Water Samples.

Samples were taken from the Council's own supplies and the bacteriological results show that the waters were satisfactory for drinking purposes. Details.

(a) Satisfactory.... 25, (b) Unsatisfactory.... 3 (c) Suspicious..... 6.

53 water samples from private sources were taken during the year. All were submitted to bacteriological examination. 27 supplies were found to be bacteriologically unsatisfactory or suspicious. 26 were found to be satisfactory. This points to the conclusion that a very high proportion of the older shallow wells in the district would prove to be bacteriologically unsatisfactory if sampled. The louncil is well aware of this and schemes have been prepared, or are being prepared, to cover the whole of the district.
