LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit for your consideration my Annual Report on the Medical Inspection and Treatment of School Children during the year ended December 31st, 1917.

The total number of children inspected during the year is slightly larger than the corresponding number for the previous year. In the continued absence, on active service, of the Assistant Medical Officer, the whole of this work has devolved on myself.

I may here call attention to the great difficulty in obtaining satisfactory treatment for certain classes of defect, e.g., enlarged tonsils and adenoids, owing to the strain on the resources of the local hospital caused by wounded soldiers.

The size of the Report has been still further reduced in accordance with the suggestions of the Board of Education.

I take this opportunity of expressing my thanks to the Director of Education and his staff, the Head Teachers of the various schools, the clerical staff of the Health Department, and to the School Nurse (Miss L. H. Rishton) for the assistance they have given me, and to you, Ladies and Gentlemen, for your courtesy and kind sympathy.

MEDICAL INSPECTION OF SCHOOL CHILDREN.

I.—METHODS.

The methods adopted during 1917 were similar to those detailed in previous Reports, and need not be repeated here. The groups of children inspected are :—

1. "Entrants."
2. "Leavers."
3. "Special Cases."

Number of Examinations made during the year.—The total number of examinations made during 1917 was 3,732, and was made up as follows :—

At the routine inspections 369 entrants and 67 leavers were absent.

In addition to the above, a large number of children were examined for dirty and verminous conditions, signs of infectious disease, &c.

In Table I. at the end of the Report will be found particulars as to the age and sex of the children inspected, while Table II. shows their physical condition.

There has been a marked improvement in the cleanliness of the children and in the condition of their clothing and footgear. Members of certain families, however, continue to come under notice owing to their dirty and verminous condition, and in one case it was necessary to prosecute the parent. Four members of the family were concerned, and, after the magistrates had twice adjourned the case (for a period of two months in each instance) the parent was fined 5s. 6d. in each case, or 22s. in all.

Special Cases.

When the Medical Officer visits a school for the purpose of Medical Inspection, advantage is taken of the opportunity to examine such children (not falling into either of the two classes, "Entrants" and "Leavers") as have been noticed by the teachers to be suffering from some palpable disease or defect. The total number of such children brought to the notice of the Medical Officer during the year was 85, a decrease of 16 upon the number examined in 1916. A summary of the diseases and defects discovered will be found in Table II. (page 9).

Miscellaneous Examinations.

These consist of children examined at the office and comprise such minor ailments as dirty and verminous conditions, ringworm, impetigo, &c. Saturday morning of each week is set apart for the examination of these children at the Health Office, but many children attend at other times.

During the year 728 examinations have been made of 204 children:—

III.—TREATMENT.

The methods employed or available for the treatment of defects are as in former years, and have been fully detailed in previous reports. Owing to the strain on the resources of the local hospital considerable delay has arisen in obtaining treatment at that institution. There are children who have been awaiting treatment for upwards of twelve months and who are still untreated.

Table IV. shows the number of defects treated during 1917.

Diseases of the Eye.—During the year 57 children were examined by the ophthalmic surgeon. Spectacles were prescribed in 47 cases, and of these 43 have obtained glasses.

In six cases the parents were considered too poor to pay for spectacles, and the cost was defrayed, wholly or in part, by the Local Authority.

The comparatively small number of children examined for eye defects is due to the fact that the Ophthalmic Surgeon (Dr. Williamson) was called up for service and a considerable interval elapsed before his successor (Dr. Harry) was appointed.

IV.—INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

Closure of Schools.—During the year the following schools have been closed on account of the prevalence of Infectious Disease among the scholars:—

Education (Provision of Meals) Act, 1906.

No necessity has arisen during the year to put the Act into force.

SUMMARY of the Work of the SCHOOL NURSE during the year 1917.

446 visits have been paid to the various school departments. This number is made up as follows:—

124 visits with the Medical Officer to assist at the routine inspection.

346 visits for other purposes—examination of children for cleanliness, &c.

1,395 visits and re-visits have been made to the homes of dirty children and children found on Medical Inspection to be suffering from some disease or defect.

Visits were paid to all the schools for the purpose of giving instruction to the children, especially the girls, in personal cleanliness, the care of the hair, &c., and 10,891 children were inspected for cleanliness.

Nine visits have been made to the Ophthalmic Surgeon's rooms to assist in the examination of children with defective vision, and in the case of the children examined by him (57) atropine has been introduced into the children's eyes by the nurse on the day previous to examination.

Note:—The following Tables, I., II., and IV., are prescribed by the Board of Education. It has not been possible this year to obtain the particulars required for Tables III. and V.

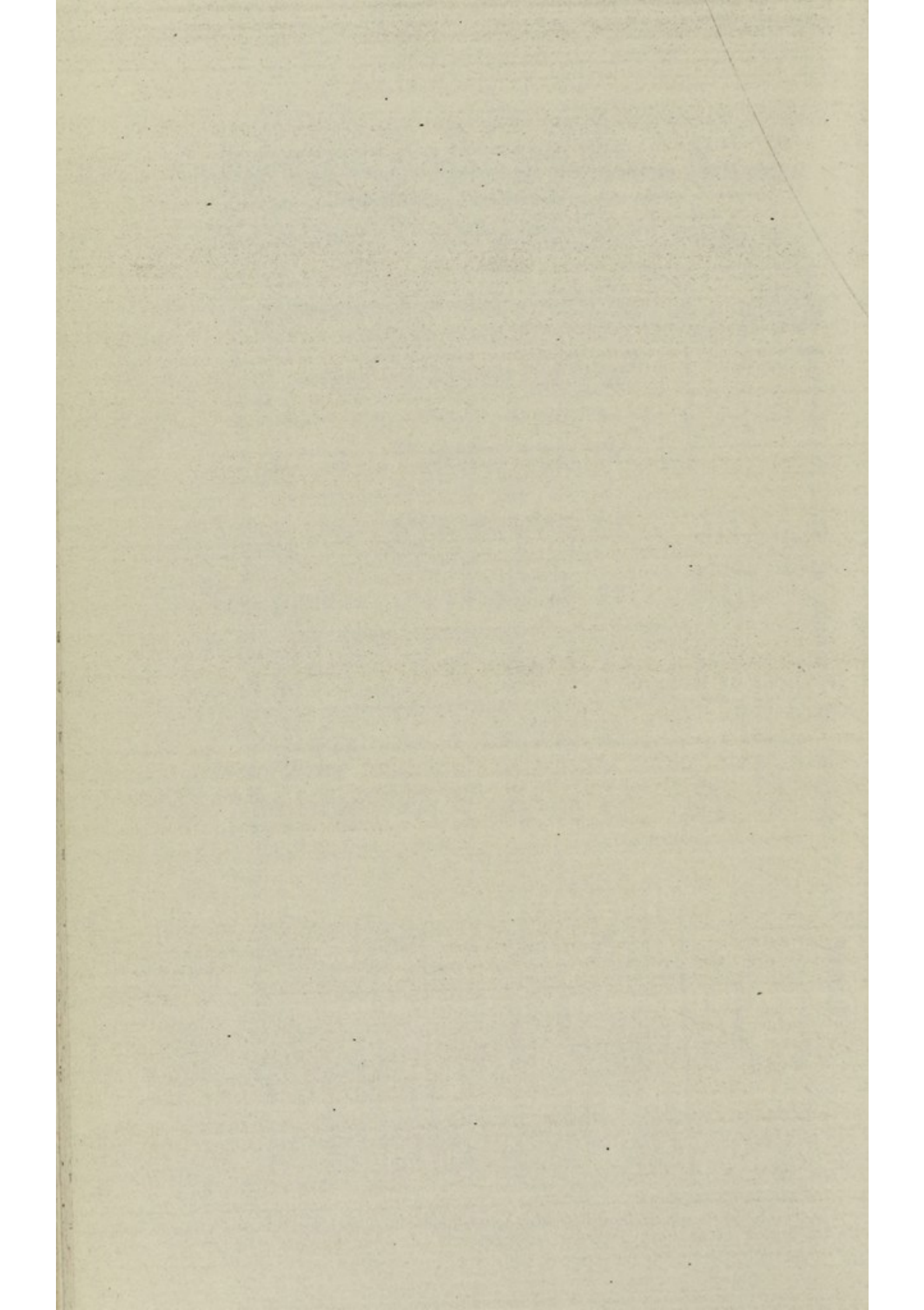

were presented and returned enclosed - four of £15 each, two of £10 each, and one of £5, the value in the latter case having been previously determined by a similar process.

Two of the defendants appealed against their convictions, but their appeals were dismissed, although the penalties were reduced in one case from £10 to £5, and in the other from £15 to £10.

No preservatives were found in any of the samples of milk.

The samples of margarine were of good quality, containing lard and a preservative, but the samples of butter were very inferior, being adulterated with oil and containing no butterfat. The fat present was, however, genuine butterfat.

The samples examined called for no comment.

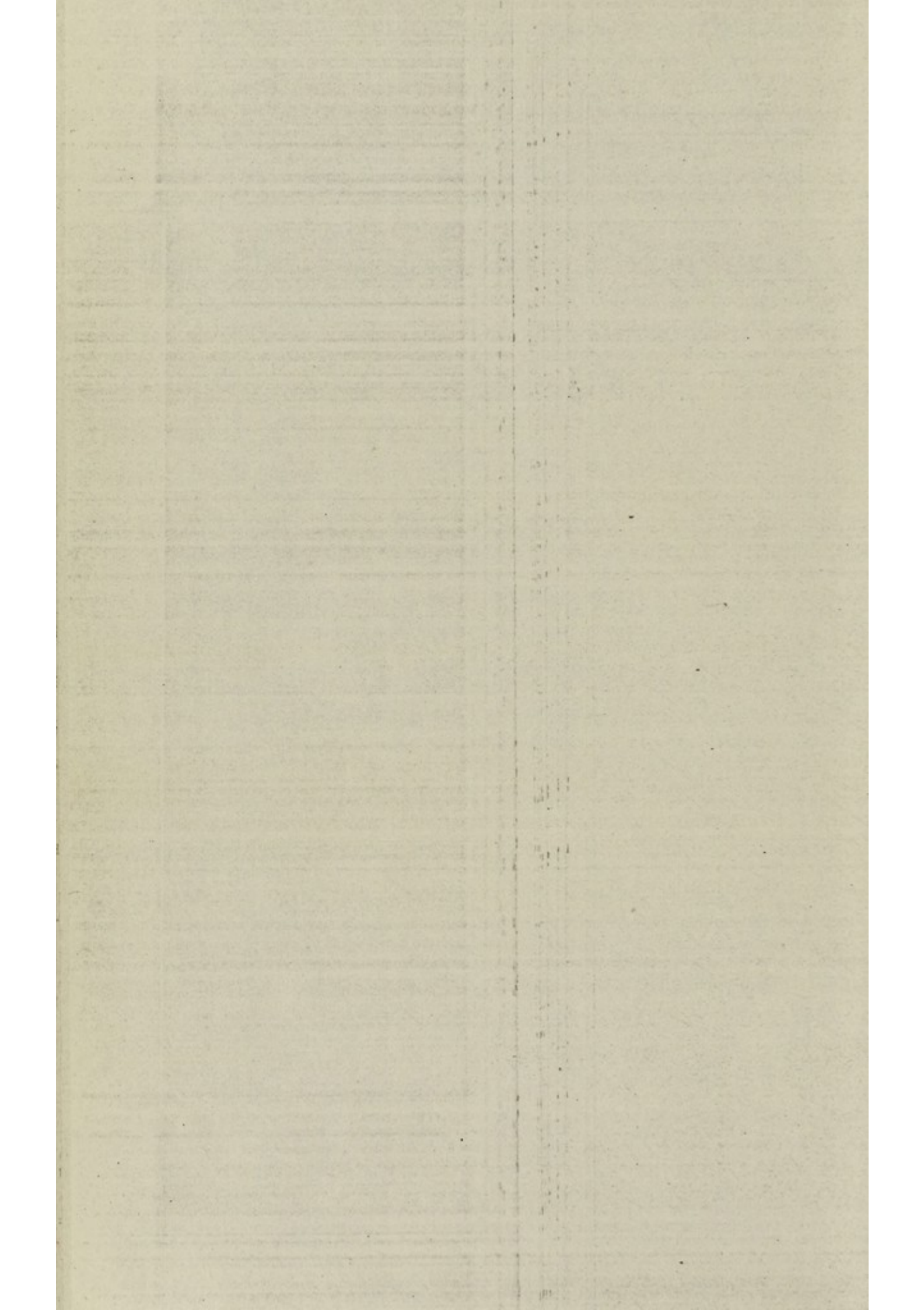
The percentage of adulteration is equal to 8 per cent.

Two of the defendants appealed against their convictions, but their appeals were dismissed, although the penalties were reduced in one case from £10 to 20/-, and in the other from £50 to £20.

No preservatives were found in any of the samples of milk.

The samples of margarine were of good quality, containing boric acid as a preservative, but the samples of butter were very rancid and unpalatable and contained boric acid not exceeding 0.50 per cent. The fats present were, however, genuine butter fats.

The samples examined called for no comment.

The percentage of adulteration is equal to 8 per cent.
