ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1969

Your Worship, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you the Annual Report of the Public Health and Sanitary Conditions in the Borough during the year 1969.

The Registrar General's estimated population was 35,130, a further fall of 280, which means a total decline in the population of 1,310 since 1963.

It is pleasing to report, however, that the falling birth rate has been halted; as there were 536 births during 1969, an increase of 21 over 1968, giving a birth rate of 15.2 per 1,000 population.

The number of infant deaths was 4, the lowest ever recorded, giving an infant mortality rate of 7.4 per 1,000 live births. There were 10 still births compared with 9 in 1968.

The number of deaths rose by 52 to 456 giving a crude death rate of 12.9 per 1,000 population.

The deaths of persons over 65 years of age was 303, and the commonest cause of death was heart disease.

The number of tuberculosis cases on the register continues to fall - 9 fewer than in 1968, in spite of 3 new notifications. The pulminary tuberculosis case rate is the lowest ever recorded, 2.4 per 1,000 population.

No action was taken during 1969 for the compulsory removal of persons under the National Assistance Acts.

It will be noted that there were only 23 notifications of infectious disease. It is to be hoped that parents will accept the facilities for protecting their children from diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, poleomyelitis and measles. These are available from their family doctor or local clinic. In this way the decline of infectious disease can be expected.

I wish to thank the Chairman and members of the Health Committee for their interest and support, and my colleagues in other departments for their co-operation.

The Health Department staff have worked loyally and well under very difficult conditions. In a Department with small numbers of staff, the loss of one due to sickness or resignation can cause considerable disruption of the general work, and this has been the case during 1969.

HOUSING FOR THE ELDERLY

I have always been interested in houses for special groups - handicapped persons and the aged. This Council has supported me in many of the recommendations I have made and I am grateful to the members for this.

In the reports for 1962 and 1964 I drew attention to the question of warm housing for old people and the need for action to prevent incidents of hypothermia (very low body temperature) which can lead to death. With active tenants who have adequate fuel supplies this is unlikely to be a problem but for the old person living alone or the invalid in bed there is considerable risk in a severe winter.

All modern houses have roof insulation, many have double-glazed windows to prevent heat loss. Why should old peoples' houses not have these as standard, and why not include *avity wall insulation as well? A small increase in the rent would pay for the extra cost and this rent would be more than offset by a saving in fuel.

The following figures are quoted by a reputable insulation firm:

Cavity insulation can save up to 18% heat loss

Doubling glazing 5% heat loss

Draught-proofing doors 11% heat loss

This means an economy of more than one third of the fuel costs. Heat conservation can be accomplished most readily and cheaply at the planning stage, and opposition is forthcoming because of the increase in capital outlay.

It is more expensive as an adaptation but I think there is a case for special consideration for the elderly.

I would urge the housing committee to give serious consideration to modernising the bungalows in Willow and Chestnut Avenues - there are 26 in number where the amenities are exceedingly poor when compared with the improved houses of 23rd Avenue. I would press for top priority for the modernisation of these houses. They should have as a minimum :-

Double glazing and central heating and as many labour saving devices as possible.

Everything should be done to cut down housework. This is going to be essential in the very near future as the question of supplying domestic and nursing assistance to these people is going to become more and more difficult.



INFECTIOUS DISEASE, 1969

This has been a most exceptional year for Blyth as far as infectious disease is concerned. There is no record of so few notifications as 23. Measles accounted for eleven of these and this equals the low figure of 1960. This might well have been reduced had measles vaccine been available during the year.

Infectious Hepatitis

There were 3 cases notified.

Scarlet Fever

There were 2 cases notified.

Dysentery

There were 2 cases notified.

Food Poisoning

One isolated case was notified, the specific organism being Salmonella Derby. It was not possible to trace the source of infection.

Tuberculosis

Three cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were notified. This must be considered as satisfactory when one remembers that in 1952 there were 96 notifications.

Your Worship, Ladies and Gentlemen,

Once again it is my pleasing duty to submit to you my report on the activities of the Department in the field of environmental hygiene, which I trust the Members will find of interest.

Whatever else may be said of the work it is always varied and interesting, from slum clearance to inspection of offices and shops; from meat inspection to water sampling; from improvement grants to rodent control; from clean air to exhumations; nuisances, infectious diseases, unsound food, complaints, dilapidated buildings. All are grist to the mill; they arise, they are attended to, next problem please.

If there is one subject above all else upon which I should like to elaborate it is that of wanton vandalism. In all the sound and fury which accompanies the action or lack of action by the Council in dealing with the problem of ruinous and dilapidated buildings and neglected sites it is usual to overlook the fact that the properties and lands are generally in private ownership, but it is neither the wish or the desire of the Owners that their properties should be rendered derelict and their land used for indiscriminate dumping.

Might I remind the Members and the public of the Congregational Church and Clifton Hall, Stanley Street, which had to be demolished following continuous damage and depredation; of the French Street Bakery, a valuable commercial property which was the subject of negotiation for change of usage and occupation until it was necessary for the Owners to raze it to the ground following damage and two consecutive fires; of the vacant Co-operative shop premises in Wellington Street which ultimately required demolition following persistent vandalism; of the Bebside Railway Station and Waiting Room currently awaiting demolition; of the principal Railway Station now owned by the Council, which was also subjected to damage and fire, and others too numerous to mention.

Is it not possible in 1970 for a house to be closed or commercial premises to be left vacant pending further occupation without them being descended upon by a horde of locusts intent on destroying or stealing anything which they can carry away. Is it not possible for the Council, the National Coal Board, British Rail or any other private person to own a piece of land without it being used as a general dumping ground.

Apart from the cost to the Owners and the Ratepayers to nullify the results of such anti-social behaviour, it is indeed a sad reflection on modern society.

Of the 700 dwellings considered to be unfit in 1965, 348 (half) had been dealt with or represented by the end of 1969 and, in order to produce more factual and up-to-date information, a complete survey of the remainder of the 1965 programme is being made. When completed it is hoped to be able to say precisely which of the houses will be dealt with by slum clearance, individual orders or excluded from the programme, and this should be of value not only to the Council, but to the local planning authority and prospective house purchasers.

If the same progress is maintained during the next four as during the preceding four years it is reasonable to expect that we should see an end to any major slum clearance programme for the Borough and be able to concentrate on the re-vitalisation of the remaining older properties.

One matter of concern to myself is the current action in the Croft Ward which, as has been previously emphasised, will result in "Islands" of fit properties remaining in the midst of cleared areas.

Although this is a matter for Council policy, I would earnestly recommend that consideration should be given to the acquisition of such remaining properties by agreement or compulsorily and subsequent demolition, so that cleared areas of convenient shape and size may be left. This would, of course, involve the Council in some expenditure without any prospect of immediate return, but would materially benefit the appearance of the town and leave the particular sites available for future development.

(It is pleasing to note that a start has been made in this direction during 1970 by the decision to acquire certain properties in Salisbury and Hambledon Streets for this purpose).

25th August, 1969 saw the inception of the new Housing Act, 1969 and notification was sent to all applicants who had either received approval or made preliminary enquiry advising them of the opportunity to submit new applications provided the work had not started, in order that they might benefit from increased grant aid.

As a result, six owner-occupied approvals (5 Discretionary and 1 Standard) were cancelled and have been either re-issued or are pending.

It is too early to state what the long-term effect will be of the new legislation with the limit of grant aid raised from £400 to £1,000 of which not more than half may be payable in respect of works of repair or replacement, as works previously approved have been amended and there was a time-lag on the part of applicants whilst awaiting the Act coming into force. There has, however, been a steady flow of enquiries since then and more applications are in the pipe-line.

It must of course be remembered that increased grant aid means correspondingly increased expenditure by the Owner and subsequently increased rent to be met by the tenant.

One disquieting feature of the whole operation of re-vitalising the older houses is increased building costs for comparable work due principally to charges for labour, transport, materials and S.E.T., and only a practical application of the Improvement Area project will reveal the willingness of owners and tenants to co-operate.

Once the new slum clearance programme has been clearly defined it is hoped to select a suitable area for the Council's consideration.

THE ICE CREAM (HEAT TREATMENT) REGULATIONS, 1959 TO 1963.

There is only one registered ice-cream manufacturer in the Borough from whom the following samples were obtained:-

The manufacturer concerned has consistently produced Grade 1 samples for many years and a sequence test at all stages of production gave no indication as to the reason for unsatisfactory results. Further sampling and investigation is proceeding.

THE SLAUGHTER OF POULTRY ACT, 1970.

The Act comes into operation on the 1st January, 1970 and provides that turkeys and domestic fowls slaughtered for the purposes of preparation for sale for human consumption shall be either slaughtered instantaneously (by decapitation or dislocation of the neck) or stunned by means of an instrument approved by the Ministers. The Act makes provision for the examption of the slaughter of birds by the Jewish or Muslim method and for other methods of slaughter to be approved and the local authority have a duty to maintain a register of all premises in its area where turkeys or domestic fowls are stunned before slaughter.

A circular letter was sent to all butchers, canteens, restaurants, farmers and poultry keepers in the Borough drawing their attention to the requirements of the Act.

The current position is :-

- 1. There is no large-scale poultry packing establishment in the Borough.
- 2. Poultry keeping is mainly for domestic purposes.
- 3. Four farms prepare fresh killed domestic fowls, three principally for the Christmas trade.
- 4. Retail outlets sell principally pre-packed frozen birds during the year, with additional sales of freshly killed domestic fowls during the Christmas period.

Mr. H. Gilbert, Additional P.H.I., attended a five day intensive course on Meat and Poultry Inspection at the College of Technology and Art, Blackpool.

THE MEAT INSPECTION REGULATIONS.

Slaughtering took place on 253 days including two Saturdays, one Sunday and four Statutory Holidays, involving 551 visits for the purpose. Total carcases and offal inspected and marked were 8,951. (See details Page 32).

In addition, meat inspection was carried out on behalf of the Morpeth Borough Council on twelve days during July and August.

ANIMAL HEALTH.

A total of 117 animals (See details below) were condemned as being unfit for human consumption, being principally the class of animal referred to in my report for 1968.

Segregation of diseased or unsound animals in accordance with the Regulations is usually accomplished by the fact that most of the low-grade stock are brought to the slaughterhouse towards the end of the week and special attention is given to these.

As a result of an increase in the number of complaints of unsound or contaminated foodstuffs, a circular letter was forwarded to all food traders in the Borough, drawing to their notice their responsibilities regarding the preparation, storage and sale of food, with particular reference for the need to ensure a systematic rotation of stock.

Modern processing, packaging and preservation techniques are constantly improving, but there appears to be an increasing tendency to regard foodstuffs as just another commodity to be balanced up at the end of the financial year against other retail outlets.

It is appreciated that profit must be made but not, so far as the public and the Health Department are concerned, at the expense of hygiene.

The increased cost of removal of unwanted household articles has been the subject of criticism from time to time but, apart from the regular increase in labour and transport costs over which the Council have very little control, regard should be had to the considerable increase in the number of premises visited for this essential service.

In the past three years the figures of premises visited has jumped from 1,254 in 1967; 1,597 in 1968; to the current figure of 1,894 in 1969. There is no doubt that this has had a very considerable effect in diminishing the unauthorised dumping of unwanted articles although regrettably this still occurs.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

Work continued during the year on the contract to extend the sewage works and sewerage system.

KEEPING OF ANIMALS

There were a small number of complaints mainly arising from nuisance caused to adjoining households by insanitary poultry or dog keeping.

Part II of the Mines and Quarries (Tips) Act, 1969 came into operation on the 30th June, 1969 and places responsibility on the County Council for ensuring that disused tips of mines and quarrying refuse do not by reason of instability, constitute a danger to the public and for this purpose are given certain powers of inspection and enforcement. A preliminary survey has already been made and arrangements have been made for all of them to be inspected by a senior member of the County Council staff.

PART IV - WATER SUPPLY

The water supply to the Borough is entirely by mains supply by the Newcastle and Gateshead Water Company. The principal source is Coquet water from the North treated at the Warkworth Treatment Plant and then by main at a rate of 6,000,000 gallons per day to the Water Board. At a point North of Seaton Burn the trunk main sub-divides and delivers bulk water direct to the Borough.

The Tynemouth supply is taken from Fontburn or Mitford or occasionally the Warkworth Treatment Plants. No fluorides are added.

The absence of creatinine suggests that fresh sewage is not gaining access to this watercourse."

This was referred to the Northumbrian River Authority for investigation who reported that the apparent source of the pollution had been found and representations were made to the Authority concerned, together with a request that remedial action be taken.

As the sites in general remain the property of the individual owners, the Council are then called upon at the ratepayers expense to remove any "rubbish" deposited by unauthorised persons.

THE OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963.

For the fourth consecutive year virtually all premises registered under the Act have been subject to inspection. A separate annual report on 1969 has already been issued.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

Regular servicing and survey work is carried out to all agricultural, business and Council-owned properties, details being shown overleaf.

As a result of continued tipping of household refuse and reclamation of land, the Meggies Burn tip and adjacent Burn are given regular treatment and during 1969 a special full scale and intensive treatment was given over a period of one month. The materials used consisted of 7 lbs. "Cymag" (Cyanide) used in holes; 116 lbs. of pre-bait laid (damp sausage rusk); 100 lbs. of poison bait laid (sausage rusk and zinc phosphide). 360 ounces of poison bait were taken, 101 rats picked up and the estimated kill was 990 rats. In all, 1,270 baits were laid and 400 holes gassed.

A report was received from the Divisional Pests Officer following his inspection on the 20th November and stated "I am pleased to advise you that I have never before seen the rats at such a low level on this tip".





In the White Paper "Old Houses into New Homes" the Minister of Hausing and Local Government sets out his proposals for raising the present maximum limits of discretionary Grant from £400 to £1,000, and maximum Standard Grant from £155. to £200, but it will be noted from the Summaries (Pages 24 and 25) that although the overall average grant aid in Blyth has increased for Discretionary Grants from £202. 9.74 to £325.8s.0d. between 1955 and 1968, and for Standard Grants from £123.8s.4d to £130.6s.8d between 1959 and 1968, we are still within the existing maxima and, considering the owner must find fifty percent of the improvement costs, plus, in some cases, cost of repair works, it is unlikely that the new ceiling figures will make much difference, at least for some time.

The details given above do not include any Council-owned dwellings which have been the subject of improvement schemes by the Borough Engineer's Department.

HOUSES FOR AGRICULTURAL POPULATION.

Annual certificates were issued in respect of the fourteen new dwellings constructed since 1958.

HOUSES IN MULTIPLE OCCUPATION.

The Housing Acts 1961 to 1964 gave local authorities powers to control conditions arising due to multiple occupation, by the making of management orders, the provision of additional services and directions to prevent or reduce overcrowding.

We are fortunate in Blyth in that these older type houses which might lend themselves to multi-occupation have not, to any degree, become occupied by more than one family but are still either owner-occupied or of single tenancy. In the past five years the occasional house has required attention but this has principally been done by the service of an informal schedule of works, followed by the requirements of the Chief Fire Officer, and these combined requirements have generally had the desired effect.

On information received from the Rating and Housing Officer there are, however, some applications from persons living-in or without a home of their own, the majority of whom are probably living with in-laws or other relatives. Such houses as these could, in fact, be classified as being in multi-occupation but are generally not lettings primarily for gain.

GENERAL.

Including 1,001 inspections in connection with the housing survey for future possible improvement areas, a total of 1,980 inspections were made, ranging from general enquiries, applications, overcrowding, slum clearance, improvement grants, proposed house purchase, houses in multiple occupation, to Rent Act enquiries.

Details of action relating to unfit houses, new house construction and improvement grants are given in the following pages.
