III WATER SUPPLY

- (1) Source of supply for the Port and shipping is the Bridgwater Corporation supply.
- (2) Hydrants and hosepipes are inspected as to their sanitary condition.
- (3) There are no water boats in the Port.

IV PORT HEALTH REGULATIONS, 1933 AND 1945.

- (1) The Declarations of Health are handed to the Captain on arrival, completed and returned to the Port Health Inspector.
- (2) All vessels from foreign ports are boarded by the Port Health Inspector immediately on arrival.
- (3) The Customs Officer notifies the Port Medical Officer of the times of arrival of all vessels from foreign ports.
- (4) Mooring stations designated under Article 10 are:-
 - (a) The Northside of the Bridgwater Dock.
 - (b) The vessels will be breasted off the quay, with gangways off, at the place of mooring.
- (5) Standing exemptions issued to:-
 - (a) Vessels unhealthy by reason of minor infectious diseases on board, e.g. Measles, Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Tuberculosis and Pneumonia.
 - (b) Vessels otherwise clean which have arrived from a listed port in an infectious area.
- (6) No experience.

- (7) (a) None.
 (b) Carried out under the supervision of the Port Health Inspector.
 (c) None.
 (d) Cases of Plague, Cholera, Yellow fever by arrangement with the South West Regional Hospital Board. Cases of Small Pox at Ham Green Isolation Hospital, Bristol. Cases of other infectious diseases at Axbridge Isolation Hospital until the middle of December, when arrangements were made for cases to be admitted to Taunton Isolation Hospital.
 (e) The County Council's Motor Ambulance is available at the Isolation Hospital.
 (f) Supervision of contacts carried out by the Port Medical Officer.
- (8) & (9). By the Somerset County Council Laboratory at Taunton.
- (10) Treatment of Venereal Diseases carried out at the Health Centre, Mount Street, Bridgwater. Particulars of Treatment Centres available in the Bristol Channel Ports are displayed at all wharves and docks.
- (11) By arrangement with the Bridgwater Borough Council.
- (12) None.

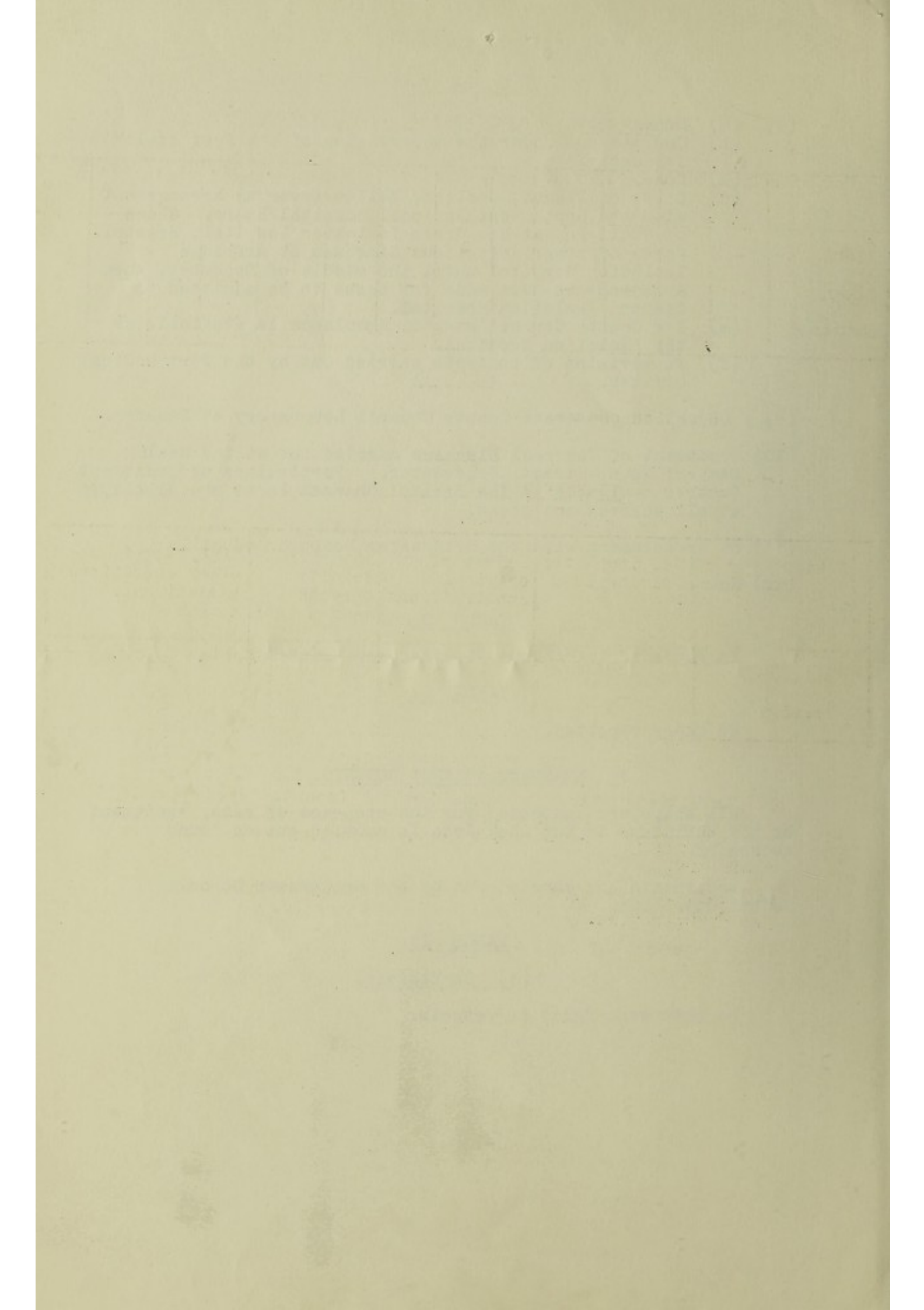
