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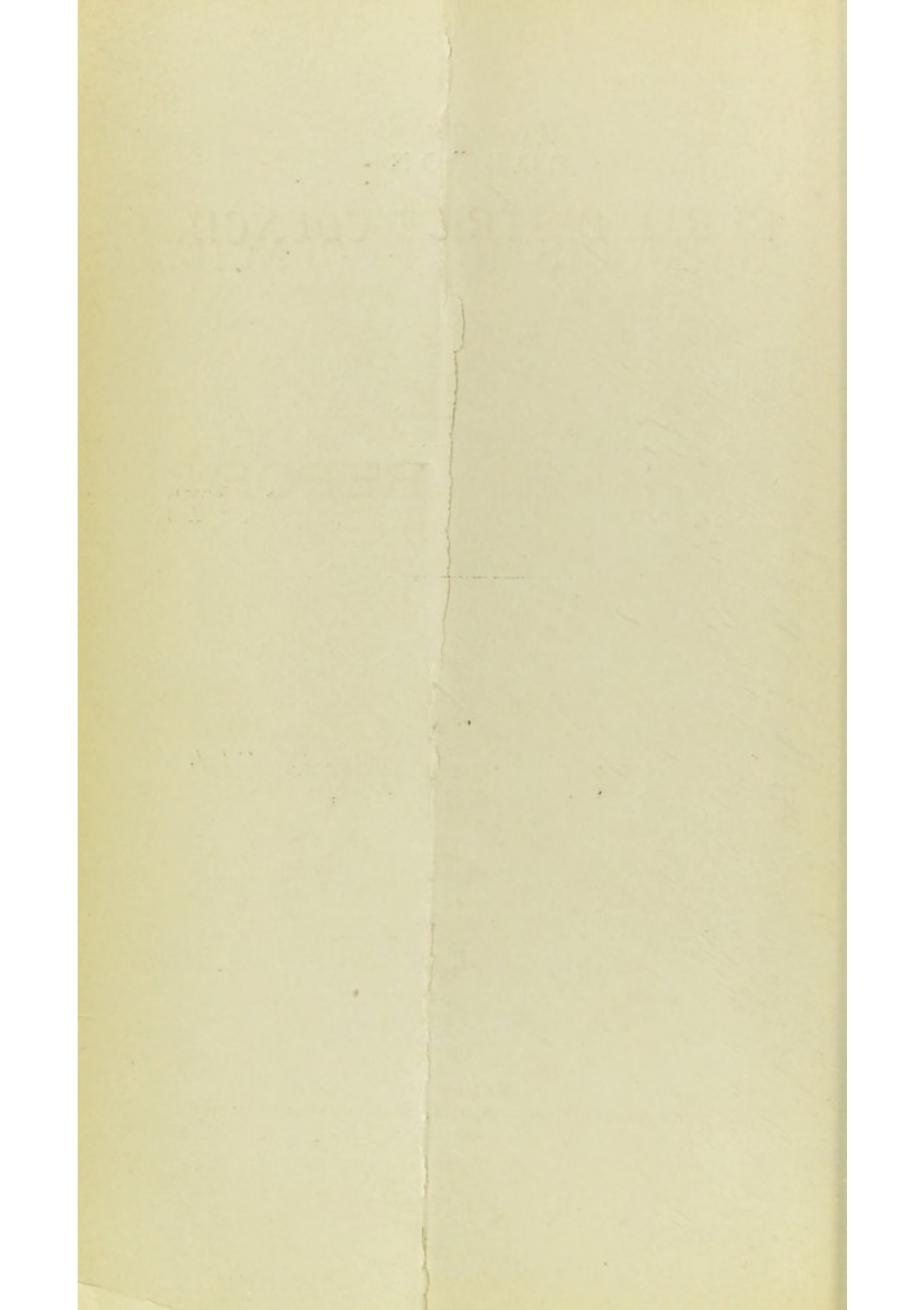

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# Medical Officer's Report.

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*Estimated Population to middle of 1894, 34,884. Area of District in Acres, 25,026.*

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276, DEANE ROAD, BOLTON, JANUARY 28TH, 1895.

*To the Bolton Rural District Council.*

GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit my Annual Report to you upon the health of your district, and also a Record of the Sanitary work done during the year of 1894.

**Births.**—During the year 1068 births were registered in the district, 538 were those of males, and 530 those of females, being at the rate of 30·6 per 1000 persons living per annum. The birth rate for 1893 was 34·5.

**Deaths.**—The number of Deaths from all causes and at all ages, was 441, of which 212 were males, and 229 females. This mortality gives a death rate of 12·6 per 1000 per annum, upon an estimated population of 34·884. The rates for 1893 and 1892 being 17·5 and 15·22 per 1000 respectively.

**Infant Mortality.**—The deaths of children under the age of five years numbered 169, including those of 126 infants under the age of one year, and represents 38·3 per cent of total deaths from all causes. In 1893 269 children died under the age of five years, including 178 infants under the age of one year.

**Illegitimacy.**—The number of children born out of wedlock during the year was 22, or two per cent. of total births.



**Zymotic Diseases.**—The total number of deaths from this class of disease was 32, and were caused by Small Pox, Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Croup, Enteric Fever, Erysipelas, Whooping Cough, and Diarrhoea, giving a zymotic death rate of 0·9 per 1000 of the population per annum. Form 3 shows the death rate, also zymotic death rate in each township for the past 5 years.

**Small Pox.**—A case of Small Pox was taken to Hospital on the first day of January, from a house No. 1, Taylor-street, Great Lever, this being the second patient from the same house, the first being removed to Hospital on the 18th December previous, and was daughter to the woman admitted to Hospital on January 1st. The mother was not protected by vaccination, and died from Malignant Small Pox four days after admission to Hospital. The disease was distinctly traced to a house in the Borough of Bolton, where the patients had visited, and where Small Pox existed.

I feel confident if no Hospital had been erected for this class of disease, there would have been a serious epidemic of Small Pox in the township of Great Lever.

**Scarlet Fever.**—The total number of cases notified was 160, five of which died, Bradshaw and Longworth being the only townships which escaped this scourge; the largest number of cases occurring during the summer months. The Public Schools at Rumworth and Tonge were closed for six weeks on account of the prevalence of this disease.

Eighty-five of these cases were removed to your Hospital at Rumworth. Particulars as to numbers removed from each township will be found in Table "B."

**Measles.**—Only five cases of Measles came under my notice during the year, and no deaths were attributable to this disease. This compares very favourably with 1893, when nine deaths were registered from Measles, and a large number of children were sick from this cause.

**Diphtheria.**—The number of cases reported was 5, one of which ended fatally. In two cases at Tonge there was defective drainage, but no cause could be found for the others.

**Diarrhœa.**—Five deaths occurred from this cause, and were all in young children under 12 months old. Last year the number of deaths from this cause was 40, showing a very great improvement for the present year.

**Enteric Fever.**—The number of cases notified was 47, and in 9 persons proved fatal.

The cause for a large amount of this complaint appears to be a mystery. In every case the home was visited, the drainage examined, and the milk and water supply inquired into, but no satisfactory cause found. One point perhaps deserves notice, and that is in 23 cases the patients lived in new houses, and were the first tenants; possibly the nature of the ground-air may have some predisposing cause.

The present midden system in populous townships is very objectionable, and if more water or waste-water closets were used, I am convinced they would conduce very much to the public health, by taking away at once a large amount of objectionable matter, which now lies very near their doors.

**Whooping Cough** was prevalent during the month of March in Tonge, Great Lever, Edgworth, and Over Hulton, and caused 5 deaths. Parents are very lax in the isolation of children suffering from this disease, and I have frequently found them being taken a drive on omnibus or tramcar, under the impression that fresh air was a remedy, but alas, often causes pneumonia or other chest complaints, ending in death.

**Diseases of Chest.**—The total number of deaths from these causes was 145, being 26 less than the mortality from these diseases during 1893, and include 95 from Bronchitis, Pleurisy, and Pneumonia, 22 from Heart Disease, and 28 from Pulmonary Phthisis. The number of deaths from Phthisis compared with other years appears to be almost stationary.

It is most important that all milk, before being used, should be boiled, otherwise there is a great danger of persons contracting Phthisis from using the milk from tuberculous cows.

**The Infectious Hospital.**—The number of patients removed and treated in Hospital during the year was 87, an increase of 7 compared with 1893. Table below gives particulars as to disease admitted, as well as ages and number of deaths :—

The average stay of patients at the Hospital was—for Scarlet Fever 47 days, and Enteric Fever 56 days. The Hospital is now much appreciated by the public in all parts of the district, and very little opposition is shown to the removal of patients.

**Disinfection.**—62 houses have been disinfected after the recovery or removal of Infectious Disease, and a large quantity of bedding, wearing apparel, carpets, &c., have been disinfected with the steam disinfectant at the Hospital.

**Visits.**—During the year I have made 315 visits on account of Nuisances and Infectious Disease, including periodical visits to all parts of the district. During each visit the water supply from wells have been particularly attended to, 23 samples were taken, and roughly analysed by me; 35 houses have been supplied with Corporation water in lieu of that from wells.

A great Sanitary improvement has been made by the construction of Sewerage Works at Belmont, which were opened in January last, the sewage being treated with Alumina Ferric, and afterwards filtered through land. The effluent being very satisfactory.

The township of Edgworth is in great need of sewers being made, the present drains (most of them rubble) are most unsatisfactory, and likely to cause much disease. At the present time there are many cases of Diphtheria in the township, and in my opinion are caused through the defective drainage. The townships of Harwood and Bradshaw are also in great want of a sewerage scheme.

**Prosecutions.**—Three prosecutions before the Magistrates took place during the year, one to provide sufficient closet accommodation at Dean Mills, Halliwell. An order was made, and the work has since been completed. The other two were for exposing meat for sale, the same being unfit for human food, and fines of 5 and 10 pounds were inflicted. I gave evidence in all three cases.

**Dairies and Cowsheds.**—The number of Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milkshops on the register is 379, 190 for the Northern District, and 189 for the Southern District. Most of the farms have been visited by me during the year, and are all in a very fair condition.



**The Removal of Refuse.**—The usual system of contract has been followed during the year for the emptying of ashpits in Great Lever, Darcy Lever, Tonge, Breightmet, Middle Hulton, Over Hulton, Deane, Heaton, Lostock, and Smithills. In the remaining townships the tenant is responsible for the removal of ashpit refuse.
