

Mr. Chairman, Ladies & Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in submitting to you my report on the work carried out by the Health Department of the Council during the year 1968.

As you remember, owing to the unfortunate death of Mr. L.J. Cottrell, I succeeded to the office of Public Health Inspector in May, 1968, and I have continued as such ever since. The first four months of the year were under the control of Mr. Cottrell, but there appears to be little of major importance which is necessary to bring to your attention.

Certain improvements have however, been carried out during the year these are set out in detail in the report following.

The Standard Improvement Grants scheme does not appear to have been taken advantage of by the Bowdon Ratepayers, as was expected, only three Improvement Grants amounting to a total of £434 were paid during the year. Publicity however, given later in the year has speeded up the applications for this type of grant and there has been a steady improvement since.

Bowdon is very fortunate in not having a slum clearance problem, as only a few sub-standard houses exist in the district. Several small improvements have been effected on this type of house during the year but generally speaking I have no hesitation in saying that the housing conditions in Bowdon may be considered as satisfactory.


The Summer of 1968 passed without incident, with the exception of an increased number of wasp nests which had to be dealt with. These were cleared effectively by our Rodent Operator as soon as they were reported to us. The co-operation between the Department and the Residents in regard to Rodent Control has kept this down to a desired minimum and only a few cases of rodent infestation are reported to us.

The inspection of meat and food continues and nothing of importance has occurred with the exception of one complaint in respect of a loaf of sliced bread which was below the standard required. This occurred during the month of January and action was taken by the County Food and Drugs Department, and a prosecution was sustained.

The collection of house refuse continues to operate satisfactorily, the whole of the district being cleared by a very efficient team of scavengers. During the year the whole of the refuse collected was tipped on the Hale Council's Tip, this is by arrangement with the Hale Urban District Council, in order that the Bowdon Tip could be temporarily closed.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal has not caused a lot of trouble during the year, with the exception of heavy rain which caused flooding in the Bowdon Vale area. As a result of this flooding which was found to be due to overloaded sewers, the Council instructed Messrs. Ward, Ashcroft and Parkman, Consulting

Engineers of Liverpool to carry out a further inspection and report. This was in the course of preparation towards the end of 1968 and it may be possible to report further next year.

Vandalism at the Sewage Works which was growing regularly has been abated by the provision of a guard dog at the works and this has proved to be a very effective deterrent.

With a view to increasing the drainage facilities in the Bowdon Vale area the Council carried out the construction of a new sewer in Vicarage Lane and this was constructed without incident and completed by the end of October, 1968 at a cost of £12,934.

You will notice from the following report that the district has been fairly clear of infectious diseases during the past year with the exception of an outbreak of dysentery at Beechmount Childrens Home, Langham Road, Bowdon which was soon cleared up.

This being my first full year as Public Health Inspector, may I express my appreciation to the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for their kindness and consideration and the Medical Officer of Health for his advice and guidance during the year and also to the members of my staff for their co-operation, particularly my Secretary Miss Carolyn Thomason both in respect of her work during the year and her help in the compilation of this report.

# MANCHESTER CORPORATION WATERWORKS

## WATER SUPPLY

The whole of the Urban District lies within the area of supply of the Manchester Corporation Waterworks, whose Engineer and Manager has kindly supplied the following information:-

- (1) The water supply to this area has been satisfactory in respect of quality.
- (2) 361 bacteriological samples were taken from Consumers' taps in the Southern District of Manchester's distribution area of which Bowdon forms part. 91.4% were coliform-free and classed as excellent, 99.7% were free of coli type 1, and all cases where unsatisfactory samples were obtained repeat samples gave excellent results.

76 chemical analyses were carried out on samples taken from consumers' taps in the Southern District in 1968. A typical analysis on water taken from a consumer's tap in the district was as follows:-

Slight seasonal variations occur during the year, but the above figures may be regarded as typical.

- (3) The supply to the district is a mixture of waters from Thirlmere and Haweswater. The standard test for plumbosolvency has been applied to each, and both supplies gave satisfactory results. (Lime is added to water leaving Thirlmere and to water from Haweswater at Woodgate Hill, in order to correct any plumbosolvency of the raw lake water).
- (4) If bacteriological or chemical contamination is found additional flushing (additional to normal periodic flushing) is carried out, together with swabbing and, if necessary, re-sterilisation of the mains is carried out. During 1968 this was not necessary in the Bowdon area, although of course, mains were re-sterilised as a matter of routine after any work had been carried out upon them.
