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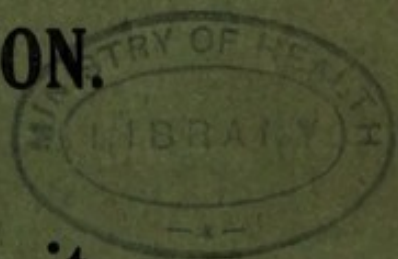

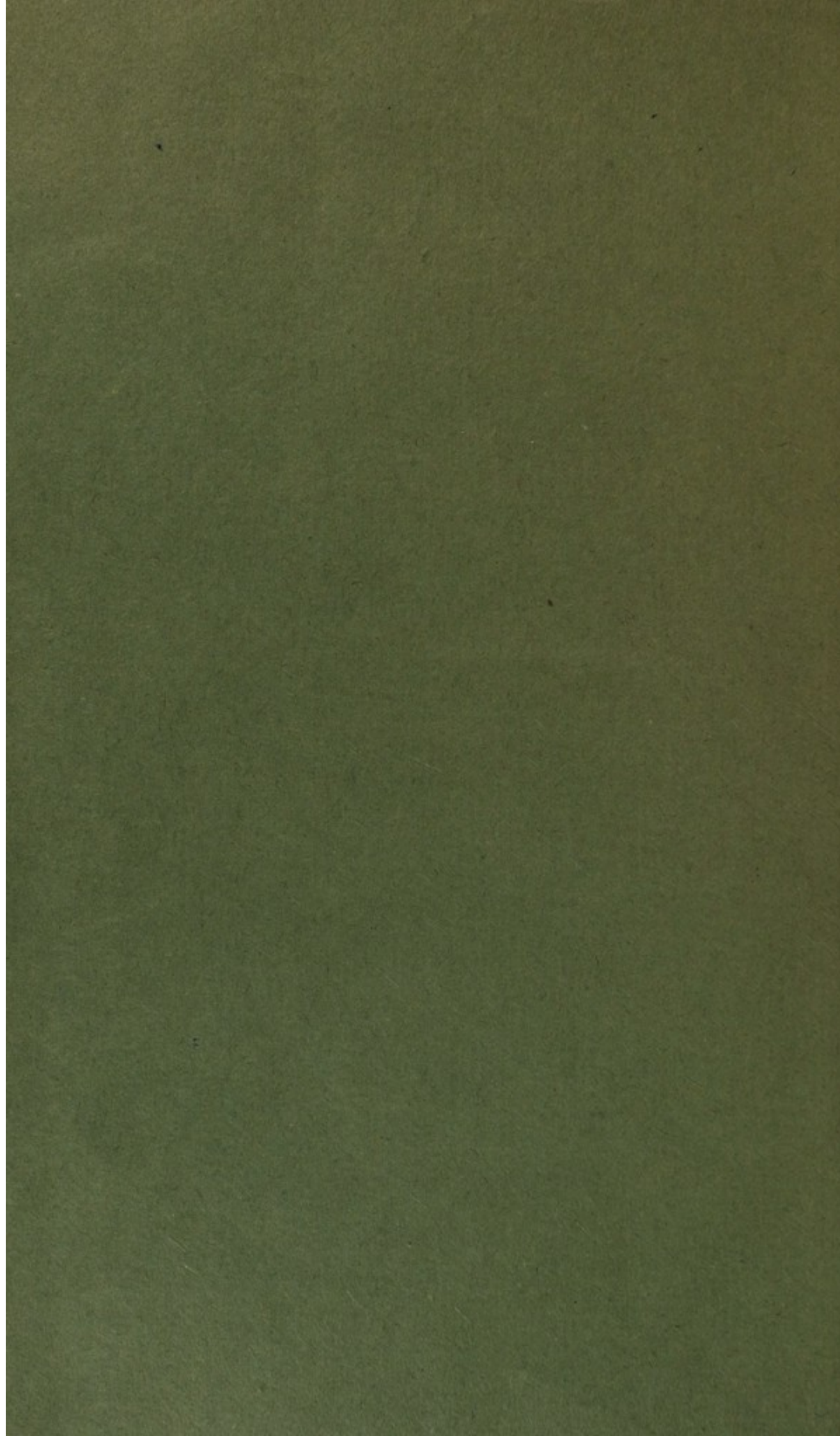

* Form “Port 10” is issued only by the Port Medical Officers of Health of Bristol, Cardiff, Hull, Liverpool, London, Manchester, River Tyne, Southampton, Swansea and Weymouth for vessels proceeding to U.S.A. ports.

Arrangements have now been made for the employment of a rat catcher. He will be under the supervision of the Medical Officer of Health and a proper table kept of rats destroyed. Any suspicious rat found dead will be sent for bacteriological examination.

I hope also that he will be able to do more destruction of rats actually on board ship. One hundred and forty-one rats have been destroyed during the year, almost wholly brown rats.

A peculiar specie of rat was caught during the year and I forwarded to the Ministry of Health for their expert's opinion as to what family this rat belonged, and the following is their reply :—

“ The specimen has been examined and the report is to the effect that it is a variety of *Rattus rattus*—one of the intermediate individuals between *Rattus rattus rattus* and *rattus rattus alexandrinus*, in other words, a variety of the ‘ Black ’ rat.”

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

There has been no case of infectious disease during the year. All cases, including smallpox, can be adequately isolated if the occasion arises. The telephone to the Pilot Light Ship is now functioning satisfactorily and is available in any case of emergency.

Cleansing and disinfection of ships and persons can be satisfactorily carried out.

The quantities landed at Boston Dock during the year were as follows :—

REPORT AS TO CHARACTER OF THE
PRINCIPAL EXPORTS AND IMPORTS
DURING THE YEAR.

The principal ports and character of the trade to and from are as follows. The actual quantities not available at time of going to press :—

FOREIGN TRADE.

IMPORTS.—TIMBER. is imported from Archangel and the ports in the Gulf of Finland.

GENERAL CARGO from Hamburg, Antwerp, Ghent, Bruges, and Rotterdam.

EXPORTS.—COAL, to Denmark, Sweden, Hamburg and Ghent.

POTATOES to Spain and the Canary Islands.

COASTWISE TRADE.

IMPORTS.—Granite from Jersey and North Wales.

Grain from London, Ipswich and Hull.

Potatoes from Perth and Dundee.

TRAWLERS.

The number of trawlers discharging into the port during the year was 54, which is the lowest number for a great many years. The decline of the fishing industry is to be deplored, especially is this so when the facilities for such an industry are of such an admirable character.

INSPECTOR'S REPORT.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I beg to present to you a report of my work of ship and port inspection during the year ended December 31st, 1925.

I have inspected 50 ships from foreign and 27 coastwise, and the nuisances abated have been—

Dirty Crews' Quarters	13
Dirty W.C.'s	14
Defective Ventilators	2
Defective Floors	2
Dirty Bedding	1

On one ship the crews' quarters were verminous and the master requested that the forecastles be fumigated and this was done under my supervision at the ship's expense.

I have also examined the cargoes of fish as they have been landed, but am pleased to be able to report that all were in good condition.

I have made examinations of the cargoes of shell and other fish landed at the wharfs at Skirbeck Quarter and found them all in good condition.
