Mr. Chairman, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for the year 1951, based on Ministry of Health Circular 42/51.

The District has remained free from serious epidemics throughout the year and the customary standard of good health which this district enjoys has been maintained.

The work of the Public Health Department in carrying out its varied functions in the field of Preventive Medicine is not easily measured and a large amount of routine work has to be undertaken to maintain existing standards. Considerable knowledge has still to be gained concerning the prevention, spread and control of certain infectious diseases such as Poliomyelitis and the development of effective protective agents against them is eagerly awaited. Everything possible needs to be done towards educating the public to an even higher standard of preventive hygiene and in the early recognition of dangerous diseases such as cancer and tuberculosis. This would help to eliminate much needless sickness and suffering, and reduce the growing expense of hospitals, sickness benefits, etc., which would in turn increase the national output and benefit the community generally.

It is hoped that the true value of Preventive Medicine in minimising sickness will be increasingly appreciated and that research and the carrying out of the many contributory factors in this vital field will not be hampered by lack of public interest and adequate funds.

I would like to take this opportunity of thanking Mr. Noble for his help and co-operation during the year, and Mrs. Hannaford and Mr. Mills for clerical assistance so ably and so willingly given.

OUTLINE OF THE HEALTH SERVICES OPERATING IN THE AREA

Laboratory Facilities

The Laboratory attached to the Pathology Department of Salisbury General Infirmary undertakes all bacteriological and pathological examinations in the district.

In the part of the district nearest Bath, use is made by General Practitioners of the Laboratory at St. Martin's Hospital, Bath.

These laboratories with their skilled staff provide a most valuable service with regard to the examination of drinking water, food and milk samples, throat swabs, etc., and their willing cooperation and expert advice is greatly appreciated.

Hospital Facilities

The South-Western Regional Hospital Board is responsible for hospital facilities in this district.

The two hospitals in the area are a general hospital in Melksham, and a hospital for the chronic sick at Semington. Other general hospitals are situated in Devizes and Trowbridge, with larger ones in Bath and Bristol.

The nearest hospital for the treatment of common infectious disease is the Isolation Hospital at Trowbridge, while cases of Poliomyelitis are generally treated in Bath Isolation Hospital. The nearest Smallpox Hospital is at Bristol.

Poliomyelitis

Of the five cases of poliomyelitis recorded only one was paralytic in nature and recovery has been complete. It will be observed from the table that all were young males.

Two members of one family contracted the disease, which was unusual, as normally, in keeping with the other cases, the disease is sporadic in nature.

From the above table it will be seen that 9 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were notified during 1951. One death from tuberculosis was recorded.

Housing of Tuberculosis Patients

During the year, cases were referred by the Chest Physician for consideration for re-housing. These cases are classified as follows :---

Certificate No. 1. Sputum-positive cases where rehousing is considered urgent for the prevention of infection.

Certificate No. 2. Where better housing would be desirable in order to improve and maintain the patient's health.

Certificate No. 3. Where improved housing would be beneficial but is not an urgent matter.

Mass Radiography

During October the Mass Radiography Unit visited the New Mendip Engineering Company Ltd. A total of 151 persons attended for examination. Three persons were found to have simple non-tuberculous conditions, and three were kept under observation. I am glad to report that no case of tuberculosis was found.

It may be possible to arrange for a further visit of the Mobile X-Ray Unit to the district when a larger number of the general public may be enabled to take advantage of this very important service.

Diphtheria Immunization

Diphtheria immunization is carried out systematically throughout the district by General Practitioners and County Medical Officers, in homes and schools.

Diphtheria immunization was suspended for a time during the summer owing to the prevelance of Poliomyelitis in this and neighbouring districts.

Vaccination is performed under the National Health Service by General Practitioners. Emergency clinics can be operated in the event of an outbreak of smallpox in County Health Clinics at Salisbury and Swindon. Vaccination propaganda is undertaken by the County Health Authority.

It would appear that too few babies are being vaccinated at the present time, and in sharp contrast to diphtheria immunization, which is relatively popular, vaccination in infancy is in my experience inclined to be viewed with relative indifference at the present time. Everything possible, therefore, requires to be done toward stimulating public opinion in favour of vaccination and impressing on them the constant danger of smallpox outbreaks in a poorly protected community.

Food Poisoning

There were no outbreaks or known cases of food poisoning in the district during 1951.

National Assistance Act, 1948

SECTION 47 : REMOVAL TO SUITABLE PREMISES OF PERSONS IN NEED OF CARE AND ATTENTION

During the year one case was kept under review, but I am happy to report that it was not found necessary to obtain compulsory removal of any persons against their will from their homes.

This step is one that should only be considered after all the assistance that can be given by Home Helps, District Nurses, National Assistance Officers and Welfare Officers, etc., has failed to provide the care and attention needed, and it is felt that there is need for more co-ordination of these services which are available to assist the aged and infirm.

Note-It will be noticed throughout this report that on occasion, more notices are shown as "complied with" than "served." This is explained by work, requested in 1950, being completed in 1951.

During the year, 148 horses have been killed for human consumption. 8 lungs (parasitic), 23 livers (parasitic), and 2 kidneys (cystic) were condemned as unfit for food. No carcass meat was condemned.

It is of interest to say that no evidence of Tuberculosis was observed, and that the meat is remarkably free from disease. One specimen of lung tissue and bronchial lymphatic gland was sent to the Department of Preventive Medicine at Bristol University. The report confirmed the presence of anthracosis with silicosis. Enquiries showed that the horse had been worked in a coal mine.

Wherever possible the condemned food is re-processed or used for animal foodstuffs. A further opportunity to remind food handlers of the need for strict hygiene was afforded in November, when the Council agreed to the issue of notices requesting that dogs be kept out of food premises, to shops, restaurants, etc.

This action formed part of a campaign which has consisted of personal visits and inspections in 1948 and 1949 and the adoption and circularisation of the Ministry of Food's Model Byelaws in 1950.

The results of the year's sampling are set out in Appendix "A" of this report. Enquiries and check samples are made following a poor sample result. All the ice cream is manufactured outside this district.

The 1951 results show a definite improvement over the figures for 1950, and the Council's policy of registering general stores for the sale of pre-packed ice cream only, appears to be fully justified.

During the year, the Council refused registration for the sale of ice cream at premises which did not comply with Section 13 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938. The occupier appealed, but the local Magistrates upheld the Council's decision.

Appendix "B" of this report sets out the sample results of "designated" milk. In two cases the results cannot be considered satisfactory. Thorough investigations were made, and, in each case, it is thought that the cause of the sample failures was discovered and rectified.

In renewing the licences for 1952, it has been made clear to those dairymen that an improvement is essential, and if three consecutive samples fail, the question of revocation of the licence will have to be considered.

During the year, 13 samples have been taken for biological examination, and in each case the report was "tubercle bacillus not present." The number of such samples is really insufficient. but is limited owing to lack of staff.

Appendix "C" of this report sets out the sample results for the year.

Three unsatisfactory supplies have been discontinued as a result of the main extension schemes carried out by this Council.

The various water supplies are not uniformly satisfactory in quality or quantity. The Council Surveyor has various schemes in hand which will result in considerable unification and improvement.

I am not in a position to give, with any degree of accuracy, the number of houses and the population in each Parish supplied from public water mains direct to houses, or by means of standpipes. None of the water supplies appear to be liable to plumbosolvent action. A typical report of a satisfactory bacteriological examination is given below :---

The Rodent Operator now spends three weeks out of four in this Council's service. Steady progress is being made and the Council are shortly to consider the question of rodent inspections of farms. A case of Weil's Disease (Rat Jaundice) in a farm-worker occurred towards the end of the year. Intensive rodent destruction, by the Agricultural Executive Committee, neighbouring authorities, and ourselves, was put in hand and rats have been submitted to the Leptospira Laboratory. No further cases have been reported.

Details, in the form required by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, are given in Appendix "E."

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

This service, with a mainly weekly collection, has been maintained throughout the year with remarkably few complaints. Credit is due to the driver and loaders for this satisfactory record.

There have been various staff changes and it was found necessary to provide housing accommodation in order to secure the services of a suitable Loader/Relief Driver.

Owing to some unsatisfactory temporary labour, a fire broke out on the 13th August, 1951, at our secondary tip at Avoncliff. The fire was still burning at the end of the year, and this has entailed some considerable anxiety and dislocation.

These figures are encouraging and show an increase, for waste paper, of 53 per cent. weight and 343 per cent. gross value over the 1950 collection figures.

The Council entered the 1951 National Waste Paper Contest and have endeavoured to stimulate the collection of paper by the issue of posters to Parish Councils, the provision of sticky labels, asking for householder' co-operation, for the collectors to affix to dustbins, and a salvage bonus scheme for the staff.

CESSPOOL EMPTYING SERVICE

This service, which was brought into operation in 1948, has been utilised to clear 175 cesspools and septic tanks during 1951. The contractors, employed by the Council, visit the district every three months and carry out work notified to my office following newspaper advertisements.

To save correspondence, a standing order scheme has been established, and instructions have been received for 165 clearances every year, quite apart from any enquiries made following our quarterly advertisement.

No progress has been made under the Rural Housing Survey and old property continues to deteriorate. We shall be faced with a difficult and large problem in later years.

No improvement grants, under the Housing Act, 1949, have been made and no proceedings have been taken under Sections 12, 25, 26 or the Overcrowding Sections of the 1936 Act. Some amendment to the restriction of rents appears to be a pre-requisite to the improvement, or indeed adequate maintenance, of cottage property. The scheme of rent increases submitted in November to the Minister of Housing and Local Government by the Sanitary Inspectors' Association deserves most serious consideration. It affords a practical solution to some existing difficulties, but is likely to raise issues on the rising cost of living.

Once again, a variety of complaints have been received and investigated. It is only if friendly informal action is unsuccessful that the cases are reported to the Public Health Committee for consideration of statutory action.

A summary of work carried out by informal action is given in Appendix "F" of this report.

RIVERS, STREAMS AND SEWERAGE

Informal action has been taken in various parts of the district to prevent pollution of streams and water courses. Sewer ditches continue to be a problem. Only three of the 13 Parishes (Winsley, Hilperton and Holt) have sewerage systems, but additional schemes are envisaged by the Surveyor to the Council.

SWIMMING BATHS

There are no swimming baths or pools open to the public in this area. Various samples and some advisory work was undertaken for a private pool at a school.

SMOKE ABATEMENT

No action was found to be necessary during the year with regard to smoke abatement.

RAG FLOCK AND OTHER FILLING MATERIALS ACT, 1951

Two premises have been registered in accordance with the new Act. Enquiries and inspections were carried out and preparations have been made for routine sampling next year.

PET ANIMALS ACT, 1951

Preparatory inspections have been made in connection with the Pet Animals Act, 1951, which comes into operation on the 1st April, 1952.

The R.S.P.C.A. Inspector has very readily given technical advice on these inspections.
