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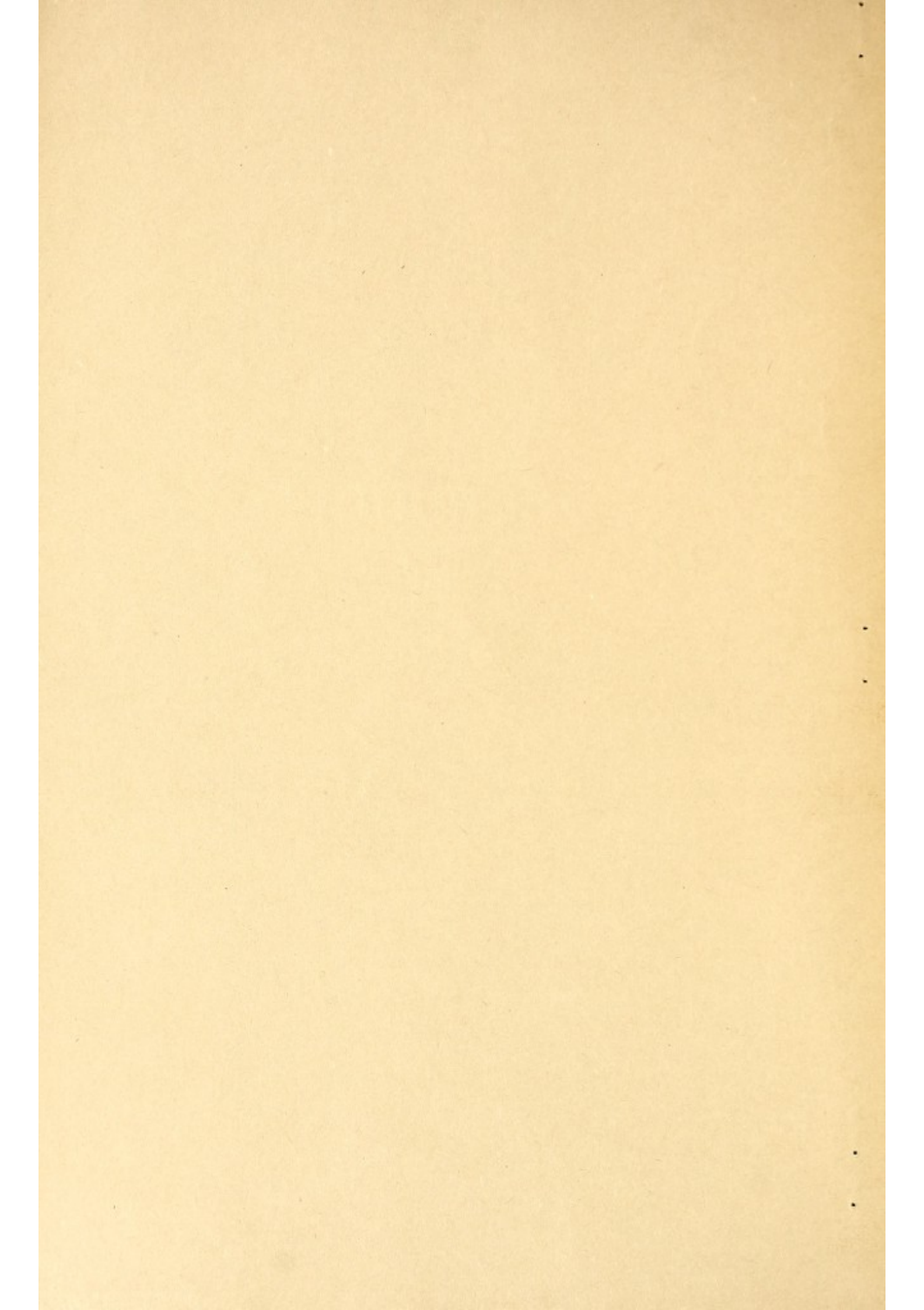

Mr. Mayor, Ladies & Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my annual report for the year 1967, in accordance with Regulation 15(5) of the Public Health Officers Regulations, 1959.

During the thirty years which have elapsed since 1938 when I was appointed Medical Officer of Health of the Borough of Calne, great changes and improvements in the public health have taken place.

The Borough has grown in population from 4,824 to 9,290; the number of inhabited houses has increased from 1,424 to 2,972; the rateable value has increased from £24,970 to £308,011 and a penny rate now produces £1,217 instead of £97. 18. 6d.

The more serious infections such as Diphtheria, Scarlet Fever, Pneumonia and Poliomyelitis are fortunately becoming things of the past due to the various schemes of immunisation of children introduced during the last war and since extended. The future immunisation of infants and children against measles will further reduce the amount of sickness in the child population.

Pulmonary tuberculosis is not yet eradicated and it is essential that children are immunised against this infection whenever necessary and that the adult population, especially the elderly, makes full use of the Mass Radiography Unit.

Intestinal infections require careful enquiry and diagnosis and there is a tendency for them to increase. Strict observance of personal hygiene is essential if the spread of these infections is to be prevented.

Estimates of Birth Rates and Death Rates in small populations show wide fluctuations on account of the small numbers involved, nevertheless the birth rate is now 21.1 compared with 11.82 in 1938 and the death rate is now 10.6 compared with a rate of 13.88 in 1938. The expectation of life has been raised and more of the population, particularly women, can now look forward to a survival to at least three score years and ten - an infrequent event in the past.

The activities of the Council in providing good housing, adequate sewage disposal and refuse collection, a pure water supply and supervision of the handling, processing and distribution of food, have been major contributions to the present very satisfactory state of the public health.

My thanks are due to the Council and its officers for the unfailing courtesy I have always received during my long service as your Medical Officer of Health, and I leave with regret an appointment which I have found to be both interesting and stimulating.

LOCAL HEALTH AUTHORITY SERVICES.

The County Council Health Committee provide the following Health Services:-

1. The care of expectant and nursing mothers and young children.
2. Provision of midwives and maternity nurses.
3. Provision of Health Visitors. A new development is the arrangement whereby Health Visitors will work in closer liaison with General Practitioners.
4. Home Nurses.
5. Arrangements for vaccination and immunisation.
6. Ambulances.
7. Mental Health Services.
8. Home Helps. Such help is available if members of a household are ill, lying-in, suffering from mental illness or aged. A charge is made for such services.
9. Arrangements for the prevention of illness, care and after-care.
10. Health Education.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES.

School Health Services are provided by the County Education Committee. In addition to the routine inspection of children of certain age groups in schools, a variety of facilities are provided with the aim of finding, assessing and treating physical and mental handicaps, so helping the child to make the best use of education.

Mr. Mayor, Lady & Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year, 1967.

The growth rate of the Borough was maintained fully during the year. It became necessary to review critically, the position of the refuse disposal service and to continue the planned expansion of the sewage disposal works.

The Borough Council agreed in principle to join with neighbouring Authorities in the establishment of a central refuse disposal plant. Preliminary talks were held and representatives of the proposed constituent Authorities visited the Ministry of Housing and Local Government to discuss the matter in further detail.

Problems arising at the By-Products factory of Messrs. C. & T. Harris (Calne) Ltd. and F.M.C. are being tackled with vigour but the drainage and effluent disposal from the Marden Farm Pig Experimental Unit gives rise to concern.

The scheme for securing a 100% meat inspection in the slaughterhouses within the Borough is operating well.

I am indebted to the members of the Public Health Committee, Dr. Broomhead, The Medical Officer of Health, Mr. Cowley, Deputy Public Health Inspector and other members of the staff for their support throughout the year.

The total rainfall for the year was 26.899 inches.

The wettest day was February 27th, being .850.

The driest month was April and the wettest month October.

WATER.

The water undertaking is operated by the North Wilts Water Board and the Borough receives water from Chippenham and Yatisbury as well as the springs at Calstone.

Samples of 'consumer water' i.e. treated water from household taps, are submitted to the Public Health Laboratory, Bath each week, to establish a routine control. Further samples are taken on complaint.

During the year under review 70 samples of chlorinated water were submitted and 66 of these proved to be satisfactory. The unsatisfactory samples showed insufficient chlorination of the water following repairs to the main. A series of check samples quickly showed that the required dosage had been restored to the water supply. Information on unsatisfactory samples is referred immediately to the North Wilts Water Board.

From time to time tests are also taken to establish the degree of residual chlorine present in the water.

WATER SUPPLY. INFORMATION REQUIRED BY CIRCULAR 1/67.

- (a) The water supply has been generally satisfactory.
- (b) No Bacteriological samples of raw water have been taken.
- (c) The water supply is not plumbo solvent.
- (d) Where contamination of piped water is detected as a result of routine sampling the North Wilts Water Board are informed immediately.

SEWAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

It is estimated that the percentage of all inhabited houses in the Borough not connected to the sewer is less than 2% and this is due to insufficient fall and isolation.

It is hoped to reduce this percentage still further by sewerage the extreme Northern part of the Borough with the aid of a pumping station and a scheme has been prepared and tender accepted.

The Council's Consulting Engineers are preparing a scheme to enlarge the existing Sewage Disposal Works to cope with development which has taken place within the Borough, and proposed development.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

The Council operates a weekly collection of household refuse using direct labour. Salvage is collected each Monday. The service continues to operate satisfactorily despite the increased demands consequent upon a growing population. This has necessitated an increase of the collection staff and a new refuse vehicle has also been added.

The refuse from the Borough is disposed of by the Sanitary Landfill method, the refuse being dumped in the sand workings of a Local Company and covered with top soil to reclaim the land which has been exposed.

DISCRETIONARY GRANTS.

There was one Discretionary Grant approved and paid during 1967 in the sum of £355.

CERTIFICATE OF DISREPAIR (RENT ACT 1957).

No applications were received for Certificates of Disrepair or for any other certificates prescribed by the Act.

SALE OF COUNCIL HOUSES.

Council houses are no longer being sold to the tenants.

COUNCIL'S WAITING LIST.

The number of people on the Council's waiting list at the 31st December, 1967 was 274 (approximately).

IMPROVED COUNCIL HOUSES.

Improvements to 20 Council houses were completed during the year. These houses are now equipped with the five standard amenities.

PROPERTIES IN CLEARANCE AREAS.

Following objections, a Public Enquiry into the Borough Council's proposals, reference Curzon Street Clearance Area, was held in the Town Hall on 5th December, 1967.

RODENT CONTROL. PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949.

The Council employ a part-time rodent operator to treat all premises in the Borough where rats or mice are reported. Extensive use is made of Warfarin, one of the better anti-coagulants, to destroy rats and mice, but acute poisons such as zinc-phosphide and arsenious oxide are also used in conjunction with various baits, in an effort to avoid an immunity being built up against Warfarin. No case of 'Warfarin Resistance' has been encountered.

Hydrogen cyanide has also been used effectively, under proper weather conditions, in the treatment of the refuse tip and river banks.

The sewer network within the Borough was treated twice during the year and no serious infestation is apparent.

Two large migratory infestations were discovered and effectively dealt with during the year.

It has not been necessary to take legal proceedings against any owner or occupier, under the Act.

THE SLAUGHTER OF PIGS (ANAESTHESIA) REGULATIONS, 1958.

Messrs. C. & T. Harris (Calne) Ltd., continue to slaughter pigs using the CO₂ chamber method. This is licensed by the Borough Council and a certificate of approval under Regulation 9, is in force. The Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food are informed that the apparatus is in use.

THE DISEASES OF ANIMALS (WASTE FOOD) ORDER 1957.

The Borough Council exercise powers of delegation under the above Order and four boiling plants are licensed and inspected from time to time.

MEAT INSPECTION REGULATIONS 1963. STATUTORY INSTRUMENTS 1963/1229.INSPECTION OF MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

The Borough Council continues to provide a 100% meat inspection service at the two slaughterhouses within the Borough. At the slaughterhouse of Messrs. C. & T. Harris (Calne) Limited the full time inspectorate consists of a Veterinary Officer and five Authorised Meat Inspectors.

During the year 177,847 pigs were slaughtered and examined at this factory.

At the other slaughterhouse, that of Messrs. L. & O. Hawkins, the inspection is carried out by the Council's two Public Health Inspectors, this duty being largely carried out after normal working hours. This slaughterhouse caters mainly for the slaughter of animals destined for sale at the Central Markets, Smithfield, London, but also serves the requirements of butchers in the Borough and the surrounding areas.

The amount of money recovered from Messrs. Hawkins for inspection services provided throughout the year 1967 was £425. 18. 6.

One case of localised bovine tuberculosis was encountered during the year. The Ministry of Agriculture Fisheries and Food were acquainted with the details. This case represents 0.214% of the cattle slaughtered.

CONDEMNATION OF FOODSTUFFS OTHER THAN AT THE SLAUGHTERHOUSE.

The increased amount condemned reflects the opening of a wholesale food warehouse in the Borough.

THE MILK (SPECIAL DESIGNATIONS) REGULATIONS 1960 and 1963.

Licences were issued for various designated mills to four dealers by the Borough Council under the Delegation Agreement with the Wiltshire County Council.

Since the 31st December, 1965 dealer's licences granted will continue in force for a period of five years.

In addition 7 sets of bottle rinses were submitted for bacterial examination and all gave satisfactory results.

10 samples of untreated milk were submitted for biological examination during the year, and all were found to be free from Tuberculosis and also negative on ring test for *Brucella Abortus*.

ICE CREAM.

19 premises within the Borough are registered for the storage, and sale of ice cream. In addition three mobile shops tour the area regularly. 68 samples of ice cream were purchased and sent for analysis to the Public Health Laboratory at Bath, during the year. All these samples were found to be of Grade I.

THE FOOD HYGIENE (GENERAL) REGULATIONS 1960.

Regular inspections are made of all food premises within the Borough under the provisions of the above Regulations. In the main the premises are found to be quite sound structurally as a result of previous visits. Minor infringements are found from time to time and these have been dealt with very satisfactorily through a policy of informal action and instruction so that it has not been necessary to take legal proceedings against any food trader during the year. The staffs of Wiltshire County Council School Kitchens were visited before each term and given a 'pep talk' on food handling.

A minor outbreak of food poisoning involving 5 children and 7 staff at a local school occurred during the year. Intensive enquiries revealed that the illness had been introduced via an infected ox tongue from which the causative agent, Cl. Welchii was isolated. The tongues were supplied by a Hampshire firm.

OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963.

H.M. Inspector has been asked to report on the office block of Messrs. C. & T. Harris (Calne) Limited, which falls into a special category. Broadly speaking all premises as defined in the Act have been registered with the Local Authority and subsequent inspections made to ensure compliance with the Act and Regulations.

The following report is taken from the Annual Report sent to the Minister of Labour and shows the progress made to date.

NUMBER OF PREMISES REGISTERED AND INSPECTED.
