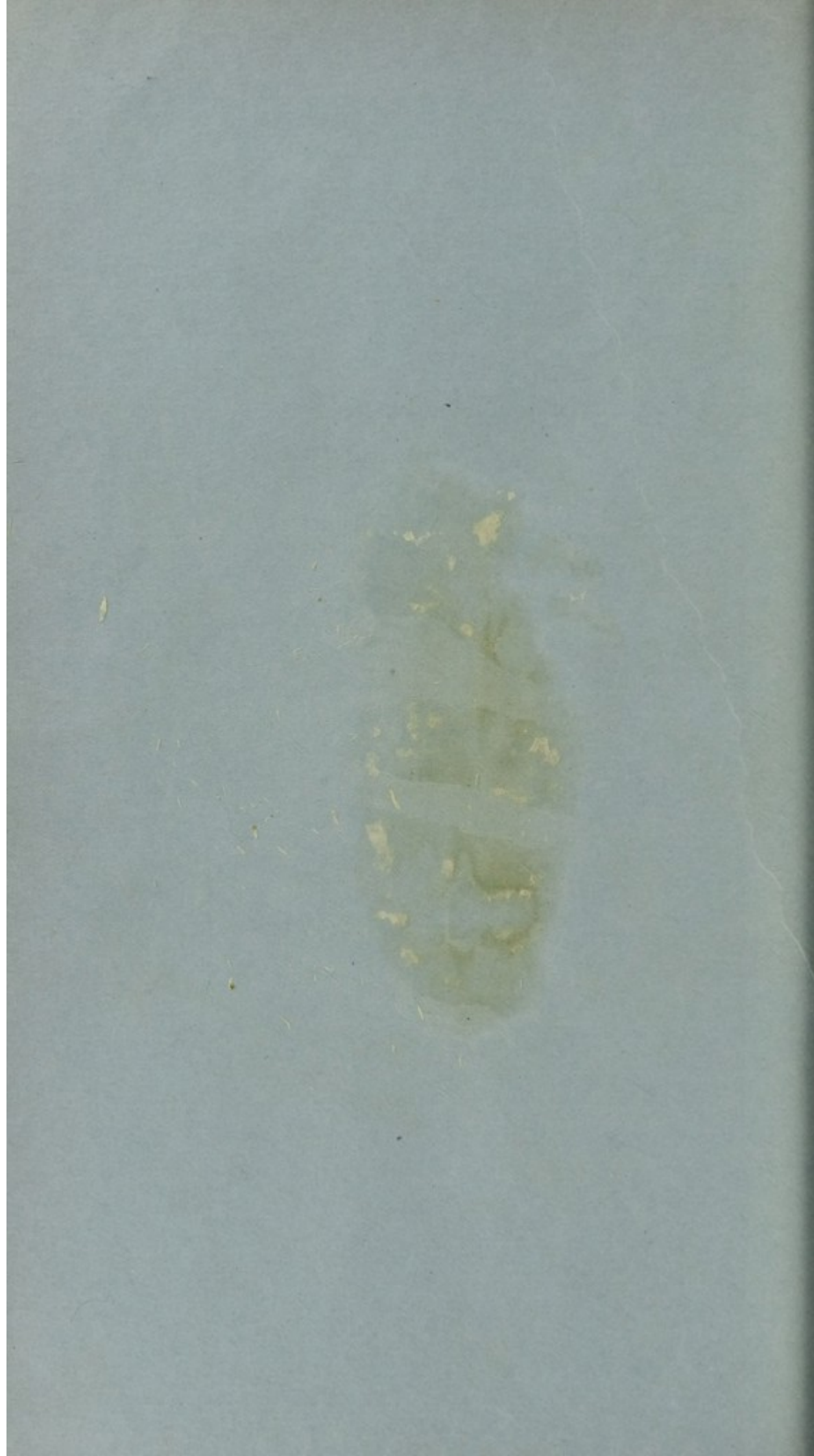

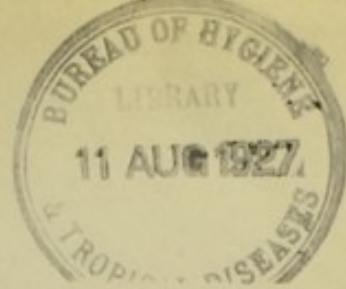

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS
OF THE HEALTH COMMITTEE,
COUNTY BOROUGH OF BOURNEMOUTH.

Gentlemen,

I beg to submit herewith my Annual Report on the health of Bournemouth during the year 1926.

Population. (1) At the Census taken in 1921 the number of persons recorded as being in Bournemouth was 91,761. My estimate of the population in the middle of 1926 is 100,000.

The Registrar-General decided that it was necessary to deduct 10,000 from the 91,761 persons recorded in 1921, and he estimates the 1926 population as 90,100, the figure on which the vital statistics given in this Report are based. In former reports I have given my reasons for the opinion that the deduction made from the Census figures in 1921 is excessive.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

Statistics and information concerning this department are given later in the report.

(a) The Birth Rate for the year 1926 was 12.3 per thousand population as compared with 18.2 for the 105 County Boroughs and Great Towns. The lowest rates recorded for Bournemouth in former years were 12.4 in 1917 and again in 1918, and 11.8 in 1919.

(b) The *Infantile Mortality* in Bournemouth has always been very low in comparison with the average for the 105 County Boroughs and Great Towns. This rate is the number of deaths of infants under 12 months per thousand births and in 1926 it was 57.6 as compared with 73 for all large towns.

The Infantile Mortality throughout the country has decreased very largely during the past twenty-five years. Many causes have contributed to this result, the influence in this generation of the Elementary Education Act of 1870; improved economic conditions; and in more recent years the trained instruction of mothers at the Welfare Centres and in the homes by Municipal Health Visitors, a work that has been ably supported by Voluntary Workers who were the pioneers of this education effort in many places.

A decrease in birth rate has been coincident with the declining infantile mortality of the past twenty-five years, and there is good reason for deducing a causative relation between these rates. Another and probably a powerful influence that has reduced infantile mortality is the improvement in general sanitation throughout the country. This influence, to which may be attributed largely the reduction of Typhoid Fever mortality per 1,000 population in

England and Wales (mainly adults) from 0.388 in 1870 to 0.01 in 1926, has had far reaching effects.

(c) *Puerperal Fever* No deaths from this condition have been recorded in Bournemouth during the three years, 1924, 1925 and 1926.

During the past six years, it has caused in the County Borough nine deaths in 6,828 child-births, a mortality of 1.31 per 1,000 births, as compared with 2.28 for the lustrum 1916-1920.

The decrease of this serious occurrence in child-birth is relatively small as compared with that of most infections, and investigations concerning its etiology are being made throughout the country. So far as my enquiries have gone they indicate that, apart from the considerable influence of a low degree of resistance possessed by the individual patient, sources of infection in the household such as impetigo in children may be a determining cause. With this in view the work of the Minor Ailments Clinics for School Children has been co-ordinated with that of the Maternity and Child Welfare Department.

Maternity and Infant Welfare Centres. There are now five centres with doctors' clinics provided by the Local Authority, each of them being open on one afternoon a week. The work of the Municipal Health Visitors and of the Voluntary Workers at these Centres is still increasing in value, and the aid of the Bournemouth Infant Welfare Voluntary Association has been very much appreciated.

The number of attendances at the Centres during 1926 was 28,732 as compared with 25,472 during 1925, and 26,069 during 1924.

During 1926, the Municipal Health Visitors paid 7,712 visits to homes (Maternity and Child Welfare Department).

Other information concerning this department is given later.

Infectious Diseases. The low incidence and the remarkably low mortality from these diseases in Bournemouth during the past decade were unbroken during the year 1926. No spread of any serious infectious disease has occurred in the County Borough. There have been weeks during which the Isolation Hospital had to be maintained for three patients. Statistical tables and information concerning the work of the department are given later in the report.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Council and the members of the Public Health Committees for their consideration and support during the year, and to express my appreciation of the excellent work of the staff.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

(a) During the year 1,171 births were registered in the County Borough of Bournemouth, of which 130 were transferred to other districts by the Registrar-General and 69 transferred into Bournemouth from other districts, the net births in Bournemouth

being therefore, 1,110, making a *birth rate* of 12.31 on the Registrar-General's estimate of the population.

The following table shows the birth rates for the past ten years, calculated on the Registrar-General's estimate of the population. It will be noted that this is now taken as the basis of calculation whereas the birth rates in former reports were calculated on the estimate of the population based on the Census figures.

Of the 1,163 births that actually occurred in the County Borough 1,148 were notified. Of these notifications 579 were made by doctors, 564 by midwives and 5 by other persons.

(b) *Infantile Mortality.* Seventy-three infants died in Bournemouth during their first year of life. Of these deaths 11 were transferred to other districts. Two infant deaths occurring in other areas were transferred to Bournemouth, the number of infant deaths referred by the Registrar-General to Bournemouth being therefore 64, making an Infantile Mortality of 57.65.

Of the 64 infant deaths, 12 were certified as due to premature birth and 13 to congenital malformations. No child under twelve months died from any notifiable infectious disease.

Comparative Infantile Mortality. The Infantile Mortality of the 105 County Boroughs and Great Towns of England and Wales during the year was 73, as compared with the figure of 57.65 for Bournemouth.

(c) *Midwives Act.* During the year 26 midwives notified their intention to practise in Bournemouth, 25 being trained and one untrained.

One hundred and thirty-eight records were received concerning the sending for medical assistance by midwives. In 22 of these cases the doctors fees were paid by the Health Authority, the whole of the fee being recovered in five instances and a part of the fee in three others.

(d) *Provision of Milk.* Under the Maternity and Child Welfare Act, 1918, milk was supplied free or below cost to 315 mothers and children during the year, the average daily number receiving milk in this way being 161. The expenditure during the year amounted to £1,082, as compared with £813 during 1925, and £656 during 1924. A Government grant of 50 per cent. is received in relief of this as of all other Maternity and Child Welfare expenditure.

(e) *Ophthalmia Neonatorum.* During the year one notification was received in respect of this inflammation of the eyes. The case was mild, but it was considered advisable to retain the mother and child in Hospital. The child was kept under observation for four months and no after effects were noted.

The actual number of Bournemouth patients who received treatment in institutions during 1926 was 125.

Of these, 54 suffered from Tuberculosis of the Lungs in an early stage ; in 21, the disease was advanced ; and in 36 the tuberculosis was not pulmonary. Included in this total are five Ex-service Men whose Tuberculosis was attributed to military service.

The 14 children who received Institution treatment were in delicate health and regarded as pre-tubercular patients.

The number of deaths that occurred from Tuberculosis of the Lungs during the year was 76. On the Registrar-General's estimate of the population of 90,100 this gives a rate of .84 per thousand, while on the population for the year 1926 based on my estimate the rate is .76 per thousand.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

Ninety-seven cases of Scarlet Fever were notified during the year. One death occurred among these patients.

Thirty-seven cases of Diphtheria were notified, of whom one died.

BOURNEMOUTH SANITARY HOSPITAL.

During the year 137 cases were admitted into the Hospital. Of these, 136 were Bournemouth patients, and one was admitted from without the County Borough. The following table refers to Bournemouth patients :—

I beg to submit for your consideration the Annual Report upon the work carried out by this Department during the year ending 31st December, 1926.

The duties relating to the selection of tenants for the Corporation Housing Schemes, the general supervision and control of the properties including repairs by direct labour, enquiries for applications for Subsidy houses and the supervision of such tenancies to ascertain that the conditions are being maintained.

RE CINEMAS AND PICTURE PALACES.

The special arrangements made under your Authority for the regular disinfecting of these premises by the Public Disinfecter once a fortnight has been continued throughout the year, and the cost of his time and materials has been defrayed by the Proprietors.

Inspections have also been made of these premises with regard to the provision for Sanitary Conveniences, Lighting and Ventilation, and reports submitted to the Finance Committee when the renewal of licences was under consideration.

THE FACTORY AND WORKSHOPS ACT, 1901-1907

The total number of workshops and work-places now registered in the Borough is 861, a decrease of six on that of last year.

During the year 26 new workshops have been registered, 26 workrooms have been measured and 32 cards, re cubic space, etc., have been supplied to the occupiers.

In all cases where nuisances have been found, notices have been given to the owner or occupier of the premises to remedy the defects, and it is very satisfactory to report that in every instance the nuisance has been abated without resort to legal action.

During the year 2,426 inspections, including Bakehouses and Restaurants, have been made, and Notices have been served.

The Occupation Cards have been revised, and are brought up-to-date.

BAKEHOUSES.

Of the 76 bakehouses occupied in the Borough, three are occupied as underground bakehouses, and the remainder are on, or above, the ground level.

The underground bakehouses are certified by your Authority to be suitable (as regards light, ventilation, construction, etc.) for use as bakehouses.

During the year one bakehouse has been added to, and two deleted from the Register.

The whole of the Bakehouses in the Borough have been cleaned or limewashed twice during the year, in accordance with the requirements of the Act. One hundred and fifty-two visits have been made to these premises during the year.

KITCHENS OF RESTAURANTS, ETC.

These premises, forty-five in number, have been inspected, and special attention has been given to the cleanliness of the larders, tables and cooking utensils, and these have been found to be satisfactory.

HOMework.

During the year 59 lists containing the addresses of 132 "Outworkers" have been received.

Eighteen of these were residing outside the Borough, and the usual particulars were sent to the Authorities of the Districts in which the work was done.

Three addresses were received from outside Authorities.

One hundred and twelve visits were made to Outworkers' premises, and in no instance was it found necessary to serve a notice for the abatement of nuisance.

REGISTRIES FOR FEMALE AND DOMESTIC SERVANTS.

The number of premises on the Register at the end of the year was 32, a decrease of two on that of last year.

Fifty-nine surprise visits have been made from time to time to the premises, for the purpose of enforcing the provision of the Bye-Laws relating thereto.

SHOPS ACT, 1912.

The total number of shops on the Register at the end of the year was 2,429, an increase of 38 on that of last year.

During the year 4,094 visits have been made to shops in the Borough under the Act.

In 54 cases the Exempted Trade Notice under the second Schedule, in 55 cases the Assistants' Weekly Half-Holiday Notice under Sect. I, and in 69 cases the Young Persons Notice under Sect. II were not found to be affixed as required by the Act.

In all cases a verbal warning was sufficient, the requirements being subsequently complied with.

Sixty-two Warning Notices re Sale of Celluloid Articles were delivered.

Fifty-eight special inspections have been made with regard to the sale of non-exempted goods on the half-day of closing.

Sixty-six special inspections have been made with regard to the new order of the Shops (Early Closing) Act, 1920.

In one case proceedings were taken under the above Order, and conviction obtained, with a fine of £1 including costs. In six cases letters of warning were considered sufficient.

Each new shop opened in the Borough during the past year has been supplied with a copy of the Extracts of the Shops Act.

Two hundred and forty-five shops have been visited with regard to the employment of young persons, and in no case was a young person found working beyond the prescribed hours.

GENERAL INSPECTION OF FOOD SUPPLIES.

During the year 8,319 visits have been made to shops in the Borough for the inspection of Meat and Food Supplies, and with regard to the cleanliness of the premises and stores.

Periodical and regular inspections of the Meat Supplies form an important part of the Food Inspector's duties, as shown by the appended tables.

By arrangement with the retail traders, early morning inspections of meat are made before the meat is "weighed in" by the butchers, in all cases where the carcasses have been slaughtered outside the Borough.

In April, 1925, the Public Health (Meat) Regulations came into force and in accordance with your instructions circular letters have been sent to all meat purveyors, provision merchants and tradesmen affected.

There are seven wholesale meat stores and the provisions as to the cartage and storage of carcasses and clothing of the employees are being complied with.

Of the 121 retail shops, 48 are provided with sash windows, 32 with fixed windows and permanent means of ventilation, 38 with shutters and two with partly open fronts. During the last six months 21 old shops have been altered and supplied with the approved new sash window fronts or fixed fronts, and in three others the works are in hand.

Of the 38 shops still supplied with the ordinary movable shutters the majority are small shops and not in the main thoroughfares, and from the inspections made, it has not been found necessary to take statutory action. The proprietors of the few shops with

open fronts in the main thoroughfares, take the precaution to have the glass shutters up, on occasions as circumstances require, and the Inspectors are giving these shops special attention.

The provisions as to the removal of trade refuse, cleanliness of refrigerating plant, stores and trade implements, are being carried out satisfactorily.

The register of the wholesale and retail meat purveyors' shops has been revised and the details as to construction of the premises, fittings and condition has been brought up-to-date.

General Provision Shops and Grocers' Shops.

The regulations relating to these shops have been enforced and the details as to general arrangements entered up in the revised register.

Bacon Stores, where necessary, have been cleansed and limewashing carried out as required.

There are 237 of the above shops in the Borough, 133 have fixed fronts, 26 have sash windows, 49 have partly fixed and partly sash window fronts, and only one with glass shutters.

Fishmongers.

There are 58 retail fish shops in the Borough, 25 of which retail fried fish. The conditions as to the class of fish, frying ingredients and the cleanliness of premises are satisfactory. The details have been entered and the register revised up-to-date.

Fruiterers and Greengrocers' Shops.

There are 127 of these shops in the Borough, and improvements as to the storage accommodation, removal of trade refuse and general cleanliness of premises have been enforced, due to the result of more frequent inspections now possible.

The register for this trade has been revised and brought up-to-date.

It is satisfactory to report that the necessary alterations and works in each of these trades have been carried out, on Preliminary Notices being served from the Department, and in no case has it been necessary to take statutory proceedings under the Regulations.

There are six slaughterhouses in the Borough, at each of which the Regulations as to periodical limewashing, cleansing, etc., have been carried out. Six hundred and thirty-eight inspections have been made of these premises during the year.

The frequent inspections of the Pork Shops clearly prove that it is essential, both in the interests of the Public Health and the Pig Trade generally, to examine carefully all carcasses before exposing them for sale.

The Bye-laws with respect to Slaughter Houses have been revised and adopted in July, 1926, by which it is provided that all animals shall be effectually stunned with a mechanically operated instrument previous to slaughter.

Offensive Trades.

Bye-laws for the regulation of Offensive Trades were adopted by your Authority in October, 1926. Under these Bye-laws it is possible to supervise and control special trades, dealing with rag and bone dealers, fish friers, etc.

Regular and periodical inspections are now being made to these premises with a view to the enforcement of the Bye-laws.

THE FERTILISERS AND FEEDING STUFFS ACT.

No samples have been submitted during the year.

PRIVATE SCHOOLS.

The total number of Private Schools in the Borough is 57, comprising 234 classrooms, and the average number of scholars in attendance at these schools is 2,519.

The sanitary arrangements of the larger private Schools have been examined, and the drainage tested at the end of each term, and reports as to repairs, cleansing, etc., made to the Principals.

This periodical examination has proved to be a precautionary measure where the number of boarders necessitates large households being maintained.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The sanitary conveniences of the public Elementary Schools have also received systematic attention from the Drain Testers who are responsible for the daily cleansing and disinfection of all the fittings, etc. The conveniences are thus maintained scrupulously clean, and the scholars are induced to make proper use of them.

WART DISEASE IN POTATOES.

No cases of Wart Disease were reported during the year.

RAG AND FLOCK ACT REGULATIONS.

Inspections have been made of the premises where flock is used for manufacture of bedding, upholstering, etc.

SALE OF FOOD AND DRUGS ACTS, 1875-1907.

During the year, 450 samples of Food and Drugs were obtained, of which number 322 samples were purchased formally or "taken" in accordance with the provisions of the Acts and 128 samples were purchased informally and submitted as "Test" samples to the Analyst.

Of the formal samples, 31 (9.62 per cent.) and of the unofficial six 4.4 per cent.) were adulterated, whilst 35 (10.86 per cent.) of the official and 10 (7.81 per cent.) of the unofficial were of poor or doubtful quality.

The proportion of adulterated samples was 8.22 per cent. and the poor or doubtful 10.00 per cent. as compared with 8.14 per cent. adulterated and 8.14 per cent. poor or doubtful during 1925.

Tables showing the various articles analysed during the year, with the results of the analyses, will be found in the Public Analyst's Report, Tables II. and III.

MILK.

One hundred and fifty-three samples of Milk were officially purchased or taken and submitted to the Public Analyst, who reported adversely upon thirty-eight of the samples.

Of the adulterated samples thirteen contained added water, etc.

Twelve samples were submitted to the "Gerber Test" by your Inspector; the whole of the samples were taken from consignments of milk in course of delivery to dairymen in the town. Four of these samples were adulterated.

For the detection of the poorer supplies, and subsequent administration regarding them, these examinations are of increasing utility.

BUTTER.

Fifteen formal samples of butter were purchased; one was adulterated and all contained preservative.

DRUGS AND PRESCRIPTIONS.

Twenty samples of Drugs were sent for analysis.

GENERAL REMARKS.

1. The number of rats killed with dogs and ferrets during the year, including the number given above for the 11th Campaign, is 1,403. Allowing that one pair of rats produces 800 in the year, the normal increase has been checked by 561,200 during the year by the use of dogs and ferrets only. It is not possible to calculate the number of rats destroyed by the use of poison baits. With the exception of one or two affected with mange, the rats caught were found to be in a clean, healthy condition.

2. No black rats were found.

3. The Parks, Chines, Cliffs, Pleasure Grounds, Allotments, Piggeries were systematically hunted during the Campaign.

4. The greatest number of rats were caught under fowl houses, pig stys, etc.

5. Special night visits have been made in the larger hotels and stores with good results.

PRESENT ACCOMMODATION.

These three schemes provide accommodation for 398 families, comprising 798 adults, 783 children over 10 years of age, 528 children under 10 years of age, making a total of 2,109 persons.

The number of houses and flats occupied by one family is 246, and the number of houses with three bedrooms occupied by two families is 71, and with four bedrooms is five.

During the year 13 cases of sub-letting without permission were ascertained and the sub-tenants were given notice to leave.

DIVISION OF FOUR-BEDROOMED HOUSES.

Four such houses have been adapted so that each may accommodate two families. Two of these are on the Southill and two on the Carbery Estate. The tenant of each part-house is responsible to the Corporation for one-half of the total rent for the house.

SUB-TENANCIES.

On receipt of a written application from the tenant, the Committee have granted permission to sub-let to another family, provided that the sub-tenancy includes a sitting room, a bedroom (with a fireplace therein), joint use of scullery fittings, bathroom and W.C. The sub-tenant is liable for not more than half of the rent and water rate, which is paid direct to the superior tenant. At the end of December, 1926, there were seventy-eight approved sub-tenancies recorded in the Register.

A large number of the houses have been so arranged with separate doors leading into the sculleries to avoid the tenants having to pass through each other's rooms.

POULTRY KEEPING, ETC.

On receipt of a written application from the tenant or sub-tenant, the Committee has granted permission to keep poultry, provided that the number kept does not at any time exceed eight and that the height of the shed in which they are housed is not more than five feet.

At the end of December, 1926, there were 65 poultry runs on the Southill and Charminster Road Scheme, and 38 on the Carbery Estate.

SHEDS OTHER THAN POULTRY SHEDS.

Applications to erect cycle sheds, etc., were generally granted subject to any conditions imposed by the Buildings Committee, and a list of such applications was handed to that Department.

GENERAL SUPERVISION.

During the year 593 visits have been paid to the Corporation Housing Estates by this Department.

GENERAL REMARKS.

In the Subsidy Housing scheme it will be seen that there are 581 families, most of whom are of the better paid class of workers. Including the 398 families of the lesser paid class of workers in the Corporation Housing Schemes, the total number is 805 families, which shows that accommodation has been provided for about 5,000 persons.

All the ill-effects found in the families of the lesser paid working class cannot be attributed to bad housing. There are—and probably always will be—a certain number of careless and thriftless persons, and other mentally and physically incapable of earning

sufficient to provide for their families for whom it would appear to be of little use to provide good houses. The Housing Committee, however, made no distinctions and regarded all applications solely on the basis of bad housing cases.

It is gratifying to report that your Authority's action in concentrating to provide accommodation for the lesser paid worker—when private enterprise could not do so—has certainly affected improvement in the home conditions of a number of the tenants. In some cases the improvement is most marked.

The ideal of one family per house is one to be aimed at, but it is no good providing a good house if the tenant *will* not or *cannot* pay the rent. Your Committee, by permitting conditional sub-letting conferred a real boon to some families who would not or could not pay 12/6 rent. There were cases of applicants who at their marriages had no furniture of their own and who were occupying one or two furnished rooms at an excessive rent. At the time of their application they had little or no furniture, but by being allotted two unfurnished rooms they made a start and have made good.

It has also been an advantage when the mother is partly, the bread winner, to have another woman in the house to look after the children while she is at work. There are cases where the women have gone out on alternate days and thus helped each other.

The complaints received as to friction and unpleasantness have not been serious and generally have arisen from trivial matters which were soon put right. Moreover the houses occupied by two families do not appear to show any excessive marks of damage over those occupied by one family such as might be expected.

After careful consideration of the results of the House to House Inspection, I am convinced that if conditional sub-letting could be controlled in non-Corporation houses, on similar lines, as in your Corporation houses, and the superior tenant were prohibited from charging exorbitant rents from sub-tenants, the housing problem would the sooner right itself, to the benefit of the Borough in general.

Remembering all the difficulties your Authority have had in dealing with the Housing Conditions such as cost of buildings, scarcity of materials, tenancies, rents, etc., it must be some satisfaction to you to know that the inspections made, prove that the tenants in the majority of cases do value the privilege of renting a Corporation house, as shown by their expressions of thanks, and certainly in some cases by their improved manner of living.

I beg to express my best thanks to the Chairmen and Members of the Health and Housing Committees for their careful consideration of all questions relating to the administrative work of the Department.

Excluding the one abnormal and 13 adulterated samples the average composition of the remaining 139 samples was :—

In no sample was any preservative or artificial colouring detected.

CREAM.

Of the 17 samples of cream examined, four contained very small amounts of Boric Acid ranging from 0.01 to 0.05 per cent., quantities, which as a preservative have little or no value.

It is unlikely that such small proportions were added intentionally—more probably some measure, ladle or spoon which had been previously used for "preserved cream" was used for "Cream"—if so a most objectionable practice.

Three others contained Boric Acid ranging from 0.21 per cent. to 0.32 per cent. and were obviously Preserved Creams.

The amount of fat found was on the whole satisfactory, but three samples contained only approximately 25 per cent. or rather less than half that usually found in Cream.

From time to time in past years I have reported upon such poor samples as these, but in the absence of a standard and the reference to Cream containing less than 35 per cent. of fat in the Order. I have not felt justified in describing them as legally adulterated although knowing full well that morally they are so.

These samples are sometimes described as Rich Cream (which is a palpable lie) and as "Sterilized," thereby giving an undiscerning public the idea that they are superior to ordinary Cream, containing 50-60 per cent. of fat. In my opinion it is fully time that the Ministry of Health should issue an order defining Cream as containing from 40 per cent. to 70 per cent. of fat and compelling the vendor to state upon the label the proportion of fat within limits, e.g.:

(1) Cream contains from 40 per cent. to 70 per cent. Milk Fat.

This Cream contains over 50 per cent. of Milk Fat.

(2) Cream contains from 40 per cent. to 70 per cent. Milk Fat.

This Cream contains from 45 per cent. to 50 per cent. Milk Fat.

(3) Cream contains from 40 per cent. to 70 per cent. Milk Fat.

This Cream contains from 40 per cent. to 45 per cent. Milk Fat.

Of the seven samples of Preserved Cream each contained a good proportion of fat and the amount of Boric Acid varied from 0.12 per cent. to 0.36 per cent.

BUTTER AND MARGARINE.

Of 15 samples of Butter one contained 16.76 per cent. of water or 0.76 per cent. in excess of the maximum allowed, and all contained Boric Acid in quantities varying from 0.06 per cent. to 0.42 per cent.

Fifteen samples of Margarine were also examined and all contained Boric Acid in proportions varying from 0.14 per cent. to 0.48 per cent.

The regulation prohibiting the use of preservative in Butter and Margarine does not come into operation till January 1st, 1928.

SPONGE CAKES.

Of 20 samples of Sponge Cakes examined five contained Boric Acid in amounts varying from 0.03 per cent. to 0.06 per cent.

These quantities are so small that they can scarcely be attributed to the use of Preserved Eggs (unless in small proportion for the purpose of working off stocks gradually), but rather to accidental contamination such as the presence of Boric Acid in the bake-house or the use of fat containing Boric Acid.

It should be remembered that the use of Boric Acid in any proportion in Sponge or any other Cakes is now prohibited unless it can be shown that it has been introduced in Butter or Margarine preserved with Boric preservative.

SAUSAGES.

Eighteen samples of sausages were examined and 10 were found to contain preservative.

Six contained Sulphur Dioxide in amounts varying from 0.76 to 1.92 grain per pound, and four contained Boric Acid in amounts varying from 0.11 per cent. to 0.24 per cent.

Under the Preservatives in Food Regulations which came into operation January 1st, 1927, the practice of using Boric Acid as a preservative in Sausages must cease, as only Sulphur Dioxide in quantity not exceeding 3.15 grains per pound will be allowed.

APPLES.

Twenty-two samples of Apples were examined for arsenic. Of these seven were entirely free, five contained traces only, two contained approaching the limit allowed in food stuffs ($1/100$ th grain per pound).

Eight contained quantities greater than $1/100$ th grain per pound, the range being from $1/20$ th to $1/83$ rd.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH (PRESERVATIVES, ETC.) IN FOOD REGULATIONS, 1925.

Before closing my report I think I ought to outline the provisions of these Regulations.

Broadly the Regulations are :—

(1) To Prohibit the use of any preservative in any article of food or drink, except those named in the Schedule.

(2) To Permit of the use of Sulphurous Acid or Sulphites and Benzoic Acid or Benzoates in—

(3) Certain regulations are given respecting labels to be used for preserved foods.

(4) Certain specified colourings are entirely prohibited, including compounds of Lead, Arsenic and Copper; a specially important effect of this is that Preserved Peas which contain Copper may no longer be sold.

(5) The regulations do not apply to Drugs.

The dates on which the regulations as amended come into operation are as follows :—

(1) All foods except those specified below, came under the regulations on 1st Jan., 1927.

(2) Bacon, ham, egg yolk and articles of food containing preservative necessarily introduced by the use in their preparation of preserved margarine 1st July, 1927.

(3) Butter, cream and articles of food containing preservative necessarily introduced by the use in their preparation of preserved bacon, preserved ham, preserved egg yolk or preserved cream. 1st Jan., 1928.

(4) Articles of food containing preservative necessarily introduced by the use in their preparation of preserved butter. 1st July, 1928.
