## IMMUNISATION

The statistics below were kindly supplied by the County Medical Officer of Health.

The percentage of babies born in 1968 who were given primary immunisation against diphtheria (and usually against tetanus, whooping cough and poliomyelitis) was 82.6%. This again shows an improvement against previous years (1968 - 77.3%; 1967 - 60.4%) and compares well with the County average of 77.4%.

The measles immunisation programme was interrupted due to withdrawal of one make of vaccine, but as can be seen from the figures quite a number of children, who had not previously had measles, were immunised and presumably stopped our measles notification figures being higher.

Vaccination against small-pox was surprisingly much improved - approximately 25% of our recent births seem to have been vaccinated.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,


I have pleasure in presenting my twenty-second Annual Report to this Council.



Note - It will be noticed throughout this report that, on occasion, more notices are shown as "complied with" than "served". This is explained by work requested in 1968 being completed in 1969.

The two private slaughterhouses have continued in operation during the year (animals slaughtered and condemnation figures are shown in Appendix "A"). Each slaughterhouse has a stunning pen and complies with the Hygiene and Prevention of Cruelty Regulations.

The carcase and offal of every animal is inspected.

The requirements of The Meat (Sterilization) Regulations, 1969 have been satisfied.

There is one poultry slaughtering establishment in this district. The average weekly kill is 500 approximately. It is just not possible to keep a general oversight over the poultry inspection which is left to the proprietor.

Two complaints of grease in bread and one of maggots in sausages were thoroughly investigated. In one case the Council prosecuted the bakery, who were fined £15 plus 7 guineas costs. Severe warnings were issued to the persons concerned in both the other cases.

As mentioned in previous Annual Reports, we have a modest routine of sampling pies, ham, fish cakes, etc. for Bacteriological examination.

A routine sample of "Untreated" milk from a Producer/Retailer gave a positive culture for Brucella Abortus. Of 5 "follow up" churn samples, 3 proved positive. The farmer's Veterinary Adviser took further samples and I am glad to say the farmer has ceased to retail "Untreated" milk. He now retails "Pasteurised" milk obtained in bottles from a large dairy.

We are endeavouring to persuade the one remaining Producer/Retailer to follow this example.

When it is realised that in 1949, 12 out of 98 water samples showed dangerous pollution, the present position is very satisfactory. However, we will avoid complacency and the sampling routine will be maintained.

I am not in a position to give, with any degree of accuracy, the number of houses and the population in each parish supplied from public water mains direct to houses or by means of standpipes. None of the water supplies appear to be liable to plumbo-solvent action.

The Michigan Shovel Tractor continues to do grand work at Beanacre Tip, about which we received no complaints throughout the year.

A fire at Beanacre Tip in September was quickly controlled and put out with the use of the Michigan and the good offices of the Fire Brigade using a portable pump.

We have been very fortunate in being able to use old burnt refuse as cover at the Tip. This material is now exhausted. The Council approved the purchase of 300 tons of scalpings and crusher run stone to provide some spur roads for our lorries to traverse the tip surface.

The Council decided to issue a holder and paper sacks free of charge to permanently disabled householders on production of a medical certificate.

A paper sack system throughout the whole district may be a dream but it must come eventually.

During the year 3 cottages were demolished and 2 reconditioned.

Some considerable discussion and inspections are a preliminary to such applications but the work is well justified by the results.

No applications have been made during the year for Certificates of Disrepair under the Rent Act, 1957.

With the arrival of the Housing Act, 1969, we re-commenced trying to persuade owners of cottages in one parish to install bathrooms, etc. with the aid of Improvement Grants. This is proving to be quite difficult as many of the owner/occupiers and tenants are elderly and do not wish to be disturbed. At the same time, it seems a pity that such folk should not enjoy the benefits of a bathroom, internal water closet and hot water system.

### RIVERS, STREAMS AND SEWERAGE

Of the thirteen parishes (Atworth, Broughton Gifford, Hilperton, Holt, Melksham Without - Spa Road, Semington Road, Berryfield, Shaw, Whitley, Woodrow - Staverton, Westwood and Winsley) now have sewerage systems and further schemes are envisaged by this Council. Throughout the district informal action has been taken to prevent pollution of streams and water courses, but sewer ditches continue to be a problem.

Problems have arisen with sewage disposal from new houses in villages without sewerage systems. The success of approved septic tanks cannot be guaranteed. Planning permission should, in my opinion, be restricted to those sites where a public sewer is available.

### SWIMMING BATHS

There are no swimming baths or pools open to the public in this area. Various samples and some advisory work was undertaken for private pools at schools in the district.

### ABANDONED CARS

This is not too serious a problem in this district. Arrangements were made for the removal of one derelict car by a local car breaker. Normally, the owner is traced and eventually the vehicle is removed by him.
