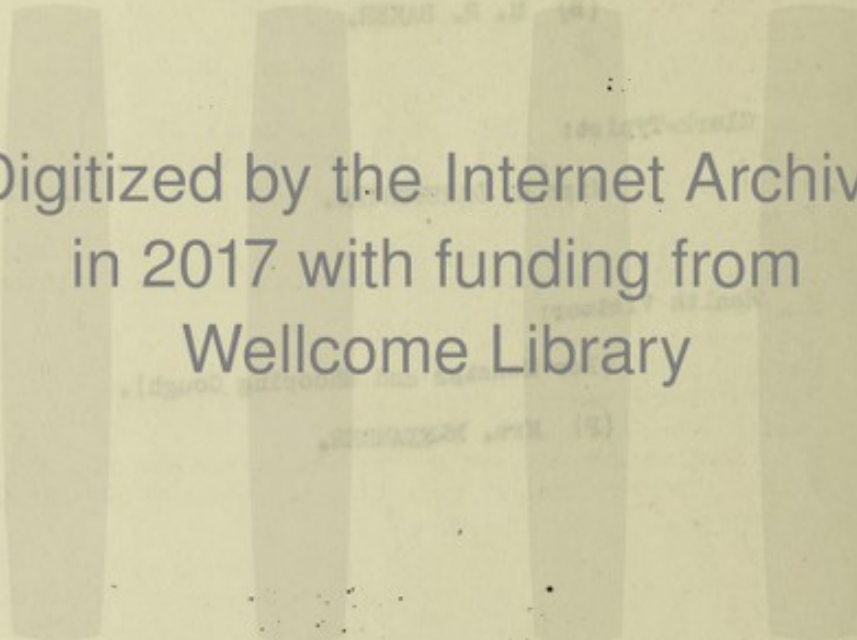

No persons suffering from tuberculosis were found to be engaged in food supply or distribution.

No action under Section 172, Public Health Act, 1936.

The County Laboratory examined 27 samples of Sputum of which two were positive.

As again Medical Officers' Reports are to be kept as short as possible, it fortunately happens that 1942 presents no features requiring elaborate comment.

The fore-going Tables show satisfactory Vital Statistics.

I wish to call attention to the following points:-

1. The Death rate was slightly above two-thirds of that of the country as a whole.
2. The Infantile Mortality rate was also slightly above two-thirds of that of the country as a whole.
3. No woman died of puerperal fever or of anything else connected with child-bearing.
4. There were no deaths from tuberculosis.
5. There were no deaths from typhoid, scarlet fever, diphtheria, measles or whooping cough.
6. The number of deaths from cancer was not quite so high as last year but as cancer is chiefly a disease of elderly people, we are certain to have a proportionately large number of cases as long as 65% of our population live to be over 65 years of age - which I am pleased to say they do.

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I wish to call attention to the following points:-

1. The death rate was slightly above two-thirds of that of the country as a whole.
2. The infantile mortality rate was also slightly above two-thirds of that of the country as a whole.
3. The mean time of hospitalization was slightly above connected with child-bearing.
4. There were no deaths from typhoid, scarlet fever, diphtheria, meningitis or whooping cough.
5. The number of deaths from cancer was not quite so high as last year but as cancer is chiefly a disease of elderly people, we are certain to have a correspondingly high number of cases as long as we live. The mortality rate is not over 25 years of age - which I will mention in my report.

7. Owing to recent advances in other methods of treating lobar-pneumonia, it is no longer considered necessary to maintain supplies of anti-pneumococic serum for use by medical practitioners.
8. One death in every ten was due to suicide or accident.
9. The number of children immunized against diphtheria is now 987.

There are no bye-laws in force in the district as to tents, vans, sheds &c. There are no underground sleeping rooms in the district.

Shops and Offices:- No action has been found necessary during the year.

Swimming Baths and Pools:- There is one privately-owned bathing pool in the area and every endeavour is made to keep the water in a satisfactory condition. Regular inspections have been made during the season.

Eradication of Bed Bugs:- No action has been necessary.

Other Sanitary Conditions requiring Notice:- There does not appear to have been any important matters of sanitary environment which have required special attention.

Removal and Disposal of Refuse:- This work has been carried out regularly in the parishes of Dunham Massey, Mobberley, Partington, Ashley, Ringway, Carrington, Warburton, Tabley, Mere, Millington, Bollington, Peover, Ollerton, Plumley, High Legh, Pickmere and Agden, as in previous years.

The collection of refuse is carried out by means of two Bedford lorries, one being a 3-ton vehicle and the other a 2-ton vehicle which replaced the 1935 30-cwt. vehicle. Both vehicles are giving satisfactory service. In addition a 30-cwt. Bedford has again been brought into daily use for the collection of salvage.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

- (a) Milk Supply:- Inspections of dairies, cowsheds and milk-shops have not been carried out as well as in previous years due to present conditions. More attention should be paid to the cows, milkers, vessels and premises generally with a view to the provisions of the Milk and Dairies Orders being strictly carried out.

Samples submitted for biological examination were taken by the County Council.

Tuberculosis cows were dealt with by Ministry of Agriculture Veterinary Staff.

- (b) Meat and Other Foods:- Meat inspection has practically ceased due to arrangements for centralized slaughtering.
- (c) Adulterations:- The work under the various Acts and Regulations is carried out by the County Council.

I am now Consulting Medical Officer of Health but this Report bears my signature because my successor, who only commenced duty on the 27th October, 1942, resigned his position prior to the completion of the Report, which this year is almost entirely the work of Mr. Kershaw, the Sanitary Inspector.

I regret that this is the last Report in which I shall be able to thank Mr. Kershaw for his assistance, and I wish to express appreciation of his knowledge of his work, and of his unfailing tact in performing it.

Thanks are also due to Mr. Shaw and Mr. Sweet for information supplied.
