PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR'S SECTION OF REPORT

WATER SUPPLY

The taking over by the Herefordshire Water Board of the supplies in the area has taken from the Urban Council the headaches and complaints. When the Council were the authority for water supply, many petty complaints that were received had to be investigated, and the Authority was always the subject of attack: now the undertaking is centralised the complaints have ceased, even though the problems that existed during the Council's control still exist.

Sewage Disposal Plant

This hardy annual must again be mentioned in the report, but, with the Inquiry having been held by the Ministry, progress is now on the way and perhaps by the end of 1962 we may see the fruition of a dream that has existed since 1894, of a proper disposal plant for the Urban district. The design of the works takes into consideration the future development of the area, and with this, one of the major problems of increased population can be faced.

It is hoped that once the works have been constructed that the complaints of river pollution will cease. The maintenance of the works will be another problem, and the engagement of an employee to supervise and maintain the disposal plant in a satisfactory manner will be essential.

HOUSING

The general housing conditions in the area could well be better. Many derelict houses have in the past been repaired and modernised to bring them up to the present day standard. The Ministry, realising these facts, have introduced Discretionary Grants, but these are subject to the sanction and approval of the local councils. In some areas, like our Urban authority, discretionary grants are not viewed with favour, and grants made under the Standard Grant system are grudgingly approved. If the general standard of housing is to be raised, is it not time for statutory legislation to be introduced to cover both types of grants, especially if the dwelling is for letting?

Improvement Grants

Eight applications under this scheme were approved.

Council houses

The erection of houses is an expensive venture, and it is sometimes found that once tenants from substandard dwellings become Council tenants, they find all faults possible with the houses and are continually asking for repairs, which, in privately owned houses they would never dream of requesting. Do they treat the houses in the same careful manner as they look after the family motor car?

PUBLIC CLEANSING

As mentioned in previous reports, the amount of refuse collected from the houses in this area far exceeds the normal of towns of a similar size, and either through the good-will of the collectors or the wastage of the house-holders the amount of refuse collected seems to be increasing every year.

RODENT CONTROL

The rodent infestations in the district have declined due to the efficient work of the Operator. Strict attention is paid to the refuse tip and the outfall of the sewers. The infestations where animal carcases and offal are stored still cause some concern, also the action of some ratepayers in dumping food refuse in open containers.

SWIMMING BATHS

There is no public swimming bath in the district.

FOOD INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION

Meat Inspection

The two slaughterhouses in the town have been approved by the Ministry.

The strict routine inspection of the carcases slaughtered in both of these premises is indeed a problem, and in my opinion the time has come for limitation of slaughtering hours to enable adequate supervision and inspection of the meat.

Six persons are licensed to slaughter animals under the Slaughter of Animals Acts, 1933-54. No licences extend to the slaughter of horses.
