

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

#### CARAVAN SITES AND CONTROL OF DEVELOPMENT ACT, 1960.

Last year's report showed a decrease in the caravan population, brought about by the transfer of Contractors following the opening of the East Midlands Airport and the completion of the Leicestershire section of the M.1 Motorway. This clearance was not continued and the Council were obliged to take action under the relevant Acts which resulted in one unsatisfactory site being cleared of about twelve occupied caravans. At another unlicenced communal site an appeal was made to the Ministry of Housing and Local Government following a refusal which was issued to the Applicant in accordance with the provisions of the Town and Country Planning Act, 1947, but the land was still in occupation at the end of the year.

Some improvement works were however carried out at the two privately owned communal licenced sites in Castle Donington which continue to be fully occupied and well kept. From time to time reports were received of caravan dwellers residing in the area for varying periods, on land adjacent to highways and information was forwarded to the appropriate Authorities since the above Acts cannot apply in such cases.

#### WATER SUPPLIES

At the end of the year the Department continued to co-operate with the North West Leicestershire Water Board as caretaker managers although the takecver date was April, 1966. Last year's report was submitted in retrospect with the passing of control of the powers as Water Authority, a responsiblity the Rural District Council had since 1894.

It can however, be recorded with some gratification that mains water in pipes is provided in all eight parishes in the Rural District. Mains water was brought to parts of the parish of Charley and though it may well be that the whole of the parish will not be supplied for some time it is indeed a progressive step in an area with scattered development.

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#### PUBLIC CLEANSING REFUSE COLLECTION

The volume of refuse collected increased appreciably during the year, commensurate with the increase in the number of private development houses erected, and the continual growth of the traffic through the East Midlands Airport.

The seven to eight days collection has however been maintained to the present time, but it is becoming obvious that a modification of the collection methods used at the Airport will be necessary in the near future.

The controlled tip used by the Council is rapidly filling and it is hoped that the new incinerator unit will be brought into use by the end of 1967. Ministry approval has been obtained and site works have commenced.

A limited street cleansing scheme is operated by the Council in the shopping areas of the larger villages in the District.

There were no prosecutions under the Litter Act, 1958, but the problem of litter still occurs in certain places by careless people dropping their litter in the streets.

During the year litter bins were replaced mainly on account of vandalism and additional bins were provided in the Parishes of Castle Donington, Charley, Diseworth and Long Whatton.

The number of applications for planning permission exceeded last year's total, two hundred and fourteen applications were dealt with.

#### RODENT CONTROL

The Pest Officer is not fully employed with rodent control for part of his time is taken up by other outside duties, including attending to gardens and lawns at properties in the ownership of the Council.

A charge based on the hourly wage rate of the operator, plus the cost of materials and establishment charges is made for the treatment of business premises. Private houses are treated free of charge.

Refuse Tips and Sewage Works are visited frequently and treated as necessary.

#### BUS STATION AND PUBLIC CONVENIENCES

Inspections were carried out at the above premises in Castle Donington mainly on account of damage by vandals. Quite apart from minor misuse on two occasions during the year extensive damage was caused at these Conveniences and although I am sure the Police give their best co-operation it is so difficult to find the persons responsible.

#### PETROLEUM (REGULATIONS) ACTS, 1928 and 1936

Licences were renewed and inspections made at establishments where new installations had been installed. Excavations for tanks are inspected and tests made of pipe lines and tanks before issue of new licences.

#### STREET LIGHTING

The Council continued to co-operate with all the Parish Councils concerning street lighting plans and details of all proposed housing development were sent to the Parish Councils and in some cases additional Group 'B' lights were provided following representations from the parish.

For the first time street lights were introduced to the parish of Charley. Fifteen lights from a point near Oaks Church extending to the gates of Mount Saint Bernard Abbey, were provided together with new lamps that were fitted at the Copt Oak boundary which merged with street lights already provided by the neighbouring Rural District Council.

Additional expenditure had to be met on account of vandalism since many street lights were wantonly damaged.

Standard Grants are not discretionary and local authorities have to make a grant where property has a life of not less than fifteen years. The amount of grants are set out in the House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959 and the Housing Act, 1961.

A grant can only be given to provide certain amenities :-

- (1) Fixed bath or shower in a bathroom.
- (2) A wash hand basin.
- (3) A hot water supply.
- (4) A water closet in or contiguous to the dwelling.
- (5) Satisfactory facilities for storing food.

#### SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

Extensions to the Long Whatton works are in progress, as is the erection of a new disposal unit to accommodate the village of Wilson. Sewer laying in Wilson is almost complete.

Six properties with pail closets were connected to water-borne systems where sewers were available in the district and two new septic tanks were constructed as part of improvement grant works.

There are six existing sewage disposal works and six pumping stations in the district employing a labour force of six attendants.

### BUILDING REGULATIONS, 1965

The new Building Regulations came into full operation on the 1st. February, 1966. During the year one hundred and two plans were submitted and approved under the Building Byelaws and Regulations.

#### HOUSING APPLICATIONS

A total of one hundred and sixty one application for Council Houses were received during the year.

Routine inspections of factories were carried out during the year and all enquiries from H. M. Inspector of Factories were dealt with appropriately.
