



# ONE HUNDRED AND TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT.

To Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, the Members of the Committee have again the pleasing duty of rendering their most grateful thanks for her Royal patronage and annual support to the Society's funds.

The Committee desire to offer their thanks to His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, Vice-Patron, and to His Grace the Duke of Argyll, President, for their continued interest in the welfare of the Society.

# REWARDS FOR SAVING OR ATTEMPTING TO SAVE LIFE.

Under the above heading the work of the Society for the past twelve months has been most satisfactory; 367 cases have been considered by the Committee, and 391 persons have received the Society's rewards for their gallantry and promptness.

Notwithstanding the recent formation of many Humane Societies in the provinces established on the basis of the Royal Humane, yet the applications to the parent Society for its honorary rewards are annually increasing, and it is gratifying to report that these rewards give a decided stimulus to saving life from drowning.

It is also satisfactory to observe that out of a large number of immersions reported, so few fatalities have occurred.

The awards for 1885 are classified as follows, viz.:

- 1 Gold Medal (Stanhope).
- 15 Silver do.
- 139 Bronze do.

- 126 Testimonials inscribed on Vellum.

35 Pecuniary Rewards with Certificates.

In the cases brought under the notice of the Committee thirty-eight officers and men of the Royal Navy, Naval Reserve, and Coast-Guard Service, and forty-eight officers and men of the army and auxiliary forces, received the honorary rewards of this Society during the past twelve months.

The Nile Expedition was prolific of gallant rescues. Many of these were effected under great difficulties and at considerable personal risk, owing to the dangerous rapids on the river, in proximity of which most of the immersions occurred-

### LIFE-SAVING APPARATUS.

The Society maintains drags and lifebuoys at 300 places in and around the metropolis, and during the past year has placed them at many Police Stations on the recommendation of the Commissioner of Police. A list of places will be found on page 84.

The attention of the Committee has lately been drawn to some garments and other apparatus for the prevention of drowning (the invention of F. W. Brewster, Esq., M.A.), which appear to them to be worthy of trial by those who are constantly boating and exposed to the many risks incident to the use of light craft on rivers.

Mr. Brewster was kind enough to show his inventions to the Committee at the Aquarium, where various trials were made of their capacity, and the Committee formed a very favourable opinion of their value. A little book has been written by Mr. Brewster on the flotation of the human body, and his inventions can be seen at 93, Regent Street.

# ENCOURAGEMENT OF SWIMMING AT PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The swimming competitions under the Society's Rules with reference to saving life from drowning have now been carried on for four years, and judging by the general opinion expressed by head masters of schools and training ships, they appear to be not only popular but instructive to the swimmer in the important matter of saving drowning persons.

A propos of this, and as an inducement to other schoolboys to follow a good example, it is worth mentioning that a Tonbridge School pupil named Leonard Lockhart Miller, aged fifteen, on the 22nd of October last gallantly plunged into the Medway and rescued another lad, of eleven years of age, from drowning. It appears that the younger boy after

becoming immersed was carried out to the centre of the river by the strong current and sank three times, when Miller swam out with all his clothes on and after diving succeeded in bringing the boy to the surface.

It is stated that the Salvor has gained his experience in saving life by competing at his school for the Royal Humane Society's Swimming Prize.

Miller has been awarded the Bronze Medal for this act.

The Committee have to thank the head and other masters of schools, the officers commanding training ships, and those gentlemen who have acted as umpires for carrying out these competitions at the cost of a good deal of time and trouble.

The Committee are prepared to continue the prizes at those schools and ships where the contests have already taken place and if possible extend them to others.

### BATHING IN HYDE PARK.

With reference to this subject, it is estimated by daily observation that 200,000 persons have bathed in the Serpentine during the past year, and it will be seen by the undermentioned summary that the boatmen of this Society have been the means of saving 68 persons from drowning, while no bather has lost his life through the absence or neglect of the Society's servants.

It is true that two persons lost their lives whilst bathing but this was due in both instances to a disregard of their state of health before entering the water, and the cause of death was probably collapse of the lungs or congestion of some vital organ.

One of these persons was found in two feet of water. Summary of casualties in the Serpentine for 1885.

- 16 Boating and other accidents.
- 68 Persons rescued while bathing.
  - 3 Attempted suicides.
  - 3 Found drowned.

The Receiving House in Hyde Park requires some external repairs.

The iron houses in Regent's and St. James's Parks are in fair condition.

The ice boats with other appliances for the prevention of skating fatalities are serviceable. A few idemen were employed for two days in December, but their services were only required in anticipation of accidents in Regent's Park and other waters. The Serpentine was not sufficiently frozen to bear skating.

A statement of Receipts and Disbursements will be found on page 14.

A legacy of £100 was bequeathed to the Society during the past year by the late John Lucas Walker, Esq., and it has been invested in India 4 per Cent. Stock.

The Royal Humane Society does not parade its aims and wants by largely advertising, but its field of operations is extensive, and the pecuniary support it receives outside of the metropolis is very small and quite unequal to the numerous demands on its resources, made from all parts of the United Kingdom, India, and some of the Colonies, therefore the Committee trust that the old supporters of this Society will use their influence towards obtaining new subscribers to replace those who year by year are lost by death.

During the past year three Vice-Presidents, the Hon. Treasurer, and two of the Committee have passed away, and the names of the late Duke of Somerset, the Earl of Shaftesbury, Viscount Ranelagh, Wm. Hawes, Esq., J. Hampden Fordham, Esq., and Wm. Upward, Esq., will not again appear upon the list of those who have for so many years been reckoned amongst the Society's friends and supporters; but the Committee cannot allow this opportunity to pass without recording their sorrow at the loss of their late Treasurer, Mr. Hawes, who for seventeen years gave the Society the benefit of his time and talents and to whom so much is due for the unvarying attention paid by him to its interests.

It is well also that the subscribers should on this occasion be reminded of the connection between the Hawes family and the Royal Humane Society, as the institution was first formed by the grandfather of the late Treasurer and some of his friends. The father of the late Treasurer, who died at the advanced age of ninety, was for no less than seventy years one of the most earnest of its advocates.

The Committee have also to regret the death of Mr. John Sutton, the late Superintendent of the Hyde Park Receiving House, who faithfully served the Society for a period extending over twenty years.

Lt.-General Lothian Nicholson, R.E., C.B., has been elected Treasurer of the Society.

Captain A. B. Hawes has been elected a member of Committee.

Mr. Jas. Horton, late a Master of Arms, R.N., is appointed Superintendent of the Receiving House.

Mr. Pearson is authorised to collect subscriptions in lieu of the late Mr. Sutton.



# The Model Receiving House (erected in 1834), with a description of its internal arrangements.

This Receiving House is situated on the north bank of the Serpentine River, midway between the Bridge and the east end. It contains, besides accommodation for the resident Superintendent and Boatmen of the Society, two Wards, a Surgery, and Committee Room. The wards are furnished with two baths and six beds, and when filled with hot water, the bedding becomes heated; the object of this is to keep up the temperature of the body after the patient is removed from the warm bath to the bed. There are likewise two hollow iron tables, with pipes leading to a boiler, through which the hot water circulates, keeping the hot-water bottles, &c., warm, and the rooms at a high rate of temperature. About two tons of water are thus constantly kept hot throughout the year; and by these arrangements a warm bath can be obtained (night or day) immediately.

A Stretcher is also kept at the Receiving House, ready for carrying persons in cases of accidents by Equestrians, &c.

When an accident occurs, and while the boatmen are engaged in recovering the body from the water, a messenger is despatched for the medical attendant outside the Park; thus no loss of time occurs, which is so essential in cases of suspended animation.

# DESCRIPTION OF THE MEDALS AND CLASPS

OF THE

### ROYAL HUMANE SOCIETY.

FLAME having been used both by the Ancients and Moderns as the emblem of life, and its extinction as the symbol of death, the front of the medal represents a boy blowing an extinguished torch, in the hope, as expressed by the motto, "LATEAT SCINTILLULA FORSAN," peradventure a little spark may yet lie hid. This design appears applicable both to the person apparently dead and to the one who endeavours to resuscitate him. Under the device is the following inscription abbreviated: "societas Londini in resuscitationem intermortuorum instituta, mdcclxxiv"—The (Royal Humane) Society, established in London for the recovery of persons in a state of suspended animation, 1774.

The reverse of the Medal exhibits a Civic Wreath, which was the Roman reward for saving life; the inscription round it expresses the merit which obtains this honour from the Society, "Hoc pretium cive servato tulit"—He has obtained this reward, for having saved the life of a citizen. Within the wreath is the following inscription abbreviated: "VITAM OB SERVATAM DONO DEDIT SOCIETAS REGIA HUMANA"—The Royal Humane Society presented this gift for saving life.

There is a second reverse to the Society's Medal, with the Civic Wreath only, which is used when the Medal is presented to persons who have endeavoured to save the lives of others at the risk of their own, but without success; the inscription reads "VITA PERICULO EXPOSITA DONO DEDIT SOCIETAS REGIA HUMANA"—

The Royal Humane Society presented this to ————, his life having been exposed to danger.

The clasp for the Silver and Bronze Medals is the same in shape. It is usually awarded to those who are already in possession of the Medal, for a second act of bravery in saving life.



# THE STANHOPE GOLD MEDAL.

Many of the friends and subscribers to the Royal Humane Society are not aware of the History of the Stanhope Gold Medal Fund, therefore the circumstances connected with it are here briefly recapitulated.

The late Captain Chandos Scudamore Scudamore Stanhope, R.N., who died on the 7th July, 1871, having been much respected in his profession, a Memorial Fund was raised to commemorate his services.

The Committee of the Fund passed the following resolution:

"That the sum raised for the 'Stanhope Memorial Fund' shall be made over to the Royal Humane Society for the purpose of presenting a Gold Medal annually to the most deserving case which may come before the Society in each year, such medal to be known as the 'Stanhope Gold Medal.'"

This Medal was first issued in 1874.

The Committee of the Royal Humane Society have had a special ribbon made for the Stanhope Medal, in order that soldiers and sailors in possession of it when wearing ribbons in undress uniform may have it thus distinguished from the other medals of the Society.

APPLICATIONS for the Society's Honorary Rewards in cases occurring in Great Britain must be sent to the Secretary within two months after the date of the occurrences, otherwise they will not be recognised.

If the rescues, or attempted rescues, occur in India or the Colonies, a longer period will be allowed, but eighteen months after date is the maximum.

# REGULATIONS RESPECTING MEDALS TO THE ARMY AND NAVY.

THE FIELD MARSHAL COMMANDING IN CHIEF having sanctioned Medals granted for acts of bravery in saving life being worn in Uniform, whenever a Society may consider any officer, non-commissioned officer, or soldier entitled to receive a Medal, the decoration, together with a statement of the act of bravery performed, should be sent to the Adjutant General to the Forces, in order that the recipient's name may be registered, and the necessary authority issued for the distinction to be worn.

These Medals will be worn on the Right Breast.

"Circular No. 11.—C. Admiralty, 19th March, 1869. Humane Society's Medals.—The Royal Humane Society having made arrangements for reducing the size of their Medals in future—in order to admit of their being worn—and for granting Clasps and Bars for subsequent acts of bravery, in cases where a Medal has been already granted, my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are hereby pleased to notify to the officers and men of Her Majesty's Navy and Marines their permission to officers and men to wear such Medals and Clasps when awarded by the Humane Society.

The Volunteer Force are permitted to wear the Society's Medals in Uniform.

### MINIATURE MEDALS.

Case 22,611. Alfred Collins, aged 21, Fisherman.

The fishing lugger "Water Nymph" of Looe was seven or eight miles east-south-east of the "Eddystone," on the night of the 16th December, 1884, when a boy named Hoskings fell overboard, and was soon about eighty feet astern.

The captain of the boat, Alfred Collins, immediately jumped in to the rescue, carrying the end of a rope with him; he was clothed in oilskins and sea-boots. After a great deal of difficulty Hoskings was reached and pulled on board. At the time this gallant act was performed there was a gale of wind blowing with heavy rain, and the night was dark.

The Silver Medal was voted to Alfred Collins on the 20th January, 1885.

At the Annual General Court of the Society held on the 12th January, 1886—

It was resolved to award the "Stanhope Gold Medal" to Alfred Collins, this being considered the most meritorious case during the past year.

CASE 22,614. Saraj Din, aged 22, Foot-constable, Lahore Police.

On the 19th September, 1884, a water-carrier fell into a well at Lahore, the water surface being forty-five feet below ground;

the man's brother went down to his assistance by means of a rope, when by some mismanagement it gave way and both men were in imminent danger of drowning.

Constable Saraj Din, at great personal risk, descended by a small rope (which was very much worn) and succeeded in rescuing one of the men; the other was unfortunately drowned.

The Silver Medal was awarded on the 20th January, 1885, to Saraj Din.

Case 22,628. Brevet-Colonel Reginald Clare Hart, V.C. Mr. McLeod, Student. Dhan Singh, Sepoy.

On the 15th December, 1884, a gunner fell off a pontoon bridge over the Roorkee Canal, and being fully accounted, sank at once.

Colonel Hart immediately jumped in to his assistance and disappeared also (being probably dragged under by the gunner).

Mr. McLeod then followed with a life-buoy and it is believed sank also.

The sepoy Dhan Singh then went with another life-buoy to their aid, first saved one man and was probably the means of saving all.

Colonel Hart was awarded the Silver Clasp, being already in possession of the Silver Medal. Bronze Medals were awarded to the others on the 17th February, 1885.

CASE 22,640. C. J. R. Le Mesurier, District Judge, Ceylon.

The Judge while shooting at a tank or reservoir, saw a man struggling in the long weeds and apparently drowning; the man vainly attempted to free himself and eventually sank.

Mr. Le Mesurier swam to his assistance and succeeded in extricating him.

It is stated that alligators are found in these tanks; the rescue was therefore unusually hazardous.

The Silver Medal was voted to Mr. Le Mesurier on the 17th February, 1885.

Case 22,674. Sergeant Henry Brace, Royal Irish Constabulary.

At 3 p.m. on the 12th April, 1885, a child fell into the River Suir at Cahir; the current was very strong and carried the boy rapidly down stream.

Sergeant Brace on coming to the bank of the river, at once threw off his belt, plunged in, and succeeded in seizing hold of the drowning child; he swam with him to the boundary wall of the river, which at that place was eight feet high; here he was assisted out by another policeman.

Considerable risk was incurred by the salvor, as he was in delicate health at the time; he is a bad swimmer, had all his clothes on, and there was much difficulty in landing.

The Silver Medal was awarded to Sergeant Henry Brace.

# Case 22,677. Michael Smith, O. S. of H.M.S. "Duke of Wellington."

H.M.S. "Tamar" was at anchor in the Grand Harbour of Malta on the 10th March, 1885. About 7.30 p.m. a prisoner undergoing sentence by court martial, endeavoured to escape by jumping through a scuttle into the sea and swimming to shore.

Smith gallantly jumped off the forecastle (a height of 22 feet), caught hold of the man, and kept him affoat until a boat arrived.

The risk incurred appears to have been considerable, as the man had a knife in his hand and threatened to strike Smith,

The night was dark, and the affair occurred 200 yards from shore.

The Silver Medal was awarded to Michael Smith.

# Case 22,691. James Haveron.

At 11 p.m. on the 5th April, 1885, near O'Connell Bridge, Dublin, screams were heard apparently proceeding from the river.

Mr. Haveron ran to the place, and on being told that a woman had fallen into the water, at once mounted the parapet of the bridge and jumped in.

Two men unfastened a life buoy that happened to be near the

place and threw it towards him; he seized the woman and placed her in the buoy, directing those above to haul her up. By some mismanagement the woman again fell in when about ten feet from the water surface, and in doing so, struck Mr. Haveron on the head, rendering him almost unconscious; he, however, managed to support her until a boat came.

The night was very dark.

Silver Medal was awarded to Mr. Haveron.

### Case 22,701. John Crook.

About 3.30 p.m. on the 26th April, 1885, a girl of fourteen slipped down the steep bank of the River Ribble at Preston, falling from thence over the boundary wall (a height of 6 or 7 feet into the water). The tide carried the girl some distance outwards.

Crook ran to the place, threw off his coat, and jumped in; he succeeded in catching hold of her, but the girl clutched him around the neck, and he became entangled in her clothes, consequently both sank several times; he, however, eventually succeeded in rescuing her, although at great personal risk.

The salvor has been instrumental in saving 29 lives in twenty-five years, during which time he has lived on the river side.

The Silver Medal was voted to John Crook.

# Case 22,717. Samuel Dutton, aged 13.

At 8 p.m. on the 5th June, 1885, near Bolton, a young boy fell from the top of a quarry into deep water; the height was 65 feet.

Dutton, who was playing cricket in an adjoining field, hearing a cry for help, ran to the water, plunged in, and succeeded (after diving) in rescuing the boy.

The personal risk incurred in this rescue was considerable, as the salvor had to descend the steep sides of the quarry-hole, and swim out to the centre of the water, where, it appears, the lad had drifted.

Silver Medal awarded.

Case 22,721. Torrey Baz, Sepoy in Punjaub Infantry.

On the evening of the 19th of April, 1885, a native soldier went into the River Hari Rud, Afghanistan, to bathe; he was unable to swim, and was carried off his legs into deep water by the rapid current.

The salvor gallantly jumped in and succeeded at great personal risk in rescuing him.

The sepoy, Torrey Baz, formed part of the escort of the Afghan Boundary Commission, and his conduct was recommended to the notice of the Society by General Sir Peter Lumsden, K.C.B.

Silver Medal voted to Torrey Baz.

### Case 22,783. Gunner H. Sears, R.A.

On the 24th June, 1885, about 11.30 p.m., a native was seen struggling in the Bay at Aden, and apparently drowning; he was about 120 yards from shore.

Gunner Sears ran down the rocks, and throwing off a part of his clothing, plunged in to the drowning man's assistance. After swimming 40 yards or so, he took off his shirt and again proceeded, ultimately reaching the man and with difficulty bringing him to shore.

Several natives made previous attempts to swim to him, but found the sea too heavy.

The native was insensible when reached and never rallied. The attempt is said to be a plucky one as there are dangerous currents on the coast, and sharks are often seen in the same water.

Silver Medal voted.

# Case 22,794. Lieut. Frederick St. George Rich, R.N., and William Walsh of H.M.S. "Hecla."

On the 21st July, 1885, about 4 p.m., H.M.S. "Hecla" and the S.S. "Cheerful" came into collision.

The accident took place about eighteen miles north of the Longships. It was at once seen that the "Cheerful" was fast settling down, and within four minutes after the collision she sank.

Lieut. Rich jumped off the fore part of the "Hecla," swam to a drowning man and was the means of saving him.

Walsh also jumped in and saved two others.

Both officer and man ran considerable personal risk, not only from the broken wreckage, but in being drawn down in the vortex the sinking ship.

Silver Medal voted to each.

Case 22,859. Captain Edwin Short, 1st Leinster Regiment.

About 6 p.m. on the 21st January, 1885, Captain Short was steering a Nile boat down a rapid, when she struck a rock with such force as to cause one of her crew to fall overboard.

The boat was wedged so firmly on the rock that the efforts of the crew were unavailing to release her. It soon became evident that if the boat was not got off before dark it would break up and all hands would be drowned. The only means of saving the boat was to get a rope made fast to a belt of rock in midstream, but to swim direct to this place was impossible.

Captain Short then conceived the idea of swimming down the rapid, coming up the backwater and thereby gaining a footing on the rock.

The danger of being drowned in the attempt was very great, but it was successfully accomplished by Captain Short, and a rope being then thrown from the boat he was enabled to make it fast. By this means four soldiers got a footing on shore and pulled the boat off.

The Silver Medal was voted to the salvor.

## Case 22,918. Edward Skillicorn.

About 11 p.m. on the 10th August, 1885, the S.S. Tynwold arrived at Ramsay, Isle of Man. When the passengers were leaving the ship one of them fell into the harbour.

Skillicorn, who had his heavy waterproof and sea boots on, jumped in and swam after the passenger, who was then being carried out by a strong ebb tide; he succeeded in bringing him to the ship.

A strong westerly gale was blowing, and the night was very dark.

Silver Medal was voted to the salvor.

## CASE 22,938. Joseph White, Coastguard.

On the 11th October, 1885, at Ryhope, Seaham, six children when playing on the sands had their retreat cut off by the tide and took refuge in a cave at the bottom of the cliffs. On their situation becoming known to the salvor he obtained some small lines, twisted them together, and descended by them to the beach (a height of seventy feet). He found the children in a most exhausted state, the youngest having been washed twice out of the cave and back again.

The man took off his clothing and by means of the line managed to send five of the children in succession to the top of the cliff, the youngest being in such an exhausted state that the salvor was compelled to wade 300 yards through the surf with the child in his arms until he discovered a place where he was able to ascend.

The Silver Medal was unanimously awarded to White.



# IF FROM DROWNING, SUFFOCATION, OR NARCOTIC POISONING.

Send for Medical Assistance, Blankets, and Dry Clothing, but proceed to treat the patient INSTANTLY.

The points to be aimed at are—first, and immediately, the RESTORATION OF BREATHING; and secondly, after breathing is restored, the PROMOTION OF WARMTH AND CIRCULATION.

The efforts to restore life must be persevered in until the arrival of Medical Assistance, or until the pulse and breathing have ceased for an hour.

## Dr. H. R. Silvester's Method of Restoring Natural Breathing.

Rule 1.—To adjust the Patient's Position.—Place the Patient on his back on a flat surface, inclined a little from the feet upwards; raise and support the head and shoulders on a small firm cushion or folded article of dress placed under the shoulder-blades. Remove all tight clothing from about the neck and chest.

Rule 2.—To maintain a Free Entrance of Air into the Windpipe.—Cleanse the mouth and nostrils; open the mouth; draw forward the Patient's tongue, and keep it forward: an elastic band over the tongue and under the chin will answer this purpose.


Rule 3 .- To imitate the Movements of Breathing.


First.—Induce Inspiration.—Place yourself at the head of the Patient, grasp his arms, raise them upwards by the sides of his head, stretch them steadily but gently upwards, for two seconds.

[By this means fresh air is drawn into the lungs by raising the Ribs.—See Engraving I.—INSPIRATION.]

Secondly.—Induce Expiration.—Immediately turn down the Patient's arms, and press them firmly but gently downwards against the sides of his chest, for two seconds.

[By this means foul air is expelled from the lungs by depressing the Ribs.—See Engraving II.— Expiration.]





To illustrate the position of the Body during the employment of Dr. H. R. Silvester's Method of Inducing Respiration.

Thirdly.—Continue these Movements.—Repeat these measures alternately, deliberately, and perseveringly fifteen times in a minute, until a spontaneous effort to respire be perceived.

[By this means an exchange of air is produced in the lungs similar to that effected by natural respiration.]

When a spontaneous effort to respire is perceived cease to Imitate the Movements of Breathing, and proceed to Induce Circulation and Warmth (as below).

Rule 4.—To excite Respiration.—During the employment of the above method excite the nostrils with snuff or smelling-salts, or tickle the throat with a feather. Rub the chest and face briskly, and dash cold and hot water alternately on them. Friction of the limbs and body with dry flannel or cloths should be had recourse to. When there is proof of returning respiration, the individual may be placed in a warm bath, the movements of the arms above described being continued until respiration is fully restored. Raise the body in twenty seconds to a sitting position, dash cold water against the chest and face, and pass ammonia under the nose. Should a galvanic apparatus be at hand, apply the sponges to the region of the diaphragm and heart.

## Treatment after Natural Breathing has been restored.

To induce Circulation and Warmth.—Wrap the Patient in dry blankets, and rub the limbs upwards energetically. Promote the warmth of the body by hot flannels, bottles or bladders of hot water, heated bricks, to the pit of the stomach, the armpits, and to the soles of the feet.

On the restoration of life, when the power of swallowing has returned, a teaspoonful of warm water, small quantities of wine, warm brandy and water, or coffee should be given. The Patient should be kept in bed, and a disposition to sleep encouraged. During reaction large mustard plasters to the chest and below the shoulders will greatly relieve the distressed breathing.

Note.—In all cases of prolonged immersion in cold water, when the breathing continues, a warm bath should be employed to restore the temperature.

#### IF FROM INTENSE COLD.

Rub the body with snow, ice, or cold water. Restore warmth by slow degrees. It is highly dangerous to apply heat too early.

#### IF FROM INTOXICATION.

Lay the individual on his side on a bed with his head raised. The Patient should be induced to vomit. Stimulants should be avoided.

### IF FROM APOPLEXY OR FROM SUN-STROKE.

Cold should be applied to the head, which should be kept well raised. Clothing removed from the neck and chest. Stimulants avoided.

#### APPEARANCES WHICH GENERALLY INDICATE DEATH.

There is no breathing nor heart's action; the eyelids are generally half-closed; the pupils dilated; the jaws clenched; the fingers semi-contracted; the tongue appearing between the teeth, and the mouth and nostrils are covered with a frothy mucus. Coldness and pallor of surface increases.

The treatment recommended by the Society is to be persevered in for three or four hours. It is an erroneous opinion that persons are irrecoverable because life does not soon make its appearance; as cases have come under the notice of the Society of a successful result even after five hours' perseverance—and it is absurd to suppose that a body must not be meddled with or removed without permission of a Coroner.

## RULES AND ORDERS

OF

### THE ROYAL HUMANE SOCIETY.

I. That this Society do consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Governors, Chaplain, Medical Assistants, and Secretary.

II. That a Subscription of *One Guinea* annually constitutes a Governor, and a Donation of *Ten Guineas* a Life Governor.

The Executor of any person paying a Legacy of Fifty Pounds to be a Life Governor.

Governors have the privilege of attending all General Courts.

III. That a General Court be held on the Second Tuesday in January in each year; Five Governors shall form a Quorum. That an Extraordinary General Court may be called either by the Treasurer, or by a requisition in writing of Ten Governors, addressed to the Secretary. General Courts, or Extraordinary General Courts, shall have authority to make, amend, or alter the Rules and Orders of the Society, not less than seven days' notice being given in writing, and signed by five Governors, of the proposed alterations.

IV. That the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Chaplain, be elected at the General Court in January; or, in case of emergency, at an Extraordinary General Court convened for the purpose; but, in the event of a vacancy occurring in the List of the Officers of the Society, whether Honorary or otherwise (except the President and Vice-Presidents), from death or other causes, the Committee in such case shall be authorised to fill up the vacancy, subject to the approval of the then next General Court.

V. That a Committee shall be chosen at the Annual Court in January, to consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Chaplain, and not less than Thirty Governors; Three of whom may act as a Quorum. The Treasurer shall be ex officio the Chairman of such Committee, or, in his absence, the Chairman shall be chosen by the Meeting. That the Committee meet on the Third Tuesday in each month, or oftener if occasion shall require.

VI. The election of the Secretary shall be vested in the Committee, and he shall be subject to annual reelection at the General Court in January. In the event of a vacancy occurring in the office of Secretary not less than fourteen days' notice of the vacancy shall be given by advertisement in two daily papers prior to the election of the new Secretary.

VII. That the Committee shall define the duties of the Secretary and other officers and servants of the Society, and shall have power to suspend any Officer or Servant till the next General Court, and to make arrangements for the discharge of his duty in the mean time.

VIII That Three Auditors be elected at the General Court in January, who shall meet and audit the Accounts for the current year; that the Accounts be signed by Two,

at least, of the Auditors, and submitted to the General Court.

IX. That gentlemen desirous of becoming Medical Assistants shall be elected by the Committee.

X. The Medals and other Rewards given by the Society shall be awarded by the Committee, with the exception of the "Stanhope Gold Medal," which shall be awarded by the General Court.

XI. That pecuniary Rewards be paid only in cases which occur within thirty miles of the Metropolis; with liberty to the Committee to give rewards in particular cases beyond those limits.

XII. That a sum not exceeding Two Pounds be given to any *Publican* or other Person who shall without delay admit into his house the body of any Individual apparently Drowned or Dead, with a view to its recovery, send instantly for medical assistance, and furnish the necessary accommodations.

XIII. That three members of the Committee be elected at a General Court in January, to be joined with the *Treasurer*, as Trustees for Stock and Funded Property.

XIV. That proceedings on business of importance transacted at the different Meetings, together with Cases, Subscriptions, or whatever may be for the information of the Public or the advantage of the Society, be from time to time published at the discretion of the Committee.

XV. That if a *Debate* arise at a General Court or Committee, such question shall be determined by the holding up of hands, unless a Ballot be demanded by five Governors: in case of an equality of Votes, the Chairman shall have the casting Vote.

XVI. That all persons resident within five miles of London who claim the rewards offered by this Society, shall produce their Testimonials to the Secretary within one month, signed by two respectable Householders, acquainted with the circumstances of the case, and the Medical Assistant, if any attended, or by the Minister of the Parish; but if the distance be considerable from the Metropolis, two months shall be allowed, though as early an application as possible is, in all cases, expected.

XVII. That all Incumbents who grant their pulpits for a Sermon in aid of the Funds of the ROYAL HUMANE SOCIETY, shall be elected LIFE GOVERNORS.

XVIII. That all cheques on the Bankers be signed by the Treasurer and two other members of the Committee, and countersigned by the Secretary. That no payments be made except by order of the Committee, and recorded by the Secretary on the minutes.

# STANDING INSTRUCTIONS TO BE OBSERVED DURING THE SKATING AND BATHING SEASONS.

#### 1. SKATING.

The officer appointed by the Office of Works will determine when the ice on the Park Waters is safe for Skaters, and will take all proper means to prevent persons venturing upon it before that time.

When permission has been given for Skating, the Icemen of the Society will be stationed on the ice at places indicated by the Superintendent, so as to afford immediate assistance in the event of an accident.

Each Iceman will wear a distinctive badge with his number thereon.

The Icemen appointed by the Society will muster at the

Receiving House in Hyde Park at 7 a.m.

Icemen are not to assist in putting on or taking off skates, nor to smoke when on duty, nor to allow any one to do so in the Society's Iron Huts.

The Icemen are strictly prohibited to receive any gratuities

for services rendered.

Icemen who are reported as having displayed unusual skill and courage in the discharge of their duties will be rewarded by the Committee of the Society according to the merits of the case.

Icemen found intoxicated or accepting liquor from the public whilst on duty will be instantly dismissed.

#### 2. Bathing.

Boats with proper Boatmen, supplied with drags, &c., will be in attendance on the Serpentine during the Bathing Season. The Superintendent is to see that all the men appointed strictly attend to their duties, and afford every possible assistance when their services are required.

#### 3. General Instructions.

In cases of immersion the body should be at once carried to the Receiving House, when, if required, the nearest medical gentleman will be instantly sent for by the Society's attendant. It is important that persons do not crowd to the spot, the men provided being amply sufficient to do all that is necessary.

## APPENDIX.

## ROYAL HUMANE SOCIETY.

#### IMPORTANT TO BATHERS.

Avoid bathing within Two hours after a meal.

Avoid bathing when exhausted by fatigue or from any other cause.

Avoid bathing when the body is cooling after perspiration.

Avoid bathing altogether in the open air, if, after having been a short time in the water, it causes a sense of chilliness with numbness of the hands and feet.

Bathe when the body is warm, provided no time is lost in getting into the water.

Avoid chilling the body by sitting or standing UNDRESSED on the banks or in boats after having been in the water.

Avoid remaining too long in the water—leave the water immediately there is the slightest feeling of chilliness.

The vigorous and strong may bathe early in the morning on an empty stomach.


The young, and those who are weak, had better bathe two or three hours after a meal—the best time for such is from two to three hours after breakfast.

Those who are subject to attacks of giddiness or faintness, and those who suffer from palpitation and other sense of discomfort at the heart, should not bathe without first consulting their Medical Adviser.

#### THE FRICTION STILL.

An Invention for rendering Sea Water Drinkable.

Invented and Patented by LIONEL PEARCE, Coalbournbrook, Stourbridge, Worcestershire.

The sufferings endured by seamen who from shipwreck and other causes have been left in boats without a supply of water, are often brought under the notice of this Society, therefore it may not be deemed inappropriate in the cause of humanity to notice Mr. Pearce's invention, of which the following is a description.

This is an invention for converting sea water into fresh, by means of a machine so simply constructed, that to pour in sea water, and to turn a handle, are all that are necessary in order to obtain a supply of pure drinkable water.

The mode of working is as follows :-

The "STILL" which is firmly fixed to the after thwart (or seat) of the boat, is supplied at intervals with sea water, poured through an opening at the top into a metal tube, which con-

stitutes the boiler. The handle attached revolves a wheel inside, which rubs against the tube (or boiler). The friction thus produced generates sufficient heat to cause the water to boil in less than a minute. The steam, which is of course free from salt, becomes condensed in a dome-shaped vessel or vessels, from which it runs out through a spout, a small but continuous stream of drinkable water. Provision is made for draining off the nonvaporised water, together with the salt left by the vaporised portion. The mechanism of a "FRICTION STILL" is contained in a strong case, in size about equal to a quartern loaf, and as all the apertures are sealed until required for use, no damage can be done by exposure to the weather. No more skill or experience is required for working the "STILL" than is necessary for working a coffee mill, which in fact it somewhat resembles. By constant work about sixteen pints of fresh water can be produced daily, though this amount may be considerably increased if the handle is turned by two persons instead of one.

The advantages of this invention to our seafaring population are obvious. Large vessels can, of course, carry their own water supply, and their costly condensers, but to ships'-boats, fishing smacks, and other small craft, where fire is not available, the "FRICTION STILL" will be invaluable, and when its adoption becomes general, the horrors of thirst—often leading to such tragic results, as in the case of the crew of the "Mignonette,"—will be unknown. It is to be hoped, therefore, that all who are interested in the welfare of sailors, will use their influence in urging the speedy and universal adoption of the "FRICTION STILL."

#### RISE AND PROGRESS

OF

## The Royal Humane Society.

#### Instituted 1774.

THE ART OF RESUSCITATING THE APPARENTLY DEAD does not appear to have been known to the ancients.

Some instances of recovery from Drowning and Hanging, mentioned in the notes to 'Derham's Physico-Theology,' are the first on record. These cases happened at Tronningholm and at Oxford, about the year 1650; and the means used for the recovery of the persons in question were similar to those recommended by The ROYAL HUMANE SOCIETY. It does not seem, however, that these instances excited any public interest, or that any serious investigation of the subject of Suspended Animation took place till about the middle of last century. At this period the penetrating genius of Dr. J. Fothergill, which had already in other branches of his profession developed new and important modes of treating disease, led him to perceive "the fallacy and dubiousness of the received criteria of dissolution;" and in a paper which he addressed to the Royal Society, he maintained, as the result of his inquiries, "the possibility of saving many lives without risking anything." To us it must appear extraordinary that this publication excited little interest and attention among the medical philosophers of his time. He had, however, propounded a most important theory, although the glory of putting it to the test of experiment was reserved for a later period. This was first attempted by M. Reaumer, \* an ingenious foreigner: that gentleman having succeeded in several attempts at resuscitation in Switzerland in the year 1767, transmitted reports of his cases to the Academy of Sciences at Paris. Soon after this period, in the same year, a Society for the Recovery of the Apparently Drowned was instituted at Amsterdam. and, as if by a simultaneous movement, several similar associations were formed in different parts of Europe. The Memoirs of the Dutch Society were translated into English, in 1773, by Dr. Cogan, for the purpose of

convincing the people of this country of the practicability of resuscitating the apparently drowned. His work fell into the hands of the late Dr. Hawes (M.D.), to whose ardent and indefatigable mind it opened a career of public usefulness, which he pursued until his death. Finding that a strong and general prejudice existed against the practicability of Resuscitation, and that the idea was even ridiculed as hopeless and chimerical, he determined to demonstrate it. With this view he publicly offered rewards to persons who, between London and Westminster Bridges, should, within a certain period from the occurrence of an accident, rescue the bodies of drowned persons, and bring them to places appointed on shore for their reception, in order that the means of resuscitation might be tried. At these places he and his friends restored several lives. During a whole year Dr. Hawes continued to pay these rewards himself. At the end of this period Dr. Cogan represented to him the injury his private fortune must sustain by such continued expenses, and kindly offered to unite with him for the formation of the HUMANE SOCIETY, which at first consisted of thirty-two individuals, their respective private friends.\* Until the end of Dr. Hawes's life, the Institution continued to receive his unremitting attention and vigilant care. To the persevering exertions of this gentleman, and especially to his disinterested early efforts, the English nation is indebted for the formation of a Society which, whether we reflect on its purposes or success, does honour to our country, and exhibits most impressively the power of a single mind to accomplish objects of the most benign character and extensive utility.



## IMPORTANT TO BATHERS.

Avoid bathing within two hours after a meal.

Avoid bathing when exhausted by fatigue or from any other cause.

Avoid bathing when the body is cooling after perspira-

Avoid bathing altogether in the open air, if, after having been a short time in the water, it causes a sense of chilliness with numbness of the hands and feet.

Bathe when the body is warm, provided no time is lost in getting into the water.

Avoid chilling the body by sitting or standing UNDRESSED on the banks or in boats after having been in the water.

Avoid remaining too long in the water—leave the water immediately there is the slightest feeling of chilliness.

The vigorous and strong may bathe early in the morning on an empty stomach.

The young, and those who are weak, had better bathe two or three hours after a meal—the best time for such is from two to three hours after breakfast.

Those who are subject to attacks of giddiness or faintness, and those who suffer from palpitation and other sense of discomfort at the heart, should not bathe without first consulting their Medical Adviser.

If the above Rules were more generally known and attended to, many fatalities might be avoided during the bathing season.

In addition to the above the Institution has established a Prize Silver Medallion, to be given at certain Schools, for the Encouragement of Proficiency in Swimming Exercises with reference to Saving Life from Drowning.

## IMPORTANT TO BATHERS.

Avoid bathing within two hours after a meal.

Avoid bathing when exhausted by fatigue or from any other cause.

Avoid bathing when the body is cooling after perspiration.

Avoid bathing altogether in the open air, if, after having been a short time in the water, it causes a sense of chilliness with numbness of the hands and feet.

Bathe when the body is warm, provided no time is lost in getting into the water.

Avoid chilling the body by sitting or standing UNDRESSED on the banks or in boats after having been in the water.

Avoid remaining too long in the water—leave the water immediately there is the slightest feeling of chilliness.

The vigorous and strong may bathe early in the morning on an empty stomach.

The young, and those who are weak, had better bathe two or three hours after a meal—the best time for such is from two to three hours after breakfast.

Those who are subject to attacks of giddiness or faintness, and those who suffer from palpitation and other sense of discomfort at the heart, should not bathe without first consulting their Medical Adviser.

If the above Rules were more generally known and attended to, many fatalities might be avoided during the bathing season.
