To the Chairman and Members of the Bromyard Rural District Council

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for 1961, together with the report of the Public Health Inspector.

#### Vital Statistics

As in previous years, the birth rate was substantially above average. The Death Rate was higher than of late, with specific increases in the rates of death from Cancer and heart disease.

#### Infectious Diseases

Nothing of especial note occurred during the year.

#### Housing

The Council's policy of supplementing their house building by buying old houses continues, as Mr. Worsdall has pointed out in his section of the report. The Council now owns six such houses and each is serving a very useful purpose.

While the first house was bought to provide adequate accommodation for a grossly overcrowded large near-problem family, subsequent houses have not been bought so much with a definite tenant in view as with the aim of using empty houses to the best advantage.

These houses provide a simple but acceptable standard of comfort without the necessity of becoming part of a modern estate, and so relieve tenants of limited means and aspirations of the necessity of attempting to reach a standard which they cannot attain. The tenants in these cases have come from either dilapidated huts and vans, or condemned property of a standard so low as truly not to be fit for pigs.

I hope the Council will continue in this course, and that other councils will follow in their footsteps.

I would like to thank Mr. Worsdall for completing much of this report, and for his help in the past year.

#### Water Supply Schemes

It is always difficult to get away from routine in an Annual Report, especially on a subject which is all too often conspicuous by its absence. On this occasion a look back to 1954 might add some interest. Water supplies in much of the County are primitive in comparison with practically the whole of England and progress towards parity has been painfully slow. Once more therefore, the usual figures are omitted, but a minimum are included at the Ministry's insistence and it is hoped their import is fully comprehended.

#### WATER SUPPLIES (Continued)

  Ministry's enquiry into proposed Water Board held in March;
- 1958 A red letter year in that Bromyard R.D.C., became a Water Undertaker for the first time, by the completion of the small Bishop's Frome scheme. Bredenbury village scheme started. Perhaps most significant advance was Ministry allowing the Council to plan in detail first stage of the comprehensive scheme covering Whitbourne, Morton, Bromyard, Cradley and Pencombe;
- 1959 A fine, dry summer and the Fire Brigade virtually became Water Undertakers and more people were convinced of the necessity for a proper water supply. Engineers nearly completed plans of comprehensive scheme. Arrangements for wayleaves and purchase of land in hand. Bredenbury village scheme completed;
- 1960 The Herefordshire Water Board became into being and inevitably took time to establish its administrative organisation and to "get the feel" of the more important schemes. In the Bromyard district most of the smaller supplies passed on to the Board, continued to be managed by the Council;
- 1961 Bromyard District Schome accepted by the Ministry in 1958 now given first priority by the Water Board, and further, the parishes of Wolferlow and Upper Sapey are to be supplied from the Tenbury R.D., as part of a joint scheme with Martley R.D. Work on this started about Christmas 1961.

  In addition a small village scheme at Edwyn Ralph, associated with a new housing site, was provided by the Water Board and much appreciated by the local inhabitants.

#### HOUSING

Last year reference was made in this report to four main items - (a) provision of O.P. Bungalows on existing sites, (b) the Bromyard central scheme, (c) purchase of older properties for special families, and (d) improvement grants.

Improvement Grants continued to demand attention and the cumulative result since 1950 is most rewarding when viewed within the whole housing picture. Standard Grants attracted increasing interest and it is probable the inauguration of water schemes will give added impetus to Standard Grants. It is an unfortunate symptom of the times, that really competitive tenders have often been difficult to obtain and in many instances building work progressed so very slowly.

By the end of 1961 the Council owned six lower standard but sound cottages, and all were occupied by special families, and, incidentally, much appreciated. This activity has much to commend it and is complementary to the normal building programme which, for various reasons, has proved difficult to get started again.

The imaginative Bromyard old peoples' bungalows and school teachers accommodation scheme has really not moved one inch during the whole of 1961, due entirely to a failure to get agreement with one of the land-owners on the question of compensation. There are those who thought this project well suited to the needs of several parishes adjoining the urban district, especially for the elderly and retired, often living in situations in-appropriate to their age.

Finally it is a pleasure to record that early in 1962 the Council's first two sites for old peoples' bungalows should be occupied; at Fromes Hill and Edwyn Ralph. Plans were pushed ahead for three further sites in 1962, Whitbourno, Ocle Pychard, and Stoke Lacy. In addition, land was purchased at Cradley.

#### SEWERAGE

It is still very broadly true that a general absence of public water mains means that problems of sewerage and sewage disposal have not arisen in an acute form. However, the villages of Bredenbury and Bishop's Frome have satisfactory water systems and the Council met the situation by instructing their Consulting Engineers to prepare sewerage schemes for both villages.

In addition, the Engineers are to report on schemes for Cradley, Pencombe, and Linton, the intention being to anticipate the arrival of water in 1963/4. The Council is acutely aware of drainage problems which are bound to appear in each of these parishes. There is the further point that a sewerage plan is necessary to accommodate a proposed housing estate at Cradley, and it is evident some private development will follow the provision of water.

#### PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

In company with the Rural Districts of Hereford, Ross and Ledbury, the effort to control damage by rats in particular has continued and thanks are due to the officers concerned with this scheme.

#### SWIMMING BATHS

There is no public swimming bath in the district.

#### REFUSE COLLECTION

Once again the contract service has functioned well, perhaps with emphasis on scavenging the Common Lands. Clearly the problem of litter is fast coming to a head and unless the visiting public can be persuaded or coerced into tidier conduct, the Council will have to consider spending more money on scavenging.

An increasing number of refuse containers and inconcrators are positioned over the Common in an attempt to control the nuisance, and each is emptied fortnightly during the summer period. Both the number of receptacles and the interval between clearances will require constant review.
