**SECTION B.—GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH
SERVICES FOR THE AREA:**

Laboratory Facilities:

Laboratory facilities continued to be available at the County Public Health Laboratory, Hereford, which, for the duration of the war, is under the administration of the Medical Research Council.

Clinics:

There are no Clinics provided by the Authority. Under a County Council Scheme a Child Welfare Clinic is held on alternate Thursdays, at 2 p.m., in Frome Bank, Bromyard.

The nearest Venereal Diseases Clinic is at the County Hospital, Hereford.

I am indebted to Mr. T. S. Watts and to Mr. J. D. Barrs for the following statement (Sections C. to E.) furnished under Article 27 (Sub-Section 18) of the Sanitary Officers (outside London) Regulations.

**SECTION C.—SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES
OF THE AREA.**

Water Supplies:

The whole of the district is supplied, and also eleven houses and four farms in the Rural District.

Section C.—Continued.

The supply was generally adequate for all domestic purposes during the year, but drought conditions at one period entailed limited use of the water by consumers and curtailment for business purposes. After the drought, the yield from the springs increased steadily from 40,000 gallons to 100,000 gallons daily by the end of December.

Samples of the water, which is chlorinated, were taken for analysis at intervals and found to be satisfactory.

Sewerage:

Owing to the war the proposed sewage disposal scheme formulated in 1937 was held up and the sewage continued to discharge at 3 outfalls as in previous years.

Severe drought conditions last year reduced the normal flow of the river at the Forburries outfall, where the dry water flow of sewage is about 40,000 gallons daily, and complaints were made of a nuisance arising at this point, and also at Petty Bridge, 350 yards lower down. Towards the end of the year the above trouble was neutralised by floods which scoured and cleansed the outfall frequently.

The storeware pipe sewers in the town were examined at intervals and found to be in a satisfactory state and free from offensive odours.

Rivers and Streams:

Except for the matter of pollution described under the previous heading there was nothing calling for comment.

House Refuse:

The collection of house refuse is carried out by a contractor. The service during the year was generally satisfactory but on one occasion outside assistance was necessary to deal with the work. The horse-drawn trolley used for the collection is out-of-date and disseminates dust and other matter in the streets on windy days. A modern covered tipping lorry is badly needed for this service. The condition of the "tip" is attended to weekly by one of the Council's employees.

Demolition of Cottages under the Housing Act of 1935.

Three old cottages in Old Road, scheduled as Slum Clearance Area, No. 4, have been demolished to ground level in accordance with a notice served under the above Act.

Milk.

There are no milk producers in the Urban District. Inspection of the Dairies in town is carried out regularly and samples are taken when necessary. Most of the Milk retailed in town is sampled outside the district.

Meat and other Foods:

No cases of diseased meat were noted, all meat having been thoroughly inspected at the Hereford Abattoir.

SECTION F.—PREVALENCE OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

During the year under review, Whooping Cough and Pneumonia were the notifiable diseases which were most prevalent. Only four cases of Scarlet Fever were notified, contrasting with the high 1943 total of sixteen. There were no cases of Measles or Diphtheria.
