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

Madam Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for 1971.

Looking back at previous reports, written by my predecessors as well as myself, one finds a picture of a stable community with little change apart from a slow but steady improvement in health and living conditions. This year has been no exception, though much behind-the-scenes discussion has taken place portending a more rapid change in the future. It will be necessary to ensure that medical facilities are improved and expanded in order adequately to cater for the expansion that appears imminent. At the time of writing we do not know what the Government's intentions are in respect of the reorganisation of the health services in 1974, but by the time this report is published, a White Paper should have been released.

The Council is already concerned in ensuring adequate public representation in the forthcoming new larger district councils, and I would like it to consider this aspect on the proposed Area Health Boards. "Consumer representation" has not been a feature of the existing National Health Service, but there should be an opportunity for more adequate community participation in 1974, provided the case for this is properly put.

At least I hope it will be possible for a more adequate monitoring of the health community in the new service to enable us to tackle the many outstanding needs in the health field.

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PERSONAL HEALTH SERVICES

AMBULANCE SERVICE: Administered by Bucks County Council from Aylesbury Station, North Bucks Station and Bletchley, with a day time base at Buckingham.

HOSPITALS: Under the Oxford Regional Hospital Board, Patients are treated at Buckingham, Aylesbury and Oxford. Certain Outpatient facilities are available in Buckingham.

DISTRICT NURSING, MIDWIFERY AND HEALTH VISITORS: Verney Close, (Tel.3395)

CHILD HEALTH CLINIC: Held in the Congregational Chapel Hall.

CHILD GUIDANCE CLINIC: Whalley Drive, Bletchley. Director: Dr. M. Lindsay.

CONTRACEPTION ADVICE: Clinics are held at Whalley Drive and Katrine Place
Health Clinics, Bletchley by the Family Planning
Association (by appointment), and at Meacham Clinic,
Wolverton. For appointments Tel. Bletchley 2285.

CYTOLOGY CLINICS: Through family doctors or at Verney Close (appointments Tel. Bletchley 4701).

<u>DENTAL CLINICS</u>: Verney Close. Treatment offered to children and expectant mothes. The dentist visits schools regularly.

HEALTH EDUCATION: Area Organiser - Mr. T. Watson at Area Health Office, Bletchley.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE: Administered from Area Health Office. 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Sanitary Circumstances of the Area

1. WATER

The water supply which is under the control of the Borough Council was satisfactory during the year, both in quantity and quality.

The Public Health Laboratory Service at Oxford carry out bacteriological examinations of the raw water, and during the year 22 such examinations were carried out.

No new plant was installed during the year but a new consumption meter is due for early installation at Maids Moreton.

Discussions have been held with the Bucks Water Board on the formation of Regional Water Authorities and the effect of this on our undertaking.

The next year should see the pattern emerge of the organisation of water supplies for the foreseeable future.

During the year we cooperated with the River Board in experiments relating to underground water levels depression and recovery, using our plant at Gawcott for this purpose. Together with instrumentation provided and installed jointly.

Rainfall figures are recorded daily at Gawcott and submitted to the River Authority.

A test sample of metal for H.T. Transmission lines is exposed at Gawcott Station to determine the degree of atmospheric decay for the C.G.E.B.

FLUORIDATION

Monitoring of both our water sources was carried out during the year to ascertain the presence and quantity of natural fluoride and in respect of the Gawcott source the natural content fluctuated between 1 ppm and 1.6 ppm, and the Maids Moreton supply fluctuated from Nil ppm to 0.6 ppm.

NEW DEVELOPMENT

Work has been actively progressing on the laying of water mains to the two new schools at Page Hill, and also the H.2 Housing site.

Estimates have been prepared for the Buckingham Borough Development Company on the costings for the new development areas H.3 and H.4.

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Average consumption per head per day which includes the above figure was 52 gallons.

Total quantity of water supplied during the year was 95,460,000 gallons, a decrease since last year of 2,485,000 gallons.

Peak daily consumption recorded was 330,000 gallons.

A more diligent system of leak detection, coupled with reduced consumption at the industrial premises, probably accounts for a reduced consumption two years in succession.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

Several meetings have been held between the Borough Development Company, Consulting Engineers, the River Authority and myself in connection with the new sewage disposal works to service the development areas.

Several sites have been inspected, and the acquisition of the most suitable site is being proceeded with.

This is the most critical stage of the town expansion, and it is hoped that during 1973 contracts will be let and construction started.

No major improvements have been carried out at Gawcott, the tertiary treatment is still in operation, and as part of the town expansion it is thought probable that the total flow from Gawcott should be pumped into the new trunk sewer system for disposal at the new works leading to the final abandonment of the Gawcott plant, which has operated, I believe, since 1934. This will give rise to some satisfaction in the Gawcott area, although complaints arising from the present works are few and infrequent.

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REFUSE DISPOSAL.

The weekly house-to-house collection continues and no complaints of a serious nature have been sustained.

In November of this year, we ceased tipping refuse within the Borough and commenced the delivery of all refuse to the Aylesbury Borough disposal pit at Calvert in the Rural District Area.

This can be considered a first stage in the desirable centralisation of disposal facilities which I am sure all will appreciate is much to be desired as a means to better environmental and pollution control.

It is anticipated that under the Local Government reorganisation, the disposal of refuse will be the responsibility of the County Council, and this may therefore be considered an interim step in the right direction.

A new larger compression collection vehicle, mentioned in last year's report, is now in operation and proving adequate to its task.

4. SWIMMING POOL

The pool again enjoyed good support during the summer season. Undoubtedly the water heating system installed early in the season contributed largely to the increased use made of the pool.
