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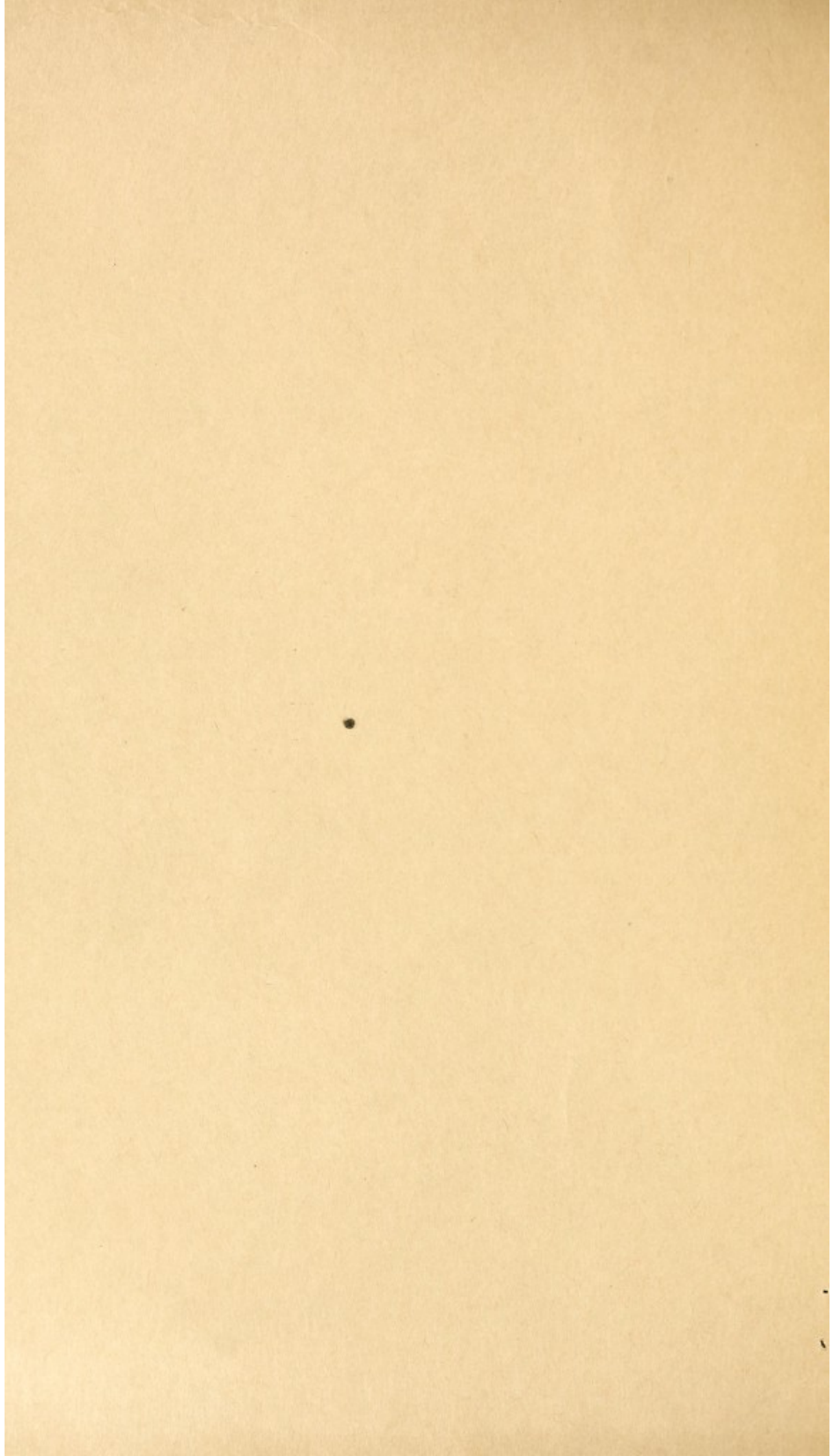

Notifiable diseases are those conditions defined in the appropriate sections of Public Health Legislation, and the number is limited.





## PREVALENCE AND CONTROL OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE (CONTINUED)

At present, some notifiable diseases are largely of historic value and are of little public health importance nowadays. Notification serves two main purposes, it is of epidemiological and statistical value to the Ministry of Health and Major Authorities and is of immediate importance in the control of infectious disease among the local community. Early notification is essential if control measures are to be effective.

A total of eighteen confirmed cases of dysentery were investigated during the year. These cases were distributed among eight families. No common epidemiological factor came to light. Control measures included the exclusion of school children and food handlers until found to be bacteriologically free from infection.

The more serious infections, e.g. Smallpox, Diphtheria, Typhoid Fever and Poliomyelitis were conspicuous by their absence.

### TUBERCULOSIS

During the year under review, no new cases of tuberculosis were notified, and there were no deaths due to this disease. Apart from new cases which may be notified from year to year, a certain proportion of tuberculous persons either move into the Borough or move out. According to the Register of Tuberculous Persons, the following notified and confirmed cases were living in the Borough at the end of 1966.

There were 26 cases on the Register at the end of 1965.

### PREVENTION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASE - IMMUNISATION & VACCINATION.

Under Section 26 of the National Health Service Act, 1948 provision for vaccination against Smallpox, Diphtheria and such other diseases as the Minister may approve, is the responsibility of the County Council Health Committee. Immunisation against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus is available from one's family doctor and from County Council Child Welfare Immunisation Clinics. Triple antigen is now universally used and a course of injections with vaccine protects against all these diseases. With older children, vaccine immunising against Diphtheria and Tetanus, or Tetanus alone is available. Polio vaccination, using Sabin oral vaccine is offered at Clinics and by General Practitioners. Smallpox vaccination is carried out by the General Practitioners at their patient's request.

LOCAL HEALTH AUTHORITY SERVICES.

The County Council Health Committee provide the following Health Services:-

1. The care of expectant and nursing mothers and young children.
2. Provision of midwives and maternity nurses,
3. Provision of Health Visitors. A new development is the arrangement whereby Health Visitors will work in closer liaison with General Practitioners.
4. Home Nurses.

5. Arrangements for vaccination and immunisation.
6. Ambulances.
7. Mental Health Services.
8. Home Helps. Such help is available if members of a household are ill, lying-in, suffering from mental illness or aged. A charge is made for such services.
9. Arrangements for the prevention of illness, care and after-care.
10. Health Education.

## SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES.

School Health Services are provided by the County Education Committee. In addition to the routine inspection of children of certain age groups in Schools, a variety of facilities are provided with the aim of finding, assessing and treating physical and mental handicaps, so helping the child to make the best use of education.

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year, 1966.

With the continued expansion of the Borough positive steps have been taken to plan the Public Health services to keep in step with the development. To this end discussions have taken place with neighbouring Authorities culminating in the establishment of a new Disinfection Plant at Chippenham and agreement in principle to share the cost of building and operating a new Refuse Destruction Plant.

Schemes for dealing with sewage problems in the Lickhill area and the enlargement of the Sewage Disposal Works are well in hand.

In the sphere of Housing the Borough Council declared a Clearance Area in Curzon Street and steps are being taken to acquire the houses and land.

The scheme for securing a 100% meat inspection in the slaughterhouses within the Borough is operating well.

I am indebted to the members of the Public Health Committee, Dr. Broomhead, The Medical Officer of Health, Mr. Cowley, Deputy Public Health Inspector and other members of the staff for their support throughout the year.

The total rainfall for the year was 30.472 inches.

The wettest days were August 28th and 29th both being 2.0.

The driest month was March and the wettest month was August.

## WATER.

The water undertaking is operated by the North Wilts Water Board.

Samples of "consumer water" i.e. treated water from household taps, are submitted to the Public Health Laboratory, Bath each week.

During the year under review 51 samples of Chlorinated water submitted and 50 of these proved to be satisfactory. The unsatisfactory sample showed insufficient chlorination of the water following repairs to the main. A series of check samples quickly showed that the required dosage had been restored to the water supply. Information on unsatisfactory samples is referred immediately to the North Wilts Water Board for action.

From time to time tests are also taken to establish the degree of residual chlorine present in the water.

## WATER SUPPLY. INFORMATION REQUIRED BY CIRCULAR 1/67.

- (a) The water supply has been generally satisfactory.
- (b) No Bacteriological samples of raw water have been taken.
- (c) The water supply is not plumbo solvent.
- (d) Where contamination of piped water is detected as a result of routine sampling the North Wilts Water Board are informed immediately.





SEWAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

It is estimated that the percentage of all inhabited houses in the Borough not connected to the sewer is less than 2% and this is due to insufficient fall and isolation.

It is hoped to reduce this percentage still further by sewerage the extreme Northern part of the Borough with the aid of a pumping station and a scheme has been prepared.

The Council's Consulting Engineers are preparing a scheme to enlarge the existing Sewage Disposal Works to cope with development which has taken place within the Borough, and proposed development.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

The Council operates a weekly collection of household refuse using direct labour. Salvage is collected each Monday. The service continues to operate satisfactorily despite the increased demands consequent upon a growing population. This has necessitated an increase of the collection staff and a new refuse vehicle has also been added.

The refuse from the Borough is disposed of by the Sanitary Landfill Method, the refuse being dumped in the sand workings of a Local Company and covered with top soil to reclaim the land which has been exposed.

SALE OF COUNCIL HOUSES.

Council houses are no longer being sold to the tenants.

COUNCIL'S WAITING LIST.

The number of people on the Council's waiting list at the 31st December, 1966 was 240 (Approximately).

IMPROVED COUNCIL HOUSES.

The work on the improvement of 25 Council houses was commenced during the year.

PROPERTIES IN CLEARANCE AREAS.

The Borough Council declared a Clearance Area in Curzon Street and steps are being taken to acquire the houses, buildings and land.





RODENT CONTROL. PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

The Council employ a part-time rodent operator to treat all premises in the Borough where rats or mice are reported. Extensive use is made of Warfarin, one of the better anti-coagulants, to destroy rats and mice, but acute poisons such as zinc-phosphide and arsenious oxide are also used in conjunction with various baits, in an effort to avoid an immunity being built up against Warfarin.

Hydrogen cyanide has also been used effectively, under proper weather conditions, in the treatment of the refuse tip and river banks.

The sewer network within the Borough was treated twice during the year and no serious infestation is apparent.

It has not been necessary to take legal proceedings against any owner or occupier, under the Act.

THE SLAUGHTER OF PIGS (ANAESTHESIA) REGULATIONS, 1958.

Messrs. C. & T. Harris (Calne) Limited continue to slaughter pigs using the CO<sub>2</sub> chamber method. This is licensed by the Borough Council and a Certificate of approval under Regulations 9, is in force. The Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food are informed that the apparatus is in use.

THE DISEASES OF ANIMALS (WASTE FOOD) ORDER 1957.

The Borough Council exercise powers of delegation under the above Order and four boiling plants are licensed and inspected.

MEAT INSPECTION REGULATIONS 1963.STATUTORY INSTRUMENTS 1963/1229.INSPECTION OF MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

The Borough Council continues to provide a 100% meat inspection service at the two slaughterhouses within the Borough. At the slaughterhouse of Messrs. C. & T. Harris (Calne) Limited the full time inspectorate consists of a Veterinary Officer and five Authorised Meat Inspectors.

During the year 179,656 pigs were slaughtered and examined at this factory.

At the other slaughterhouse, that of Messrs. L. & O. Hawkins, the inspection is carried out by the Council's two Public Health Inspectors, this duty being largely carried out after normal working hours. This slaughterhouse caters mainly for the slaughter of animals destined for sale at the Central Markets, Smithfield, London, but also serves the requirements of butchers in the Borough and the surrounding areas.

The amount of money recovered from Messrs. Hawkins for inspection services provided throughout the year 1966 was £422. 8. 9.

THE MILK (SPECIAL DESIGNATIONS) REGULATIONS 1960 and 1963.

Licences were issued for various designated milks to four dealers by the Borough Council under the Delegation Agreement with the Wiltshire County Council.

Since 31st December, 1965 dealer's licences granted will continue in force for a period of five years.

Regular sampling was carried out by Officers of the Authority and the following table indicates the range and frequency of the sampling.

In addition 5 sets of bottle rinses were submitted for bacterial examination and all gave satisfactory results.

16 samples of untreated milk were submitted for biological examination during the year, and all were found to be free from Tuberculosis. Two samples, however, were found to be positive on ring test for Brucella Abortus and the details were passed to the Milk Officer of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food for investigation at the farm concerned.



ICE CREAM.

19 premises within the Borough are registered for the storage, and sale of ice cream. In addition three mobile shops tour the area regularly. 86 samples of ice cream were purchased and sent for analysis to the Public Health Laboratory at Bath, during the year.

The results indicate that 84 ice creams were Grade I, and 1 ice cream was Grade II. One sample was declared void owing to the breakage of the glass container.

THE FOOD HYGIENE (GENERAL) REGULATIONS 1960.

Regular inspections are made of all food premises within the Borough under the provisions of the above Regulations. In the main the premises are found to be quite sound structurally, as a result of previous visits. Minor infringements are found from time to time and these have been dealt with very satisfactorily through a policy of informal action and instruction so that it has not been necessary to take legal proceedings against any food trader during the year. The staffs of Wiltshire County Council School kitchens were visited before each term and given a 'pep talk' on food handling.
