

The majority of deaths are those associated with old age, that is the failing of the cardio vascular system, and with cancer in its various forms.

The number of deaths gives a death rate which is rather higher than the average for the country as a whole. This must not be regarded as of any particular significance as the total numbers being small, the average is easily upset by any chance increase or decrease in deaths occurring in any one month as say in January or December, which would influence the rate for one or other calendar year.

The coliform bacteria found would be derived from "aftergrowths" in deposits in the mains. The higher coliform counts were attributed to local mains disturbances as in most cases other samples taken on the same date were coli-free. The few faecal coli found were also derived from "aftergrowths" and not from any pollution.

The water has been of excellent chemical and bacteriological quality throughout the year.

SEWERAGE & SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The existing sewers throughout the district have been satisfactorily maintained during the year and, where necessary, repairs have been carried out.

The Council's Consulting Engineers have continued during the year on their investigations into the condition of the sewerage system, with particular reference to infiltration, and the sewage disposal works. A considerable amount of time has been spent on this work by myself and your workmen who on numberous occasions worked throughout the night in order to carry out gaugings of the sewerage system. The result of these investigations has been most revealing and the report of the Consulting Engineers, a copy of which has been



distributed to Members of the Council, shows the amount of infiltration to be at least twice the volume of the dry weather flow. This is increased considerably during periods of heavy rainfall, which results in the disposal works becoming completely overloaded.

I have reported previously on the condition of the sewage disposal works whose condition, particularly that of the settlement tanks, has rapidly deteriorated during the year. It is hoped that the Consulting Engineers will be in a position to submit their Outline scheme to the Ministry for their consideration in the near future and that approval will be given to the Council to replace the existing disposal works with one which will be able to treat increasing volume of sewage which is now entering the works.

The laying of new sewers to the Housing Estates to the east and west of Bow Green Road was completed during the year. A total length of 1450 yards or over three quarters of a mile of new sewers were laid.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

Refuse Collection

A weekly collection of refuse is carried out throughout the whole of the district and in certain cases two collections a week are made.

The Council employ one Dennis side loading refuse collecting vehicle and five workmen to carry out this work. In addition waste paper and salvage amounting to approximately £200 is collected.

Controlled tipping is carried out on land adjoining the sewage disposal works. The purchase during the year of the tractor together with various items of equipment has helped considerably in the work on the refuse tip. Every effort is made to seal off the tip with soil or inert refuse as soon as possible and the tip is regularly treated with insecticides to prevent the breeding of insects.

One workman is engaged on the refuse tip.

Street Cleansing

Street cleansing is carried out by the Council. Two workmen are engaged full time on this work and additional labour is sometimes available after the completion of the weekly refuse collection.



HOUSING

Under the Housing Acts, the Council has a duty to consider the general housing conditions in the district and to ascertain whether any houses are unfit for human habitation. The Council has powers to deal with unfit houses, powers to provide new houses for all classes and various powers and duties in the management of Council housing estates.

The district is purely residential containing in the main houses of exceptionally good structural condition. There are therefore no unfit houses in the district nor has it been necessary to take action in respect of properties under the Housing Acts.

Housing Management

The Council now own 187 occupied houses all of which are situated in Bowdon Vale. The housing management is largely in the hands of the Public Health Inspector and every effort is made to inspect the houses at regular intervals to see that the property is kept in good condition.

During the year work commenced on the carrying out of improvements and repairs, which includes the provision of bathroom to nineteen sub-standard cottages. The scheme was prepared and is being supervised by the Surveyor and Public Health Inspector and is expected to be completed in about twelve months.

Approval was given during the year for the erection of 36 new houses in the district, 23 houses were completed during the year.

FOOD AND DRUGS

The Council bear most of the statutory responsibilities for safe-guarding the public from foodbourne diseases, the main aim being directed towards securing proper and hygienic conditions for the manufacture, preparation and sale of food.

All premises connected with these businesses have been inspected during the year and where necessary informal action has been taken to secure compliance with the Food and Drugs Act and the Food Hygiene Regulations. In no case was formal action necessary.

GENERAL PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTION

Offensive Trades

There are no offensive trades in the district.

Factories

There are two factories in the district. No action has been necessary under the Factories Act, 1937 during the year.

Shops Acts

No action has been necessary during the year in respect of the provisions of the Shops Act, 1950 regarding sanitary and other arrangements in shops.

Atmospheric Pollution

As the Urban District is purely residential the possible source of nuisance from factory chimneys within their district does not arise.

Serious pollution of the air however eminates from domestic premises both inside and outside the district and the Clean Air Act, 1956 placed into the hands of Local Authorities power to establish Smoke Control Areas within their district in order to reduce atmospheric pollution.

Suitable areas for establishing Smoke Control Areas are the two new housing estates to the east and west of Bow Green Road, Bowdon.



In addition the Council could establish Smoke Control Areas involving properties owned by them, many of which already have installed approved appliances, making it a condition of tenancy that only smokeless fuel shall be burnt.

Following the introduction of the Clean Air Act, 1956, the Council amended their Building Byelaws so as to include control over the installation of appliances for the burning of fuel in all new dwellings. Rigid control is kept during the construction of new houses to ensure that only approved appliances are installed.

The Council are members of the Manchester and District Smoke Abatement Committee and they are represented at this Committee and also at the Standing Conference of Local Authorities regarding Atmospheric Pollution.

A deposit gauge recording the amount of Sulphur Dioxide in the atmosphere is installed in the Council's Yard and periodic readings are taken from this gauge.

Petroleum Licences

Your Public Health Inspector also acts as Petroleum Officer and during the year six licences to keep Petroleum or Petroleum Spirits were issued.

Rodent Control

The Council employ a part time Rodent Operator who carried out the destruction of rodents where necessary.

Sewer tests are taken periodically but few taken are recorded.

The Council's refuse tip and sewage farm are treated weekly and the Council's Yard monthly. No serious infestation has been reported.
