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



# REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH for the year ending 31st December, 1944

#### MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health and combining that of the Sanitary Inspector. I am happy to express my gratitude to members of the Council and of the Staff for their help and interest throughout the year.

The year commenced with Dr. S. Leff in office as Medical Officer of Health. Dr. Leff resigned early in the year, and was followed by Dr. C. T. Darwent who commenced duties on the 1st May in a temporary capacity in place of Dr. D. J. Jones in H.M. Forces.

The Medical Officer of Health holds a full time public health appointment, combining with his duties to this Council, those of Medical Officer of Health to the Councils of Brackley Borough and Brackley Rural District, Daventry Borough and Daventry Rural District, and Assistant Medical Officer and Assistant School Medical Officer to the Northamptonshire County Council. This combined appointment allows the Medical Officer to be concerned with that part of the public health administration of the District for which the County Council is responsible, and includes :--

Examination of infants and toddlers at three Infant Welfare Centres: Brixworth, Moulton and Welford.

- Medical inspection of children attending the public elementary schools.
- Supervision of dairies and cowsheds concerned in the production and distribution of "accredited" and Tuberculin tested milk.
- Supervision of rivers and streams, under the Rivers Pollution Prevention Acts.

The Sanitary Inspector is also the Surveyor to the Council. He and his assistants prepare plans and estimates and also supervise the carrying out of all works on behalf of the local authority, and supervise all building in the District.

Heart disease and cancer were the commonest causes of death.

#### PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES.

(a) Laboratory Facilities. Swabs from suspected cases of diphtheria, water for bacteriological examination and any other pathological or bacteriological investigations are carried out in the Emergency Public Health Laboratory, at Northampton General Hospital.

(b) **Diphtheria Antitoxin**. A supply of Antitoxin is maintained at the Council Offices in accordance with the provisions of the "Diphtheria Antitoxin (outside London) Order, 1910," and is available free of charge to all Medical Practitioners in the District.

#### (c) Ambulance Facilities.

- (1) Ordinary cases by St. John Ambulance Brigade.
- (2) Infectious cases by Kettering Joint Hospital Board.
- (d) Nursing in the home.

(e) Treatment centres and clinics.

#### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES.

#### (i) Water Supplies.

There has been no change in water supplies during the year.

The Council have, however, been seriously concerning themselves with the provision of piped supplies of water to the whole of their district as soon as circumstances permit. Much preparatory work has been done to achieve this and negotiations with neighbouring authorities for a joint scheme were still in progress at the close of the year.

There was a general shortage of water throughout the district during the summer months due to the drought, but it was not necessary to cart water to any of the villages.

#### (ii) Drainage and Sewerage.

No major schemes and/or improvements were carried out during the year; the arrangements of drainage and sewerage therefore remain substantially the same.

The total length of sewers in the district is about 39<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> miles, the regular flushing of which has been much interfered with owing to the shortage of labour.

#### (iii) Public Cleansing.

Scavenging of household refuse is carried out by direct labour throughout the whole of the district. Collections are made monthly with the exception of part of the parish of Boughton, adjacent to the Borough of Northampton, where fortnightly collections are in operation.

#### INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

#### MILK AND DAIRIES.

Periodic inspections have been made for cleanliness and alterations to existing Cowsheds.

#### SLAUGHTERHOUSE AND MEAT INSPECTION.

All slaughtering of animals for sale for human consumption in this district, is now carried out in the Central Abattoirs at Northampton and Market Harborough.

#### BAKEHOUSES.

During the year no adverse reports have been received.

#### SHOPS AND OFFICES.

No action has been taken and no complaints have been received.

#### CAMPING SITES.

There are no recognised camping sites in the district. One temporary voluntary labour camp was sited in the parish of Hollowell by the County W.A.E.C. This was in operation from June to October and no adverse reports were received.

#### SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS.

There are four private swimming pools in the District and no reports have been received as to the condition of the water.

#### ERADICATION OF BED-BUGS.

Sanitary Inspection of houses has revealed two cases of infestation and appropriate action was taken.

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#### INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

#### Scabies.

Notifications of cases are received by the Medical Officer of Health and where facilities for treatment are available at home this is usually instituted by the general medical practitioner and/or with the guidance and supervision of the health visitors.

Where such facilities do not exist, treatment is carried out in the case of local residents in the County Borough of Northampton at their cleansing station by arrangements with the Public Health Department of the Borough. All evacuees are treated by arrangement with the County Council at Daventry Public Assistance Institution. Twenty-five notifications have been received during the year.

Infected bedding and clothing is removed and disinfected by the Sanitary Inspector.

#### DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION.

The ideal time for immunisation is at the age of one year, and the Medical Officer of Health does the majority of cases at the Schools and Infant Welfare Centres.
