To the Burnham-on-Crouch Urban Sanitary Authority.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present to you my Report for the year 1921, on lines prescribed by the Ministry of Health.

The area of Burnham is 4,517 acres ; population (1921), 3,406 ; number of inhabited houses, 884 ; number of families or separate occupiers, 898 ; rateable value, £14,104 ; sum represented by a penny rate, £42 10s. 6d.

The total number of births for 1921 was 58 (32 males, 26 females) as against 70 for the preceding year. The total number of deaths was 42 (20 males, 22 females) as against 40 for 1920. Included in the 58 births were 4 illegitimate cases.

Causes of Sickness.

As will be seen above, 23 cases of scarlet fever took place during the year. The first case took place in May and the last in December. They were all of a very mild type, and none proved fatal.

Fourteen cases of diphtheria were also notified, commencing at the end of October. For the most part the cases were mild ; there were, however, a few severe ones and three cases proved fatal. The cause of the outbreak could not be traced, and none of the cases of scarlet fever or diphtheria were admitted to hospital.

Nursing Arrangements, Hospitals, etc.

There is a voluntary Nursing Association helped by the County which supplies a Nurse for the town for general purposes but not for infectious cases. Cases of measles are nursed at home by the parents.

There are no mid-wives in the town.

The Parish Nurse attends daily at a Maternity and Child Welfare Centre held at her house.

Tuberculosis patients are frequently visited by the County Tuberculosis Officers.

Venereal cases are treated at Chelmsford when application is made.

The town has an Infectious Hospital capable of receiving 20 patients, situated in the Maldon Road, supported entirely by the Council.

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.—For the removal of infectious cases there is a special brougham kept ready and provided by the Council.

An Ambulance purchased from the Metropolitan Police is in use for non-infectious cases and accidents.

In the event of small pox appearing in the town, the arrangements are to have the patient at once removed to a tent to be erected on the marshes pending their removal to a small pox hospital.

Laboratory Work.

The several doctors send their bacteriological specimens to the County Offices at the expense of the local authority.

The M.O.H. always keeps a supply of diphtheria anti-toxin ready at hand, which is provided by the Sanitary Authority for the use of the doctors.

No Adoptive Acts.—The only Bye-laws are those relating to New Streets and Buildings.

Sanitary Administration.

The staff consists of the Medical Officer, the Sanitary Inspector, who is also the Surveyor, and an odd man when required.

A contribution is made by the County Council towards the salaries of the M.O.H. and the Sanitary Inspector.
