

To the CHAIRMAN and MEMBERS, BRIERFIELD URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Gentlemen,

I have recently received from the Assistant Secretary of the Ministry of Health Circular No.2314 which states that, in view of the increasing pressure of work in the Public Health Department of Local Anthorities and the need for strict economy in the use of paper, the Minister considers that interim reports only should be made for the year 1940 as in the previous year. These reports must be confined to essential and urgent matters which have effected Public Health during the year, but suitable arrangements will be made for the preservation of all records and statistics in order that, after the termination of the War, a report can be made dealing more fully with the period from the beginning of 1939 to the end of the last complete year, giving separate statistics for each year in order that the annual records may, as far as practicable, be continuous and complete.

I have pleasure, therefore, in submitting for your consideration the following interim report on the Health, Sanitary conditions and Public Health administration in the Urban District of Brieffield for the year ended 31st; December 1940.

STATISTICS AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

The number of inhabited houses at the end of 1940, according to the Rate Books was 2,480, the Rateable Value being £43498 and the sum represented by a penny rate - £181.

The Social conditions were good; the chief industry is cotton weaving, and there was very little unemployment in the District during the year.

CLINICS AND TREATMENT CENTRES.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE:

This Service is under the Direction and control of the District Council. There has been no change in the times of opening with the exception of a Diphtheria Immunisation Clinic which is held, on Tuesdays at 3.0.pm.

SANITARY ADMINISTRATION.

WATER: Brierfield is supplied with a constant supply of water from the Mains of the Nelson Corporation, and there were no new sources of supply during the year.

CLOSET There are approximately 20 pail closets in the ACCOLMODATION:

SCAVENGING: This is carried out by the Council's own workmen, with a two-ton "Karrier" tipping waggon. Domestic refuse is collected free of charge from private houses, shops and mills, and disposed of at the Council's Destructor.

Disinfestation is by means of "Cimex" and "Cescones" poison gas, carried out by the local authority, at the expense of the owner or occupier.

HOUSING.

CONDITIONS: Generally, the houses are well built of stone, most are through houses and in good condition.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOODS.

DAIRIES. COWSHEDS &

MILKSHOPS: wholesome, and it is distributed throughout the District directly, chiefly by the farmers in the vicinity. Retail Milk purveyors registered with the Council 65. Producers of Milk registered with the Council 5. Periodically, bacteriological examinations of samples of milk are made by the County Council.

The milk supply is plentiful and its quality

Periodical inspections of places where food is prepared have been made, and the premises generally have been found to be in good order.

MEAT:

Owing to the outbreak of War, all slaughtering has been transferred to the Central Abattoirs.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

All cases of infectious diseases are visited upon notification, and where patients are not transferred to isolation hospital, they are isolated in one room of the house. Disinfectants are kept at the Town Hall and supplies are given to necessitous cases. Diphtheria Antitoxin and Tetanus Antitoxin are also issued free to Medical Practitioners on application.

DIPHTHERIA: No cases of Diphtheria occurred during the year.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION:

The scheme for the immunisation of children against __ Diphtheria has met with a better response, 49 children receiving treatment during the year. 29 of these were children under 5 years of age, the remaining 20 being children attending school. I have continued to give talks on the value of immunisation, and, posters have been displayed in the Township.

The Annual Christmas Tree and Children's Treat was held in the Congregational School.

A body of lady helpers has again been of great assistance in the carrying on of the work of the Centre, and their services are much appreciated.

There have been no cases of sickness or invalidity which have been specially noteworthy in the area during the period under review, nor any conditions of environment or occupation which appear to have had a prejudicial effect on health.

On the 15th; December 1940, 117 mothers and children Evacuees arrived in the District from London. Their health has been comparatively good.
