# Report of the Medical Officer of Health to the Health Committee.

In presenting this my Thirteenth Annual Report on the work done by the Public Health Department of the Borough, and particularly on that carried out during the year 1904, it is interesting to compare the work which has now to be performed with that of a few years ago.

With each succeeding year new Acts of Parliament have come into force increasing to a very large extent the duties to be carried out by your Committee, and by the Public Health Department, for which I am officially responsible, and it is no exaggeration to say that our work has almost doubled within the last five years, and tends to increase still further.

In the first place the population of the Borough, which at the time of the Census in 1901 was 110,915, had increased by the end of the year under review to 115,427, whilst 2,497 new houses had been erected in the Borough within the same period. This means considerable increase in the density (i.e. number of persons per acre) of population, which, without very special vigilance and sustained counteracting effort on your part, and on that of your officials, would soon bring up the death rate of the Borough and reduce the vital stamina of those who have to live in the congested districts.

It is satisfactory therefore to note that the health conditions of Birkenhead still maintain their favourable position as compared with the other great towns of the Country and of this immediate district. In connection with the carrying out of the provisions of these Acts, upwards of 7,000 nuisances are dealt with per annum, whilst a vast amount of other work, such as testing of drains, disinfecting premises &c., is constantly being carried out, particulars of which are given on subsequent pages of this report. But in connection with the administration of such Acts as the Shop Hours Act, the Midwives Act &c., and certain orders of the Local Government Board, it is impossible to summarise here the work which has had to be done. Your Chief Inspector of Nuisances and I have had to pay a very large number of visits to different premises, and, to have repeated interviews, with the persons affected by the new Acts.

Under the Act requiring the Notification of cases of infectious diseases, 3188 different Notifications were received, and the houses, bedding, clothing &c., disinfected after the disease, and 371 of these cases were treated in the Fever Hospital, and 37 in the Smallpox Hospital. Smallpox was introduced into the Town on three separate occasions, giving rise to 37 cases as stated above, but these were at once removed to hospital, and no further spread of the disease occurred.

The duties involved in carrying out the provisions of the Acts relating to the sanitary condition of Bakehouses are under a special Inspector, whilst the Chief Inspector and I have made systematic visits to all the bakehouses and confectioners' shops in the Borough, and this has resulted in a very great improvement in the sanitary state of these places. 670 visits were made to bakehouses during the year. 430 visits were made to different shops in connection with the Shop Hours Acts, and 206 visits in connection with the "Seats" for Shop Assistants Act; whilst some 1,700 visits were made to workshops in connection with the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

With regard to the supervision of the Food Supply of the Town, some 171 samples of different articles were taken by the Inspector and submitted to the Public Analyst for analysis, and proceedings instituted in all cases showing adulteration. Shops for the sale of meat, fish and vegetables were also systematically visited, and the carcases of all animals slaughtered at the Abattoirs, and Woodside were carefully examined. The numbers of animals to be dealt with during the year amounted to no less than 230,180 oxen, 13,088 sheep and lambs, 5,406 pigs, and 538 calves.

The Common Lodging Houses and houses let in lodgings were regularly and carefully inspected, special attention being given to the repression of over crowding and cellar occupation. And the scavenging of back passages and the removal of night soil had also to be supervised.

It will thus be seen that the work performed under your direction is very great; and when we consider the number of interests involved, and the many difficulties which have to be overcome, I must congratulate the Committee on the very small amount of litigation which we have had to encounter. The work done and the results so far achieved must, I think, be regarded as in every way satisfactory.

# DETAILED STATEMENT OF THE WORK OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT DURING 1904.

Ordinary Sanitary Operations.—The ordinary sanitary operations of the Department have continued to receive unremitting attention. House-to-house inspections of the cottage property in the Borough have been regularly made. Gulleys and passage drains have been periodically cleansed, public fountains, &c., have been scoured and kept in order, and the systematic removal of ashpit refuse at stated intervals has been carefully superintended.

It will be seen from the above that the work of the Department continues to increase, this is in part due to new Acts of Parliament, to the ever-increasing population and consequent greater crowding, and also on account of the more thorough manner in which examinations are now made. The latter tends to the advantage of the public, both as regards health and comfort, and every effort is made to keep down public or private nuisances dangerous to the community.

Smoke Nuisances.—Seventeen observations were taken of the smoke emitted from the factory and other chimneys of the Borough during the year 1904,

In three cases the Health Committee felt called upon to prosecute the offenders against the Acts, and penalties and costs were imposed by the magistrates in each case.

The reduction of the smoke nuisance is one which is very carefully watched by the Inspectors, and much benefit has resulted in the past by their vigilance in this matter.

## FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACTS, 1878 to 1901.

In connection with the carrying out of the provisions of these Acts, the following is a statement of the work done by the Inspector during the year, viz:—

- 1700 visits have been made to workshops.
  - 670 visits have been made to bakehouses.
    - 12 visits have been made to workplaces.
    - 68 visits have been made to homeworkers premises.

- 35 workshops, including 10 bakehouses, have been placed on the register during the year, making a total of 377 up to the end of 1904, of which 72 are bakehouses and 20 are confectioners' shops.
- 36 workshops have been closed.
- 16 workshops have been transferred to more suitable premises.
- 303 nuisances in connection with workshops have been reported and abated.
  - 50 notices have been served for the abatement of nuisance arising out of defective drainage, and 15 for inefficient ventilation.
  - 72 notices to cleanse and limewash the workshops have been served and complied with.
  - 24 occupiers of workshops have limewashed their premises under inspection, but without waiting for the formal notice.
    - 2 case of overcrowding has been reported during the year.
    - 7 new workshops and removals have been notified to H.M. Inspector of Factories as referred to in section 3, subsection 3, of the Act.
    - 2 workshops have been provided with w.c. accommodation, where none previously existed.

Lists of out-workers have been carefully kept, and notices in the form prescribed by the Secretary of State, as given in my Report for 1892 (pp. 57 and 58), have been served when necessary.

Laundries.—90 visits were made during the year to the 20 laundries at present on the register.

Bakehouses.—The duties involved in carrying out the provisions of the Acts relating to the sanitary condition of bakehouses have been put under a special Inspector, and during the year 670 visits have been made to bakehouses.

There has been a very great improvement secured by this systematic inspection.

## "Shop Hours Acts, 1892 and 1895."

In carrying out the provisions of these Acts the Inspector has paid 430 visits to different shops, and the occupiers' names and addresses have been placed upon a register specially kept for the purpose, together with the date of his visits.

71 premises have been visited under this Act, and 206 visits made during the year ending 1904.

# Seizure and Destruction of Unwholesome Meat, Fish, and Vegetables.

The Meat and Food Inspector has furnished the following particulars of meat, &c., unfit for human food, seized and destroyed during 1904.

The total weight of the meat destroyed amounted to 222,860 lbs., but of this a large proportion was voluntarily surrendered by the butchers, they having called the Inspector's attention to it.

As in all recent years, a considerable proportion of the meat taken was on premises in connection with the Foreign Animals Wharf, Woodside. The total number of oxen killed at Woodside and inspected by us during 1904 was 229,182 and 8 sheep, and 129 oxen and 232 sheep were killed at Wallasey Stage and 1,140 sheep at No. 4 Shed, within our jurisdiction. At the Abattoirs in New Chester Road there were killed 879 beasts, 6852 sheep, 3856 lambs, 538 calves, and 5406 pigs; a total of 17531.

In addition to the above 216-lbs of fruit and vegetables, 154-lbs of fish, 448-lbs of eggs were siezed and destroyed as unfit for food.

## Proceedings taken under the "Sale of Food and Drugs Acts, 1875 to 1899."

The Chief Inspector (Mr. William Dawson) gives the following summary of proceedings taken under these Acts during 1904.

The total number of samples taken during the year was 171, viz.—Arrowroot 1, Brandy 2, Butter 47, Cheese 10, Coffee 2, Cream of Tartar 3, Gin 1, Ground Ginger 2, Lard 10, Margarine 3, Milk 64, Mustard 1, Oatmeal 6, Pepper 1, Rum 2, Sweets 9, Vinegar 6, Whiskey 1.

Out of the above, 6 samples of Milk, and 1 of Butter, were reported adulterated by the Public Analyst, and proceedings were taken in each case, the results of which are as follows, viz.—

The Milkhouses.—The regulation of dairies, cowsheds, and milk-shops, and the supervision of milk-sellers, has had systematic attention for a number of years. Special care is taken that the ventilation, lighting, cleansing, draining, and water supply of premises used for milk-trade are thoroughly efficient. The register of milk-sellers is revised week by week. The total number of milk-shops is 168, in addition there are 16 cowsheds, and 47 farmers resident outside the Borough, registered to purvey milk inside the Borough.

Twice every year notice is sent to all the milk-sellers requiring that the walls and ceilings of every room in the occupation of Registered Milk-sellers, used for storage or sale of milk, shall be lime-washed, that is to say, in March and September; but if the walls are painted, then they must be washed and thoroughly cleansed twice every year, in March and September.

## Meteorological Results.

The noteworthy features of the meteorology of the year are given in the following tabular statement, which has kindly been prepared by W. E. Plummer, Esq., M.A., F.R.A.S, Director of the Observatory, Bidston Hill, Birkenhead, who also furnishes particulars weekly of the daily observations taken under his directions, from which Table IV. in the appendix is compiled, and also the information on which the remarks with reference to meteorological conditions and epidemics are based.

Barometer.—The mean barometer of 1904 (29.931 inches) was higher than in recent years and 0.01 higher than the average mean of the last 38 years. The greatest wind storm during the year was on December 30th, when it varied from 64 to 25 miles per hour. On April 6th the wind varied from 63 to 22 miles per hour, and on October 6th from 65 to 8 miles per hour. There were nine absolutely calm hours in which there was no wind, these occurred on March 2nd two hours, and June 3rd, 23rd and 29th, July 11th and 21st, August 27th, and September 13th, one hour each day. Detailed particulars respecting the barometric pressure, temperature, rainfall, wind, humidity of the air and the proportion of cloud to clear sky &c., will be found in Table IV.

Rainfall—The rainfall of 1904, 25.175 inches, was lower than usual and 3.656 inches less than the average of the previous thirty-seven years.

The connection between Meteorological Conditions and Epidemics.—In endeavouring to trace any connection between meteorological conditions and epidemics, it is obvious that there are only two circumstances likely to have any effect. First, temperature, and secondly, rainfall or humidity; and with regard to the first, since the temperature curve will always have a maximum in the summer, and a minimum in the winter, it seems more important to consider the variations of temperature from the normal condition than the absolute temperature itself. Exceptional circumstances cannot be explained by ordinary phenomena, and the weekly variations of both temperature and rainfall from the regular amounts have therefore been tabulated for a number of years. These variations are set down in the following table for the year 1904.

Relative Mortality of different portions of the year.—The year's meteorology naturally introduces the next subject to be considered, viz.:—the distribution of the mortality over the four quarters, as the relative mortality of different portions of the year must necessarily be affected by the atmospheric conditions which have marked its progress. Of the sum of the deaths registered in Birkenhead Borough, 594 were entered to the first quarter, 502 to the second, 626 to the third, and 560 to the fourth. In the Union Hospital and Workhouse the number of deaths registered in the four quarters were respectively 80, 54, 46, and 56. Expressed in death rates per thousand living, the mortality of the whole Borough in 1904 was 20.6 in the first quarter, 17.4 in the second quarter, 21.8 in the third quarter, and 19.5 in the fourth quarter.

### PREVALENCE OF ZYMOTIC SICKNESS DURING 1904.

Notification of Cases of Dangerous Infectious Diseases.—The Infectious Disease Notification Act, 1889, requires householders and medical men in attendance to notify cases of dangerous infectious diseases to the Sanitary Authority, and gives facilities for supplementing the statement of the mortality from zymotic diseases with a statement of cases of sickness due to some of the chief zymotic diseases, month by month, as they were reported. The diseases which require to be notified to the Authority as "dangerous infectious diseases" are—

Small-pox Measles Scarlatina Diphtheria Membranous Croup Erysipelas  $Fevers \begin{cases} Typhus \\ Typhoid \\ Continued \\ Relapsing \end{cases}$  Puerperal Septicæmia Cholera

The cases notified appear in the following return, showing that 3188 cases were notified during the year, being 1738 more than the number notified last year; the epidemic of measles, of which disease 2212 cases were notified, accounts for a very large proportion of these.

### SMALLPOX.

On the 5th of March a case of smallpox was reported as existing at No. 6 West View, and a second one was suspected in the mother of the patient residing at No. 2 West View; there was a history of this latter patient having had two or three spots on one of the arms, but these had disappeared by the time the daughter developed the eruption. We could not discover where these people had got the infection, there was a history of their having attended a funeral party about a fortnight previously at Bootle, but no case of the disease was known to exist there, and the source of infection remained The patient was removed to the Smallpox Hospital and isolated, and all contacts were reported to the Public Vaccinator and with one exception vaccinated. quently the husband of the woman took the disease, as did also her sister-in-law, who was nursing her, and in addition to these, her step-father and two lodgers in the house and a woman who visited her also became infected. About the same time an outbreak took place in the Workhouse Infirmary and spread to a number of the inmates, there were two or three cases reported as having rashes in one of the Wards and at the request of Dr. Stansfield, the Medical Officer, I visited the Workhouse and examined the cases with him, at this time we were not aware of the existence of the disease in the town. The rashes, however were not at all characteristic, but much more like chickenpox. The patients were all elderly men and old inmates who had not been going about and thus likely to get the infection. They had no initial temperatures and little or no constitutional disturbance, and we came to the conclusion that these men had chickenpox, and I am still of that opinion. However, on the 12th March, an undoubted case of smallpox occurred in a different ward of the Workhouse Hospital, and subsequently from the 16th to the 29th March ten other cases occurred amongst the inmates of that Institution-and in addition, the visiting Chaplain became infected with disease. Two women who had been visiting their father in the same ward some days previous to the outbreak being discovered, also sickened and developed the eruption.

Another woman visited the Workhouse on the 12th, 13th and 14th February, she was ill with backache and headache &c., but no doctor was called in, and whether she had any eruption or not is unknown. Her husband who returned from sea on March 1st, was reported as suffering from the disease on March 18th, and it seems possible that this woman may have been the original source who introduced it into the Workhouse, but we have not been able to prove it; nor have we been able to trace from whence she could have become infected. On March the 22nd, another case occurred in a Common Lodging House in Ivy Street; the patient was not proved to have been in contact with any of the previous cases, nor was the source of his infection ever discovered, but it is possible that some passing tramp who may have stayed for a night in the lodging house may have brought it to him. This, however, is pure conjecture.

By the middle of June the disease had been entirely stamped out. However, another case occurred in August, and two more cases were reported in November; these were at once isolated and no further spread of the disease took place—we were not able to trace their origin.

## VITAL AND MORTAL STATISTICS FOR THE YEAR.

Area.—The Borough has an area of 3850 acres, or a little more than six square miles.

Population.—The population as shown by the Census taken in England and Wales on April 1st, 1901, was 110,915, being 11,058 in excess of the number enumerated in the census taken on April 6th, 1891.

The estimated number of persons living at Midsummer 1904, was 114,814, and on this estimate I have based the following statistics.

The total number of houses in the Borough at the time of the 1901 census was 21,172, and the number built since that time up to 31st December 1904 was 2497, and the number demolished in the same period was 60, a net gain of 2437, giving a total for the Borough at end of the year 23,609. But there are a number of houses in different parts of the town which, though not demolished, have been converted from dwelling houses into factories, stores or other workshops; of these I have no return and can only guess at their number, which I estimate will be between 200 and 300.

The number of new houses built during the eleven years, 1891-1901, is 2911, for which information I am indebted to the Borough Surveyor. The number of houses demolished during the same period being 493.

The number of houses demolished since taking of Census to end of 1904 is 60.

Taking the total number of houses in the Borough as given above viz. 23,609, and allowing 1,500 as uninhabited (there were 1,428 uninhabited at the time of the Census), then we have 22,109 inhabited houses in the Borough on the 31st December, 1904—if we multiply this by 5.6 the number of persons per house at the time of the Census, then the population of the Borough at the end of the year ought to be 123,809, or about 8,382 more than the number estimated (115,427) by the usual method of arithmetical progression employed by the Registrar General. Of course, if this is correct then our birth and death rates would be very considerably lower than those shown, which as stated above are calculated on the ordinary estimate.

Births and Deaths in Birkenhead.—During the year 1904 the returns of the local registrars recorded 3805 births and 2282 deaths in the Borough of Birkenhead. The natural increase in the population in 1904 was therefore 1523. Of the births 1940 were males and 1865 were females; of the deaths 1179 were males and 1103 were females.

Further particulars as to the births and deaths in the Borough registered in each quarter of the year, and in each township are given in the subjoined table. Those occurring in Union Workhouse are entered separately.

The proportion of Deaths of Infants under One year to the Births registered.—The proportion in Birkenhead Borough in 1904 was equal to 180 per 1000. In the seventy-five great cities and boroughs in England and Wales, amongst which Birkenhead is classed, the average proportion of deaths under one year to births registered in 1904 was 166. It varied greatly in the different towns, ranging from 87 in Hornsey to 229 in Burnley. In Liverpool it was 196, Wallasey 160, Bootle 183 and Stockport 203.

Birth-rates and Death-rates in thirty-seven great towns in England.—In order that the birth-rates and death-rates of the Borough of Birkenhead in 1904 may be compared with the corresponding rates of the most populous cities and boroughs in England, the following table has been compiled from a return given by the British Medical Journal from the Registrar General's Quarterly Returns of Births, Deaths, and causes of Death in London and the other great towns, 1904. The table gives the estimated population of the thirty-seven large towns at Midsummer 1904. The birth-rates and death-rates are for the fifty-two weeks ending December 31st. For comparative purposes these figures are interesting as they are all calculated on the same basis. They are of course unrevised returns. (See Table on opposite page.)

Out of the whole number of cities and boroughs in this list thirty-two had lower birth-rates, and thirty had lower deathrates than Birkenhead.

Tabular Statements.—In the appendix to this Report are tabular statements of the year's mortality within the Borough, classified according to the diseases, ages, and localities, a weekly register of deaths and of meteorological results, together with a return of deaths in the Birkenhead Union Hospital and Workhouse, &c.

Table I. shows the deaths registered in the whole Borough during 1904, arranged with reference to the age at which death occurred in each case. They are disposed in four sub-tables the deaths in the townships of Birkenhead and Claughton in the

first, deaths in Tranmere (exclusive of the Union premises) and Oxton in the second, the deaths in the incorporated portion of Higher Bebington in the third, and the deaths in the Union Hospital and Workhouse in the fourth. The deaths of infants are entered up in three columns-those under one year, those of one year and under two years, and those turned two years and under five. Then follow the deaths of children and young persons, those turned five years and under twenty; and of adults those turned twenty and under forty, and those turned forty and In the last two columns are the deaths of old people, those turned sixty and under eighty, and those of eighty and upwards. Reference to this table will show that, of the gross local mortality for 1904, the deaths of infants under one year of age accounted for 688, those over one year but under five years of age 375, children and young persons 107, adults 552, old people sixty years of age and upwards 560.

The relative proportion of deaths in 1904 among the infants, children and young persons, adults and old people, to the whole number of deaths, in certain sub-divisions of the borough, in the premises controlled by the Guardians of the Poor, and in the entire incorporated area, is readily shown in tabular form, thus:—

In this respect the local mortality compares favourably with the mortality in most great cities and boroughs. The percentages taken out for Bebington have little significance, the number of deaths being so small.

Table II. is the weekly register of deaths in the Borough of Birkenhead for 1904. The deaths are entered as in Table I., into four sub-tables, representing Birkenhead and Claughton, Tranmere, Oxton and Bebington, and the Union Hospital and Workhouse. Table III. is a summary of the weekly register of deaths. Table IV. is a Weekly Condensed Register of Meteorological Results. Table V. is a street register of deaths.

The Classification of Death Causes.—The causes of death, as they appear in Tables I. and II. in the appendix, are systematically classified according to the principles laid down by the late Dr. W. Farr, the nosology being that adopted by the Registrar-General until within the last few years, which experience has shown to be well suited for statistical purposes. The death causes are arranged under classes and orders, the latter corresponding to the families of Natural History. Genera, or what in diseases would be varieties, are not distinguished. All death causes are thus conveniently classified under 116 heads some of which, however, include diseases very distinct from one another.

At the beginning of Table I. are the totals of deaths from all causes, and on the next line the totals of deaths from specified causes. The deaths which it is necessary to refer to unspecified causes are not only those ascribed, in legal phraseology, to "visitation of God" or "natural causes," but also those which, with almost equal vagueness, are classified as due to "tumour," "coma," &c. The deaths from specified causes are then divided into five classes. Class I. (the zymotic) embraces all diseases, either epidemic, endemic, or contagious, which are induced by some specific body, or by want of, or by the bad quality of food. The diseases coming under Class II. (constitutional or cachectic) appear to be due to a bad habit of body, and possibly may sometimes be hereditary. Class III. takes in diseases the effects of which are manifest in disturbing or obliterating the function of particular organs or systems. Class IV. includes the conditions tending to produce death, which are the incidental results of the formative, reproductive, and nutritive processes. Class V. groups together all deaths which are the evident and direct result of physical or chemical forces.

Of the 2282 deaths registered in the Borough during 1904, 2279 were ascribed to specified causes; that is to say 465 to

zymotic diseases, 335 to constitutional diseases, 1085 to local diseases, 339 to developmental diseases, and 58 to violence. The proportion of deaths from zymotic diseases to the whole number of deaths was thus 20.3 per cent. The proportions which deaths ascribed to zymotic diseases bear to deaths from all causes is, however, a matter of no great significance, as of course the general death-rate varies considerably from year to year, and any increase in the fatality of non-zymotic diseases, such as phthisis or pneumonia (which are closely allied to zymotic diseases) makes the proportion of deaths from zymotic diseases compare more favourably.

Deaths from Zymotic Diseases.—The deaths from zymotic diseases include 169 by what have been termed the chief zymotics (certain diseases belonging to the miasmatic order), viz., smallpox 1, measles 98, scarlatina 20, diphtheria 20, membranous croup 8, fevers 15, and puerperal septicæmia 7. The remaining 296 were entered to what have been called minor zymotics (diseases less prevalent, less fatal, or less obviously zymotic in character), viz., whooping cough 83, erysipelas 5, influenza 11, diarrhœa 187, syphilis 5, dysentery 3, and other zymotic diseases 2.

## Relative Fatality of Chief Zymotic Diseases.

The figures for the years 1878 to 1898 were given in my Report for 1898.

Inquests.—The number of inquests held during 1904 was 176, thus 7.7 per cent. of the sum of the deaths in the Borough formed the subject of official enquiries. Out of the 176 inquests held, 2 were upon the bodies of infants whose deaths were due to being overlain.

Deaths not Certified.—Not all the death causes which are classified represent diseases or symptoms observed and certified by medical men in attendance during the last illness, or verdicts following official investigation. A significant proportion of the death causes are entered in the register on the doubtful testimony of deceased persons' relatives or friends, or fellow lodgers. The registrars have, therefore, been required to mark in the returns furnished, every death not certified by a registered practitioner, or made the subject of a coroner's inquest. In 1904, out of the 2,282 deaths registered, 7 were marked "not certified," that is 0.3 per cent. The causes of the 7 deaths were entered in accordance with the statements of persons giving information to the registrars as follows:—

though how such conclusions were arrived at does not appear. In my opinion such deaths ought not to be registered without a Coroner's certificate.

The proportion of uncertified deaths to the sum of the deaths was as already stated, 0.30 per cent. as compared with 0.51 per cent. in 1903.

Deaths classified according to Localities.—Tables I., II., III., and IV., in the appendix, having been fully discussed, are followed by Table V., in which the deaths registered during 1904 are classified according to the localities in which they occurred. Opposite each street or place is the number of deaths from all causes and from zymotic diseases, registered as occurring in that street or place during the year. As it was felt that particulars of the number of deaths from all causes and zymotic

diseases in each ward would prove interesting, and as the Street Register does not afford this information, the Table here submitted has been drawn up.

Illegitimacy.—Statistics relating to illegitimacy are important, not merely on account of the bearing which such a subject has upon the social life of the community, but also with a view ultimately of showing to some extent the influence which illegitimacy exerts upon the "chances of life" of infants, as it is well known that the death-rate of illegitimate children is considerably greater than that of those born in wedlock. I have thought it desirable, therefore, to continue these statistics in this report, as the subject is one of some interest.

The following table gives the total number of legitimate and illegitimate births, with the rates per 1000 of births and per 1000 living, and statistics relative to the deaths of such children under one year of age.

Illegitimate Births and Deaths, 1904.

# HOUSING OF THE WORKING CLASSES ACT, 1890.

Under the provisions of this Act during the year 1904, I made the following representations under Part II. of the Act respecting the condition of certain sets of houses, which premises were in a very insanitary condition.

These representations were duly considered and approved by the Health Committee who gave instructions for the recommendations to be carried out. The areas dealt with are as follows:—

23rd February, 1904.—1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 Campbell Terrace and 1, 2, 3 and 4 Back Camden Street. These houses were in part re-constructed, repaired and made fit for habitation.

23rd February, 1904.—1 and 2 Mersey Cottages, Thomas' Court, Queen Street. These premises were closed and are no longer used for habitation.

23rd December, 1904.—6 Leicester Terrace, Leicester Street. This house was not repaired and is closed as unfit for human habitation.

It will also be seen that a considerable amount of work in Sanitary administration and improvements was accomplished during the year, and the results I trust will be satisfactory to the Health Committee.

The Fever hospital consists of four isolation wards, containing twelve beds and two cots in each ward, and two observation wards containing four beds and two cots each. The total number of available beds is therefore fifty-six, and twelve cots in addition (these do not include the smallpox ward).

The floor space allowed for each bed in the hospital is 156 superficial feet, and the air space per bed 2,028 cubic feet.

The Nursing Staff consists of five charge nurses and ten assistant nurses.

The total number of patients treated in the hospital during the year (January 1st to December 31st) was 403; of these, 371 were admitted during the year, and 32 remained in hospital from 1903. Out of those admitted 20 died, giving a death-rate of 5.2 per cent nearly, a very low percentage.

The following table gives a summary of the cases treated in the hospital during the year 1904, along with the results obtained.

In addition to the above, I case of death occurred from burns received before admission. In connection with the deaths from diphtheria, it should be mentioned that a greater number of the cases survive since the introduction of the anti-toxin treatment.

The smallpox hospital, containing 45 beds, stands in its own ground, and is provided with a separate administration block, washhouse, mortuary &c., and is entirely distinct from the other hospital.


