OUTLINE OF THE HEALTH SERVICES OPERATING IN THE AREA

Laboratory Facilities

The Public Health Laboratory, Manor Hospital, Bath, undertakes all necessary bacteriological and pathological examinations in the District.

This laboratory with its skilled staff provides a most valuable service with regard to the examination of drinking water, food and milk samples, throat swabs, etc., and their willing co-operation and expert advice is much appreciated.

Hospital Facilities

The South-Western Regional Hospital Board is responsible for hospital facilities in this district.

The two hospitals in the area are a general hospital in Melksham, and a hospital for the chronic sick at Semington. Other general hospitals are situated in Devizes and Trowbridge, with larger ones in Bath and Bristol.

The nearest hospital for the treatment of common infectious disease is the Isolation Hospital at Trowbridge, while cases of Poliomyelitis are generally treated in Bath Isolation Hospital. The nearest Smallpox Hospital is at Bristol.

From the above table it will be seen that 14 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were notified during 1957. Two deaths from tuberculosis were recorded.

Re-housing of Tuberculosis Patients

Cases are referred from time to time by the Chest Physician for consideration for re-housing. These cases are classified as follows:--

Certificate No. 1. Sputum-positive cases where rehousing is considered urgent for the prevention of infection.

Certificate No. 2. Where better housing would be desirable in order to improve and maintain the patient's health.

Certificate No. 3. Where improved housing would be beneficial but is not an urgent matter.

None of the above certificates was received during the year.

Mass Radiography

No visits were paid by the Mass Miniature Radiography Unit during the year.

Diphtheria Immunisation

Diphtheria immunisation is carried out systematically throughout the district by General Practitioners and County Medical Officers, in homes and schools.

Immunisation Statistics, 1957

Compared with 1956, the number of primary immunisations against diphtheria fell from 142 to 106. The number of reinforcing injections administered fell from 135 to 63. The total immunised child population at the end of the year was 1243 compared with 1363. The number of primary whooping cough immunisations rose from 93 to 119 and reinforcing from 4 to 9.

Approximately the same number of primary vaccinations were undertaken as in the previous year, while the number of re-vaccinations rose from 24 to 29.

Vaccination is performed under the National Health Service by General Practitioners. Emergency clinics can be operated in the event of an outbreak of smallpox in County Health Clinics at Salisbury and Swindon. Vaccination propaganda is undertaken by the County Health Authority.

It would continue to appear that too few babies are being vaccinated at the present time, and in sharp contrast to diphtheria immunisation, which is relatively popular, vaccination in infancy is in my experience inclined to be viewed with relative indifference at the present time. Everything possible, therefore, requires to be done toward stimulating public opinion in favour of vaccination and impressing on them the constant danger of smallpox outbreaks in a poorly protected community.

Food Poisoning

No cases of food poisoning were reported.

National Assistance Act, 1948

SECTION 47: REMOVAL TO SUITABLE PREMISES OF PERSONS IN NEED OF CARE AND ATTENTION

Happily, it was not found necessary to obtain compulsory removal of any persons against their will from their homes.

This latter step is one that should only be considered after all the assistance that can be given by Home Helps, District Nurses, National Assistance Officers and Welfare Officers, etc., has failed to provide the care and attention needed, and it is felt that there is need for more co-ordination of these services which are available to assist the aged and infirm.

Note—It will be noticed throughout this report that, on occasion, more notices are shown as "complied with" than "served." This is explained by work, requested in 1956, being completed in 1957.

The two private slaughterhouses have continued in operation during the year (animals slaughtered and condemnation figures are shown in Appendix "A").

Both slaughterhouses in the district have a high standard of construction and the methods of working are very satisfactory.

To obtain 100% inspection, considerable overtime is worked, including every Sunday and Bank Holiday. Ante-mortem inspection is not possible. No horses have been slaughtered during the year.

During April and May, whilst we were without the services of an Additional Public Health Inspector, a neighbouring Rural District Council permitted one of their Public Health Inspectors to give us assistance on meat inspection work. This action was greatly appreciated and is an example of the flexibility and good will in Local Government.

A special report was made to the Public Health Committee in November, 1957, and the progress of work under the Food Hygiene Regulations was detailed. The Committee agreed that I should continue to proceed with informal approaches to the occupiers of food premises.

We have been able to maintain our augmented sampling routine to cover all Distributors and Producer/Retailers. Sample failures are investigated and further check samples obtained. Two Distributors showed an unsatisfactory sampling record and the Public Health Committee has given instructions that, as the licences are renewed, the Distributors are to be informed that the Council are not satisfied and they must indicate what steps are being taken to obtain an improvement.

The number of biological samples for Tubercle Bacillus shows a reduction. The Bath Public Health Laboratory feel obliged to restrict the routine use of this test to samples of raw, undesignated milk. This Rural District now lies in an area within which only Tuberculin Tested or other designated milk may be sold. Biological testing is still considered if special circumstances require it, as when investigating milk supplies to households in which cases of bovine tuberculosis have occurred. During 1958 the laboratory hope to make a sample survey of raw Tuberculin Tested milk in this area for evidence of brucellosis and Q fever infection. In the course of this, observations will also be made for the presence of tuberculous infection in the milk.

WATER

Appendix "B" of this Report sets out the sample results for the year.

I am not in a position to give, with any degree of accuracy, the number of houses and the population in each Parish supplied from public water mains direct to houses, or by means of standpipes. None of the water supplies appear to be liable to plumbosolvent action.

It will be noticed that the number of public supplies is being reduced; this is due to the Council's policy which results in easier control by the Surveyor of the Council.

It is again pleasing to report that no complaints have been received during the year regarding gipsies at Norrington Common.

All the sites, licensed by the Council, have been inspected to ensure compliance with the licence conditions.

RODENT CONTROL

Details, in the form required by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, are given in Appendix "D."

The arrangement of a part-time Rodent Operator has proved satisfactory.

The three public sewerage systems have been test baited. Two systems showed "no takes." The third system showed one complete take of bait and a small poison treatment was made at three manholes.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

The R.A.F. Station, Melksham Without, renewed their contract with the Council for refuse collection and the work has proceeded smoothly.

The Council's two diesel ten cubic yard vehicles — one Bedford and one Ford — have given good service.

A weekly collection throughout the district is maintained with a limited service for some trade refuse.

With some difficulty, it has been possible to find a market for our salvaged paper and steps have been taken in an endeavour to increase our collection of scrap metal and rags for which there is a ready market.

CESSPOOL EMPTYING SERVICE

This service, brought into operation in 1948, has been utilised to clear 411 cesspool and septic tanks during 1957.

The Contractors, employed by the Council, visit the district every three months. In January the Contractors had to increase their price, but the extra charge was kept to a minimum for the benefit of the householder utilising this Service.

In accordance with the Council's policy, 18 cottages have been formally presented to the Housing Committee as suitable for action under Section 16 of the Housing Act, 1957, and 6 as suitable for a clearance area. Every endeavour is made to persuade owners to undertake reconditioning schemes and to take advantage of Improvement Grants.

During the year, two cottages were demolished, one reconditioned and three converted into a bungalow as a result of formal and informal action commenced by the Council during 1955 and 1956.

Twenty-one Improvement Grants (total £6,829) have been made during 1957. The time involved on the advisory work, necessary inspections, checking plans and specifications, is well spent on this constructive aspect of our duties.

Three applications have been made to the Council for Certificates of Disrepair under the Rent Act, 1957.

Following a statutory notice and court procedure reported last year in connection with the drainage from a piggery, it can now be reported that a new sewage disposal plant is in the course of erection, but there have been long delays.

RIVERS, STREAMS AND SEWERAGE

Informal action has been taken in various parts of the district to prevent pollution of streams and water courses. Sewer ditches continue to be a problem. Only three of the 13 Parishes (Winsley, Hilperton and Holt) have sewerage systems, but additional schemes are envisaged by the Surveyor to the Council.

We have co-operated with the Bristol Avon River Board in the removal and disposal of various animal carcases from the river at Limpley Stoke Weir.

SWIMMING BATHS

There are no swimming baths or pools open to the public in this area. Various samples and some advisory work was undertaken for a private pool at a school.

SMOKE ABATEMENT

No formal action was found necessary during the year under the Clean Air Act, 1956.

Proprietors of various industrial premises were advised, last year, of the provisions of the Act and consultation invited with the Council's Officers and the National Industrial Fuel Efficiency Service.

Before renewal of licences, the premises are visited by me and the Local Inspector of R.S.P.C.A., to whom my thanks are due for co-operation and advice.

The R.S.P.C.A. asked this Council in July to make it a condition of licence that leaflets dealing with the feeding, care and management should be issued with each animal sold. It was felt that such a condition was undesirable but the attention of licence holders was drawn to the leaflets and voluntary co-operation encouraged.

AGRICULTURE (SAFETY, HEALTH AND WELFARE PROVISIONS) ACT, 1956

The Council agreed that the enforcement of this Act did not warrant a special survey of each farm and that it would suffice if the Rodent Operator made inspections and reported in the course of his routine duties. This is being done but activity has been restricted owing to Foot and Mouth Disease in the area.

DISEASES OF ANIMALS (WASTE FOODS) ORDER, 1957

At the end of the year, we were notified that the enforcement of this Order was delegated by the County Council to the County District Councils.

Various preliminary visits were made with a view to the issue of the necessary licences but difficulties have been encountered in preparing a comprehensive list.

PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY SERVICE

I would like to make special mention of the very good service given to this Council by Dr. Mann and the Public Health Laboratory at Manor Hospital, Bath. All our milk, ice cream and water samples are given prompt attention and it is of very great assistance to have Dr. Mann's advice so readily available.
