Health Report for 1914.

To the Chairman and Members of the Castle Donington Rural District Council.

GENTLEMEN,

I have much pleasure in presenting my First Annual Report on the health and general Sanitary condition of the District,

Upon the whole, the general health of the district during the year has been very good. Considerably more than half the number of deaths registered have occurred in persons over 65 years of age, and there has been remarkable freedom from Infectious Disease.

The area of the District is 15,938 acres, slightly over 22 square miles.

The principal geological formations are :-

Breedon.—Keuper sandstone and marl, carboniferous limestone,

Castle Donington.—Keuper sandstone and marl.

Kegworth.—Keuper sandstone and marl.

Diseworth, Hemington, Isley Walton.—New red marl.

Lockington.—Alluvium principally, but the village stands on new red marl.

The rateable value in April, 1914, was £39,939, consisting of Agricultural Land, £17,986; Buildings and other hereditaments, £21,953.

The principal industries are Agriculture, Basket Making, Hosiery Making, Brewing and Quarries.

No imported labour for fruit or pea-picking is employed in the district.

VITAL STATISTICS.

Population.—At the 1901 Census the population was 6.223, and in 1911 it was 6,416, an increase of 193 during the ten years. Kegworth is the only parish in which the population increased to any extent, the rural parishes showing a decrease, and Castle Donington remaining practically stationary.

Births.—One hundred and seventeen births were registered during the year, as compared with 125 in 1913, giving a birth-rate for the year of 18.23 per 1,000 of the population. This is the lowest birth-rate ever recorded for the district.

Of the children born during the year, 59 were males and 58 were females.

The natural increase or excess of births over deaths was 25.

The birth-rate for the year for England and Wales was per 1000.

Deaths.—The number of deaths registered as actually occuring within the District was 82. Three of these were of persons non-resident in the district, but on the other hand, 13 residents died in other districts. Notifications of these were received from the Registrar General, and they must be added to those actually occuring within the District. This gives a total of 92 deaths. Giving a nett annual death-rate of 14.3 per 1,000 of the population.

INFANT MORTALITY.—During the year eleven infants died in their first year. During 1913, the number was nine. This is about 10.2 per cent of the total number of deaths registered.

The infant death-rate in England and Wales was per 1000, or in other words, for every children born, one died before reaching the age of one year.

The infant deaths occurred as follows:—Castle Donington, 8; Kegworth, 2; Breedon, 1.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

Total number of cases notified were 24, consisting of Diptheria 12. Scarlet Fever 1, Enteric Fever 1, Erysipelas 2, Tuberculosis 8.

Houses infected ... 22

Deaths ... Diptheria 2, Tuberculosis 4,

Tubercular Meningitis 1 (not notified)

Three cases of Diptheria were removed to the Draycott Hospital.

PREVENTIVE MEASURES.—Infected houses were visited and the printed sheets left at them giving instructions on the management of the case, and the precautions necessary to prevent spread of the disease. In all cases post cards are supplied, to be returned to me at the termination of the illness, the premises being then stoved under the supervision of the Inspector. All stoving is done by means of Formalin Vapour.

Antitoxin is supplied on application to the medical attendants of patients not in a position to pay for it themselves.

Bacteriological Examinations in suspected cases of Diptheria and Typhoid Fever are done by the Clinical Research Association.

All insanitary conditions found at infected houses were dealt with by the Inspector.

SMALL POX.—No case was notified during the year. The isolation of Small Pox is in the hands of the County Council.

SCARLET FEVER.—Only one case was notified during the year. It occurred at Diseworth.

DIPTHERIA.—Twelve cases, one at Castle Donington and eleven at Kegworth, Twelve in 10 houses.

ENTERIC FEVER.—One case at Breedon.

PUERPERAL FEVER.-No case during the year.

TUBERCULOSIS.—Eight cases were notified, distributed as

NON-NOTIFIABLE INFECTIOUS DISEASES,—There was very little of any disease in this class and no deaths from the same,

No schools were closed on account of Infectious Disease during the year.

GENERAL SANITATION.

Housing.—The accomodation throughout the District is fairly satisfactory. There is no marked shortage of cottages and but little overcrowding. Attention was given during the year to cases under the Housing and Town Planning Act.

General Character of Defects found.—Dampness, bad and insufficient closet accomodation, bad flooring and spouting, defective light and ventilation.

Sewage Refuse Disposal.—The new houses in the Parishes where there is a public water supply are provided with water closets.

Twenty insanitary privies were converted into water closets, and twenty-nine were repaired and lime-washed.

House Drainage.—This has improved during the year and is now fairly good throughout the District.

Water Supply.—Most of the houses are now supplied with Town Water. Two wells have been closed and town supply substituted. Samples of well water were taken from several wells and analysed by me. Only in two samples was there any evidence of pollution, and this was not very marked.

Systematic Inspection.—The usual systematic inspections were made during the year, and due attention was given to drainage, water supply, closet accommodation, cleanliness, overcrowding, and general sanitation. Many defects were found and notices served, and in most cases complied with.

Schools.—During the year I made the usual systematic inspect ion of the sanitary condition of all the Schools in the District, a detailed report being sent to the County Educational Authority. No special Inspections were necessary in connection with the outbreak of Infectious Disease.

Bye-Laws.—In addition to those under the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Orders, Bye-laws with respect to new streets and buildings are in force over the whole District. They follow the Old Model Bye-Laws, are satisfactory and well enforced. Nothing further has been done in regard to the Bye-Laws for Slaughter Houses. Some better regulations of these premises would be of advantage in Castle Donington and Kegworth, but without Bye-Laws it is difficult to obtain much improvement.

Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops.—Generally speaking the cowsheds in the District are excellent, and it is unusual to find any requiring structural alteration. It is more difficult to obtain cleanliness, and due attention is given to the matter by the Inspector, with I believe, marked improvement, as compared with the state of things last year. Seven notices to lime-wash were served during the year, and duly complied with. Eighty-four persons are registered as dairymen (or milk-sellers) in the district, and the Inspector reports 158 inspections of their premises during the year.

Factories and Workshops Acts.—The provisions of these Acts are carried out to a certain extent. The register of Factories, Workshops and Warehouses is kept by the Inspector. Forty-nine inspections were made and 11 notices served with respect to drainage and want of cleanliness. They were attended to and the nuisances abated.

There are 76 Workshops on the register, including 16 bakehouses.

The bakehouses are all in good structural conditions and there are no underground bakehouses in the district. Three notices to lime-wash were served and duly complied with.

No instance of unemployment of a protected person in any

workshop where no abstract of the Act was posted up, came under my notice during the year,







ANNUAL REPORT OF SANITARY INSPECTOR, 1914.

To the Chairman and Members of the Castle Donington Rural District Council.

GENTLEMEN,

I have much pleasure in presenting to you my Eighteenth Annual Report on the Sanitation of your District,

During the past year the effluent from the Filters at the Castle Donington Sewage Farm has been very good.

The effluent from the Kegworth Sewage Farm has been greatly improved since the Dortmund Tank was built.

I am not issuing a separate Report on the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops, but all information regarding this Branch of my work will be found under that heading.

I append full particulars and figures with respect to General Sanitation work done under the Housing and Town Planning Act, Slaughter Houses. Factories and Workshops, Water Supply, Etc., together with Building operations therewith.

ROUTINE INSPECTIONS.

1382 Houses and Premises were visited and 136 Notices served, which were due chiefly to insanitary closet accommodations, defective drainage and offensive accumulations, yard surfaces, and house spout ing respectively, only 3 cases of overcrowding having to be dealt with.

37 Statutory Notices were served, and no further proceedings were necessary,

2 Wells have been closed and Town Supply laid on.

Practically all the new houses have water closets in the parishes where a public water supply is available.

29 Insanitary privies were repaired and limewashed, and 20 converted into water closets.

318 Visits were paid to the various parishes, including Castle Donington, Kegworth, Hemington, Lockington, Diseworth, Breedon-on-the-Hill, Isley Walton, and Cavendish Bridge.

H.T.P.A.—205 Houses were inspected under this Act, 28 of which were repaired by the owners on receipt of notices, 11 have been demolished, 3 are still under consideration, and 12 have been dealt with under the Public Health Act.

Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milkshops.—There are now 84 persons on the Register, and there are approx. 1137 cows, occupying 128 sheds.

I have made 158 inspections and served 7 notices relating to lime-washing, cleansing, drainage, and floors, the water supplies were satisfactory.

Due care appears to have been taken in keeping the milk clean after it reaches the cooler and churns and storage places, and I have no complaint to make in this respect,

I find very little milk stored, as it is generally cooled and sent away.

Bakehouses.—34 Inspections were made and 3 notices served, which related to lime-washing.

Slaughter Houses.—38 Inspections were made and 5 notices served with respect to lime-washing and cleaning up,

Factories and Workshops.—49 Inspections were made and 11 notices served with respect to lime-washing and drains.

New Houses Built during the Year.—5 New houses have been built at Castle Donington.
