

Each Nurse during the year paid over 14 visits a day, with several large areas, sparsely populated, and several miles apart. In addition to this, 72 days in a year are allocated for Centre work, and all the Centres are widely apart. I have examined the Nurses Record Books, and advised that more details should be inserted, as to condition of mother, of child, or of environment.

It is proposed to start an Ante-natal Clinic in the District, and I have instructed the Nurses in all cases of suspicious odema in pregnant women to have specimens of urine submitted for examination by the Welfare Doctors or myself, and to refer any woman with abnormal symptoms to their own Doctor or the Clinic Doctors.

Child Welfare.

Early in the New Year, the Council authorised the Health Visitors to visit a number of Child Welfare Centres with a view

to studying the various systems in operation.

On the suggestion of the Staffordshire, Wolverhampton and Dudley Joint Committee, the Council had under consideration the appointment of an After-Care Committee for Tuberculosis Cases. Under the scheme of the Joint Committee, the following districts have been constituted:—

- No. 1. Acton, Bednall, Coppenhall, Dunston, Huntington, Kinvaston, Penkridge, and Teddesley Hay.
- No. 2. Brewood, Stretton, and Lapley.

No. 3. Bushbury. No. 4. Essington.

Brewood Centre

No. 5. Cheslyn Hay and Great Wyrley.

No. 6. Featherstone, Hilton, Shareshill, Saredon, and Hatherton.

A number of ladies have been invited to serve on the above

Committee, and to visit cases in the various districts coming under the notice of the Joint Committee.

Towards the end of the year it became apparent that there was a growing necessity for the establishment of an Infant Welfare Centre at Landywood, Great Wyrley. Action was taken by the Council to obtain suitable premises to hold a Centre.

It was decided to hold the Centre at Brewood on the fourth Wednesday in each month, instead of the fourth Thursday.

Bushbury Sewerage.

Instructions were given for the preparations or carrying out of schemes of sewerage, and the treatment and disposal of sewage for the Low Hill, New Oxley, and Fordhouses portions of the Parish of Bushbury. The proposals of the Council have been submitted to the Minister of Health, and the necessary Local Enquiries held. In the case of New Oxley and Fordhouses, a loan has been sanctioned of £15,360 to defray the cost of carrying out the schemes and for the construction of the works. A Contract has been entered into in each case. The scheme for Low Hill includes provision for dealing with storm and surface water. Negotiations are proceeding to obtain a loan for carrying out the work.

Bushbury Mortuary.

A Hand-wheeled Ambulance, fitted with moveable stretchers has been purchased, much improvement being thereby effected.

Bushbury, Essington, Featherstone, and Hilton Sewerage.

During the year a joint scheme for the drainage of portions of the Parishes of Bushbury, Essington, Featherstone, and Hilton was prepared. A Local Enquiry has been held, and a loan of £11,000 sanctioned. This loan has been obtained. A Contract has been entered into for the construction of work. Good progress with the work has been made.

Isolation Hospital.

Early in the year, the Engineer, Mr. H. M. Whitehead, submitted to the Council plans and proposals for the provision of a Porter's Lodge and Discharge Block near the Entrance Gates to the Hospital. In view of the financial liabilities of the Council, it was decided to postpone the work.

Report of the Sanitary Inspector,

To the Chairman and Members of the Cannock Rural District Council.

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit to you my Report as Sanitary Inspector, etc., for the Year ending 31st December, 1925.

Scavenging.

The Council, by Contract, undertake the work of removal of House Refuse in the Parishes of Bushbury, Cheslyn Hay, Essington, Huntington, and Great Wyrley.

In the remainder of the District, at present, this work devolves upon the occupiers of the houses themselves.

There are in the above five Parishes, 3,530 Houses, being 1,325, 694, 548, 345, and 618 respectively.

Since the appointment of my assistant, much more efficient supervision of this work has been possible, and it is being carried out a great deal more satisfactorily.

The total of 4.524 ashpits, which have been inspected, shows more frequent visits, and the results are evident, as there are no large number of houses with accumulations of refuse.

The L.M. and S. Railway Company have been tipping the refuse from some of their Stations at Fordhouse Road, Bushbury. As this refuse was rather offensive and was being tipped too near to houses, the Company have, at my request, ceased tipping at this place.

Considerable time had to be spent in supervising the emptying of cesspools at Oxley, and the Low Hill Estate, Bushbury, and at 44 houses, Canneck Road, Essington. The large cesspool in Greenwood Road, Bushbury, has had to be frequently treated with disinfectants.

Slaughter Houses and Meat Inspection.

There are at the end of the year 19 Slaughter Houses in the District; 12 of these are Licensed and 7 are Registered, and they are situate as follows: Bushbury 4, Brewood 6, Cheslyn Hay 3, Essington 1, Penkridge 3, Wheaton Aston 2, and there is one place Licensed as a Knackers' Yard at Penkridge.

During the year 13 Licences were renewed, and one new Licence granted to erect a Slaughter House.

314 Inspections of Slaughter Houses were made, and 9 of them required whitewashing, and these were done. On the whole the places are kept satisfactorily.

903 Inspections of meat were made at the Slaughter Houses and Shops, and the Meat generally was of a very good quality. Several organs and portions of meat were found to be diseased, and these were destroyed.

Under the Meat Regulations, 268 visits were made to shops and private houses where pigs were slaughtered. I found the regulations were fairly well carried out. In every case I found the cottager's pig of very good quality, and this I attribute to the cleaner food and better care given to the animals.

Workshops and Bakehouses.

93 Inspections of Workshops and Bakehouses were made. Nine Bakehouses and 7 Workshops were found to need white-washing and these were done. The sanitary accommodation at two Workshops was defective and was remedied.

There are 18 Bakehouses in the District, situate as follows: Bushbury 2, Brewood 6, Cheslyn Hay 2, Great Wyrley 2, Penkridge 4, and Wheaton Aston 2.

Petroleum Acts.

68 Inspections were made under the Petroleum Acts, and the places were found to be kept satisfactorily.

There are 37 yersons licensed to store and sell petrol, and of these 15 have now underground tanks and pumps, which is the best method of storing petrol in bulk.

37 Petrol Licences and 7 Carbide Licences were renewed, and 4 new Licences to store Petrol and 4 to store Carbide of Calcium were granted.

Shop Acts, 1912-1913.

I have made 326 visits under the Shops Acts, and on the whole I found that the requirements were being complied with, except the exhibiting of the notice showing the day of closing.

I have supplied information to a large number of shop keepers on various points.

There are now on the Register 240 Shopkeepers.

Cowsheds and Dairies.

There were on the Register at the end of the year 211 per sens, 142 as wholesale producers of milk, 42 as wholesale producers and retail purveyors of milk, and 28 as retail purveyors of milk.

During the year 12 persons were registered as wholesale producers of milk, and 3 as retail purveyors of milk.

240 Inspections of Cowsheds and Dairies were made. A good number of the sheds required whitewashing, and these were subsequently done. The drainage at 8 sheds was defective, and at 18 sheds the light and ventilation was defective, and at 20 sheds there were defective channels. Notices for these to be remedied were served.

The efforts on the part of the milk producer to ensure cleaner milk are becoming noticeably better, but there is a lot of alteration needed in the methods at a good number of farms before really clean milk is general.

The New Regulations which are proposed to be made under the Milk and Dairies (Consolidation) Act, 1915, will be eagerly awaited.

There are in this District three farms which produce Grade A milk, at two of which the milk is bottled. Grade A Milk Certificates are granted by the County Council.

This Council have granted a licence for "Pasteurised Milk" to be produced at one farm. At this farm there is a good and efficient pasteurising plant. The milk is put into containers, where it is retained for 30 minutes at a temperature of 145 degrees

Far., and afterwards cooled by brine cooler to about 40 degrees Far., and it is then immediately automatically bottled and sealed. There is also a refrigerator in which all milk not for immediate delivery is stored. There is a good apparatus for washing the bottles, and for which there is a good supply of water and steam.

The sample I took for bacteriological examination had a temperature of 42 degrees Far., and the analyst's certificate showed that Coliform Bacillus were present in 1/10th cubic centimetre, but in 1/100th cubic centimetre, Coliform Bacillus were entirely absent, and the total organisms present were under 1,000 per c.c. This is a very low count

Water Certificates and Water Supplies.

I have inspected 357 newly erected Houses and 32 Bunga lows, for which applications have been made for Water Certificates under the Public Health (Water) Act, 1878.

All the Houses in Bushbury and in Brewood are supplied from the Wolverhampton Corporation Water Mains.

The Houses at Huntington, Great Wyrley, and Penkridge are supplied from the South Staffordshire Waterworks Mains.

The Houses at Cannock Road, Essington, are supplied from the Hilton Main Colliery.

One House at Hatherton, one at Brewood, and one at Wheaton Aston are supplied from wells.,

The Welverhampton Corporation have laid the Water Mains in Brewood, and there is now a good supply available. I have sent notices and particulars to all owners of houses, and a request to have the premises connected to the mains as soon as possible. At the end of the year there were 147 houses connected, and a number of others in hand.

Dunston and Coppenhall Water Supplies.

I have made a survey of the supplies of water in the Parishes of Dunston and Coppenhall. I have taken a sample of water from each well and tested same.

In Dunston there are 63 Houses, 22 along the Stafford Main Road from Acton Gate to Dunston Hall, 30 on Dunston Heath from the Schools to the Toft, and 11 on Little Heath.

At these Houses there are:-

23 Wells with Pumps. 6 Open Draw Wells.

7 Cottages having no independent supply.

Of the 29 samples tested, 6 were, in my opinion, of fairly good quality and quite fit for drinking. Ten showed some little pollution and were unsafe for drinking, and 13 were rather badly polluted and were unfit for drinking.

At Coppenhall, there are 19 Houses, and these are supplied from 11 Wells with Pumps and one Open Draw Well.

One House is connected to the South Stafford Water Mains at the Hyde Lea Boundary.

I tested 11 samples, and, in my opinion, 5 of them were fairly good, and 6 showed more or less poliution, and were unsafe for drinking.

The Water in Coppenhall was, on the whole, of a better quality than in Dunston.

Drainage, Oxley.

The New Sewers at Oxley, Bushbury, are now in hand, and when completed the Houses can be connected, and so end the insanitary conditions caused by the cesspools.

Broad Lane, Long Lane, and Newtown, Essington.

The insanitary state of the drainage and disposal of the sewage at the premises in Broad Lane, Long Lane, and Newtown, continues.

Some progress has been made with the scheme for new Sewers and Sewage Works, but there are difficulties in the way of the work being commenced.

Drainage, Great Wyrley.

The extension of the Sewer near the Great Wyrley Church bas now been put in hand, and the nuisance caused from several premises, the drainage from which lay in the ditch, will soon be remedied.

Penkridge Sewerage.

In the village of Penkridge there are a large number of premises at which the drainage and the disposal of the sewage is very bad and insanitary.

I am unable to do much to properly remedy these matters, and the work is being held up and conditions are getting worse through the lack of proper sewers.

The provision of a proper system of sewers and sewage works for the village of Penkridge is much needed.

Bushbury Housing.

During the year, a Survey was made of 902 Houses in the Parish of Bushbury, in connection with overcrowding.

In these Houses there were 3,760 inmates, giving an average of 4.16 per house.

There are 54 Houses with 2 families, and in these houses there are 306 inmates, giving an average of 5.66 per house.

34 of these families expressed a desire to have a separate house.

There are a large number of workpeople, working in Bushbury, but now residing elsewhere, who wish for a house in Bushbury.

To show the variation of numbers of occupants, there were 10 three-bedroomed houses with only one occupant to each, and 130 with 2 occupants, and 227 houses with 3 inmates in each house.

The total number of inmates in these 367 Houses was 951, having only an average of 2.59 per house.

The following particulars as to the Housing and Sanitary arrangements in the Parish of Bushbury will be interesting:—

In the whole of the Parish there are 1,250 occupied Houses, 1 Church, 2 Schools, and 3 large Works (Electrical Construction Company, The Star Engineering Company, and Macfarlane and Robinson's).

All the Houses with Tap Water are connected to the Wolverhampton Corporation Water Mains.

The Scavenging is done by Contract, the dust bins and pans are emptied once every fortnight, and the ashpits every two to three months. The tip for dry refuse is at the Northeycote Farm, and all nightsoil is carted direct on to the land.

Since 1918, New Houses have been built as follows:-

- 40 Houses have been erected by the Cannock Rural District Council, and Conract has also been given for 24 more at Fordhouses.
- 46 Houses erected with Subsidy from other Authorities.
- 42 Houses erected (without Subsidy) by Private Enterprise.
- 42 Houses have been erected with Subsidy from the Can nock Rural District Council.
- 274 Houses have been erected by the Wolverhampton Corporation, which are all occupied. (156 of these are on the Oxley Estate, and 118 are on the Low Hill Estate.
- 1000 Houses are being erected on the Low Hill Estate, and, in addition to the 118 occupied, a large number of others are near completion.
- 722 Houses are connected to the Sewers of the Cannock Rural District Council, the sewage of which is treated by the Wolverhampton Corporation.
- 54 Houses are connected to the Heath Town Sewers.
- 34 Houses are connected to the Cannock Rural District Council Sewers at Fordhouses, and treated at a small Outfall Works there.

The Cannock Rural District Council are now constructing Sewers and a Pumping Station to take the drainage from about 200 Houses at New Oxley and Oxley Bank, with provision for further developments. This sewage will be pumped to the Wolverhampton Sewage Works.

Water Supplies to Schools.

- Bushbury.—Council Schools, Bushbury Jane; Bushbury Old Schools. These Schools have water from the Wolverhampton Corporation Mains.
- Brewood.—Church of England Schools; Roman Catholic Schools; The Grammar Schools. These Schools have now got the water laid on from the Wolverhampton Corporation Mains.
- Bishops Wood Schools.—There is a well at these Schools, but the drinking water is obtained from a spring near the gateway, the water of which is quite good.
- Coven School.—Now obtain the water from the Wolverhampton Corporation Mains.
- Bednall Schools .- Water is obtained from a well.
- Cheslyn Hay Schools.—Water obtained from the South Staffordshire Water Mains.
- Dunston Schools.—Obtain water from a well. The water is of a fair quality, but the Stafford Corporation are laying water mains in Dunston, and it will be possible for these Schools to be connected.
- Essington C. of E. and Council Schools.—Water obtained from the Wolverhampton Corporation Mains.
- Great Wyrley and Landywood Schools.-Water is laid on from the South Staffordshire Mains.
- Gailey Schools .- Obtain water from well.
- Penkridge C. of E. and Council Schools.—Obtain water from the South Staffordshire Water Mains.
- Shareshill Schools.—Obtain the water from well, but the water mains are now laid, and it will be possible to have the tap water laid on.
- Stretton School .- Water from well.
- Wheaton Aston School .-- Water from well.
- Huntington C. of E. and Council Schools.—Water is laid on from the South Staffordshire Water Mains.
