To the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee of the Cannock Rural District Council:-

I have the honour to present to you the Annual Report for the year 1945 on the health and sanitary conditions of the district: a report from your Chief Sanitary Inspector is included.

Of the Infectious Diseases, there were 468 cases of measles, mainly in the first five months of the year. The type was of moderate severity, and one death was attributable to this disease.

Of diphtheric there were 29 cases and no deaths. The number of children protected by immunisation showed an increase on last year, and can be counted a satisfactory number.

Towards the end of 1944, it was realised that the appointment of an Additional Sanitary Inspector would be necessary to bring the number of Sanitary Inspectors up to the normal pre-war number of two. Mr.R.A.B. Margoschis, an ex-service man, was appointed and commenced duty in April 1945. His main task has been the survey of houses in the district: and by the end of the year over 750 houses had been examined and scheduled.

In early Autumn the Government Billeting of Evacuees in this district came to an end.

I acknowledge with thanks the willing and loyal assistance given me by the Senior and Additional Sanitary Inspectors: and by Miss Eccleshall in the Clerical Department.

To you, Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen, I wish again to express my thanks for help given during the year.

ANTI-NATAL CLINICS AND WELFARE CLINICS IN CANNOCK RURAL DISTRICT.

Report of Sanitary Inspector.

ANTHRAX.

During the year 10 suspected cases of Anthrax were reported compared with 8 in the previous year.

WATER SUPPLIES.

The chief water supplies in the district remain the same and are obtained from the South Staffordshire Water Works Co., and the Wolverhampton Corporation which supply Cheslyn Hay, Great Wyrley, Huntington, Hatherton, Penkridge and the larger portion of the parishes of Brewood, Stretton, Essington, Shareshill, Featherstone, Hilton, Lapley, Wheaton Aston, and Saredon. The Stafford Corporation supplies Coppenhall and Dunston. During the year the Hamlet of Laney Green was provided with piped water from South Staffordshire Water Works Co., It is estimated that 4,250 out of 6,130 houses have a piped water supply.

RURAL HOUSING SURVEY.

The survey in this district commenced in April 1945 but did not get under way until June. At the close of the year 763 houses had been inspected and classified.

Each house, or **row** of houses, is separately considered and put into one of the five classes agreed on by the Staffordshire Rural Housing Advisory Committee. Of the houses inspected 5.09% are considere satisfactory in all respects while 4.6% are considered totally unfit.

The results of the Survey so far are as follows:-

Statutory 40 Statutory Notices had been served affecting <u>Notices.</u> some 70 houses, and requiring provision of a proper water supply, adequate closet accommodation and dustbins.

Informal In addition 53 Informal Potices have been served affecting <u>Notices.</u> Some 350 houses. These are served mainly on Class 2 and 3 houses requiring urgent repairs to be carried out and on Class 4 and 5 only to maintain them in a weatherproof condition.

Overcrowding. The Houses are also considered with regard to Overcrowding, thus bringing the 1936 Overcrowding Survey up to date and incorporating it on the same House Report sheet. It has been found that in 36 cases the number of people occupying the house is in excess of the permitted number, this represents 4.7% of the houses inspected.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

During the year Public Cleansing by direct labour was continued in the Parishes of Brewood, Penkridge, Stretton and Lapley, and the populated parts of Weston-under-Lizard, Brineton, Blymhill and extended to Huntington, Acton Trussell and Bednall.

The emptying of cesspools in the Parishes of Brewood, Cheslyn Hay, Great Wyrley, Saredon, Essington, Huntington, Featherstone, Hilton Shareshill and Hatherton was done as in previous years by the council's cesspool emptier.

The regular fortnightly and weekly collections have been maintained by your Contractor in the Parishes of Cheslyn Hay, Great Wyrley, Essington, Shareshill, Saredon, Hilton, Featherstone and Hatherton.
