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

#### To the Rural District Council of Bury,

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit my Report on the Health and Sanitary condition of the District for the year 1910.

The District is a wide and scattered one, being composed of all that part of the Bury Union which is not Urban. It lies at an altitude varying from 125 feet at Molyneux, to 1500 feet above sea level, at Whittle Pike, Shuttleworth.

The Rainfall in the County Borough of Bury, which the Rural District surrounds, was 43.86 inches during the year, compared with 45.52 inches during 1909. The greatest rainfall occurred in the month of August and was 6.05 inches, and the least in September when less than a quarter of an inch fell during the whole month. An appreciable amount of rain fell on 215 days during the year, compared with 187 days in 1909.

The District embraces both agricultural and industrial communities. The chief centres of population are in parts of each of the various localities, especially Ainsworth, Bamford, Outwood, and Unsworth, Birtle to a less extent, while Walmersley-cum-Shuttleworth is mainly agricultural. The inhabitants in these centres of population are chiefly employed in textile industries. consequently there is a large demand for female labour. There are about 80 Milk Farms in the District. The milk, in addition to supplying the inhabitants, is carried for sale to the various Urban Districts in the neighbourhood.

Birth Rate—This is slightly higher than in 1909. 190 births have been registered, consisting of 92 males and 98 females, giving a Birth Rate of 21.9 per 1000 persons living compared with 21.4 per 1000 in 1909. The average for the previous 10 years

was 20.5 per 1000 persons living. Five illegitimate births were registered during the year, being at the rate of 2.6 per cent. of the total births.

Crude Death Rate.—The total number of deaths registered during the year in the district was 90, of which 45 were males and 45 were females, giving a crude Death Rate of 10·3 per 1000 persons living. This is the lowest rate recorded for many years. The average for the previous 10 years was 13 per 1000.

Corrected Death Rate.—In addition to these 90 deaths 12 other deaths of persons usually resident in the district have occurred in public institutions in other districts, making altogether 102 deaths of residents, and giving a corrected Death Rate of 11.7 per 1000 per annum. This is considerably lower than in 1909 when it was 13.2 per 1000, and with the exception of 1901, when it was 11.4 per 1000, it is the lowest recorded in the district during the last 10 years. The average Death Rate for the previous 10 years was 13.1 per 1000.

Infantile Mortality.—I regret having to report an increase in the Infantile Mortality. During the year 21 deaths of infants under one year of age have been registered, which is equal to a rate of 110.5 per 1000 births registered, compared with 76.08 in 1909. This is the highest recorded in the district since 1906.

There was only one death of an illegitimate infant during the year.

The ages at which these 21 deaths occurred were 11 under 1 month, of which 7 took place during the first week of life, 3 in the second week and 1 in the third week; 3 between 1 and 3 months; 3 between 3 and 6 months; 2 between 6 and 9 months and 2 between 9 and 12 months. The causes of death were 2 from Whooping Cough, 2 from Diarrhoea and Enteritis, 11 from Premature Birth and Congenital Defects, 2 from Tuberculous Diseases, 1 from Convulsions, 1 from Meningitis, and 1 from Pneumonia.

The striking feature is the large number of deaths from Premature Birth and Congenital Defects and consequently the large number occurring in the first few weeks of life. These facts, I think, strengthen the opinion that it is urgently necessary for Parliament to enact that pregnant women must not work during the later months of their pregnancy, and they should also extend the time during which mothers are prevented from resuming their work after their confinement. There is no increase in the number of deaths from Gastro-Intestinal diseases, the fewness of which is probably dependent on the large number of days during which an appreciable amount of rain fell during the year and consequently the comparatively small quantity of dust that was blown about.

Mortality under Five years of age.—26 out of the total number of deaths occurred among children under 5 years old. This is at the rate of 26 per cent. of the total deaths, compared with 21.5 per cent. in 1909.

Mortality over Sixty-five years of age.—The deaths of 31 persons over 65 years of age were registered. This is at the rate of 31 per cent. of the total deaths, as compared with 28.07 per cent. in 1909.

Zymotic Death Rate.—12 deaths from Zymotic diseases have been registered during the year, viz.: 2 from Diphtheria, 2 from Whooping Cough, 1 from Enteric Fever, 4 from Influenza, and 3 from Diarrhoea. This gives a death rate of 1.3 per 1000 persons living, and 12 per cent. of the total deaths.

Phthisis and other Tubercular Diseases have caused 10 deaths, giving a rate of 1.15 per 1000 persons living, and 10 per cent. of the total deaths. This is a somewhat lower rate than in 1909, when it was 1.39 per 1000.

Cancer and other Malignant Diseases have caused 7 deaths, which is at the rate of 0.8 per 1000 persons living and 7 per cent. of the total deaths. This is also a slight decrease on 1909 when the rate was 1.4 per 1000.

Diseases of the Respiratory Organs have caused 15 deaths during the year, being at the rate of 1.7 per 1000 persons living, and 15 per cent. of the total deaths.

Notifications of Infectious Diseases.—60 cases have been notified during the year. This is exactly the same number as were notified in 1909. No less than 47 of this number were cases of Scarlatina, which again this year has been very prevalent in the neighbourhood. Except in August and September Scarlatina has been notified during each month of the year. The greatest number were notified in July (10), October (8), and November (11). The localities most largely affected were Birtle-cum-Bamford and Outwood. During the year 15 cases were removed to the Infectious Diseases Hospital, all of these were cases of Scarlatina. Of this number 2 were from Ainsworth, 5 from Birtle-cum-Bamford, 3 from Outwood, and 5 from Unsworth. The following table shows the distribution of the cases in the various localities:

Water Supply.—Nearly the whole of the district is supplied by the Bury and District Joint Water Board, but Ainsworth receives some of its supply from the Bolton Corporation, and Bamford from the Heywood and Middleton Water Board. Most of the farms and the outlying parts of the district have private supplies. I have received no serious complaints during the year. At the extreme ends of the mains there has been some trouble on account of the muddiness of the water. Arrangements were made to have the mains flushed more frequently, and the result was satisfactory.

Drainage.—Works for the treatment of sewage are in operation at Prestolee, Parrs, Bamford, Croft Lane, Kilner Croft, Black Lane and Blackford Bridge. The works at Bradley Fold are almost completed and will be in operation in a short time. A sewage scheme for Ringley is being made and should be completed some time this year. The works at Prestolee have been improved, but require some further extension owing to the increase of population. During the year a considerable number of water closets have been provided, especially for new property, and wherever possible I have urged the doing away with privy middens and substituting water closets for them.

Farms.—The usual inspections have been carried out. On the whole the conditions are satisfactory and good airspace is provided. Improvements have been carried out at nine farms during the year. There are 101 registered purveyors of milk in the district now.

Elementary Schools.—There are six elementary schools in the district, viz: at Ainsworth, Buckhurst, Hollins, Unsworth, Ringley, and Turn. These have been inspected during the year. Improvements in the sanitary conveniences are being carried out at Turn. The Lancashire County Council School at Prestolee is in course of erection.

New Buildings.—Plans for the erection of new buildings have been passed by the Council, for the various localities as follows:—In Ainsworth for 26 new cottages, 1 weaving shed, 9 alterations and extensions and 2 wooden buildings. In Birtle-cum-Bamford 20 water closets for factories and houses. In

Outwood 2 additions to mills, 23 new cottages, and 1 club, In Unsworth 20 new cottages, 2 additions to factories and 8 new closets.

Factory and Workshop Act.—The usual inspections have been carried out, and all have been found in good sanitary condition. There are 33 factories and 21 workshops in the district. They are situated in the various localities as follows:

The factories consist of 3 spinning mills, 6 cotton weaving sheds, 1 woollen mill, 2 fulling mills, 3 dyeworks, 1 calico print works, 6 bleach works, 2 wheelwright's shops, 2 joiners' shops, 1 terra-cotta and brick works, 1 engineer's shop, 3 quarries, 1 firelighter's shop and 1 spindle and fly works.

The workshops consist of 3 dressmakers, 1 barber, 6 clog and shoemakers, 3 painters, 2 undertakers, 2 breweries, 2 tripedressers, 1 baker, and 1 plumber.

Two complaints have been received from His Majesty's Inspector of Factories. These both had reference to the sanitary conveniences provided, and are being attended to.

There are no outworkers in the district.

Appended to this Report are the Annual Report of the Inspector of Nuisances and the various Tables required by the Local Government Board and the Home Office.

#### Dairies and Cowsheds.

It is satisfactory to report that there has been a general tendency towards improvement both in structure and management of the Farms within your districts; yet there is room still for more improvements. We have now 101 persons registered under the Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milkshops Order, and one new Cowshed, and other Sanitary Improvements have been made to farm buildings, and I am pleased to report that the farmers generally are endeavouring to carry out your regulations.

#### House Dwellings.

Much improved Sanitary work has been carried out, as you will see by referring to my Table of Nuisances for the year. New Drains, Water Closets, and improvements have been made to property principally owing to the New Main Sewers at Bamford and Unsworth, and my expectations mentioned in my last year's report have been realised. Special attention has been paid to the emptying of Ashpits, and to the disinfecting and cleaning of houses where needed. Phthisis cases as well as the other notifiable diseases have received attention and I am expecting many Sanitary Improvements to House Dwellings during the coming year.

#### Factories and Workshops.

Generally the Workshops within the District have been found to comply with the requirements as to cleanliness, air-space, and ventilation. During the year H.M. Inspector has reported Sanitary defects to Closets in two Factories and work is in hand to remedy the same.






