

To the Chairman and Councillors of the Urban District of Bletchley

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year 1950.

The health of the District during the year has been satisfactory.

The Death Rate is much lower than that for 1949, and it is also much lower than that for the rest of the County and England and Wales.

The Birth Rate maintained its average and is well above that for the rest of the County and for England and Wales.

The Infantile Mortality Rate again shows a most gratifying drop from 25.8 in 1948, to 12.4 in 1949, to **5.4** in 1950. This figure is about one fifth of that for the rest of the County and about one sixth of that for the whole of England and Wales, and is a tribute to the skill and care of the doctors practising in the District, and also to our District Nurses and Health Visitors.

I should like to record another year of pleasant co-operation with Mr. R. Sherwood, Town Clerk, and Mr. J. F. Smithie, your Surveyor and Sanitary Inspector and their staffs.

SECTION B

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES

1. LABORATORY SERVICES

The bacteriological work of the District has been carried out by the Public Health Laboratories at Oxford and Luton. Samples of Water and Sewage for chemical analysis are sent to London.

2. AMBULANCE SERVICES

These services have been administered by the County Council since July 5th, 1948. An Ambulance Station with two Ambulances and two Sitting Case Cars has been established in the Town which has dealt satisfactorily with all general cases including accidents. For cases of infectious disease the Ambulance from Aylesbury Isolation Hospital was used.

3. NURSING FACILITIES

As in previous years the District Nurses carried on their very excellent and noble work.

4. CLINICS

(a) Maternity and Child Welfare: This Clinic has been held weekly at the Welfare Clinic in Bletchley Road. The voluntary committee, District Nurses and Health Visitor attended each time and a doctor attended once a fortnight. I feel that too much praise cannot be given to the ladies of the voluntary committee who give so much of their spare time, ungrudgingly, to this work. The total number of children who attended during the year was 2,515.

(b) Chest Clinic: This clinic continues to do excellent work. It is a self-contained unit complete with X-ray apparatus, etc., and is under the personal supervision of the County Chest Physician. Sessions are held weekly.

(c) Physiotherapy Clinic: This clinic which is administered by the British Red Cross Society continues to do very good work. Unfortunately shortage of staff has at times hampered its work. The Regional Hospital Board are taking it over when suitable premises can be procured.

6. DOMESTIC HELP SERVICE

The Compulsory Purchase Order which the Council made in respect of land adjoining their works was not confirmed, but a licence to sink Borehole No. 5 was given. Exploratory borings proved the ground in that area to be unsuitable and it became necessary to ask for a Licence to sink Borehole No. 6 on a site near to Boreholes 2 and 3.

Meanwhile the rising consumption of water has necessitated the purchase of large quantities of water from Birchmoor Water and Sewage Committee and the Bucks Water Board, and it is only by the goodwill of these two authorities that continuity of supply has been provided.

Only six houses within the Urban District are not connected to the main.

B. DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The Sewerage Disposal Works has again been seriously overloaded and the replacement of the works by a new one is the most urgent requirement of the town.

The Old Bletchley Disposal Works has continued to work fairly satisfactorily, but further drainage to the Works will soon see this overloaded.

C. RIVERS AND STREAMS

No stagnation or obstructions occurred in the streams within the area during the year under review.

D. CLOSET ACCOMMODATION

Practically 100 per cent of the houses in the district are now on the water carriage system.

E. PUBLIC CLEANSING

The introduction of a new Refuse Collecting Vehicle during the year, together with increased collecting staff has enabled a weekly collection of refuse to be instigated with the consequent improvement in conditions. It is now rare to receive a complaint of an overflowing dustbin.

The Incinerator at North Street can now only deal with almost half the refuse, the remainder is dumped direct to tips.

F. SHOPS

The need for lavatory accommodation at one cafe has not yet been met.

G. CAMPING SITES

No sites registered.

H. SMOKE ABATEMENT

The coming into operation of the new Coffee Factory in Denbigh Road has enabled Joseph Tetley & Co. Ltd., to remove from their Osborne Street factory all coffee processes, and so the nuisance in that area from coffee dust no longer takes place.

I. SWIMMING BATHS

A Public Swimming Bath has again become one of the most urgent amenities required in the town.

J. ERADICATION OF BED BUGS

Action has been taken in four cases for the eradication of bed bugs during the year.

SECTION G

PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES

1. GENERAL

There was a big drop in the incidence of Measles during the year but an increase in Whooping Cough and Scarlet Fever. The Scarlet Fever notifications were a follow on of the mild epidemic at the end of the previous year.

Two cases of Anterior Poliomyelitis were notified, one of a child the other of an adult. There was no connection between the two cases.

2. TUBERCULOSIS

Nineteen new cases were notified during the year of which seventeen were pulmonary and two non pulmonary. Five cases were subsequently removed from the Register.

There were two deaths during the year.

3. CANCER

This disease continues to take its toll. There were eleven deaths during the year.
