### Mr. Chairman, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for the year 1953, based on Ministry of Health Circular 1/54.

The District has remained free from serious epidemics throughout the year and the customary standard of good health which this district enjoys has been maintained.

An outbreak of measles, however, reached epidemic proportion with 267 cases compared with 9 and 211 in 1952 and 1951 respectively. The biennial epidemic pattern of the disease continued and as with scarlet fever few complications arose.

There was no serious influenza epidemic, while six cases of poliomyelitis were recorded.

I would like to take this opportunity of thanking Mr. Noble for his help and co-operation during the year, and Mrs. Hannaford and Mr. Mills for clerical and other assistance so ably and so willingly given.

### OUTLINE OF THE HEALTH SERVICES OPERATING IN THE AREA

### Laboratory Facilities

The Public Health Laboratory, Manor Hospital, Bath, undertakes all necessary bacteriological and pathological examinations in the District.

This laboratory with its skilled staff provides a most valuable service with regard to the examination of drinking water, food and milk samples, throat swabs, etc., and their willing co-operation and expert advice is much appreciated.

### Hospital Facilities

The South-Western Regional Hospital Board is responsible for hospital facilities in this district.

The two hospitals in the area are a general hospital in Melksham, and a hospital for the chronic sick at Semington. Other general hospitals are situated in Devizes and Trowbridge, with larger ones in Bath and Bristol.

The nearest hospital for the treatment of common infectious disease is the Isolation Hospital at Trowbridge, while cases of Poliomyelitis are generally treated in Bath Isolation Hospital. The nearest Smallpox Hospital is at Bristol.

### **County Health Facilities**

### DISTRIBUTION IN PARISHES

### Poliomyelitis

Six cases of poliomyelitis were notified and confirmed in the District during the year. Three cases were of the paralytic type, while the other three were non-paralytic. Contrary to the misnomer of infantile paralysis, half of these cases affected young adults. One case occurred in a separate part of a building where no less than three cases had occurred in the last two years, but no apparent connection or cause for this strange coincidence could be ascertained. By the end of the year four of the cases had made a complete recovery, while the remaining two were progressing satisfactorily.

Of these, 7 affected Royal Air Force personnel who were possibly infected elsewhere.

From the above table it will be seen that 11 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were notified during 1953. No deaths from tuberculosis were recorded.

### **Re-housing of Tuberculosis Patients**

Cases are referred from time to time by the Chest Physician for consideration for re-housing. These cases are classified as follows :—

Certificate No. 1. Sputum-positive cases where rehousing is considered urgent for the prevention of infection.

Certificate No. 2. Where better housing would be desirable in order to improve and maintain the patient's health.

Certificate No. 3. Where improved housing would be beneficial but is not an urgent matter.

No certificates, requiring to be dealt with, were received during the current year.

### Mass Radiography

During February the Miniature Radiography Unit visited the New Mendip Engineering Co. A total of 146 persons attended for examination. No cases of tuberculosis and only one of nontuberculosis disease, previously detected, was discovered. At a later date a temporary centre was set up which attracted residents from the adjoining parts of the District.

It is hoped that the Unit will make frequent return visits to the District when it may be possible to afford even greater facilities to all parts of the rural area concerned.

### **Diphtheria Immunization**

Diphtheria immunization is carried out systematically throughout the district by General Practitioners and County Medical Officers, in homes and schools.

Diphtheria immunization was suspended for a time during the summer owing to the prevalence of Poliomyelitis in this and neighbouring districts.

Considerably more primary vaccinations were undertaken during 1953, a total of 95 compared with 44 in the previous year.

Vaccination is performed under the National Health Service by General Practitioners. Emergency clinics can be operated in the event of an outbreak of smallpox in County Health Clinics at Salisbury and Swindon. Vaccination propaganda is undertaken by the County Health Authority.

It would continue to appear that too few babies are being vaccinated at the present time, and in sharp contrast to diphtheria immunization, which is relatively popular, vaccination in infancy is in my experience inclined to be viewed with relative indifference at the present time. Everything possible, therefore, requires to be done toward stimulating public opinion in favour of vaccination and impressing on them the constant danger of smallpox outbreaks in a poorly protected community.

### Food Poisoning

There were no outbreaks or suspected cases of food poisoning in the district during 1953.

### National Assistance Act, 1948

SECTION 47 : REMOVAL TO SUITABLE PREMISES OF PERSONS IN NEED OF CARE AND ATTENTION

During the year, the aged couple previously under review, were admitted to hospital on account of acute illness and frailty. Compulsory removal was not, however, found necessary.

This latter step is one that should only be considered after all the assistance that can be given by Home Helps, District Nurses, National Assistance Officers and Welfare Officers, etc., has failed to provide the care and attention needed, and it is felt that there is need for more co-ordination of these services which are available to assist the aged and infirm.

Note-It will be noticed throughout this report that on occasion, more notices are shown as "complied with" than "served." This is explained by work, requested in 1952, being completed in 1953.

During the year, 18 horses have been killed for human consumption.

It is of interest to say that no evidence of Tuberculosis was observed, and that the meat is remarkably free from disease.

There has been some national publicity regarding alleged cruel practices in connection with the slaughter of horses. During the frequent visits made to the slaughterhouse in this district, I have never seen any cruelty and I consider that the horses are handled with maximum consideration.

At various other premises, the following articles were condemned :---

Ox Tongues ... ... ... 2 tins

Wherever possible the condemned food is re-processed or used for animal foodstuffs.

At the end of the year, there was legislation pending which would give Local Authorities greater power regarding food premises and would entail registration of catering establishments. This is to be welcomed as a further step to improve food hygiene but additional staff will be required to make the detailed visits and ensure high standards.

With the co-operation of the Director of the Public Health Laboratory Service at Bath, it is hoped to commence in 1954 a modest routine of checking the efficiency of dish washing at catering establishments. A powder dusting test is to be utilized and the opportunity will be taken of discussing food hygiene with the proprietors. This will form part of our food hygiene campaign which has already included visits and the issue of circulars.

Once again, pressure of other work has rendered it impossible to make the required inspections to ensure compliance with the Shops Act, 1950.

It is pleasing to report that no complaints have been received during the year regarding gipsies at Norrington Common, Broughton Gifford.

The Council agreed to a site licence being amended to allow 9 caravans instead of 6 at a farm in the district. An additional standpipe and increased drainage facilities have been provided. Individual caravans continue to be placed in the district and the Council either require their removal or, subject to satisfactory water supply, drainage, etc., license the site. There are indications that with the easing of the housing shortage, this problem will not present so many difficulties in the future.

The Rodent Operator spends 2 weeks out of 4 on rodent control for this Council. Ready co-operation with the Pests Officers of the Agricultural Executive Committee is appreciated and leads to a smooth public service.

Mr. Boddy underwent an operation during the year and was off duty for 3 months. We were fortunate in obtaining, for this period, the services of the former Rodent Operator.

Al! 3 sewerage systems have been test baited during the year and only one manhole showed evidence of rats. In this case, a branch sewer was baited and poison laid.

### **REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL**

This service, with a weekly collection, has been maintained throughout the year with remarkably few complaints. Credit is due to the driver and loaders for this satisfactory record.

Various staff changes have taken place and one man was away ill for several months. The erection of new houses, both private and Council, have stretched this service to its limits and overtime has become a regular feature. It is to be hoped that some extension of the service to include an additional lorry, will be possible so that the routine can include a little spare time for regular attention and servicing of the vehicle. To have one large lorry to deal with the large eastern area of the district and the 7 cubic yard lorry to negotiate the awkward lanes in the western portion would render this service far less precarious.

The Treasurer of the Council has been kind enough to extract from his records and compile the statement of Income and Expenditure given in Appendix "D" of this report.

Hopes are entertained that this price will improve but in the meantime the Council are saving this raw material, keeping householders in the habit of putting salvage for collection and although not getting any great return we are probably not running this item at a loss.

With the issue in November, 1953, of the Government White Paper entitled "Houses—The Next Step," it appears that a bold approach is to be made to the difficult problem of deteriorating cottage property and the allied problem of rent restriction. This White Paper foreshadows legislation which will be welcomed but it will inevitably create a large amount of work which will entail additional trained staff. Local Authorities must accept this burden willingly in order to adequately deal with poor property which should be either re-conditioned or demolished.

During the year, two Improvement Grants under the Housing Act, 1949, were made, two applications were in the hands of the Ministry at the end of the year and details of another application are in the course of preparation.

### **RIVERS, STREAMS AND SEWERAGE**

Informal action has been taken in various parts of the district to prevent pollution of streams and water courses. Sewer ditches continue to be a problem. Only three of the 13 Parishes (Winsley, Hilperton and Holt) have sewerage systems, but additional schemes are envisaged by the Surveyor to the Council. Dr. Moore's swabs have been utilized in a certain ditch in the district and the Bacteriologist reported that no intestinal pathogens were isolated.

The Council's policy of insisting on downward filtration before any effluent from new sewage disposal plants can be discharged to a ditch or village drain, should prevent further pollution of ditches.

### SWIMMING BATHS

There are no swimming baths or pools open to the public in this area. Various samples and some advisory work was undertaken for a private pool at a school.

### SMOKE ABATEMENT

No formal action was found to be necessary during the year with regard to smoke abatement but ready co-operation was obtained from a haulage firm in one case of excessive fumes from a diesel driven lorry.
