



Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for 1961 on

the health of Bradford and Melksham Rural District.

A measles epidemic following the characteristic biennial pattern occurred during the second quarter of the year with the largest total number of cases in the district during the past decade. Children in the five to nine years age group were principally affected. Happily few complications were recorded. Cases of other infectious diseases were not numerous.

This year saw the first visit to the district of the new mobile unit belonging to the Mass Miniature Radiography Service and, in consequence, more outlying areas could be reached enabling this valuable measure to be offered more readily to a less accessible public. The response showed that this was appreciated and utilized.

Additional details have been included relating to tetanus and poliomyelitis immunisation.

I wish to thank the Members of the Council and particularly the Health Committee for their encouragement and support during the year and the officials for their willing co-operation.

OUTLINE OF THE HEALTH SERVICES OPERATING IN THE AREA

Laboratory Facilities

The Public Health Laboratory, Manor Hospital, Bath, undertakes all necessary bacteriological and pathological examinations in the district.

The laboratory with its skilled staff, provides a most valuable service with regard to the examination of drinking water, food and milk samples, throat swabs, etc., and their willing co-operation and expert advice is much appreciated.

Hospital Facilities

The South-Western Regional Hospital Board is responsible for hospital facilities in this district.

The two hospitals in the area are a general hospital at Melksham, and a hospital for the chronic sick at Semington. Other general hospitals are situated in the neighbouring towns, with larger ones in Bath and Bristol.

The nearest hospital for the treatment of common infectious disease is Bath Isolation Hospital. The nearest Smallpox Hospital is at Bristol.

Certificate No. 1. Sputum-positive cases where re-housing is considered urgent for the prevention of infection.

Certificate No. 2. Where better housing would be desirable in order to improve and maintain the patient's health.

Certificate No. 3. Where improved housing would be beneficial but is not an urgent matter.

Vaccination is performed under the National Health Service by General Practitioners. Emergency clinics can be operated in the event of an outbreak of smallpox in County Health Clinics at Salisbury and Swindon. Vaccination propaganda is undertaken by the County Health Authority.

Note—It will be noticed throughout this report that, on occasion, more notices are shown as "complied with" than "served." This is explained by work, requested in 1960, being completed in 1961.

The two private slaughterhouses have continued in operation during the year (animals slaughtered and condemnation figures are shown in Appendix "A").

From Appendix "A", it will be noticed that a high percentage of cows are shown as affected with disease other than tuberculosis and cysticerci. Approximately 2/5ths of this figure relates to liver fluke.

I was able, in October, 1961, to report to the Council that both slaughterhouses now comply with the Slaughterhouses (Hygiene) Regulations, 1958, and the Slaughter of Animals (Prevention of Cruelty) Regulations, 1958. The installation of a stunning pen, at each slaughterhouse, has proved a great success.

We have maintained 100% inspection by the working of overtime including every Sunday and Bank Holiday. Ante-mortem inspection is not possible. No horses have been slaughtered during the year.

The few cases of Tuberculosis, which have been discovered, were referred to the Animal Health Division of the Ministry for enquiries at the farms concerned.

In November, I reported to the Council on the very poor hygiene conditions at a catering establishment in the District. A severe warning was issued and it is pleasing to say that an immediate and very definite improvement resulted.

As mentioned in previous Annual Reports, we have a modest routine of sampling pies, ham, fish cakes, etc., for bacteriological examination.

The Public Health Laboratory Service suggests that 50% of a vendor's samples should fall into Grade I, 80% into Grade I or II, no more than 20% into Grade III and none into Grade IV.

MILK AND DAIRIES

By virtue of the Milk (Special Disegnation) Regulations, 1960, the duty of licensing and sampling was transferred to the County Council as from 1st January, 1961.

However, the Public Health Committee instructed me in May, 1961, to resume sampling as the standard of sampling appeared to have greatly deteriorated since the County Council assumed responsibility. The following results are, therefore, on samples taken between May and December, 1961.

Appendix "B" of this report sets out the sample results for the year. I am not in a position to give, with any degree of accuracy, the number of houses and the population in each parish supplied from public water mains direct to houses or by means of standpipes. None of the water supplies appear to be liable to plumbo-solvent action.

Some assistance was given to an Estate Owner in connection with a private water supply and arrangements are in hand for the installation of a chlorinator.

Additional samples of the Chippenham water were obtained at the end of the year as the sufficiency of the supply gave some concern following a long spell of dry weather.

It is pleasing to report that no complaints have been received during the year regarding gypsies at Norrington Common.

All sites, licensed by the Council, have been inspected to ensure compliance with the licence conditions. Sixteen licences, under the Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960, were issued and very good co-operation obtained with the site owners regarding compliance with the Council's standard conditions relating to number of caravans on site, water supply, sanitary accommodation, disposal of waste water, paths, fire extinguisher and refuse bin.

All the sites are small (the largest having nine caravans).

RODENT CONTROL

Details, in the form required by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, are given in Appendix "D".

The Rodent Operator has continued with routine inspections, including farm inspections. We now have thirteen farm contracts for which a fixed charge is made, each farm is visited every four months and the necessary treatments carried out. Two business premises have similar contracts with us for regular inspection and treatment.

During the year, Hilperton, Holt and Winsley sewerage systems were test baited. There were "no takes" except at Holt where a poison treatment was carried out.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

A weekly collection throughout the District is maintained with a limited service for some trade refuse. A collection, under contract, at the R.A.F. Station, Melksham Without, is in operation with very satisfactory results. The contract for the R.A.F. was not renewed on the 1st May, 1961. But after two days with another Contractor, the R.A.F. asked us to resume our service to them. This was immediately done.

The Council have two 10 cu. yd. refuse collection vehicles one Bedford and one Ford. Apart from normal running troubles, these give very good service. The Public Health Committee agreed that, with a view to replacing our existing 1956 lorries, it would be advisable to visit the Public Works Exhibition to inspect new models.

One of our loaders met with a serious accident on the 17th May, 1961—the loaded refuse lorry passing over his feet. Very fortunately, no bones were cracked.

In July, great difficulties were experienced as three men were off duty owing to sickness and injury and great credit is due to the remaining men that the service was maintained with practically no complaints from the public. Tipping was commenced during the year on the new site at Upper Westwood and I anticipate that the old tip will be completed, covered with soil and handed back to the owner during 1962.

CESSPOOL EMPTYING SERVICE

This service, brought into operation in 1948, has been utilised to clear 440 cesspools and septic tanks during 1961.

The Contractors, employed by the Council, visit the District every three months and it has been useful to many householders to have a standing order for such clearance with the Council.

The service has grown from 75 clearances in 1948 to 440 clearances in 1961.

The Council's policy is to formally deal with dwellings which were placed in Category IV in the Housing Survey and similarly to deal with properties becoming vacant where re-letting might provide a "stepping stone" to Council re-housing. The policy has been pursued through the year and 36 cottages have been so formally reported to the Housing Committee as suitable for action under Section 16 of the Housing Act, 1957. Every endeavour is made to persuade owners to undertake re-conditioning schemes and to take advantage of Improvement Grants.

During the year, 22 cottages were demolished and 11 re-conditioned.

18 Discretionary Grants (total $\pounds 6,303$ 10s. 0d.) and 19 Standard Grants under the House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959, have been made during 1960. Some considerable discussion and inspections are a preliminary to such applications but the work is well justified by the results.

No applications have been made during the year for Certificates of Disrepair under the Rent Act, 1957.

In common with other districts (as shown in correspondence in the technical journals), difficulties are arising in connection with private sewage disposal plants. Plans are submitted showing settlement tanks and land drain soakaways. These cannot be rejected under the Byelaws. The nature of the sub-soil sometimes turns out to be very unsuitable and this leads to difficulties between owners and builders, particularly when the builder has only come into the trade for quick speculative purposes.

RIVERS, STREAMS AND SEWERAGE

Five of the thirteen parishes (Atworth, Hilperton, Holt, Melksham Without—Spa Road and Semington Road areas, and Winsley) now have sewerage systems and further schemes are envisaged by the Council. Throughout the District informal action has been taken to prevent pollution of streams and water courses, but sewer ditches continue to be a problem.

SWIMMING BATHS

There are no swimming baths or pools open to the public in this area. Various samples and some advisory work was undertaken for private pools at schools in the District.

CLEAN AIR ACT, 1956

Co-operation with the Managements of various firms has been well sustained. At the end of the year, structural work was in progress at one factory (shown as premises "E" below) for the installation of new boilers and the provision of steam storage. In the case of premises "F", the Regional Board who control the premises are taking special steps to obtain compliance with the

Regulations.

Six samples of rag flock, one of coir fibre, one of cotton felt and one of feathers were obtained during the year. To save expense, these samples were taken informally. One sample of rag flock failed to meet the requirements of the Rag Flock and Other Filling Materials Regulations, 1961, in respect of the chlorine content. The matter was referred to the Public Health Inspector for the area in which the suppliers operate. Investigations disclosed a source of contamination which was at once eliminated.

All the remaining samples proved satisfactory.

AGRICULTURE (SAFETY, HEALTH AND WELFARE PROVISIONS) ACT, 1956

The Rodent Operator has continued with the inspections of farms under this Act in conjunction with his rodent control farm inspections. The necessary details of 19 farms have been officially recorded during the year.

So far, we have not found it necessary to serve any notices under the Act and it seems to me that, as far as the provisions enforceable by local authorities are concerned, the type of farm in this area does not provide difficulties.

DISEASES OF ANIMALS (WASTE FOODS) ORDER, 1957

One of the premises licensed by the Council under the above Order has been discontinued and the licence cancelled. The remaining six premises have been visited and conditions appear quite reasonable. The total number of routine inspections was 21. This Act comes into force on the 1st January, 1962. When the regulations regarding health, safety and welfare are issued, a preliminary survey appears desirable.

However, it has been indicated that the Government is unlikely to issue these Regulations in the near future.

NOISE ABATEMENT ACT, 1960

No complaints have been received during the year and no action has been necessary under the terms of this Act.

PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY SERVICE

I would like to make special mention of the very good service given to this Council by Dr. Mann and the Public Health Laboratory at Manor Hospital, Bath. All our milk, ice-cream, food and water samples are given prompt attention and it is of very great assistance to have Dr. Mann's advice so readily available.
