

DEATIS

83 deaths were assigned to the district by the Registrar General, yielding a standardised death rate of 8.3, which is a favourable figure.

BIRTIS

There were 161 live births, giving a standardised rate of 16 which is fairly close to the national birth rate.

MATERIAL MORTALITY

There were no deaths attributable to this cause.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948

No action was taken for the removal of any old persons in need of care and attention during the year.

SMCTION B

PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY

The Public Health Laboratory service at Dorchester continues to give the district generous service. The Laboratory undertakes the bacteriological examination of water, milk, ice-cream, and other foods. It also examines specimens for diagnosis in the case of infectious, or suspected infectious diseases.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

The Ambulance Service of the district is under the jurisdiction of the Dorset County Council, operating day and night from Castleman House, Blandford.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE SERVICES.

The Dorset County Council provide an ante-natal clinic and an Infant Welfare Centre once a fortnight. These are held at the Congregational Hall, Blandford.

HOM HELP SERVICE

The County Home Help Scheme has provided a service in Blandford and the surrounding district. It is doing excellent work.

FOOD POISONING

During the year there were three outbreaks of food poisoning at Blandford Camp. The first outbreak was sporadic, spread over a period of three months and confined to children between the ages of nine months to 15 years, the majority of them living in the Blandford Camp Warried Quarters. It would appear that a large number of young children in the Camp had symptoms of food poisoning during the Easter week-end but ressived no medical attention.

During July there was a minor outbreak in the Camp. Four officers, two cooks and a waiter were taken ill after partaking of meals in the Officers' Mess.

The third outbreak took place at the beginning of December when 58 men were taken ill. Specimens were sent to Dorchester Laboratory and profuse growth of food poisoning organisms were recovered from stew. All the man recovered within twenty four hours. It is thought likely that rats may have carried infection.

In all three cases thorough investigations were made.

A start was made towards the end of the year on the Tarrant Valley Water Scheme, based on the berehole at Stubhampton. Ministry sanction for the scheme to commence was obtained only after repeated representations and a long list of recorded unsatisfactory samples had been submitted in support.

Durweston and Stourpaine are now permanently connected to the Bryanston supply, this area forming the first part of the proposed Stour Valley Water scheme. The Blandford Forum Borough Council at present control the other part of the Stour Valley area.

From the following table it will be seen that private supplies still remain generally unsatisfactory.

REPUSE AND SALVAGE.

Two new tips were opened during the year, one at Farnham which can only be used in dry weather, and the other at Red Post, which is acting as reserve for Winterborne Kingston Tip. Winterborne Kingston Tip has been unused most of the year because of fire. The fire was still burning in December.

A resident complained to the Police that articles of clothing had been taken by the workmen. Apparently the articles were put out with the refuse in the bin and were emptied into the lorry. For two days the refuse tip was searched for the missing articles, but only the container, a hold-all type of bag was recovered. Unkind remarks were made regarding the Council's staff but I was of the opinion that "tip scroungers" had removed the things after our men had gone from the tip.

In twelve years this is only the second occasion on which such a matter has happened.

Salvage figures are slightly down on the year, compared with 1955, but this has been mainly due to lower prices provailing. Tonnage is slightly increased. Salvage figures for 1956:-

MUISANCES AND COMPLAINTS.

Fly nuisances were still much in evidence during the year but less than was expected. Action during the previous Vinter seems to have had some effect. Unfortunately most ratepayers appear to breed fly grubs in their dustbins for the Council to hatch out on the refuse tips and be blamed for creating fly nuisances. Both powder and liquid treatment is regularly carried out on the tips.

An unusual complaint from one village was to the effect that dead pigs were left lying around for dogs to get at and were causing bad smells. This was one of those rare occasions when the Police were called in to deal with the matter under the Diseases of Animals Acts.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD PREMISES.

New food regulations came into force during the year and all premises affected have been supplied with a copy of the Food Dyelaws, extracts of the Food Regulations and a Notice to Food Handlers. Good co-operation is obtained from all premises with very few exceptions.

The new regulations are being enforced where it is found to be necessary.

An outbreak of food poisoning at llandford Camp brought an appeal from the Military Authorities for assistance, which was gladly given.

There are seventy-mine food premises in the district, of which twenty-four are licences premises.

Infestations on tips were kept down by regular inspections and sewa e plants are visited regularly. Infestations generally appeared to be fewer than in 1955, although the weather and lack of food brought the rats in from the fields earlier, giving the appearance of a small increase in infestations at the end of the year.

The figure of 171 premises treated can be compared with the figure of 370 in 1955.
