ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1971.

Your Worship, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you the Annual Report of the Public Health and Sanitary Conditions in the Borough during the year 1971.

The population trend continues downward. The Registrar General's estimated population for 1971 was 34,800. This will be quite accurate following the census of 1970. It shows a considerable drift away from Blyth since 1963 when the population was 36,440. The fall of 1,640 can only be due to a changing population because the number of births have always exceeded the deaths. The number of live births rose to 606 in 1971 - an increase of 91 over 1970. This gave a crude birth rate of 17.4 per 1,000 population. There were 10 infant deaths, four more than in 1970, giving an infant mortality rate of 16.5 per 1,000 live births (E. & W. 18). There were 409 deaths - 4 fewer than in 1970, giving a crude death rate of 11.7 per 1,000 population.

The fall in infectious disease notification is quite startling - only 40 during the year.

Overall, the Borough can be said to be in a healthy state.

I would like to thank the Chairman and members of the Health Committee for their continued interest and my colleagues in other departments for their ready co-operation.

The Health department staff are to be congratulated on the considerable volume of work completed especially as there have been a number of staff changes. Improvement grant work takes a considerable amount of their time - a great deal of which is spent in patiently explaining the procedure necessary to obtain a grant and sometimes an increase in rent.

I admire their tact and forbearance.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE - 1971

There were 40 cases of infectious disease notified during 1971. This is not a record as there were 23 notifications in 1969, but it is a great improvement on all other years, and it is to be hoped that this trend will continue.

There were 26 cases of measles notified during the year and of these 8 were under 2 years of age. If parents take advantage of the normal facilities which exist at their doctors' surgeries and clinics for obtaining protection against measles, there is no reason why this disease should not be eliminated completely.

There were five notifications of pulmonary tuberculosis during the year, three less than in 1970. Two of these were over 65 years of age.

The other diseases notified, Scarlet fever (3), Infectious Hepatitis (3), Dysentery (2), Meningitis (1), make up the normal expectation of infection in an urban community like Blyth.

It is important to note that there were no notification of the following diseases - Diphtheria, Erysipelas, Ophthalmia Neonatorum, Whooping cough, Enteric fevers, Poliomyelitis and Food poisoning.

SLUM CLEARANCE

Of the amended figure of 350 unfit houses remaining to be dealt with under the Council's Four Year Programme, a beginning was made by the official representation of Waterloo No. 1 Area under Part III of the Act and designated as a Compulsory Purchase Order.

This consisted of 38 dwellinghouses numbered 1 Bishopton Street, 34 to 70 Robert Street (Even Nos. inclusive) and 3 small business premises.

This was the subject of a Public Inquiry on the 30th November 1971 and was subsequently confirmed without modification

In addition, extensive survey work was undertaken in Cowpen Quay and in John and Beecher Streets, Cowpen, for the submission of future Part III Orders during 1972.

IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

The introduction of the Housing Act 1971 increased the amount of financial assistance under Parts 1 and 2 of the 1969 Act in development areas from the 23rd June 1971 for a period of two years and authorised an increase to 75% of the allowable costs for Improvement and Standard Grant works instead of the former 50%.

The result of this was an immediate considerable expansion in the number of enquiries and applications for grant aid and a summary of these is given on Page 18 of the Report.

I think it unnecessary to enlarge on the countless hours spent by the staff in dealing with the numerous enquiries, inspection of properties, preparation of detailed schedules of works and discussion of the alternative methods of implementing applicants proposals, but I feel that in all the attendant Ministerial publicity insufficient emphasis is placed on the fact that these grants are for the IMPROVEMENT of properties and NOT for the repair and replacement of existing facilities.

The 1969 Act is quite specific in that the approved expense of the works shall not allow for works of repair and replacement to exceed one-half of the approved expense but, despite liberal interpretation by the officers, it is sometimes difficult to convince an applicant that the works he or she proposes are not in themselves improvements, but are principally renewal of existing facilities.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

For years the disposal of drainage wastes by large diameter sewers to outfalls to the sea and river have, whilst known to be noxious and offensive, been accepted as the traditional method, primitive but simple.

Advancing techniques and the substitution of the combined sewerage system by separate foul and surface water sewers, together with longer section, small diameter p.v.c. sewers and pumping mains have brought in their problems hitherto unencountered and, during the year, the Health Department was required to expend considerable time and effort to overcome repeated blockages on a developing site in the town.

Apart from certain constructional defects which became evident, the householders themselves can help to minimise the problem by exercising much greater care in the disposal of household waste of a so-called soluble nature into the domestic foul sewerage system.

PART III - NUISANCES

2,459 visits and interviews were made in connection with general public health matters. (See Summary, Page 44).

SPOILBANKS

For many many years a portion of the Annual Report was devoted to the problems of nuisance from spoilbanks arising from burning and offensive fumes and their very presence and offensive bulk dominated and marred the landscape.

In recent years these problems were accentuated when shale removal was undertaken for major road works in the County and the National Coal Board, the Contractors and the Local Authority were castigated by the public for either causing or not controlling the dust and dirt nuisance.
