Mr. Mayor, Lady and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year 1965 in accordance with Regulation 15(5) of the Public Health Officers Regulations, 1959, and Ministry of Health Circular 1/66 dated 11th. January, 1966.

Copies of the report are required by the Ministry of Health, Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries & Food, the Ministry of Housing & Local Government and H.M. Inspector of Factories; a copy is also sent to the County Medical Officer of Health.

The health of the population has been satisfactory during the year under review; apart from an outbreak of Measles, there was little notifiable infectious disease.

The birth rate shows some increase compared to the previous year (18.5 - 16.4); the death rate remaining practically the same (10.9 - 10.0).

The infant mortality rate shows a welcome reduction (12.6 - 16.6).

The high standards of health enjoyed nowadays by the public and the comparative freedom from the more serious infections are the direct result of the careful and unremitting inspections and supervisions by the Public Health Department.

The Minister of Health has given his approval to the making of arrangements for the addition of fluorine to the public water supplies which are deficient in it naturally, to the level appropriate for the prevention of dental decay.

In the Minister's view, fluoridation is now an established well proven public health measure, which confers benefits to dental health greatly exceeding the cost of introducing it. He is convinced that it is completely safe.

Drinking water which has had its fluorine content raised to 1 p.p.m. has the same beneficial effect on teeth as water in which the same proportion of fluorine is present naturally. The effect of fluoridation has been extensively investigated throughout the world. Every allegation of harm has been thoroughly and carefully investigated, but no harmful effects from a level of 1 p.p.m. have been demonstrated whether one is old, young, healthy or sick.

Fluoridation will have little or no effect on the teeth of those who are already adult, when it is introduced. Children will benefit broadly according to the age at which they first regularly begin to consume fluoridated water.

I am indebted to Mr. C.R. Phillips, Engineer, North Wilts. Water Board for the following detail of the natural fluoride content of water supplied in the Board's area.

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year  
1965.

The year has reflected the continued expansion of the  
Borough and it was necessary to increase the staff of the Refuse  
Collection Service.

Steps have been taken by the Council to enlarge the  
Sewage Disposal Works and the Council's Consulting Engineers were  
instructed to prepare a scheme for presentation to the Minister of  
Housing and Local Government.

Positive action was also taken to eliminate the septic tanks  
serving houses in the Lickhill Area. A scheme is being prepared to  
provide a small pumping station because the area cannot be drained  
by gravitation into the Council's Sewers.

It is satisfactory to report that a scheme for securing  
100% meat inspection is in operation at the Private Slaughterhouse  
and at the Slaughterhouse of Messrs. C. & T. Harris (Calne) Limited.

I am indebted to the members of the Public Health Committee,  
Dr. Broomhead, Medical Officer of Health, Mr. Cowley, Deputy Public  
Health Inspector and other members of the staff for their continued  
support.

The total rainfall for the year was 25.992 inches.

The wettest day was August 3rd.

The driest month was February and the wettest month was December.

WATER.

The water undertaking is operated by the North Wilts Water Board.

Samples of "consumer water" i.e. treated water from household taps, are submitted to the Public Health Laboratory, Bath each week.

During the year under review 55 samples of Chlorinated water were submitted and 51 of these proved to be satisfactory. The unsatisfactory samples showed insufficient chlorination of the water following emergency repairs to the main. A series of check samples quickly showed that the required dosage had been restored to the water supply.

From time to time tests are also taken to establish the degree of residual chlorine present in the water.

SEWAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

It is estimated that the percentage of all inhabited houses in the Borough not connected to the sewer is less than 2%, and this is due to insufficient fall and isolation.

It is hoped to reduce this percentage still further by sewerage the extreme Northern part of the Borough with the aid of a Pumping Station.

The Council's Consulting Engineers have now reported on the scheme to enlarge the existing Sewage Disposal Works to cope with development which has taken place within the Borough, and proposed development.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

The Council operates a weekly collection of household refuse using direct labour. Salvage is collected each Monday. The service continues to operate satisfactorily despite the increased demands consequent upon a growing population. This has necessitated an increase of the collection staff.

The refuse from the Borough is disposed of by the Sanitary Landfill Method, the refuse being dumped in the sand workings of a local Company and covered with top soil to reclaim the land which has been exposed.

SALE OF COUNCIL HOUSES.

Six Council houses were sold to tenants during the year making a total of 68 to 31st December, 1965.

COUNCIL'S WAITING LIST.

The number of people on the Council's waiting list at the 31st December, 1965 was 240.

IMPROVED COUNCIL HOUSE.

During August a pre-war Council owned house in Abberd Way was modernised and opened for inspection to the public, with a view to demonstrating what could be done to improve older property with the aid of an Improvement Grant.

This venture attracted considerable interest, and members of the staff were on duty each day and during the weekend to answer queries from members of the public.

PROPERTIES IN CLEARANCE AREAS.

Twenty one properties in Curzon Street and four properties in The Pippin were surveyed during the year and scheduled for action under the Housing Acts.

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RODENT CONTROL . SEE PAGE.6.THE SLAUGHTER OF PIGS ANAESTHESIA REGULATIONS, 1958.

Messrs. C. & T. Harris (Calno) Limited continue to slaughter pigs using the CO<sup>2</sup> chamber method. This is licensed by the Borough Council and a Certificate of approval under Regulations 9, is in force. The Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries & Food are informed that the apparatus is in use.

THE DISEASES OF ANIMALS (WASTE FOOD) ORDER 1957.

The Borough Council exercises powers of delegation under the above Order and four boiling plants are licensed and inspected.



RODENT CONTROL. PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

The Council employ a part-time rodent operator to treat all premises in the Borough where rats or mice are reported. Extensive use is made of Warfarin, one of the better anti-coagulants, to destroy rats and mice, but acute poisons such as zinc phosphide and arsenious oxide are also used in conjunction with various baits, in an effort to avoid an immunity being built up against the Warfarin.

Hydrogen cyanide has also been used effectively, under proper weather conditions, in the treatment of the refuse tip and river banks.

The sewer network within the Borough is treated twice per year and no serious infestation is apparent.

It has not been necessary to take legal proceedings against any owner or occupier, under the Act, and the sum of £22. 17. 10 has been received for work carried out at business or industrial premises.

MEAT INSPECTION REGULATIONS 1963.STATUTORY INSTRUMENTS 1963/1229.INSPECTION OF MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

The Borough Council has now achieved a 100% Meat Inspection service within its area, by appointing a further two Authorised Meat Inspectors to work in the slaughterhouse of Messrs. C. & T. Harris (Calne) Ltd., with the part-time Veterinary Officer. The Veterinary Officer will become a full-time Officer on the 1st April, 1966.

The other slaughterhouse, that of Messrs. L. & O. Hawkins, serves Local butchers and the butchers of several adjoining areas as well as supplying meat for Smithfield Meat Market, London. The Meat Inspection at this establishment is carried out by qualified Meat Inspectors holding the Certificate for Inspection of Meat and Other Foods of the Royal Society of Health.

The amount of money recovered for the inspection service at Messrs. Hawkins in the year under review was £351. 14. 9.

An agreement has been reached with Messrs. C. & T. Harris (Calne) Limited to reimburse the Borough Council for the salaries of the Officers engaged and this is designed to cover the interim period until the scheme becomes fully operative.

THE MILK (SPECIAL DESIGNATIONS) REGULATIONS 1960 and 1963.

Licenses were issued for various designated milk to four dealers by the Borough Council under the Delegation Agreement with the Wiltshire County Council.

It is interesting to note that after 31st December, 1965 every dealer's licence granted will continue in force for a period of five years.

In addition 5 sets of bottle rinses were submitted for bacterial examination and all gave satisfactory results.

10 samples of Tuberculin Tested milk were submitted for biological examination during the year, and all were found to be free from Tuberculosis. One sample, however, was found to be positive on ring test for Brucella Abortus and the details were passed to the Milk Officer of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries & Food.



ICE CREAM.

19 premises within the Borough are registered for the storage and sale of Ice Cream. In addition three mobile shops tour the area regularly. 71 samples of Ice Cream and two ice lollies were purchased and sent for analysis to the Public Health Laboratory at Bath, during the year.

The results indicate that 69 ice creams and 1 ice lolly were Grade I, 2 ice creams were Grade II and one lolly was suspect.

THE FOOD HYGIENE (GENERAL) REGULATIONS 1960.

Regular inspections are made of all food premises within the Borough under the provisions of the above Regulations. In the main the premises are found to be quite sound structurally, as a result of previous visits. Minor infringements are found from time to time and these have been dealt with very satisfactorily through a policy of informal action and instruction so that it has not been necessary to take legal proceedings against any food trader during the year.
