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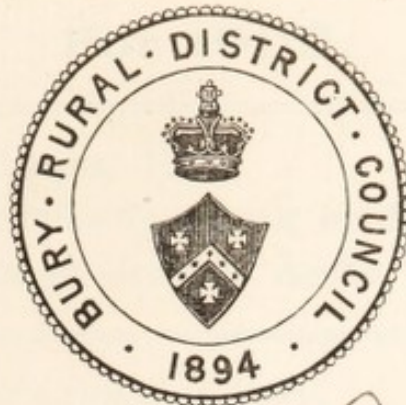

To the Rural District Council of Bury,

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit my Report on the Health and Sanitary condition of the District for the year 1909.

The District is a wide and scattered one, being composed of all that part of the Bury Union which is not Urban. It lies at an altitude varying from 125 feet at Molyneux, to 1500 feet above sea level, at Whittle Pike, Shuttleworth.

The total Rainfall in the County Borough of Bury, which the Rural District surrounds, was 45·52 inches during the year. This was 6 inches more than in 1908. The greatest rainfall occurred, as in 1908, in the month of July, and was 6·83 inches, and the least in November when 1·52 inches fell. An appreciable amount of rain fell on 187 days during the year.

The District embraces both agricultural and industrial communities. The chief centres of population are in parts of each of the various localities, especially Ainsworth, Bamford, Outwood, and Unsworth, Birtle to a less extent, while Walmersley-cum-Shuttleworth is mainly agricultural. The inhabitants in these centres of population are chiefly employed in textile industries. There are about 80 Milk Farms in the District. The milk, in addition to supplying the inhabitants, is carried for sale to the various Urban Districts in the neighbourhood.

Birth Rate—This is lower than in 1908. 184 births having been registered consisting of 90 males and 94 females, giving a Birth Rate of 21·4 per 1000 living compared with 23·4 per 1000 1908.

The average for the five years 1905 to 1909 is 20·4 per 1000 persons living.

Six illegitimate births were registered during the year, being at the rate of over 3 per cent. of the total births.

Crude Death Rate.—The total number of deaths registered in the district during the year was 106, of which 48 were males and 58 females, giving a crude death rate of 12·3 per 1000 persons living. This is the same rate as in 1908.

Corrected Death Rate.—As well as these 106 deaths 8 other deaths of persons usually resident in the district occurred in public institutions in other districts, making altogether 114 deaths of residents and giving a corrected death rate of 13·2 per 1000 per annum. This is practically the same rate as last year. The average death rate for the five years 1905 to 1909 is 13·6 per 1000. The following table shows the particulars from the various localities :

Infantile Mortality.—I am glad to be able to report that there is again a decrease in the Infantile Mortality. There have only been 14 deaths registered of children under one year of age. This is equal to a rate of 76·08 deaths per 1000 births registered, compared with 80·4 per 1000 in 1908. This is the lowest rate ever recorded in the district, and will, I am sure, compare very favourably with any part of the country. The average rate for the five years 1905 to 1909 is 98·2 per 1000 births.

There was one death only of an illegitimate child.

The ages at which these 14 deaths occurred were 6 under 1 month ; 5 between 1 and 3 months ; 2 between 6 and 9 months ; and 1 between 9 and 12 months. The causes of the deaths were 1 from Whooping Cough, 3 from Diarrhoea and Enteritis, 2 from Premature Birth and Congenital Defects, 1 from Tuberculous Peritonitis, 4 from Convulsions, 2 from Bronchitis, and 1 from Pneumonia.

The chief cause of this low rate of mortality among infants is undoubtedly the large rainfall and the absence of any long spell of hot dry weather, thus preventing the condition of the soil and atmosphere favourable to the production of stomach and bowel diseases. These complaints usually prevail during the months of July and August when an appreciable amount of rain fell on no less than 41 out of the 62 days. I am confident too that more attention is being paid to cleanliness in the feeding bottles, and the preparation of the food of those children brought up by hand.

Mortality under Five Years of age.—24 out of the total deaths have occurred among children under 5 years of age. This is at the rate of 21·5 per cent. of the total deaths, as compared with 24·5 per cent. in 1908.

Mortality over Sixty-five years of age.—The deaths of 32 persons over 65 years of age were registered. This is a rate of 28·07 per cent. of the total deaths as compared with 32·4 per cent. in 1908.

Zymotic Death Rate.—Seven deaths from principal zymotic diseases have been registered during the year, viz.: 1 from Measles, 2 from Scarlet Fever, 1 from Whooping Cough, 1 from Puerperal Fever, and 2 from Diarrhoea. This gives a rate of ·81 per 1000 persons living, or 6·1 per cent. of the total deaths.

Phthisis and other Tubercular Diseases have caused 12 deaths, giving a rate of 1·39 per 1000 persons living or 10·5 per cent. of the total deaths. This is a considerably higher rate than in the two previous years, when on each occasion it was 7·1 per cent.

Cancer and other Malignant Diseases have caused 9 deaths, which is at a rate of 1·4 per 1000 persons living or 7·8 per cent. of the total deaths. This is also an increase on 1908 when it was 4·3 per cent.

Diseases of the Respiratory Organs have caused 17 deaths during the year, being at the rate of 1·9 per 1000 persons living, or 14·9 per cent. of the total deaths.

Notifications of Infectious Diseases.—There have been 60 cases notified during the year as compared with only 22 cases in 1908, and 19 in 1907. Of these 60 cases no less than 46 were cases of Scarlatina. This disease has been very prevalent in the neighbourhood during the whole of the year. Compared with many of the surrounding districts your district has been fortunate. In January there were no less than 13 notifications and at no period of the year was the district absolutely free. The locality most largely affected was Unsworth where 26 cases occurred. No cases of Scarlatina were notified from Outwood. It was found necessary, owing to inability to provide efficient isolation in the homes, to remove 15 cases to the Joint Board's Isolation Hospital. 13 of this number were cases of Scarlatina and were taken from the following localities, viz.: 6 from Ainsworth, 1 from Birtle and 6 from Unsworth. The other 2 cases removed were of Enteric Fever from Ainsworth.

Water Supply.—The greatest part of the district is supplied by the Bury and District Joint Water Board, but Ainsworth receives some of its supply from the Bolton Corporation, and Bamford from the Heywood and Middleton Water Board. Most of the farms and the outlying parts of the district have private supplies. On the whole the supply has been satisfactory, no serious complaints having been received.

Drainage.—Schemes for the treatment of sewage are in operation at Prestolee, Parrs, Hollins, Black Lane and Blackford Brow. The works at Bamford are practically completed and will, I hope, soon be in operation. The works at Prestolee have been extended so as to meet the requirements of the increased number of inhabited houses. New works at Ainsworth (Bradley Fold) are being constructed, and a Local Government Board Inquiry has been held with reference to a scheme for the treatment of the sewage at Ringley. Now that so many sewage works are in operation, I am urging that, where possible, water closets should be adopted instead of the privy middens which are so common in the district.

The Farms have been inspected as usual and found to be in a satisfactory condition as regards cleanliness and sanitary arrangements. Where necessary improvements have been carried out, alterations having been made at 9 farms during the year.

The Register of Dairymen, Cowkeepers, and Milksellers, has been kept up to date, there being 100 on the list now.

Elementary Schools.—There are six elementary schools in the district, viz: at Ainsworth, Buchurst, Hollins, Unsworth, Ringley, and Turn. These have been inspected during the year. Improvements are desirable in some of them, especially in the sanitary arrangements and condition of the school yards.

New Buildings.—Plans for the erection of a considerable number of new buildings have been passed by the Council, chiefly for cottage property. In Ainsworth for 42 new cottages, 3 alterations to factories, and 1 enlargement to a cowshed. In Birtlecum-Bamford 2 houses, 2 alterations to mills, and 1 new cowshed.

In Outwood 61 houses and a County Council school. In Unsworth 10 houses, 2 alterations to mills and a new cowshed.

Factory and Workshop Act.—The usual inspections have been carried out, and both factories and workshops have been found in good sanitary condition. There are 33 factories and 22 workshops in the district. They are situated in the various localities as follows :

The factories consist of 3 spinning mills, 6 cotton weaving sheds, 1 woollen mill, 2 fulling mills, 4 dyeworks, 1 calico print works, 6 bleach works, 2 wheelwright shops, 2 joiners' shops, 1 terra-cotta and brick works, 1 engineer's shop, 3 quarries and 1 firelighter maker's shop.

The workshops consist of 3 dressmakers, 1 barber, 7 clog and shoemakers, 2 undertakers, 3 painters, 2 breweries, 2 tripe-dressers, 1 baker, and 1 plumber.

Two complaints have been received from His Majesty's Inspector of Factories. One of these referred to the means of escape in case of fire and is receiving attention. The other one to Sanitary arrangements which have been remedied.

Plans for alterations at or additions to 7 factories have been approved by the Council during the year.

There are no outworkers in the district.

Appended to this Report are the Annual Report of the Inspector of Nuisances and the various Tables required by the Local Government Board and the Home Office.

Dairies and Cowsheds.

The number of Registered Farmers within your district are one hundred, and applications for registration under the Dairies, Cowshed and Milkshops Order were received from thirteen persons. The Dairies and Cowsheds have been regularly and systematically inspected and special attention given to the modes of pollution of milk and the means of preventing this pollution. New Cowsheds have been erected and sanitary improvements made to others, in drainage, ventilation, and airspace.

House Dwellings.

On receipt of notifications of Infectious and Contagious Diseases your Inspector by order of your Medical Officer of Health visit the house and examine the sanitary condition of same. By this means many nuisances are ascertained which the tenants on account of carelessness or ignorance have ignored. Special attention has been paid to these and to ashpit nuisances, many of which have been reconstructed. I am pleased to mention that owing to sewage schemes in hand and completed I can see signs of a demand for more fresh water, or waste water closets, hence better sanitary conditions for the inhabitants of more populous districts.

Factories and Workshops.

The Factories and Workshops generally have been found to comply with the requirements as to cleanliness, light, and airspace. No offensive trade is now carried on in your district, and many extensions and sanitary improvements have been made to existing factories and workshops.
