

## To the Chairman and Members of the Bolsover Urban District Council.

GENTLEMEN,

I have much pleasure in presenting you with my Report for the Year 1915.

## Natural and Social conditions of the District:

Elevation of District from 400 to 600 O.D.

Geology, upper levels on Magnesian Limestone, lower levels on coal measures.

Area, Land 4,797 acres. Water 1 acre. Total 4798 acres.

Census 1901—Population 6,844. Inhabited houses 1,272.

Census 1911—Population 11,225. Inhabited houses 2,245.

Population estimated to the middle of the year 10,700.

Inhabited houses 2,468.

New houses erected during the year 2.

Rateable value £45,509/3/2. Assessable value £39,012/6/5.

General District Rate 4/- in the £ (for the year).

The chief occupation of the inhabitants is Coal Mining.

## Sanitary Conditions of the District:

The Water Supply of the Bolsover Water Company is very satisfactory, the water is very hard, and there is practically no risk of plumbo-solvent action. No cases of lead poisoning came under my notice. There are now 1,421 houses supplied by the public supply.

Houses connected during the past year 15.

I went over the Water Works recently with Mr. Bemrose and was very favourably impressed. Mr. Bemrose informed me that there is abundance of water, and the Water Co. intend increasing the supply at an early date. Labour troubles have temporarily dislocated the work at the Water Works.

#### Drainage and Sewerage:

All the Sewage disposal works have given excellent results during 1915.

A small system of Sewerage and Sewage Disposal should be installed at Stanfree in order to abolish the present cesspools.

#### Closet Accommodation:

Considerable activity has been displayed by the Council in their endeavours to abolish the privy-midden system and substitute water carriage. A considerable number of owners have been served with notices to convert privy-midden into Water Closets, and proceedings are now in hand for forcing compliance under Section 36, P.H. Act.

In Old Bolsover and Carr Vale 56 privy-middens have been converted into Water Closets, and 4 additional W.C's. installed in private residences.

Nothing has yet been done with regard to the 200 privy-middens in the Model Village, but no doubt this needful work will soon be put in hand, as the Colliery Co., has promised to do the work when a sufficient supply of water is guaranteed.

## Scavenging:

The Scavenging in the whole of the Urban District, except Whaley Thorns, is let by contract and costs approximately 6/-per house per annum.

The contract price for the Scavenging of Whaley and Whaley Thorns was £160, and by doing the work yourselves the cost works out at £146, thereby saving £14. Further, since you took over the scavenging in this area there has not been a single complaint.

I am of opinion that you should take over all the scavenging, and do the work yourselves by direct labour, under a responsible foreman. You will thus get better results for less expenditure.

Rigid economey at this time of national stress is essential and the Local Government Board have recently issued a strong letter on this point. Have you reckoned what the saving would be by the conversion of the privies in the New Village into W.C's.? There are 200 privies in this portion of your district, and allowing 2/- per house for the reduction of scavenging when they are converted into W.C's., you would

save £20 per year on the scavenging of the Model Village alone. The saving on other parts of the district when like conditions obtained, would be very substantial, ignoring altogether the improvement in the health of the inhabitants which would undoubtedly accrue.

## Premises and Occupations under Bye Laws and Regulations:

Number of premises 40. These are mostly new buildings and are satisfactorily kept.

Number of occupations 4. Classification of premises:— Cowsheds, Workshops, Bakehouses, and Common Lodging House.

#### Schools:

Sanitary condition very good, water supply public mains. The Schools are periodically disinfected irrespective of infectious disease outbreaks.

The Derbyshire County Council control the Medical Inspection of the Schools.

## FOODS. - Milk Supply:

At the beginning of the year there were 10 Cowkeepers on the register who had about 90 cows.

There are no milksellers who are not cowkeepers.

Each cow has an average space of about 800 cubic feet.

No cows were condemned for tuberculosis.

Periodical inspections were made, orders given, and carried out, as to cleanliness of premises and utensils.

All the milk sold is, as far as I know, produced in the district.

#### Other Foods :

Premises inspected where food is prepared and exposed for sale. During 1915 there were 36 inspections made.

One lot of Fish and two lots of Tomatoes (tinned) were voluntarily surrendered.

There were no prosecutions.

Meat is inspected in the slaughter-houses, and also in the shops.

The modern slaughter-houses are good, and the old ones specially observed for cleanliness.

## Housing:

Further progress has been made with the inspection of the district under the Housing and Town Planning Act 1909.

21 houses were inspected.

1 house was dilapidated and repaired without notice.

## Factories and Workshops:

36 Inspections made. No defects found.

#### Prevalence and control over Infectious Diseases

## Infantile Mortality:

There were 46 deaths in children under 1 year old during 1915, making the rate 135.6 per 1,000 births registered. This shows a considerable increase on the rate for 1914 which was 91.9.

As you know the Notification of Births' Act is now compulsory A welcome centre for babies has been established in the Parish Hall, and Nurse Nadin has been appointed health visitor under the Derbyshire County Council.

I am hoping for a considerable reduction in the Infantile death rate when the Statistics for 1916 come to be published.

Every possible step should be taken to safeguard the lives of infants, in view of the national crisis through which our Country is now passing.

#### Enteric Fever:

Only one case occured.

#### Scarlatina:

123 cases were notified during 1915, and the disease was prevalent nearly all through the year. There was however only one death from this disease.

#### Measles:

There was a severe epidemic of Measles, and this disease caused 13 deaths. Now that Measles has been added to the list of compulsorily notifiable diseases, we hope to be able to take more effective measures for its control, and the prevention of its spread. This disease seems to visit the district at intervals of three years.

## Diphtheria:

35 cases were notified during the past year. Nearly all the cases were confirmed diagnostically by bacteriological examination of throat swabs.

#### Erysipelas:

Fourteen cases were notified. There were no deaths from this disease.

#### Puerperal Fever:

Three cases were notified during 1915, and this disease caused two deaths.

## Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis:

One case was notified from Whaley Common, but was so rapidly fatal, that an examination of fluid from the spinal canal could not be carried out.

The source of infection could not be determined, but it certainly had no connection with any military visitant to the locality.

## Mumps:

This disease was epidemic during the later months of the past year, and many cases, with complications, were observed in adults.

#### Prevalence and control over Tuberculosis:

Twelve cases of Tuberculosis of the lungs (Phthisis) (29 in 1914), and eight cases of other forms of Tuberculosis were notified during 1915.

Phthisis caused 5 deaths, making a rate of '46.

Other Tuberculous diseases caused 5 deaths, making a rate of 28.

Every advantage is taken by patients to obtain treatmen at the Tuberculin Dispensary, Chesterfield, and I have myself noted some remarkably good results.

The Chesterfield Sanatorium has been available during most of the past year.

### Improvements affected during the year 1915:

- 1. Erection of Public Convenience in the Market Place.
- 52,144 super yards of Tar Spraying done during the year.
- 3 56 privies have been converted into W.C's., and 4 additional W.C's provided to private residences.
- 4. Taking over the Scavenging of the Whaley and Whaley
  Thorns portion of the district, with most satisfactory
  results both as regards efficiency and cost.

- 5. Public Water Supply laid on to 15 houses.
- 6. Provision of W.C's. and Urinal at the Common Lodging House.

## Requirements:

- 1. Pushing on conversion of all existing privies, where practicable.
- 2. Special attention should be given to the paving of back-yards.
- 3. Provision of Sewerage and Sewage Disposal scheme for Stanfree.
- 4. The Scavenging of the whole district should be done by the Council's own men and horses.


