SEWERAGE AND DRAINAGE.

A report relative to the drainage facilities in the respective Parishes was given in the 1938 report, hence as there has been no material alteration (with the exception of two Parishes) and in view of present circumstances, no useful purpose would be served in reiterating the details.

During the year under review the new Sewerage and Disposal Works at Corsham were completed. It is proposed to give a full description of the scheme and the Works at a more opportune time. The advent of this scheme has enabled the upper and lower outfalls to be abandoned, the former having been entirely demolished. The independent Sewage Disposal installation serving the Council Houses at Potley Lane and Gastard are now connected with the new scheme, hence these works are now dismantled.

New Sewage Disposal Works were also completed at Colerne, but the scheme did not include the sewering of the whole village. This has been postponed until more favourable times. These works, however, have removed two sources from which nuisances were constantly recurring. Reference is made to the two old outfalls, where crude sewage was discharged into dit ches, and therefore the removal of these outfalls can be appreciated. A full description of the works will be recorded in a subsequent report.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

There was no specific case in which it was considered necessary to take any action to check the pollution of any river or stream.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

This essential service of Public Health administration, which was originally undertaken by several individual contractors is now under the control of one Contractor.

The household refuse is now collected in a properly designed Scavenging Vehicle and periods of collection vary according to the Urban or Rural character of the Parish, hence collections are made at weekly, fortnightly, monthly or quarterly intervals.

The only Parishes from which refuse is not collected by the Council are Castle Combe, Grittleton and Stanton St. Quintin. It is, however, probable that Castle Combe will be included in the ensuing year.

Old quarries, disused pits and the like are used for the deposition of refuse. Tips are supervised and covered with soil periodically, while the acquisition of any new tips provides an opportunity for a method of controlled tipping to be adopted.

OFFENSIVE TRADES.

No complaints have been received concerning offensive trades. All fish frying premises in the district have been kept in a satisfactory condition.

RAG AND FLOCK ACTS, 1911 and 1923.

There are no premises in this district which are governed by the provisions of these Acts.

RAT AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACTS.

During the year under review, the refuse tips in this district have been baited with a proprietary rat poison by the Council's employees.

In addition the Council engage the services of a professional Rat Catcher to bait and attend to the Council's refuse tips twice yearly, and I am pleased to report that our refuse tips are now reasonably free from vermin.

Despite war conditions efforts have been made to maintain the sanitary services of the district in a satisfactory manner and, while there has been unavoidable suspension or curtailment of various duties usually performed under normal conditions, additional tasks were undertaken in respect of Salvage, War Damage, Fire Brigades Organisation, Food Decontamination Scheme, etc. The department was also responsible for assisting the Chippenham Borough Sanitary Inspector in the examination of carcases at the Central Slaughterhouse and Bacon Factories.
