 in connection with choked drains or water closets. All complaints were dealt with.

Notices.

The number of notices served during the year was 1130—Informal Notices 875, Statutory Notices 255. Notices served on owners 975, on occupiers 155.

Cleanliness of Tenants in Council Houses.

During the year 588 Corporation houses have been inspected. There is need for the constant inspection of a large number of the Corporation houses. In addition to the dirty and verminous tenants there are many who fail to keep the premises and furniture clean and who neglect and mis-use sanitary appliances.

The number of informal notices served on the occupiers to remedy conditions was 113 and the number of Statutory Notices 3. No legal proceedings were necessary.

The number of houses found to be dirty or verminous was 72 or 12.2% of the houses inspected:

Meat and Food Inspection.

The only animals slaughtered in the Borough during the year were pigs (Self Supply). The number of carcases examined was 568.

The number of visits made to food shops, food preparing premises and in connection with the slaughter of animals was 811.

The amount of unsound food destroyed was 4 tons 3 cwts. 17 lbs.

Disinfection and Disinfestation.

The number of houses disinfected after infectious cases was 109 and the number of verminous houses disinfested 81.

Common Lodging Houses.

There are two registered common lodging houses. They are not now used by travellers but are occupied by families as permanent residents.

Both of the houses are dilapidated. They cannot be reconditioned; are included in Clearance Areas and will be demolished as soon as possible.

Canal Boats Act.

Thirty-six visits have been made to the canal for the purpose of boat inspection but no registered boats have been seen.

Obstructions in Drains and Water Closets.

Choked drains and water closets are cleared by employees of the Corporation without charge to the owners or occupiers. The number of properties dealt with during the year is 544. This figure does not include obstructions removed from Corporation houses by the Housing Department.

The majority of the obstructions are due to default or neglect of the occupiers.

Factory Act 1937.

During the year 7 complaints have been received from H. M. Inspector of Factories. The defects complained of have been remedied.


Dairies, Cowsheds and Milk Shops.

There are 151 registered milk shops and two cowsheds. Bottled milk only is sold from the milk shops.

One of the cowsheds is old and dilapidated. This farm is being bought for housing development and the shed will be demolished. The other shed is old; but is kept in a clean condition. It requires re-construction but this is not practicable at present.

Rats and Mice Destruction Act.

The number of complaints received during the year was 109. The number of premises baited 196. The total number of visits made in connection with these was:—1127. The estimated kill was 1,630 and the number of dead rats found 326.
