

### OUTLINE OF THE HEALTH SERVICES OPERATING IN THE AREA

### Laboratory Facilities

The Public Health Laboratory, Manor Hospital, Bath, undertakes all necessary bacteriological and pathological examinations in the District.

This laboratory with its skilled staff provides a most valuable service with regard to the examination of drinking water, food and milk samples, throat swabs, etc., and their willing co-operation and expert advice is much appreciated.

### Hospital Facilities

The South-Western Regional Hospital Board is responsible for hospital facilities in this district.

The two hospitals in the area are a general hospital in Melksham, and a hospital for the chronic sick at Semington. Other general hospitals are situated in Devizes and Trowbridge, with larger ones in Bath and Bristol.

The nearest hospital for the treatment of common infectious disease is the Isolation Hospital at Trowbridge, while cases of Poliomyelitis are generally treated in Bath Isolation Hospital. The nearest Smallpox Hospital is at Bristol.

### County Health Facilities

From the above table it will be seen that 2 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were notified during 1956. No deaths from tuberculosis were recorded.

### Re-housing of Tuberculosis Patients

Cases are referred from time to time by the Chest Physician for consideration for re-housing. These cases are classified as follows:—

Certificate No. 1. Sputum-positive cases where rehousing is considered urgent for the prevention of infection.

Certificate No. 2. Where better housing would be desirable in order to improve and maintain the patient's health.

Certificate No. 3. Where improved housing would be beneficial but is not an urgent matter.

None of the above certificates was received during the year.

### Mass Radiography

At the Royal Air Force Station, Melksham Without, a total of 2,344 persons were examined, 5 of which were found to be suffering from inactive tuberculosis. Six other non-tuberculous conditions were revealed.

At the New Mendip Engineering Co. Ltd., at Atworth, 283 persons were examined. No cases of tuberculosis were revealed, but one person was found to be suffering from a non-tuberculous condition.

At the factory of Messrs. J. & T. Beaven Ltd., Holt, Leather Specialists, a total of 147 persons were examined without any abnormalities being revealed.

At Broughton Gifford, 102 persons were examined without any abnormalities being revealed.

### Diphtheria Immunisation

Diphtheria immunisation is carried out systematically throughout the district by General Practitioners and County Medical Officers, in homes and schools.

Compared with 1955, the number of primary immunisations against diphtheria rose from 128 to 142. The number of reinforcing injections administered fell from 209 to 135. The total immunised child population at the end of the year was 1363 compared with 1948. 93 primary and 4 reinforcing whooping cough immunisations were undertaken.

Slightly less primary vaccinations were undertaken during 1956, a total of 86, compared with 89 in the previous year.

Vaccination is performed under the National Health Service by General Practitioners. Emergency clinics can be operated in the event of an outbreak of smallpox in County Health Clinics at Salisbury and Swindon. Vaccination propaganda is undertaken by the County Health Authority.

It would continue to appear that too few babies are being vaccinated at the present time, and in sharp contrast to diphtheria immunisation, which is relatively popular, vaccination in infancy is in my experience inclined to be viewed with relative indifference at the present time. Everything possible, therefore, requires to be done toward stimulating public opinion in favour of vaccination and impressing on them the constant danger of smallpox outbreaks in a poorly protected community.

### Food Poisoning

No cases of food poisoning were reported.

### National Assistance Act, 1948

Section 47: Removal to Suitable Premises of Persons in Need of Care and attention

Happily, it was not found necessary to obtain compulsory removal of any persons against their will from their homes.

This latter step is one that should only be considered after all the assistance that can be given by Home Helps, District Nurses, National Assistance Officers and Welfare Officers, etc., has failed to provide the care and attention needed, and it is felt that there is need for more co-ordination of these services which are available to assist the aged and infirm.

The year 1956 has been one of steady progress with an expansion in the Refuse Collection Service to include the R.A.F. Station at Melksham Without, a detailed survey under the Food Hygiene Regulations and an augmented routine for milk sampling.

May I mention my gratitude to the Chairman and Members of the Council and Committees for their guidance, to Dr. Killoh for his co-operation and to Mr. Beresford and Miss Gatt for their assistance and attention to detail. The Rodent Operator and the eight members of the Refuse Collection and Disposal Staff have worked admirably and have rendered good service to the public.

Note—It will be noticed throughout this report that, on occasion, more notices are shown as "complied with" than "served." This is explained by work, requested in 1955, being completed in 1956.

The two private slaughterhouses have continued in operation during the year (animals slaughtered and condemnation figures are shown in Appendix "A").

To maintain 100% inspection, considerable overtime is worked, including every Sunday and Bank Holiday. Ante-mortem inspection is not possible. No horses have been slaughtered during the year.

A scheme of enlargement and improvement at one slaughterhouse was completed in May, 1956.

A detailed survey of all premises affected by the Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955, has been made and, with the Council's agreement, I am now making the informal approaches necessary to obtain compliance with these regulations.

It is again pleasing to report that no complaints have been received during the year regarding gipsies at Norrington Common.

All the sites, licensed by the Council, have been inspected to ensure that the licence conditions are fulfilled.

### RODENT CONTROL

Details, in the form required by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, are given in Appendix "D."

The arrangement of a part-time Rodent Operator has proved satisfactory.

The public sewerage systems have been test baited and it was found necessary to treat a section of one such system.

To save expense, the Council have agreed to a limited supply of Warfarin being left with suitable householders where minor infestations are reported. Printed warnings and instructions are affixed to each packet of this rodenticide.

### REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

The Council entered into a contract to carry out the refuse collection at the R.A.F. Station, Melksham Without. Such work commenced on the 3rd April, 1956, and great credit is due to our men that the work has proceeded very smoothly. We have also commenced a limited collection of trade refuse.

The Council now have two 10 cubic yard vehicles — one Bedford (delivered in March, 1956) and one Ford (delivered in November, 1956). The Dennis 7 cubic yard vehicle met with an accident in September whilst on loan to another Department. This vehicle was sold as scrap and the Council hired a lorry pending the delivery of the Ford.

Both vehicles are diesel driven and this fuel is provided in bulk at our new Depot at Frome Road, Bradford on Avon.

A summary of work carried out by informal action is given in Appendix "E" of this report.

Following the service of the two statutory notices in connection with a nuisance from the drainage of a piggery the Council's case was heard by the Bradford on Avon Magistrates Court. On two separate occasions the hearing lasted a complete day. On each occasion the Council's case was accepted, a fine was imposed and costs obtained.

### RIVERS, STREAMS AND SEWERAGE

Informal action has been taken in various parts of the district to prevent pollution of streams and water courses. Sewer ditches continue to be a problem. Only three of the 13 Parishes (Winsley, Hilperton and Holt) have sewerage systems, but additional schemes are envisaged by the Surveyor to the Council.

We have co-operated with the Bristol Avon River Board in the removal and disposal of various animal carcases found in the river at Limpley Stoke Weir.

### SWIMMING BATHS

There are no swimming baths or pools open to the public in this area. Various samples and some advisory work was undertaken for a private pool at a school.

### SMOKE ABATEMENT

No formal action was found to be necessary during the year with regard to smoke abatement.

With the arrival of the Clean Air Act, 1956, the Council have authorised a letter being sent to the proprietors of various industrial premises. Attention has been drawn to the provisions of the Act and consultations invited with the Council's Officers and the National Industrial Fuel Efficiency Service.
