

OUTLINE OF THE HEALTH SERVICES OPERATING IN THE AREA

Laboratory Facilities

The Public Health Laboratory, Manor Hospital, Bath, undertakes all necessary bacteriological and pathological examinations in the District.

This laboratory with its skilled staff provides a most valuable service with regard to the examination of drinking water, food and milk samples, throat swabs, etc., and their willing co-operation and expert advice is much appreciated.

Hospital Facilities

The South-Western Regional Hospital Board is responsible for hospital facilities in this district.

The two hospitals in the area are a general hospital in Melksham, and a hospital for the chronic sick at Semington. Other general hospitals are situated in Devizes and Trowbridge, with larger ones in Bath and Bristol.

The nearest hospital for the treatment of common infectious disease is the Isolation Hospital at Trowbridge, while cases of Poliomyelitis are generally treated in Bath Isolation Hospital. The nearest Smallpox Hospital is at Bristol.

County Health Facilities

From the above table it will be seen that 5 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were notified during 1955. No deaths from tuberculosis were recorded.

Re-housing of Tuberculosis Patients

Cases are referred from time to time by the Chest Physician for consideration for re-housing. These cases are classified as follows:—

Certificate No. 1. Sputum-positive cases where rehousing is considered urgent for the prevention of infection.

Certificate No. 2. Where better housing would be desirable in order to improve and maintain the patient's health.

Certificate No. 3. Where improved housing would be beneficial but is not an urgent matter.

Three certificates, requiring to be dealt with, were received during the current year.

Mass Radiography

A visit was paid to the New Mendip Engineering Co., Ltd., at Atworth, when 193 persons were examined. No active tuberculosis was found. Two cases of inactive tuberculosis and two non-tuberculous conditions were revealed.

Diphtheria Immunization

Diphtheria immunization is carried out systematically throughout the district by General Practitioners and County Medical Officers, in homes and schools.

Compared with 1954 the number of primary immunizations fell from 152 to 128. The number of reinforcing injections administered rose from 196 to 209. The total immunized child population at the end of the year was 1948 compared with 1818.

Considerably less primary vaccinations were undertaken during 1955, a total of 89 compared with 119 in the previous year.

Vaccination is performed under the National Health Service by General Practitioners. Emergency clinics can be operated in the event of an outbreak of smallpox in County Health Clinics at Salisbury and Swindon. Vaccination propaganda is undertaken by the County Health Authority.

It would continue to appear that too few babies are being vaccinated at the present time, and in sharp contrast to diphtheria immunization, which is relatively popular, vaccination in infancy is in my experience inclined to be viewed with relative indifference at the present time. Everything possible, therefore, requires to be done toward stimulating public opinion in favour of vaccination and impressing on them the constant danger of smallpox outbreaks in a poorly protected community.

Food Poisoning

No cases of food poisoning were reported.

National Assistance Act, 1948

Section 47: Removal to Suitable Premises of Persons in need of care and attention

Happily, it was not found necessary to obtain compulsory removal of any persons against their will from their homes.

This latter step is one that should only be considered after all the assistance that can be given by Home Helps, District Nurses, National Assistance Officers and Welfare Officers, etc., has failed to provide the care and attention needed, and it is felt that there is need for more co-ordination of these services which are available to assist the aged and infirm.

The two private slaughterhouses in this district have continued in operation during the year, one with slaughtering once a week and the other with slaughtering practically every day (animals slaughtered and condemnation figures are shown in Appendix "A"). This entails a considerable amount of overtime including work every Sunday and Bank Holiday. The appointment of an Additional Sanitary Inspector has enabled a rota to be operated so that alternate Sundays are spent off duty. Antemortem inspection of animals is not possible. No horses have been slaughtered in this District during 1955.

During the year plans were submitted and approved by the Council for enlarging and improving one slaughterhouse. The improvements will include a separate slaughtering booth so that the existing slaughterhouse can be used as a cooling hall. I would like to express here my thanks to Mr. Sillars, the Area Technical Adviser of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, for his co-operation and suggestions when the improvement scheme was being prepared. It is hoped that the building work of this scheme will be done early in 1956.

Although meat inspection has absorbed a great deal of time, a re-survey of food premises has been made during the year and further work is being planned for 1956 following the arrival of the Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955.

I am glad to say that we obtained very good co-operation from the Sanitary Inspector of the district concerned, the supplies of ice cream were returned to the manufacturer for re-processing and later samples showed improved results.

Our milk sampling routine is aimed to take a monthly sample from every distributor holding a special designation licence. In practice, all sorts of difficulties can arise in obtaining a supply of ice (in which to transport the samples) or in finding the roundsman in the district. This entails heavy demands on time and travelling but I think we can be proud of our sampling record. As this district became part of a specified area on the 6th December, 1955, we now have the satisfaction of knowing that no raw milk, other than "Tuberculin Tested" milk, is being retailed in our district.

It is again pleasing to report that no complaints have been received during the year regarding gipsies at Norrington Common.

All the sites, licensed by the Council, have been visited during the year to ensure that the conditions of the licences were fulfilled.

RODENT CONTROL

Details, in the form required by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, are given in Appendix "D."

The arrangement of a part-time Rodent Operator has generally proved satisfactory. I am also pleased to report good relations and co-operation with the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food and the Pests Officers of the Agricultural Executive Committee. Such co-operation leads to a good public service.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

This service, with a weekly collection, has been maintained throughout the year with scarcely any complaints from the public. Credit is due to the Driver and Loaders for this satisfactory record.

Nevertheless, the condition of our refuse vehicle has been causing some concern and we anticipate the delivery of a new vehicle in the early part of 1956.

The price for the salvaged paper was increased on the 1st February, 1955, from £6 10s. 0d. to £7 10s. 0d. per ton, and in May to £8 per ton. The Council have continued the salvage bonus for the men. During the year, a survey was made of cottages with a rateable value of £10 or less and the following results were obtained:

The Council have decided to immediately deal with the properties placed in category 4 and to encourage owners, with the aid of Improvement Grants, to re-condition wherever practicable. By the end of the year, 8 cottages were reported to the Housing Committee for action under Section 11 of the Housing Act, 1936. Negotiations with the owners are in progress.

A fair amount of time is devoted to Improvement Grant enquiries. Ten grants were approved by the Council during the year.

No applications have been made to the Council for certificates of disrepair under Part II of the Housing Repairs and Rents Act, 1954.
