MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN.

I beg to submit my Annual Report on the health and sanitary condition of your District for the year 1904.

Birth Rate.—During the year there were 159 births registered in the District, of which 83 were males and 76 females. This gives a birth rate of 19·2 per 1,000 persons living, and compares unfavourably with previous years, indeed it is the lowest recorded with one exception, viz: 1901 when it was 18·8, during the last 10 years.

The average birth rate for the 5 years 1900-1904 is 20·3.

Only one illegitimate birth was registered in 1904, which is at the rate of ·62 per cent. of the total births.

Crude Death Rate.—102 deaths from all causes and at all ages have been registered in the District, of which 52 were males and 50 females, this gives a crude death rate of 12·3 per 1,000 per annum.

Corrected Death Rate.—Of the total 102 deaths there were 4 which occurred in the Smallpox Hospital at Ainsworth, of

persons usually resident in other Districts. In addition to the remaining 98 deaths, 10 of persons usually resident in this District occurred in public Institutions outside, making altogether 108 deaths of residents, and a corrected death rate of 13·0 per 1000. There is thus a diminution in the death rate from 15·1 in 1903 to 13·0 in 1904, the average for the 5 years 1900-1904 being 13·2 per 1,000 per annum.

Infantile Mortality.—During the year 25 deaths occurred in children under one year old, giving a rate in proportion to the number of births registered of 156·6 per 1,000. This compares unfavourably with 1903 when the rate was 129·2, and is partly due to the hot and dry summer, causing more Gastric and Intestinal Disease. The Death Rate from Diarrhoea and Enteritis in children under one year of age is considerably larger than in 1903, being 20 per cent. as against 8·7 per cent. last year.

Mortality under Five years of age.—36 out of the total deaths occurred in children under 5 years of age, being at the rate of 33·3 per cent. of the total deaths.

Mortality over Sixty-five years of age.—There were 27 deaths of persons over 65 years of age, being a per centage of 25 of the total deaths.

Zymotic Death Rate.—The number of deaths from the seven principal Zymotic Diseases were 11, viz : 1 from Measles, 3 from Scarlatina, 2 from Whooping Cough, 1 from Diphtheria, and 4 from Diarrhoea, giving a Zymotic Death Rate of 1·3 per 1000 living, or 10·1 per cent. of the total deaths.

Phthisis and other Tubercular Diseases have been the cause of 12 deaths, giving a death rate of 1·4 per 1,000, or 11·1 per cent. of the total deaths. This death rate throughout the country has been decreasing of late years, which is very satisfactory, and is probably due to the more active treatment that maintains now-a-days, and to the provision of a purer milk supply owing to the more sanitary conditions under which cows are now kept. Much however is still necessary in this direction.

Cancer and other Malignant Diseases have caused 6 deaths, being a per centage of 5·5 of the total deaths. This is higher than last year.

Diseases of the Respiratory Organs have caused 16 deaths this year, being 14·8 per cent. of the total deaths, or 1·9 per 1,000 persons living.

Smallpox has only occurred once during the year, viz: a tramp who was found in an empty house at Outwood. He was removed to the Smallpox Hospital at once on the notification being received. Vaccination was offered to all contacts. Fortunately no other case occurred.

Scarlatina has been somewhat prevalent all the year. Though at no time did it actually become epidemic there were two distinct waves of prevalence, viz: in the first quarter when there were 42 cases, and in the third quarter there were 19 cases. Most of the cases were of a mild type, and in my opinion this is the chief cause of the prevalence of the disease, as two or three extremely mild cases were discovered and which were not suspected by the parents to have been Scarlatina, and I have no doubt that there were other similar cases which were never discovered. There were 3 deaths, giving a mortality of 4·3 per cent. of the cases notified.

Of the 88 cases of Infectious Diseases notified, 30 were removed to an Infectious Hospital. From Birtle-cum-Bamford 7 cases of Scarlatina; Outwood, 1 case of Scarlatina, 1 of Enteric Fever, and 1 of Smallpox; Unsworth, 20 cases of Scarlatina. Thus 28 cases of Scarlatina were removed, and I am convinced

that the prompt removal of such cases which could not be properly isolated at home prevented a far greater prevalence of the disease. The 28 cases of Scarlatina removed were taken from 20 houses, and represented a population of 158, or an average of 7·9 per house. These houses contained 48 bedrooms, that is an average of 3·3 persons to each bedroom.

The Water Supply is obtained mainly from the Bury and District Joint Water Board. Ainsworth is supplied by the Bolton Corporation as also is a part of Outwood, and the Heywood and Middleton Joint Board supply Bamford. There are also several private supplies. Owing to the dryness of the summer there were some complaints both as to quantity and quality, but no very serious inconvenience was caused I think, and no illness was directly traceable to the deficient supply.

The Drainage Scheme at Prestolee continues to work in a satisfactory manner. Steps are being taken to erect similar schemes at Bamford and Parrs.

Farms. The usual inspection has been carried out, and I have to report a very distinct improvement in their sanitary conditions. Improvements in either the dwellings, cowsheds, drainage or water supply have been made at 16 Farms during the year, and of these at 4 Farms new cowsheds have been built in accordance with approved plans. Improvements are under consideration at 11 other Farms, and I am hopeful that something will be done to these during the coming year. The Register of cowkeepers and purveyors of milk has been carefully revised during the year, and of 129 Farmers in the District 99 are now registered.

Factories & Workshops. There are 47 Factories and Workshops in the District. They are situated in the different localities thus :

The Factories are used as follows : 3 spinning mills, 4 cotton weaving sheds, 1 woollen mill, 2 fulling mills, 6 dye works, 2 calico print works, 4 bleach works, 1 plumber's shop, 2 wheelwrights' shops, and 1 joiner's shop. Five complaints with reference to Factories have been received from His Majesty's Inspectors of Factories. They have all been attended to, and related entirely to sanitary accommodation, and as a result 15 new closets have been or are on the point of being erected. The main duty of the District Council as regards Factories is in the provision of sufficient means of escape in case of fire, and with the exception of the doors opening inward in some cases and some wooden staircases being in existence, the provision is good and ample.

There are 21 **Workshops** on the Register, against 26 last year, viz : 4 dressmakers, 8 clog and shoemakers, 2 painters, 2 joiners, 1 bakehouse, 1 tripe dresser, 1 brewery, and 2 general repairers. The sanitary condition of these is good and the ventilation fairly satisfactory, with ample air space.

There are no outworkers in the District.

I beg to append the Annual Report of the Inspector of Nuisances, and the various Tables required by the Local Government Board and the Home Office.

Dairies and Workshops.

The Cowsheds have been regularly inspected, and several have been brought up to date from a sanitary standpoint. Four new ones have been built, and 11 others have had improvements made to drainage, light, ventilation, and air space. 31 applications for Certificates of Registration under the Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milkshops Order, have been made and granted, and your regulations supplied to each applicant with a view to the requirements of same being strictly carried out.

Workshops.

I have to report that owing to dilapidated, unsuitable, and insufficient closet accommodation, new ones have been erected and others made more sanitary. The liming and cleansing of Workshops is carried out more regularly, and I have to report that they continue to be kept in a very fair condition. Smoke observations have been made and steps taken to abate the Nuisances.

Canal Boats.

Fifty-two visits have been made to the Canal at Outwood, and twenty-seven boats inspected. Registration, ventilation, and fittings, &c., were found in order, and each boat duly marked and numbered with the exception of two, whose names and numbers &c., were not recognisable.

House Dwellings.

Thirty-five new dwellings have been erected and tenanted, after the same had been inspected and certified as fit for habitation. Improvements are steadily being made to old buildings, and modern trapped stoneware gullies are steadily taking the place of the old and insanitary brick ones. Six old dwellings have been supplied with water from the Bolton Corporation water mains, and infected premises have been disinfected, and disinfectants distributed where infectious cases have arisen, and special care taken to ensure their proper use.

NOTES.—(a) The deaths of residents occurring beyond the limits of the district are to be included in this table, and deaths of non-residents occurring in the district are to be excluded. See note on Table I. as to meaning of "Residents" and "Non-residents."

(b) Deaths of residents occurring in public institutions are to be allotted to the respective localities according to the addresses of the deceased as given by the Registrars, and, in addition, to be classified under "Public Institutions."

(c) Under the heading of "Diarrhoea" are to be included deaths certified as from diarrhoea, alone or in combination with some other cause of ill-defined nature; and also deaths certified as from Epidemic enteritis; Zymotic enteritis; Epidemic diarrhoea. Summer diarrhoea. Dysentery and dysenteric diarrhoea; Choleraic diarrhoea, cholera, cholera nostras (in the absence of Asiatic cholera).

Under the heading of "Enteritis" are to be included those certified as from Gastro-enteritis, Muco-enteritis and Gastric catarrh, unless from information obtained by enquiry from the certifying practitioner or otherwise, the Medical Officer of Health should have reason for including such deaths, especially those of infants, under the specific term "Diarrhoea."

Deaths from diarrhoea secondary to some other well-defined disease should be included under the latter.
