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

PREFATORY NOTE.

THE twenty-two manuscripts here described were last catalogued by Thomas Hartwell Horne in his full catalogue of the College Library (2 vols. 1827). The description will be found in vol. II, p. 999. On pp. 997–999 he gives a list of the Oriental manuscripts in the Library, thirteen in number. The Western Manuscripts are numbered from 14 to 47. The collection as it now stands is not of the highest interest. The finest book is probably the gloss on the Psalms (nos. 5, 6): the rarest perhaps the treatise of Wycliffe *De veritate sanctae scripturae* (no. 15).

One manuscript which should follow no. 3 was missing in 1867 and has not been discoverable since. It is thus described by Horne

"No. 17. Summa Raymundi de Pennaforti Barciuocensis (sic) ordinis - Praedicatorum.

A MS. on vellum in 4to. of cent. xiii. The following note appears on the flyleaf: Raymundus Barchionensis Capellanus Gregorii IX, scripsit Gregorii vitam ad initium Decretalium Epistolarum: obiit 1275. Hujus auxilio Decretales compilavit Gregorius anno 1235. Gregorii jussu in unum volumen, 5 Libris Distinctionum, Epistolas Decretales Summorum Pontificum collegit. Vide Bellarm. de Script. Eccl."

The book is a very common one, and its loss is not to be deeply regretted.

I have not gone further in my descriptions than Horne's number 35. For the remaining books I have allowed his short notes to suffice, and I do not suppose my readers will blame me very sharply.

The catalogue of the old library of the College, which was of great interest, and disappeared, like so many others, in the sixteenth century, has been admirably edited by the Rev. W. G. Searle, M.A.,

formerly Fellow, for the Cambridge Antiquarian Society (Communications, vol. II, 168–193): to this publication, which is provided with an excellent Index, students will do well to refer.

At Queens' College, Uffenbach (Merkwürdige Reisen III. 25) saw the following manuscripts:

1. Augustinus de Civitate Dei.

Vellum, $15\frac{5}{8} \times 11$, ff. 291, double columns of 40 lines each. Cent. xii, in a fine hand. Initials in plain colour, green, red, etc.

Binding: original xiith cent. In the same style exactly as no. 5 save that there are no circuit edges, and there is less brasswork. Each cover has had four or five bosses on it which are gone, and there are traces of a strap and pin fastening.

Given by Francis Tyndall, Esq. (cent. xvii). 2 fo. tamen etiam.

A carefully erased inscription on the flyleaf, as in no. 5.

Evidently these books are from the same monastic Library.

Vellum, $13\frac{3}{8} \times 9\frac{1}{4}$, ff. 2 + 169 + 2, double columns of 34 lines each. Cent. xii, very finely written, the text in red, the comment in black. Initial of good decorative work to each Psalm: rough but effective.

Binding original, of the xiith century. Wooden boards covered with calf's (?) skin (with the hair on): edges prolonged into a flap at top and bottom. The boards have brass ornaments nailed upon them, viz.: Each cover has four rectangular corner-pieces and six more tongued pieces on the edges: two on each longer side, one at top and one at bottom. Most of these have engraved ornaments consisting of concentric or intersecting circles. There have besides been five circular bosses on each cover, which are now gone. In the second cover are two holes which seem to indicate that the book was fastened by a double strap and pin.

Given by Francis Tyndall (cent. xvii).

On the verso of the flyleaf is an erased inscription of the monastic provenance of the book. 2 fo. et desudet.

Contents:

The initials are remarkable throughout. A good many have their original red silk guards left. The principal colours employed are gold (not burnished), lightish blue, green, orange-scarlet and pink. The main divisions of the Psalter (into seven nocturnes and into three fifties) are distinguished by large initials. The opening words of these psalms were to have been written in gold capitals: but this has been neglected except in the case of *Beatus vir* and *Saluum me fac* (lxviii).

6. GILBERTUS SUPER PSALMOS II.

Vellum, $13\frac{3}{8} \times 9$, ff. 184, double columns of 33 lines. Cent. xii, very finely written. In respect of handwriting, ornament and binding, the volume is quite uniform with no. 5. The hairy skin cover and incised metal ornaments are in good preservation.

Given by Francis Tyndall. There is no trace of earlier ownership. 2 fo. Nunc inter uerba.

Collation: 18-68 710 88-228 236 (6 stuck to cover).

The text begins with Ps. lxxx (lxxxi) Exultate. The first words have not been written in, and the initial is in outline.

The ornament is of exactly the same class as that in vol. i. The noteworthy initials are:

xciii. Warrior in chain mail and peaked casque with nose-piece, on horse, piercing a dragon's head.

xciv. Supported by kneeling men.

xcvii. Cantate. Larger, with dogs.

Before Ps. ci are extracts from Ambrose, Jerome and Augustine occupying five leaves.

 Two medallions above, Christ half-length with book blessing; below, a kneeling man in blue.

cix. Dixit Dominus. Larger, decorative.

cxiii. Man above; below, angel with spear piercing a dragon.

cxvi. Fish.

cxviii. Beth. Dragon.

He. Two dragons.

Zain. Two birds.

cxx. Two fish.

cxxii. Serpent at the throat of a nude man who pierces its neck.

exxiv. Fine circular design.

exxvi. Half man, half dragon with shield and sword.

cxxxiii. Medallion of Christ (?) not nimbed.

All the initials are good, but the designs of the above are noteworthy as containing either illustrative subjects or interesting figures.

Confessors: Dunstan...Samson...Cuthbert, Swithun, Patrick, Romanus.

Virgins, etc.: Genofeua—Radegundis Etheldrida...Milburga, Kyneburga, Brigida, Columba.

Kyneburga is here, not the Saint of Caister (near Peterborough) who is commemorated with Kyneswitha and Tibba, but the martyr of Gloucester.

There is nothing distinctive in the Hymnary save a Hymn for St Benedict which points to the monastic provenance of the book.

In respect of its decoration this is an interesting and beautiful book. The 'line-fillings' are of the kind that I have been accustomed to associate with East Anglian productions. They are mostly in blue outline, and represent fishes or else grotesques with human heads. Each Psalm has a good gold initial, generally decorative in design sometimes containing animal forms. The historiated initials are as follows:

1. Beatus vir. Large initial and border on two sides of the page. The border contains a half-length archer in red shooting upwards at an animal seated at top. The

initial has burnished gold ground and contains two pictures. Above: David crowned, seated playing a harp. Below: David in red tunic, stones in lap, and sling. Goliath on R. in a sitting posture, with red mail, blue surcoat, and scimitar.

Ps. ii, iii and others have their initials extended into a partial border.

Domine ne in furore. Ps. vi has a half-length praying figure on gold ground. After Ps. xiv the initials are simpler.

- 2. Ps. xxvii. *Dominus illuminatio*. On L. David, and a boy holding a glove, and another stand: on R. a Bishop in mitre and blue chasuble over alb speaks to them.
- 3. Ps. xxxviii. Dixi custodiam. David kneels with hand pointing to his face. Above on R. the Divine Hand in a red cloud.
- 4. Ps. li. Quid gloriaris. Gold ground with hatched lines. A warrior in red mail and blue surcoat about to behead a kneeling tonsured man.
- Ps. lii. Dixit insipiens. On L. the fool, bald and clad only in a short cloak, stands holding a stick and eating a cake. David throned on R.
- Ps. lxviii. Saluum me fac. In two divisions. Above, Christ half-length with red cross-nimbus and globe blessing. Below, David half-length nude, crowned in water.
- 7. Ps. lxxxi. Exultate. David sits playing on two bells hung from a red beam, with a long-headed hammer in each hand. This initial ends in a tailed and lion-headed man playing the harp.
- 8. Ps. xcvii. Cantate. Three tonsured clerks in copes red blue and pink before a lectern with an open book, which the foremost handles.
- Ps. ci. Exaudi. David kneels and prays. Above, on R. is Christ's head in a red cloud.
- 10. Ps. cix. *Dixit Dominus*. A blank page precedes it. The Father and Son in blue over red, and cross-nimbi, each with a book, seated. The Dove above in the centre in a red cloud.
- 11. Hymns. f. 178. O lux beata Trinitas. Italian Trinity. The Father crossnimbed seated holds the Crucified Son before Him. Above, outside the initial, the Dove.
- 12. f. 186 b. Advent Hymns. Conditor alme syderum. Christ stands on L. blessing. On R. a kneeling figure: above his head a red cloud with white stars.
- 13. f. 206 b. De Apostolis. Annue Christe. Three kneeling figures: above, on R., the Divine Hand in a red cloud.

It is a very handsomely illuminated Roll of History from the Creation to Edward IV, continued to Henry VII and Arthur Prince of Wales.

The principal feature at first is the genealogy of Christ: after that, the British and English kings. The ancient empires Egypt, Assyria, etc. are given.

At top is a good border of feather-work and colour, and the text begins in four columns.

- a. Ueterum cronicorum narraciones ac b. Adam in agro damasceno formatus. sacre historie solacia.
- c. In principio creauit deus.
- d. Non solum audiendis sacre historie

The genealogies begin with a medallion containing a good picture of the Fall. The serpent has a human head and arms. The line proceeds with medallions framed alternately in red and blue on gold, back bare bordered with blue.

Large medallions for pictures are left at Noe Abraham David Sedechias Christus.

Every name of a king is surmounted by a crown of burnished gold. This gives a fine effect to the whole.

Towards the end there is on the L. the line of Popes, then the Kings of France, and then those of England, and their progeny. The text decreases in amount and at the end consists of a memorial distich and a short paragraph on each king. The last paragraph is on Edward IV ending:

Et coronatus est in regem anglie apud Westmonasterium a Thoma Bourgchier Cantuar. Archiep. xxviiio die mensis Junii a.d. mo. cccc. lxio.

Richard III, Henry VII and their queens and Arthurus princeps Wallie follow. Their crowns are differently drawn from the rest and mostly have red caps in them.

Henry VII, Katherine of Arragon and a few other names are added by a third hand quite roughly.

There are many similar Chronicle-Rolls in existence: one in the Pepysian Library (also bound into a volume) recalls this in general aspect, but is I think earlier in date.
