

We were again fortunate in not having a serious outbreak of Infectious Disease. The outbreak of Chicken Pox was practically confined to a school for small children in the town, and after closure for a period on my advice, did not spread. Two of the Cases of Scarlet Fever were admitted to the Isolation Hospital. Beyond these two cases we admitted no other cases to the Hospital during the year.

There were no deaths from notifiable diseases during the year.

As far as one can tell, notification of Tuberculosis cases continue to be satisfactory in the District.

The ages of the Scarlet Fever cases were 3, 6 and 14 respectively; of the Chicken Pox cases five were under 5 years of age, seventeen were between 5-10 years, five between 10 and 15 years of age and one at 25 years of age.

The ages of the Tuberculosis cases were:-

- (1) Male Pulmonary, 8 years and 30 years.
 Non-Pulmonary, 13 years.
- (2) Female Pulmonary, 7 years and 27 years.
 Non-Pulmonary, 35 years.
- 4. There have been no special or noteworthy causes of illness during the year.

5. Nursing Arrangements, Hospitals and other Institutions in the District.

PROFESSIONAL NURSING IN THE HOME.

- (a). General. This is provided for by the Buckingham District Nursing Association, managed, in conjunction with the Buckingham Cottage Hospital, by a Voluntary Committee and financed by Voluntary Contributions and a scheme of Sliding Scale Contributions according to position financially, occupation, etc.
- (b) There is no provision for providing Nurses for Infectious Cases isolated in their own homes. In the Infectious Hospital, Nurses are obtained as required, in addition to the Woman Caretaker.
- (c) There are two practising Midwives in your District, both employed by the Voluntary Association mentioned above, and working under their auspices. Grants are received in respect of them from the County Authority.

Clinics and Treatment Centres.

There is one Maternity and Infant Welfare Centre in your District under the County Council. It is managed by a Voluntary Committee out of voluntary funds. I, personally, am the Medical Officer in charge, and one of the County Council qualified Health Visitors (Nurse Pearson) is the Nurse in Charge. It is consultative in character, and open once a month. I am glad to report that its work is increasing by the number of mothers who attend and bring their children.

School Clinics.

School Medical Inspections are carried out in your Schools by me as A.S.M.O. to the Bucks County Council.

The Dental School Clinic is held in the Council Schools, Well Street, on Saturdays during term time, under the auspices of Mr. G. Best.

The Tonsil and Adenoid Clinic is held at the Cottage Hospital, Dr. G. Bruce Pearson being the doctor in charge.

The children with defective vision attend the County Council School Eye Clinic at Bletchley.

The Tuberculosis Clinic is held every third Saturday in the month in rooms on Market Hill by Dr. L. T. Burra, County Tuberculosis Officer, assisted by Nurse Pearson. Cases of Venereal Disease can be sent under the County Council scheme to the Clinic at Radcliffe Infirmary, Oxford, or certain Hospitals in London.

Hospitals provided or Subsidised by the Local Authority or by the County Council.

- (1) Tuberculosis.—Cases approved by the County Tuberculosis Officer are sent to the Berks and Bucks Sanatorium, Peppard Common, near Reading. This is under the County Council,
- (2) Fever.—Cases requiring Hospital Isolation are treated at the Hospital situated near the hamlet of Gawcott, and provided for by this Authority and the Rural District Council of Buckingham.
- (3) Small-pox.—These cases are sent to the joint Isolation Hospital near Fenny Stratford, provided for by this Authority in conjunction with others in North Bucks.

Hospitals, other than those provided for or subsidised by the Local Authority or by the County Council, and used by the District are:—(1) Buckingham Cottage Hospital (in the District); (2) Radcliffe Infirmary, Oxford; (3) Royal Bucks Hospital, Aylesbury; (4) the General Hospital, Northampton (outside the District; (5) Buckingham Union Infirmary (in the District).

The only institutional treatment in the District for unmarried mothers, illegitimate infants and homeless children is by application to the Board of Guardians for admission to the Buckingham Union and Infirmary.

Ambulance Facilities.

- (a) For Infectious Cases.—This is provided for by this Authority for its own cases.
- (b) Non-infectious and Accident Cases.—This is provided for by the scheme to which this Authority subscribes for the use of the Red Cross Ambulance situated at Newport Pagnell, Bucks, and also by the local St. John Ambulance, in charge of the local St. John Ambulance Brigade, and towards which your Council subscribe.

6. Laboratory Work.

There is no special laboratory to which specimens are sent. In the case of Diphtheria Swabs, this Authority pays the expense of examination in necessitous cases on application by local practitioners. Anti-toxin serum is also provided in such cases.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

No alterations or additions were carried out during the year.

WATER SUPPLY.

The supply continues to be satisfactory in quality and quantity. Repairs were carried out to steam boiler at Pumping Station during the year—the smaller boiler being completed, the large boiler being under repair at the end of year. Further consideration has been given to the utilisation of the Gawcott Road supply by the erection of a wind engine pumping plant.

HOUSING.

Action with regard to houses not in all respects reasonably fit for human habitation is hampered by the lack of suitable accommodation. There are no empty houses available of any kind. The erection of the 56 houses by the Council under the State-aided Scheme have not assisted the Housing conditions very appreciably.

There is undoubtedly a need for the erection of houses which can be let at an economic rent.

At the time of writing, consideration is being given to the erection of 10 or 11 houses on the vacant site at Bourtonville acquired by the Council under the State-aided Scheme.

BUILDING BYE-LAWS.

New Bye-Laws with respect to New Streets and Buildings are being considered by the Council.

WATER REGULATIONS.

New Regulations as to Water Supply are also being considered.

UNSOUND FOOD.

One tuberculous carcase was discovered during the year and the same was surrendered and disposed of. No action was taken.

Eight cases of lemons were also condemned.

SMOKE ABATEMENT.

There is only one Factory in the town which emits smoke. No action was rendered necessary.

8. Public Health Staff.

This is the same as last year. I am your Medical Officer of Health, and Mr. G. B. Chilvers, M.R. San. I., F.I.S.E., M. Inst. M. & Cty. Eng., as Surveyor and Sanitary Inspector.

During the latter part of the year, complaints were received as to the smell arising from the Canal Basin down Stratford Road. Your Council appointed a Committee to go into the matter, and this Committee had the matter actively in hand at the end of the year.

I must again tender my thanks to the Town Clerk and Sanitary Inspector for their kindly help and courtesy at all times, and to the latter for his help especially in preparing this Report.
