Gentlemen,

I beg to submit my Annual Report for the year 1939.

The Caistor Sanitary District consists of 40 parishes and covers an area of 119,992 acres. It is entirely agricultural. The estimated population for the year 1939 was 12,060 for calculation of birth rate and 12,290 for calculation of death rate. The number of inhabited houses was 3,695, and the number of families or separate occupiers was 3,708.

The rateable value of the District on the 1st April, 1939, was £26,496, with an estimated produce of a ponny rate of £119.






