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

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Chatham.

MR. MAYOR AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for 1949.

BIRTHS

The total number of live births recorded was 857. The birth rate, which, in 1947, reached a peak of 25.5 per thousand living persons, has shown a decline in the past two years, being 21.2 in 1948 and 20.5 in 1949. The number of still births was 19, giving a still birth rate of 0.45 per thousand population.

DEATHS

There were 531 deaths, equal to a death rate of 12.7 per thousand living persons. In 1948, the corresponding figure was 11.2.

Infantile Mortality. (Deaths of infants under one year of age).

The Infant mortality rate is the lowest recorded in the Borough. It is 29.17 per thousand live births.

Infectious Diseases, other than Tuberculosis

There were no serious epidemics during the year. As in 1948, there were no notifications of Diphtheria during 1949. Whooping Cough was the cause of the largest number of notifications, namely, 189 cases during 1949.

There were no infectious diseases deaths other than from Pneumonia, which was the cause of 22 deaths.

TUBERCULOSIS—ALL FORMS

The tables on page 23 show that, whilst the notification rate of Tuberculosis has risen since pre-war years, there has not been a proportionate increase in the death rate. The notification rate which was 1.27 per thousand persons living in the period 1935-1939, was 2.23 in 1949, whilst the death rate, which was 0.69 per thousand persons living in the period 1935-1939, was 0.72 in 1949.

Associated with this increased notification rate, the registered cases of Tuberculosis has risen from 180 in 1940 to 363 at the end of December, 1949.

These figures suggest that methods of diagnosis and treatment have improved, as indeed they have in recent years, mass radiography having detected many cases of early unsuspected infection.

It can be assumed, therefore, that part of the increase in notifications is due to earlier and more frequent diagnosis, but some of it must be attributed to greater infectivity among the community. The spread of infection is facilitated by the existing bad housing conditions and overcrowding and early isolation is more difficult on account of the serious shortage of sanatoria and hospital beds.

Housing

The number of houses erected by the Local Authority in 1949 was 218 and 26 houses were erected by other persons. Demolition orders were made on 24 houses.

The lack of adequate housing conditions still remains the confronting public health problem. In April 1949, there were 1,279 applicants for corporation houses.

SEWERAGE

Additional extensions to the foul sewer, totalling 5,951 yards, were carried out during the year. For details see page 25.

In the preparation of this report, I am indebted to my colleagues in this and other corporation departments for information and figures which they have supplied to me, and I would like to record my appreciation of this help and their co-operation during the year.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank the Chairman and members of the Health Committee for the consideration and support they have given me on many occasions.

Public Cleansing

General public cleansing of street gullies, household and trade refuse is carried out by the Borough Engineer's Department and disposal is by controlled tipping.

House refuse is collected once per week except in the High Street, Military Road and Railway Street area where it is collected three times per week. Trade refuse is collected at the same time as the house refuse except where large quantities need special collection.

In accordance with the decision of the Council, all rubbish tipped must be covered the same night.

Cesspool Work

1,068 complaints of choked drains and cesspool overflows were received, and it was found possible to clear 921 drains from obstruction. Overflowing cesspools made up the remainder of the complaints. The number of cesspools emptied was 147.
