GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

Public Health Officers of the Authority.

The staff comprised the Medical Officer of Health, the Deputy Medical Officer - both part time - the Chief Sanitary Inspector, two Additional Sanitary Inspectors and two Clerks. The Sanitary Inspectors are qualified Food Inspectors and also act as Inspectors under the Shops Acts. Mr. E. R. Rogers, the senior clerk, proceeded on active service at the outbreak of war and was replaced by a woman

clerk.

Ambulance Facilities.

No change; the St. John Ambulance Brigade has provided a satisfactory ambulance service in this district for many years.

Laboratory Facilities.

No change except that at the outbreak of war Emergency Laboratory outside London was used.

Nursing in the Home.

As in past years home nursing was carried out by members of the local Nursing Associations.

Clinics and Treatment Centres.

Alternative accommodation was provided in September for two Infant Welfare and Ante-Natal Clinics, but the services were maintained.

Hospitals.

Cases of infectious disease, other than small-pox, were treated at the Caterham and Godstone Joint Board Hospital at Bletchingley.

General hospital accommodation was provided by the Caterham and District Hospital.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water is sampled systematically by officers of the several districts supplied by the East Surrey Water Company. Four samples were submitted for examination by your Chief Sanitary Inspector and the Analyst's report on the sample taken in November is given in the following table :-

Swimming Baths.

There were no public owned swimming baths in this district in 1939, but there were, however, two baths (provided with pressure filters) to which the public was admitted on payment. Some privately owned baths and baths at clubs and schools are also maintained in this area.

Twenty visits were made and Byelaws made by the Council under Section 98 of the S.C.C. Act 1936 with respect to Swimming Baths and Bathing Pools were confirmed by the Ministry of Health in July and came into operation on September 1st. Three samples of swimming bath water were submitted to bacteriological examination. The result of one proved to be most satisfactory; the bacterial content of the other two samples taken from different baths, were not very high but the figures for streptococci in both cases and for coliform bacillus in one case were considered excessive. The associated baths were not used by the public to any great extent, but representations were made to the management of the baths and an increased chlorine dosage was secured.

Eradication of Bed-Bugs.

9 houses.were found to be infested and were satisfactorily disinfested by the Council's staff. No evidence of infestation was found at Council houses.

Having regard to the results of previous samples taken from the herd associated with the one unsatisfactory sample of milk and to two subsequent samples which proved to be satisfactory, the County Authorities considered that the deficiency in fat was due to faulty milking procedure and legal proceedings were not instituted.

Diphtheria. (6 cases).

In one case the diagnosis was not confirmed. One patient had a severe serum reaction. One patient, a girl aged 18, died in hospital. Anti-toxin is always available at The Corner, Caterhamon-the-Hill, and 32,000 units were issued during the year.

Scarlet Fever. (17 cases).

One patient who formerly had lived abroad and who had been inoculated against Malaria and Typhoid developed Anaphylaxis but made a good recovery.

Para-Typhoid. (1 case).

This patient, a girl aged 9, was admitted to the Croydon General Hospital in the first instance as a query appendix case for operation. The widal proved positive and she was transferred to the Isolation Hospital, where she recovered.

Other Notifiable Diseases.

These cases call for no special comment.

Non-Notifiable Acute Infectious Diseases.

The usual increased incidence of Influenza occurred in January and February.

One case of Streptococcal tonsillitis, a nurse on the staff of the Caterham and District Hospital, was admitted to the Isolation Hospital. The occurrence of other nonnotifiable infectious diseases calls for no special mention.

Immunisation.

No arrangements for immunisation against Scarlet Fever have been made by the Council.

In December, the Minister of Health sanctioned a scheme for the provision of facilities for immunisation against diphtheria. The scheme provided for the co-operation of local medical practitioners. Diphtheria Toxoid Alum Precipitated is supplied by the Council.

120 visits were made to dairies and cowsheds during the year.

Satisfactory provision for the sterilisation of milk vessels was made at all dairies and cowsheds in the district.

Ninety-nine per cent. of the milk produced in this district for sale is "Accredited" and sampling, carried out by Officers of the Public Control Department of the County Council, to ascertain that this milk is maintained at the required standard, has not produced one adverse report since the first Accredited licence was issued in 1936.

Mi

The two Pasteurising Establishments were visited periodically. The dairy plant was satisfactorily maintained throughout the year.

16 samples of Pasteurised milk were certified by the Bacteriologist to have satisfied the prescribed test and Phosphatase tests on these samples shewed that the milk had been satisfactorily pasteurised.

One sample of Accredited milk satisfied the methylene blue and the coliform tests.

13 samples of non-graded milk were submitted for examination. Two samples which had been subjected to heat treatment satisfied the prescribed tests for Pasteurised milk and also the Phosphatase test; nine samples of raw milk proved to be up to "Accredited" standard, one contained coliform ballicus in 1/100th m.1. and one failed to satisfy the methylene blue reduction test.

15 sediment tests of raw milk were made. All samples proved to be of a satisfactory degree of cleanliness; 10 of these were in relation to milk produced inside and 5 were associated with milk produced outside the Urban District.
