To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Chard.

Gentlemes.

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for 1943. Overcrowding is still in evidence and is bound to continue until an appreciable number of new houses can be built. 19 condemned houses are still in use owing to lack of alternative accommodation. Housing is probably the most pressing post war problem and will involve an improved water supply and extensions of sewage disposal arrangements.

Shortage of main water has been felt in the district for a considerable period. Similar difficulties have been experienced in surrounding districts. The whole question of water supplies is likely to come under review on a national

scale in the near future.

The influenza epidemic which occurred in the late Autumn was fortunately of a mild type. Two deaths from influenza were reported and one from pneumonia. Influenza was a contributory factor in deaths from other causes, chiefly concerning old people. After five years of War and overcrowded conditions, the health of the town must be considered satisfactory.

General Provision of Health Services for Area.

- Mr. Webb continues the whole work of the Sanitary Department, a heavy burden which should be relieved as soon as circumstances permit.
- 2. (a) Laboratory Facilities-No Change.
 - (b) Ambulance Facilities-No Change.
 - (c) Clinic and Treatment Centres-No new Centres have been opened.
 - (d) Nursing in the Home—Nurse Tonge and Nurse Roylance continue their good work as District Nurses.
 - (e) Hospitals-No Change.
 - (f) War Nursery—Children under 5 years of female war workers are looked after at this Nursery from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. meals being provided at a nominal charge of 1/- per day. The whole time non-resident staff consists of Matron, Warden, Assistant Warden, Nursery Assistant, Nursery Trainee and two part time helpers. There was an average daily attendance of 12 children during the year. Since December 22nd the Nursery has been run by the Warden without a Matron. The average daily attendance has increased since the end of the year and there are now over 20 children accommodated daily. Conditions are satisfactory.
