TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL

MR. CHAIRMAN, MRS. CADBURY AND GENTLEMEN,

I have pleasure in presenting the Report on the sanitary circumstances of the Urban District of Bromsgrove for the year 1968.

The population increased by 520 to a total of 39,000. The Council built 8 new houses during the year, private enterprise built 224, while 19 houses were demolished or closed. Sixty houses were brought up to a satisfactory standard by grants and it is now evident that there are comparatively few houses in the District that are unfit or lacking in satisfactory amenities.

The general health of the population remained good. Except for a small increase in the illigitimacy rate, the statistics relating to births and deaths were very satisfactory, especially those regarding the infant and neonatal death rates. During the year Infective Jaundice was added to the list of notifiable diseases while Acute Pneumonia, Puerperal Pyrexia and Erysipelas were removed from the list. On the whole the incidence of notifiable disease was low and it is hoped that the introduction of measles vaccination will limit the incidence of measles.

Immunisation of children against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus and vaccination against Smallpox continued at a satisfactory level.

Water is supplied by the East Worcestershire Water Supply Co. Ltd. and was satisfactory in quantity and quality. It contained a trace of natural fluoride. It is hoped that the water will be artificially fluoridated to 1 part per million in the near future.

The standard of food hygiene remained at a high level, thanks to the co-operation of the food trade and the work of the Public Health Inspectors.

I would like to express my appreciation of the work carried out by the Officers and Staff of the Health Department. I would also like to thank the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their continued help and support.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES

The district is served by hospitals of all kinds either within the district or within comparatively easy reach. However, there is, still a need for better facilities for dealing with serious accident cases. Such cases have to be transported to either the Birmingham Accident Hospital or to Worcester Royal Infirmary.

Bacteriological examinations were carried out by the Public Health Laboratory Service at the Worcester Royal Infirmary. Chemical analyses of water etc. were done at the County Laboratory, Worcester. I am grateful to the Directors of these laboratories for their help and co-operation.

The County Council administers the Health Visiting, Maternity, Child Welfare, School Health, Immunisation, Dental Specialist, Chiropodyq Health Education and other services which aim at the preservation of the health of the community.

A cervical cytology service, available to women of 35 years and over is held monthly at Bromsgrove Clinic.

A Family Planning Association continued to run sessions at Bromsgrove Clinic, at which advice and assistance was available on family planning.

ME IS ON WHEELS SERVICE

1. Bromsgrove Town Area.

The Meals on Wheels Service is operated by the W.R.V.S. Meals were prepared at Windsor Street kitchen and delivered by volunteer W.R.V.S. members.

At the end of the year 70 old people received meals two days in the week. A total of 6,432 meals were delivered compared with 6,372 in 1967.

2. Rubery Area.

Meals were supplied from Rubery Hill Hospital and delivered by W.F.V.S. members.

At the end of the year 12 old people were receiving meals on two days in the week. A total of 1,101 meals had been delivered in this area compared with 1,173 in 1967.

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REPORT OF THE CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR

FOR THE YEAR 1968

MR. CHAIRMAN, MRS. CADBURY AND GENTLEMEN,

I have pleasure in submitting a report of the work carried out by the Public Health Inspectors during 1968

MEAT AND FOOD INSPECTION

During 1968, total throughput at the Public Slaughterhouse and one private slaughterhouse showed a considerable reduction on previous years, a total of 61,650 animals being slaughtered and inspected. This figure represents an average weekly 'kill' of 244 cattle, 8 calves, 622 sheep and 314 pigs. The decline in throughput is most probably due to the effects of the disastrous foot and mouth disease epidemic andonly partly to a changing pattern of meat trading. Comparable figures for previous years are as follows:-

1967 - 75,944 1966 - 72,636 1965 - 63,167 1964 - 66,361 1963 - 57,162

All animals slaughtered are inspected for fitness for human consumption and during the year approximately 49 tons of meat was surrendered as unfit. Causes of unfitness are given in tabular form. It is interesting to record that tuberculosis either localised or generalised, was not found in any of the 13,145 cattle and calves slaughtered, and swine fever was absent in over 16,000 pigs slaughtered.

The Public Slaughterhouse roceives 'casualty animals' from a fairly wide area, many of which require extensive care and diligence on the part of the Meat Inspector. 47 specimens were submitted to the Public Health Laboratory Morcester for either bacteriological or histological examination and I again record my appreciation of the willing assistance and advice given by Dr. R. J. Henderson, Director of the Laboratory.

It was not possible to commence work during the year on the new lairage and office accommodation at the slaughterhouse, but it is hoped this scheme will be completed during 1969

Food Premises

The Food Hygiene (General) Regulations 1960 and the Food Hygiene (Markets, Stalls and Delivery Vehicles) Regulations 1966 govern hygiene standards in general food premises and food vehicles. Following informal action 66 infringements of the Regulations were remedied during the year.

The total number of visits to food premises during the year including visits to slaughterhouses was 1,423.

Regular routine visits are made to catering establishments and licenced premises and swabs taken of eating and drinking utensils, for bacteriological examination. This practice is of great assistance in maintaining a high standard of hygiene in these premises. Of 195 swabs taken 65% were entirely satisfactory. Detailed results are given in tabular form.

Routine samples of cooked meats, meat products and milk and egg products are taken from retail shops for bacteriological examination and of 56 samples taken, all were found to be free from pathogenic organisms.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT 1963

This Act made fresh provision for securing the health, safety and welfare of persons employed to work in offices, shop premises and certain railway premises. Administration of the Act is shared by local authorities, fire authorities, the factory inspectorate and mine and quarry inspectors.

All premises registered with the local authority have been inspected, a total of 325 premises being registered in this Urban District. During the year 1968, a total of 32 new registrations were received. Of 96 general inspections carried out, 34 premises were found not to comply in one or more respects with the Health, Safety and Welfare provisions of the Act.
