



BRADFORD AND MELKSHAM RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mr Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for 1960 on the health of Bradford and Melksham Rural District.

I have pleasure in recording that a good general standard of health was maintained throughout the year.

Some cases of dysentery occurred during the Spring and one or two of these cases had a persistent infection for several weeks. In view of the prevalence of this disease at that time, routine precautions were emphasised in the schools and much co-operation was received from the school staffs in the implementation of these measures. One village school in particular had a high proportion of cases, and thanks to the energetic co-operation of the Head Teacher, spread of the disease was restricted.

Three cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were notified in 1961, two of these cases occurring in Service personnel.

The immunisation statistics show an increase in the number of primary immunisations against diphtheria and whooping cough in 1960 and this year has seen the introduction of tetanus immunisation in welfare clinics and schools. Poliomyelitis vaccination continues and was extended to persons under 40 years of age.

Finally, I should like to take this opportunity of thanking the Members of the Council and the Health Committee for their encouragement, and my colleagues for their help during the year.

OUTLINE OF THE HEALTH SERVICES OPERATING IN THE AREA

Laboratory Facilities

The Public Health Laboratory, Manor Hospital, Bath, undertakes all necessary bacteriological and pathological examinations in the district.

The laboratory with its skilled staff, provides a most valuable service with regard to the examination of drinking water, food and milk samples, throat swabs, etc., and their willing co-operation and expert advice is much appreciated.

Hospital Facilities

The South-Western Regional Hospital Board is responsible for hospital facilities in this district.

The two hospitals in the area are a general hospital at Melksham, and a hospital for the chronic sick at Semington. Other general hospitals are situated in Devizes and Trowbridge, with larger ones in Bath and Bristol.

The nearest hospital for the treatment of common infectious disease is Bath Isolation Hospital. The nearest Smallpox Hospital is at Bristol.

County Health Facilities

The following health services operating in the district are provided by the County Health Committee:—

Care of expectant and nursing mothers and young children. Domiciliary Midwifery.

From the above table it will be seen that 3 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were notified during 1960. Two deaths from tuberculosis were recorded.

Re-housing of Tuberculosis Patients

Cases are referred from time to time by the Chest Physician for consideration for re-housing. These cases are classified as follows:—

Certificate No. 1. Sputum-positive cases where re-housing is considered urgent for the prevention of infection.

Certificate No. 2. Where better housing would be desirable in order to improve and maintain the patient's health.

Certificate No. 3. Where improved housing would be beneficial but is not an urgent matter.

None of the above certificates was received during the year.

Diphtheria Immunisation

Diphtheria immunisation is carried out systematically throughout the district by General Practitioners and County Medical Officers, in homes, schools and clinics.

Immunisation Statistics, 1960

Compared with 1959 the number of primary immunisations against diphtheria rose from 102 to 179. The number of reinforcing injections administered rose from 125 to 157.

The total immunised child population at the end of the year was 1,795 compared with 1,917 in 1959. The number of primary whooping cough immunisations rose from 90 to 159 and reinforcing rose from 52 to 71.

105 primary vaccinations were undertaken compared with 76 in the previous year. Re-vaccinations rose from 9 to 38.

Vaccination is performed under the National Health Service by General Practitioners. Emergency clinics can be operated in the event of an outbreak of smallpox in County Health Clinics at Salisbury and Swindon. Vaccination propaganda is undertaken by the County Health Authority.

Note—It will be noticed throughout this report that, on occasion, more notices are shown as "complied with" than "served." This is explained by work, requested in 1959, being completed in 1960.

The two private slaughterhouses have continued in operation during the year (animals slaughtered and condemnation figures are shown in Appendix "A"). Compliance with the Slaughterhouses (Hygiene) Regulations, 1958, and the Slaughter of Animals (Prevention of Cruelty) Regulations, 1958, has mainly been obtained.

The Report on Slaughterhouse Facilities under the Slaughterhouses Act, 1958, was submitted to and accepted by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food and the date for compliance with the construction regulations will be 1st January, 1962. The outstanding work in this respect is not large.

We have maintained 100% inspection by the working of overtime including every Sunday and Bank Holiday. Ante-mortem inspection is not possible. No horses have been slaughtered during the year.

The success of the Tuberculosis Attested Area scheme is shown by our condemnation figures. The few cases of tuberculosis, which have been discovered, are referred to the Animal Health Division of the Ministry for enquiries at the farm concerned.

The Council accepted my report in December giving details of the arrangements made under the Meat (Staining and Sterilisation) Regulations, 1960. Neither of our slaughterhouses have facilities for sterilisation and it has been agreed that condemned carcase meat shall be stained green and then conveyed to approved premises, outside the district for sterilisation.

The Council were very concerned about the poor conditions at a bakehouse in the district. The proprietor was interviewed and it is pleasing to report that the bakehouse is not now in use.

As mentioned in the Annual Report for 1959, we have commenced a modest routine of sampling pies, ham, fish cakes, etc., for bacteriological examination.

Our sampling routine has involved considerable time and travelling. By virtue of the Milk (Special Designation) Regulations, 1960, the duty of licensing and sampling is transferred to the County Council as from 1st January, 1961. At the end of the year, the County Council had made enquiry as to whether District Councils were prepared to undertake these duties as a delegated power. Biological samples have been satisfactory except for two biological samples giving positive results for Brucellosis. The dairyman's supply was discontinued from the farm concerned,

I am not in a position to give, with any degree of accuracy, the number of houses and the population in each parish supplied from public water mains direct to houses or by means of standpipes. None of the water supplies appear to be liable to plumbo-solvent action.

The number of public supplies has decreased considerably in the 13 years I have been in office with the Council.

A special series of samples was taken in December following severe flooding in this area. The results were excellent.

The requirements of the Factories Act, 1937, appear to be complied with and full details, as required by the Ministry, are mentioned in Appendix "C."

It is pleasing to report that no complaints have been received during the year regarding gypsies at Norrington Common.

All sites, licensed by the Council, have been inspected to ensure compliance with the licence conditions.

A special report was submitted to the Public Health Committee in November on the implications of the Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960. All our sites are small (the largest having 9 caravans) and the Council agreed seven standard conditions relating to number of caravans on site, water supply, senitary accomodation, disposal of waste water, paths, fire extinguisher and refuse bin.

RODENT CONTROL

Details, in the form required by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, are given in Appendix "D."

The Rodent Operator has continued with his routine inspections, including farm inspections. We now have 15 farm contracts for which a fixed charge is made, each farm is visited every 4 months and the necessary treatments carried out.

During the year, the Holt Sewerage System was test baited twice and the new Atworth Sewerage System on one occasion. I am pleased to say there were "no takes."

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

A weekly collection throughout the District is maintained with a limited service for some trade refuse. A collection, under contract, at the R.A.F. Station, Melksham Without, is in operation with very satisfactory results. The Council have two 10 cu. yd. refuse collection vehicles—one Bedford and one Ford. Apart from normal running troubles, these give very good service.

The tip at Westwood is nearing completion and a supply of top soil has been obtained for final cover. Planning permission has been granted for the use of an alternative site nearby.

CESSPOOL EMPTYING SERVICE

This service, brought into operation in 1948, has been utilised to clear 459 cesspools and septic tanks during 1960.

The Contractors, employed by the Council, visit the District every three months and it has been useful to many householders to have a standing order for such clearances with the Council.

The service has grown from 75 clearances in 1948 to 459 clearances in 1960.

The Council's policy is to formally deal with dwellings which were placed in Category IV in the Housing Survey and similarly to deal with properties becoming vacant where re-letting might provide a "stepping stone" to Council re-housing. The policy has been pursued through the year and 29 cottages have been so formally reported to the Housing Committee as suitable for action under Section 16 of the Housing Act, 1957. Every endeavour is made to persuade owners to undertake re-conditioning schemes and to take advantage of Improvement Grants.

During the year, 3 cottages were demolished and 6 re-conditioned.

47 Discretionary Grants (total $\pounds 16,777$ 10s. 0d.) and 17 Standard Grants under the House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959, have been made during 1960. Some considerable discussion and inspections are a preliminary to such applications but the work is well justified by the results.

No applications have been made during the year for Certificates of Disrepair under the Rent Act, 1957.

RIVERS, STREAMS AND SEWERAGE

Four of the thirteen parishes (Atworth, Hilperton, Holt and Winsley) now have sewerage systems and further schemes are envisaged by the Council. Throughout the District, informal action has been taken to prevent pollution of streams and water courses, but sewer ditches continue to be a problem.

SWIMMING BATHS

There are no swimming baths or pools open to the public in this area. Various samples and some advisory work was undertaken for private pools at schools in the District.

CLEAN AIR ACT, 1956

Following the last two years' preliminary work, I am glad to say that co-operation with the Managements of various firms has been very well sustained and the following condensed results of smoke observations taken with Ringlemann Charts show the improvement which has been obtained. (The percentage of observations showing non-compliance is, for the respective quarters, 21%, 7%, 25% and 20%).

AGRICULTURE (SAFETY, HEALTH AND WELFARE PROVISIONS) ACT, 1956

The Rodent Operator has continued with the inspection of farms under this Act in conjunction with his rodent control farm inspections. The necessary details of 9 farms have been officially recorded.

So far, we have not found it necessary to serve any notices under the Act and it seems to me that, as far as the provisions enforceable by local authorities are concerned, the type of farm in this area does not provide difficulties.

DISEASES OF ANIMALS (WASTE FOODS) ORDER, 1957

One of the premises licensed by the Council under the above Order has been discontinued and the licence cancelled. The remaining six premises have been visited and conditions appear quite reasonable.

OFFICES ACT, 1960

This Act comes into force on the 1st January, 1962. When the regulations regarding health, safety and welfare are issued, a preliminary survey appears desirable.

NOISE ABATEMENT ACT, 1960

The terms of this new Act were discussed by the Public Health Committee. Obviously, a rural district such as this does not provide serious noise problems, but the provisions of the Act would be employed when the occasion arises.

PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY SERVICE

I would like to make special mention of the very good service given to this Council by Dr. Mann and the Public Health Laboratory at Manor Hospital, Bath. All our milk, ice-cream and water samples are given prompt attention and it is of very great assistance to have Dr. Mann's advice so readily available.
